MUCH HAS BEEN said, as well as written, concerning the boycott by the Russians and their allies of the 1984 Olympic Games.

We have come up with an angle that so far we have not heard expressed by anyone commenting on the Los Angeles games:

Eliminating the Russians from the Olympics probably makes the 1984 Olympic Games the most truly amateur Olympics that have been held in the past quarter of a century.

Virtually everyone who has followed the Olympics knows that the Russian athletes are a hand-picked, regimented group, which is separated from their society and are virtually the same as members of the Soviet Army, except that their field of competition is different from that of the soldier.

Many followers of the Olympics have expressed an objection in the past, pointing out that in relation to the way our Olympic athletes are chosen in this country, the Russian athletes are virtually professional in

nature. Further, whereas the Russians make no bones about the way their athletes are chosen and trained, in America, the Olympic officials have stuck to the amateur rule to the point that it has been virtually ridiculous. (Having the legendary Jim Thorpe return his medals, after it was discovered that he had played a summer with a semi-pro baseball team is just one example.)

In recent years, the East Germans have adopted similar tactics in addition to their athletes, using such events as the Olympics as big propaganda vehicles, to show their representatives excelling in their various sports.

So, in many respects, it's refreshing to be able to watch an Olympics in which you are confident that most of the participants live up to the Olympic ideal.

In this country, Olympians are most likely to be students, who train for their various sports while at the same time keeping up their school work. Or, they may be factory workers, office workers, etc., who use their spare time to work on their sports hobbies--whether they be cycling, volleyball, or what-have-you.

We have always felt, and still do, that whenever the athletes from our country win an event, they have really accomplished something, due to the way the athletes from the Eastern European nations are chosen and prepared for competition.

So, to say that the 1984 Olympics been have "cheapened" due to the absence of the communist bloc isn't exactly right in my particular book. More properly, they have perhaps been evened out to the extent that those nations abiding by the rules will have at least an equal opportunity of winning a medal.

Area Receives Some Rainfall

The Friona area received some most of the city Wednesday nice rain on Wednesday of this afternoon. week, with the city itself getting A survey of some area farmers one of the larger readings, with

1.5 inches registered for the day. On Tuesday night, a light shower of .07 inches was recorded, and another .02 inch was evident Friday morning, making a total for the week of 1.59 locally.

The rainfall was not real general in nature. It mainly followed Highway 60, moving from northeast to southwest (the opposite of the usual summer rain direction). Cities of Hereford and Clovis both received over an inch on Wednesday.

But residents in Western Friona reported only about half what the official city guage reported. And Friona Cablevision, whose instruments are located just north of the city, had only .15 inch for Wednesday evening, and only .01 inch of that during the "big rain" which hit

indicated their rainfall varied measurements considerably.

Clyde Woodard at Hub said he measured .6 inch at his house, with more to the north.

Ralph Wilson, who lives west of town, reported .7 inch of rain, with an inch reported just west of them, but still lighter amounts reported from the Rhea community.

Floyd Reeve said he received about .7 inch where he lives southeast of town, but received hardly any on his place just west of Friona.

About a half-inch was registered at Hub Grain, but owner Howard Fleming said he had 1.5 inches at his place two miles north of Hub. The amounts also varied east and west of the Hub intersection.

Lloyd Rector's place northeast of Hub recorded 1.3 inches, and Roy Don Rector, a mile south of there, reported 1.7 inches. Ricky Rector, three miles east and one mile south, had .6 inch, which was the same amount reported by Conrad Renner.

Charles Hough said he received an inch of rain at his place four miles south of town, but caught two inches four miles south and three east across from the Doyce Barnett's.

One report said that the Summerfield community had a big rain, but that the amount at Black was less than that officially logged in Friona.

All of the farmers were pleased to get some rain, and hoping they would get more to lay their crops

Cotton Farmers Expect To Seek Class Action Lawsuit

Cotton farmers, meeting in Friona Thursday afternoon, voted to band together and enter a class action lawsuit, as soon as information is assembled showing what has caused the damage to their cotton.

The Texas Department of Agriculture is continuing its investigation into the "herbicide drift" damage to cotton, but as yet has not established exactly which chemical, or applicator is to blame for the damage.

"It looks like multiple sources," said Al Hernandez, who is heading the investigation for the TDA.

A large group of the affected farmers and ginners met at the Friona High School Auditorium Thursday with attorney Benton Musslewhite, who discussed the ramifications of a class action suit.

Musslewhite told the group that it would be a more practical attack to go together in a class action suit, rather than each individual farmer going his own way.

And, he stated that it would undoubtedly take a lawsuit in order to get any settlement talks underway.

"Considering the amount of money which appears to be involved, you will have to file a lawsuit. I don't think you can settle the matter any other way," Musslewhite said.

The Houston attorney, whose firm has gained a measure of fame through the "Agent Orange" lawsuit, through which it forced a settlement from both the U.S. Government as well as foreign governments, explained to the group how his firm's fee arrangement would operate. He also expressed an interest in working with local and area law firms in preparing the case.

Musslewhite explained that such a case would probably be tried in State Court, and most likely in Parmer County, since this is the county where the damage occurred.

A committee of five farmers and ginners was appointed to work on the details of deciding how to proceed with the proposed suit. Those named to the committee were JeDon Gallman, Ted Fangman, D.L. Carmichael, Bert Williams and Leroy Bodkin.

All of the committee members are from Parmer County except Bodkin, who is a Deaf Smith County farmer. Williams, a farmer from the Farwell area, who also is a member of the Plains Cotton Growers' board, was named to chair the group.

Following a huddle by the new committee on Thursday, the group decided to meet with attorneys in Parmer County, to find out if they wish to do the leg work for the Houston law firm, prior to retaining their services.

One of those attending the meeting asked if there had been any damage to the area's sugarbeet crop.

Carmichael said that he and Dr. Alan Supek had examined a field of beets which was near a damaged cotton field, and could not see any damage, but did not want to imply that the beet crop had not been affected.

Angela Lamb, Texas Department of Agriculture district supervisor, told the group that as of Thursday, there had been a total of 102 complaints of herbicide damage to cotton.

"We should have some definitive information in two to four weeks," Mrs. Lamb said, explaining that her crews were being very deliberate about their work in order to get

a correct diagnosis. The TDA chief also said that the total acreage involved in the damage area was approaching 30,000 acres.

The TDA officials indicated that this week they have been in the process of checking applicators' records, dealers' sales records and distributors' sales records, in this area, as well as in Curry and Roosevelt counties, New Mexico.

The TDA workers, operating in their mobile office located on the property of Friona Co-op Gin, have been preparing a map of the area, which will show damaged farms, as well as farms where herbicides have been applied.

The Houston attorney told the farmers that his firm would handle the lawsuit on the basis of collecting onethird of the net, providing that they win a judgement, and that the farmers would not have to pay any legal fees until such time that money was collected from a defendant.

Friona Star Sports New Look

With this edition, the Friona Star is joining the majority of the nation's newspapers in changing to a single advertising standard, including the six-column format.

The Star had technically used a six-column format for the past several years, but this week adopts the slight change in newspaper size. The length of the single page remains unchanged,

but the width of the paper is somewhat more narrow.

The change in format is to allow newspapers to conform to a Standard Advertising Format (SAU). Prior to the change, it was stated that a national advertiser may have had to prepare his ad in more than 300 widths, to appear in every newspaper across the country.

CBS News Team Does Segment

A CBS television news team, headed by correspondent Martha Teichner of the Dallas bureau, was in Friona three days this week working on the herbicidecotton story.

Miss Teichner said Thursday that her story would be filed and made available to CBS on Friday, but that she had no idea when it might be aired.

She promised to call ginner D.L. Carmichael if she was given an indication as to when the segment would be telecast.

Miss Teichner, along with camera-man Pat O'Dell and Ken Collins, sound engineer, arrived in town Tuesday. They spent time interviewing farmers affected by the herbicide drift, working with the Texas Department of Agriculture officials who are documenting the situation, and climaxed their stay by covering Thursday afternoon's meeting of the farmers at Friona High School Auditorium.

Not necessarily a farm girl (a native of Northern Michigan), Miss Teichner jumped into the local event with "both feet," and soon had the respect of her local contacts.



Eldred A. Brown of Friona has been re-elected chairman of the Rural Friends political action group during a caucus in connection with the July 24-27 meeting of the Association of Texas Electric Cooperatives in San Antonio.

Brown is widely known on the High Plains and beyond as a long-time member of the Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative board of directors. He has also been active for a long time in ASC activities and the Walcott Volunteer Fire Department.

Rural Friends consists of rural electric leaders and other individuals throughout Texas who are involved in education on political issues of concern primarily to rural areas. Brown was first elected to chair Rural Friends at the annual caucus last materials for the building of the line. 

Payment of an \$18.00 doctor bill for examination of an indigent child was also approved.

A discussion was held concerning the 1985 county budget, including the various items which need to be considered when preparing the 1985 budget.

John Getz met with the court to secure permission to use the Courthouse lawn for the arts and crafts shows in conjunction with Farwell's Bordertown Days activities.

District Judge Jack Young and Bailey County Judge Corky Green met with the court to discuss the handling of court cases in Parmer County. Judge Green has been taking care of Parmer County's cases since Judge Roberts became ill in April.

It was decided that Judge Green would continue handling the cases as long as possible, with Judge Green helping wherever he can. Expressions of thanks were extended to Judge Green for his help.

It was voted to pay Judge Green a travel allowance of 25 cents per mile, with a 50-mile round trip for each trip he has to make to Farwell, and to pay him \$150 for the 12 trips he has made from April through July.


grader is for the use of Precinct 1, and the other for Precinct 2. Bids are to be opened August 13 at 11

STUDY SHOWS

Local School Budgets Increased

Texans increased spending on local public schools by \$552 million last year, as trustees in 1,069 school districts adopted school budgets totaling \$9.0 billion. That provided more than \$200 in additional funds for each of the 2,727,512 students in the state, according to the Texas Research League.

Local property taxpayers were tagged for an additional \$327 million to pay for the increase. The remainder was funded by increases in state and federal aid programs and by higher local

The figures come from the latest issue of Bench Marks for 1984-85 School District Budgets in Texas, an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

School budgets adopted for 1983-84 called for spending \$2,713 per student for current operations. Friona ISD's budget provided for \$2,516.72 per student based on the 1219 students in average daily attendance in 1982-83.

Four of five of these dollars were spent for salaries. Statewide, payroll expense averaged \$2,153 per student, as compared to \$1924 in Friona ISD. Payroll expense is a combination of salary levels and staffing patterns.

The average salary for classroom teachers paid by Friona ISD in 1982-83 was \$17,226 which was 7.9 per cent above the minimum salary prescribed by the state. The average among all school districts

in Texas was \$19,501 per classroom teacher, or 21.8 per cent over the minimum.

There was an average of one teacher for 88 students in Friona ISD compared to a statewide pupil-teacher ratio of 1 to 16.4. The pupil-teacher ratio is not the same thing as the average class size because teachers and students are not necessarily in class the same number of hours each day.

Statewide, the ratio of teachers to students has remained the same the past three years. The report notes that during the 1980s school officials have used additional payroll dollars to increase salaries beyond the rate of inflation, whereas during the previous decade more dollars were spent to hire additional teachers while average salaries

grew less than the rate of inflation.

Local property taxes were increased by \$327 million for a total of \$3.6 billion last year. Locally, the Friona ISD's tax levy was increased by .1 per cent for 1983-84, as compared to a 10.0 per cent increase for the average school district in Texas.

School property tax rates in 1982-83 averaged \$0.613 per \$100 of market value (selling price). The school tax on a property selling for \$100,000 was \$613 in the average school district. Locally, the rate on market value in Friona ISD was \$.817, or \$817 on a property selling for \$100,000.

If the property were a homestead or owned by a senior citizen, the school tax would be less because of various

exemptions. Open-space land that qualified would be valued on its productivity value rather than market value.

Revenue lost from exemptions totaled \$679 million, which was \$125 million more than that exempted the previous year. To balance school budgets, the revenue loss from exemptions was imposed upon other taxpayers in the school district.

Preparing school budgets for next year, the report noted, will be difficult. Not only did the Special Session of the Legislature provide substantial additional funds, but also changed the method for allocating aid to different districts. School officials also must begin implementing a variety of new educational programs including new curriculum standards.







City's Sales Tax Check Is Noted

The City of Friona received \$6,687.08 for its monthly one per cent sales tax check from the State Comptroller for the month of June, according to a statement from Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Friona's check was an increase of 67 per cent, or \$2685, from the check for \$4,005.44 which the city received for the comparable period in 1983.

For the year, Friona has received \$57,082.56 in sales taxes, up \$6694, or 13.28 per cent from the total of \$50,388.81 the city had received as of the same time a year earlier.

Three municipalities in Parmer County received \$9,649.08 for the current period, up from \$6,113.53 a year ago. For the year, the county's total is now \$83,964.57, compared to \$75,528.47 in 1983, a gain of 11.1 per cent.

"We've sent Texas cities nearly half a billion dollars this year," Bullock said. "That's more than 17 per cent over what these cities had received by this time last year. Every one of the 20 biggest sales tax cities is ahead of last year's totals."

Houston's check totaled \$9.4 million, pushing the total Houston payment for 1984 to more than \$82.1 million. Dallas received \$6.8 million, putting 1984 payments to date to nearly 20 per cent above 1983.

San Antonio's \$3.1 million check brought its yearly total to \$26.9 million, up \$4 million over the total one year ago. Austin received \$2.6 million, pushing its 1984 total 31 per cent ahead of last year.

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
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Donna Echols Heads Political Workshop

"Making a Difference: Women in Electoral Politics" will be the topic of a special emphasis, non-partisan workshop scheduled August 18 in St. John's Methodist Church in Lubbock.

Sponsored nation-wide by the Women's Division of the United Methodist Church Global Ministries Board, the workshop is designed to introduce women

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to the political process and to encourage their participation as candidates.

Overall chair of the Lubbock area event, Donna Arnpriester Echols of Friona, said, "This project is an effort led by United Methodists to introduce 10,000 women to the idea of political involvement and to identify 400 potential candidates through 60 one-day workshops on political skills throughout the U.S."

She added that sponsors will personally follow-up on the potential candidates to encourage them to get in-depth campaign techniques training and to provide partial scholarships to 250 potential candidates for indepth campaign techniques workshops.

"The end goal is to have a minimum of 250 women nationwide trained to run for local and state offices by 1986."

A highlight of the local workshop will be a panel of elected women sharing their experiences in moving into and up in political roles.

of the Friona School Board. The workshop trainer will be Katie L. Dixon, Salt Lake County Recorder. She is the only elected woman official in Salt Lake County, which contains more than half of the population of the state of Utah.

Mrs. Goddard is a graduate of Southern Methodist University, and has been active in church and community affairs in Friona for several years. She served eleven years as director for Camp New Dawn, a Methodist camp for handicapped children.

Mrs. Echols, the Workshop chair, is a minister's wife and has worked on local, district and conference levels of United Methodist Women. She is coordinator of Christian Social Involvements for UMW and has worked at all levels of local churches.

She has done college work at McMurry, Texas Tech, Western Texas and West Texas State University.

Mrs. Echols points out that barely ten per cent of all elected offices in the U.S. are held by women, and believes two things must happen to increase this representation for women.

"We must increase the pool of potential candidates significantly; that is, reach out and identify active women in the communities, churches and organizations," she said.

"Also, support systems must be developed, tapping those women who do not want to enter public leadership but who can choose to support women candidates by managing a campaign."

The workshop will include audiovisuals, the panel and a series of discussions on such topics as "The Effective Political Campaign," "The Roles in a Campaign--Getting on the Right Track," and "Effective Political Media, Field Organization and Fund Raising in Local and State Campaigns."

The final block of time will include individual action plans--a

J. Taylor Attends Firemen's School




Fireman Taylor is being sponsored by Parmer County Farm Bureau and Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies by contributing toward the cost of



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
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
