ONCE AGAIN, voters were reminded this past Saturday of the value of a vote, when the area's favorite son, Kent Hance, lost the Senate nomination bid by a total of 509 votes out of almost a million votes cast in the Democratic party runoff.

It has been pointed out that if Hance had received just two more votes per county, statewide, he would have won the election.

Of course, Hance's area backers can see where the Dimmitt native could have won if he had received about ten more votes per county in a 50-county region.

That computes out to about a pair of votes (one married couple), in each community.

But the real key to the election is one we haven't heard expounded upon from any other source. Kent Hance lost the election because there was no local runoffs in Amarillo.

In Potter County, the turnout for Saturday's election was an anemic 7.35 per cent of the registered vote, or only 2,705 voters. Lubbock County, by comparison, had 23,929 voters in the senate race.

Lubbock County likewise did not have any heated local runoffs on the ballot--just a local candidate.

If Potter County could have mustered ten or 15 per cent of their voters at the polls, it could have made the difference in the election.

A longtime county political observer told us Monday "Our area just blew it. They had the opportunity to get 'their man' into the senate, and they just didn't come out to vote."

Saturday's race reminded ye editor of another race about a decade ago, when the state's voters were casting ballots on the prospects of adopting a water plan which would have provided for importation of water for this area.

That vote was turned down, and we recall that in that one, if the voters of this area, which had the most to gain, had turned out with a little more fervor, the issue would have passed. Its failure was a hard blow to the West Texas area.

The failure of conservative-minded people to bother to go to the polls last Saturday may also prove costly, if the liberal Lloyd Doggett wins the election in the fall.

Dana Berend Crowned SW Chianina Queen

Dana Berend, 16-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Berend of Friona, was crowned Southwest Regional Chianina Queen at the contest and show by the SW Chianina Association in Abilene last weekend.

There were 50 applications sent out to Chianina exhibitors in Texas and New Mexico for the queen's event. Two of the applicants, Dana and Christy Carver of Dallas, were chosen for the finals of the competition this past weekend, and Miss Berend was chosen to represent the association.

As winner of the Southwest Regional title, Miss Berend, who will be a junior student at Friona High School next fall, will now enter the national queen's contest in Louisville, Kentucky July 15.

She will be asked to attend various breed sales, and will attend six major Chianina shows to pass out ribbons and trophies to the winners.

In conjunction with the show at Abilene, Miss Berend entered six cattle, winning one first place, two seconds, two thirds and one fourth place.

On June 14, Miss Berend, whose steer Jumper was the Grand Champion at the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show this past year, will enter two of her steers in the Winner's Edge Symposium in Waxahachie.

City, County Voters Give Kent Hance Big Margin

The only thing Kent Hance could regret about his showing in Parmer County in the Democratic runoff is that another 500 voters didn't turn out at the polls.

If that many more folks had voted locally, chances are that Hance would have won the statewide nomination from Lloyd Doggett.

Parmer County gave Hance the largest majority of any county in the 19th Congressional District, and probably of any other county in the state, which cast more than 1,000 votes.

Hance received a gaudy 97.7 per cent of the vote in the county.

1934 Class Looking For 3 Members

The Friona High School graduating class of 1934 will have their Fiftieth Anniversary Reunion Saturday, and Sunday, June 16 and 17 at the Fifth Season Inn, Amarillo.

There were 24 graduates in 1934 and 17 are living. Fourteen of the class members have been contacted about the reunion and three, Wilbur Mead, Maureen Furlong and Oliver Hamblen, have not been reached. The final totals were 1,022 votes for Hance and only 24 votes for Doggett, or 97.7 per cent.

His margin was 333-9 in Friona (97.6 per cent); 157-5 in Bovina (96.9); and 204-6 in Farwell (97.1).

In three of the county precincts, Doggett failed to receive a single vote. Hance won the Lazbuddie precinct, 94-0; took the Oklahoma Lane voting box, 91-0, and won at Rhea, 43-0. He also won the absentee box by a shutout, 33-0.

In the race for the Congressional runoff, Parmer County gave winner Don Richards a good 70 per cent lead over his challenger, Thomas M. Richards, with 704 total votes to 308.

Don Richards' biggest boost in the county came in Friona's precinct 2-2, where he received 58 votes to only eight for the "other Richards," a majority of 87.9 per cent. He won the Black precinct, 24-4, or 85.7 per cent, and won the three Friona precincts combined, 256-83, or 75.5 per cent.

The nominee's margin in Bovina was 111-44, or 71.7 per cent of the vote, and at Farwell it was only 110-83, or 54.2 per cent.

Don Richards won the nomination by a slim 718-vote margin, receiving 29,144 votes to 28,426 for Thomas Richards.

Don won twelve counties to Tom's three, but Tom won big in Ector County (Odessa, 4,376-1,751), and also carried Lubbock County, 12,728 to 10,744. Don's win was made possible by his excellent showing in the rural areas.

Parmer County voters also gave their nod to incumbent winner Bill Davis in the Court of Criminal Appeals race, with 505 votes to 246 for Roy Greenwood.

They also matched the sentiment of statewide returns in the court, place 3 race, giving Bill White a total of 519 votes to 239 for Tom Thorpe.

No Re-Count Is Indicated Here--Yet

According to Parmer County election officials, no re-count has been requested as of Thursday in the Hance-Doggett senate race.

Richard Collard, county Democratic chairman, said he had not been contacted as of Thursday regarding the re-count, requested by Hance.

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



Child Abuse Hotline Is Available

The Parmer County Child Abuse board of directors reminds Parmer County residents that it's the law that any person who believes that a child's physical or mental health or welfare has been, or may be adversely affected by abuse or neglect, must report his or her suspicions to the Texas Department of Human Resources and to a law enforcement agency.

An oral report must be made immediately to the nearest office of the Texas Department of Human Resources, which is Hereford for Parmer County. Their number is 806-364-6841 or call the 24-hour Child Abuse Hotline, 1-800-252-5400.

A person who, without malice, makes a report of suspected child abuse or neglect is immune from civil or criminal liability. Reports of child abuse or neglect are confidential.

Failure to report suspected physical or mental abuse or neglect of a child in Texas is a crime punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both.

Around the House In Parmer Co.

By LAURA JACOBS Despite its need for constant cleaning, most of us enjoy the rich golden color of brass in hardware, lighting fixtures and furnishings. With little time to clean, however, it's important to prolong the effect of a polishing job and to keep brass looking good.

Solid brass is a fairly durable alloy of copper and zinc, while brass plating is a thin layer of brass bonded to a steel base. Solid brass can take much harsher cleaning than plated brass. Use a magnet to test for plating. A magnet will stick to the steel beneath plated brass, but not to solid brass.

brass, and can create an following: "antique" look. But tarnish tends to darken with time, so if you want to see detail or have a lighter look in your brass, polishing is necessary.

First remove the old protective coating. Brass is

lacquer, varnish or epoxy. Where the coating nicks or wears away, it tarnishes from oxidation.

Since you typically won't know which sealer was used, experiment. Chemical strippers or acetone (nail polish remover) may do the Wear rubber gloves, work in a wellventilated area and use very fine steel wool (0000) to remove the coating without scratching the brass. Traces of residue left by the stripper should be removed with detergent and water.

For less harsh lacquer removal, make a bath from household products. Dismantle the piece before Tarnish doesn't harm soaking in a mixture of the

For polishing brass, you

can use a commercial brass vinegar and lemon, or use cleaner in liquid or paste form. Liquid cleaners containing a very fine abrasive do a good job on the tarnish, but may leave residue in joints or carved areas if not completely removed. Both types of cleaner require elbow grease where tarnish is heavy.

Brass polish can damage wood finishes. So when cleaning brass hardware in place, tape light cardboard snugly around it to protect the wood underneath.

Apply all polishes with a soft cloth in one direction, either along the length of the piece or in the direction in which it's been turned. Continue to polish with clean parts of the cloth so tarnish won't be rubbed back into

Homemade concoctions of ammonia, lemon, or a mixture of vinegar and salt will also remove tarnish. Submerge and soak the piece, then work with 0000 steel wool. When the tarnish is completely removed, polish with a soft cloth and a fine polish.

Brass plating is usually coated with a clear protective sealer which must be removed. The same stripping solutions for solid brass can be used on brass plating, they

abrasives, like steel wool. Many mild commercial polishes may work on brass plating, but do a test patch when using anything stronger than detergent and water. Use tung oil, commercial

brass wax or lacquer to prolong and protect the polishing job. First make sure the brass is clean and of fingerprints, polishing compounds and other substances. Since fingerprints will show up under the finish, wear rubber gloves when handling the piece. Use lacquer thinner to remove traces of polish and

greasy fingerprints. To apply a tung oil finish, place the brass in a 150 degree oven for 20 minutes before applying the oil with a soft cloth. Let the piece dry at least four hours. Apply commercial brass wax the same way.

Lacquer can diminish the brilliance of brass, but it may be worth the sacrifice to protect it. Brass may be either dipped or sprayed with lacquer. Do the job on a clean day when the humidity is low. Speed up drying time by warming the piece with a heat lamp or hair dryer before lacquering.

For lacquer dipping, make a 50-50 solution of lacquer and thinner. Dip the brass, hang, and let it dry five to 15

brass polish or ammoniabased cleaners, instead, clean with a mild detergent, rinse, wipe, dry and take a break from polishing.

* * * * "Keeping Your Car Fit"

Americans have become very health conscious. Everyone wants to keep internal and external parts working and looking well. Your car needs health maintenance, too. To keep your car "fit" for warmer weather, why not adopt a "health plan" now?

Experts suggest the following to keep your car working smoothly.

*Tune-ups--Follow the recommendations in your owner's manual or at least every 15,000 miles.

*Oil--In the spring, it's important to change to heavier weight oil which will stand up to the higher engine temperatures generated in the heat of summer. At the approach of winter, remember to change back to lighter weight oil to make it easier to start the motor in cold weather. In between these seasonal changes, the oil should be changed every 3,000 miles to be sure that oil stays clean and doesn't harm the engine.






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Results Given For Play In Local Pinto League




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IN BRONCO LEAGUE

A fifth inning rally by Friona Feed Yard netted six additional runs and gained them the 13-12 victory.





Tax Check Increases

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday sent checks totaling \$72 million in local sales tax payments to the 988 local-tax cities and four transit authorities, including the first check for collections of the new Fort Worth transit tax.

Friona's check amounted to \$6,492.75, compared to a payment of \$4,342.02, an increase of 49.5 per cent for the same period a year ago.

For the year, the city has received payments amounting to \$50,395.48, compared to \$46,383.37 for the period ending in May of 1983, an increase of 8.65 per cent.

Parmer County's municipalities received a total of \$9,101.69 for the current period, compared to \$6,331.02 for the same time a year earlier.

The county's three cities now have received \$74,315.49, compared to \$69,414.94, an increase of 7.06 per

"So far this year, we've sent these cities a little over \$400 million, which is more than 13 per cent better than what they had gotten by this time last

year," Bullock said. Houston's check was the largest---\$8.9 million--for a total of \$72.7 million, up five per cent over last year. Dallas received \$5.8 million to push its total payment to \$48.3


million, a 15 per cent increase. San Antonio's payment of \$3 million brought its 1984 total to \$23.8 million, up 16 per cent. Austin received \$2.4 million for a yearly total of \$17.1 million, a 26 per cent increase.

Fort Worth's check for \$1.9 million increased total payments to \$14.7 million, up nine per cent. El Paso received \$1.1 million, bringing 1984 payments to \$8.9 million, 17 per cent over last year.

Bullock also sent checks to Metropolitan Transit Authorities in Fort Worth, Dallas, Houston and San Antonio. Fort Worth's first check from the one-quarter per cent local transit tax in that city was for \$331,306. The Dallas DART check was for \$8 million and the Houston MTA got \$10 million. San Antonio's VIA check was for \$1.7 million.





Minimum Tillage Is Pushed By SWCD

Conservation tillage prevents erosion and increases farm profits by reducing operating costs of tillage operations.

There are several forms of conservation tillage. Conservation tillage is any system which creates the best environment possible for growing a crop with a limited amount of soil disturbance. Retention of residue on the soil surface after planting for protection from erosion is the major reason for conservation tillage.

Examples of conservation tillage include no-till, non-inversion tillage, and strip tillage.

No-till consists of planting in undisturbed residue. Herbicides are used to kill growing crops after harvest and control weeds.

Non-inversion tillage consists of using sweeps or chisels to kill growing crops following harvest and retain

residues on the surface. Succeeding crop is planted in remaining residue which is adequate for protection from erosion. Herbicides may be used in this system to aid in the control of weeds.

Strip tillage system consists of preparing a seedbed no wider than 1/3 of the distance between the rows in which to plant the succeeding crop in the previous crop's residue. Twothirds of the area is left untilled with protecting cover of mulch to prevent erosion.

These are just three forms of conservation tillage. There are many others and different combinations which can be adapted for different farming operations. For more information or assistance on conservation tillage, contact the local Soil Conservation Service office in Friona.



THE FASCINATING HISTORY OF EYECARE-PART IX

In the early 1950's, contact lenses that were comfortable to wear and that provided good vision were developed by an international team whose members included Wilhelm P. Sohnges, a German optician, Dr. John Neill, an American Optometrist, and Frank Dickinson, a British optician. This first generation of hard contact lenses had some drawbacks. They required the patient to undergo a slow adaptation period (it took a long time to get used to the lenses), they could easily slip or fall off the eyes, and they could not be worn by everyone. Still, they were an advancement and many eyeglass wearers, especially teen-ager girls and young women, tried them and wore them successfully.

In the 1960's contact lens fitting procedures and manufacturing techniques had been improved significantly. In fact, about 6 million Americans were wearing them. President Lyndon Johnson was the first

U.S. President to wear contact lenses. In 1960 two chemists in Czechoslovakia developed a hydrophilic (water-

absorbing) plastic that was later developed into "soft" contact lenses. "Soft" contact lenses were much more comfortable to wear than conventional "hard" contacts, but the optics were not nearly as good. American manufacturers immediately began seeking ways to improve the optical quality of the new soft lenses; they succeeded. Soft contact lenses were classified as a "drug" by the U.S. Food & Drug Administration and development came under close government scrutiny and control. This may have slowed the introduction of soft lenses in the U.S., but it did allow for greater safety and better quality. Optometrists were required to take special courses to learn how to fit this new type of contact lens. Soft contact lenses today are greatly improved compared to those of a decade ago and remain one of the most popular types of contact lenses being fit.

During the 1960's young people created a fad for old-fashioned spectacles. Antique eyeglasses from the 19th century were worn in a variety of styles. This fad has all but died.
