Census Bureau Reports Official 1970 Population Of Callahan County

BAIRD - Callahan County's official population in the 1970 census was 8,205, up 3.5 percent from the 1960 figure of 7,929. The Bureau of the Census, U. S. Dept. of Commerce, reports.

The official population of the state was 11,196,730, up 16.9 percent from the 1960 population count, which was 9,579,677.

The 1970 census counted 8,187 white persons in Callahan

County, 99.8 percent of the total; and 18 persons of other races. In 1960, 99.9 percent of the population was white.

The census showed 443 children under 5 years; 1,891 in ages 5 through 17; 4,152 people 18 through 64; and 1,719 who were 65 and older. The population 14 years and over included 4,395 married people, 771 who were widowed, 139 divorced, and 1,255 never married.

Callahan County's 1970 population was classified as 100 percent rural.

There were 2,977 households, with 8,082 persons, including 633 one-person households. In addition 123 persons were living in group quarters.

The 1970 census counted 3,453 housing units in Callahan County, 2,415 of them occupied by owners, 562 occupied by tenants, and 476 vacant. These included vacant units for seasonal use. The proportion occupied by owners in 1970 was 69.9 percent, compared with 67.1 percent in 1960.

Among year-round dwelling units there were 3,298 single family houses, 85 housing units in multi-unit buildings, and 63 mobile homes or trailers. The percentage of occupied units with more than one person per room was 7.2, compared with 8.2 in 1960. Of all the occupied housing units, 2,814 had piped water, toilet, and bath, while 163 lacked some of all plumbing.

The median value of owner-occupied houses in Callahan County was \$7,000, compared with \$5,000 in 1960. The median rent paid by tenants in 1970 was less than \$30 per month, compared with \$48 in 1960. Half were over and half below the median figures.

Miss Debbie Hass, the RCA Rodeo Queen, and several Sheriff's Posse Riding Club members will go to San Angelo Friday, March 12 and participate in the rodeo parade, and ride in the grand entry at the rodeo performance.

The Club has also been invited to a barbecue dinner before the rodeo begins.

The four-story, contemporary design building of approximately 100,000 square feet will be located on a beautiful suburban site overlooking Lake Waco in Northwest Waco. When the Texas Farm Bureau moved its headquarters from Brownwood to Waco in 1938, it moved into a rent-free, two-room office over the Waco Chamber of Commerce. The Farm Bureau had a membership of only a few thousand farmers and ranchers at this time. As the TFB grew, it changed locations in Waco three times, moving to its present location in June 1959. The organization, with a membership of 121,158 farm and ranch families, has outgrown its present office quarters.

Clyde Junior High, Elementary Bands To Present Spring Concert

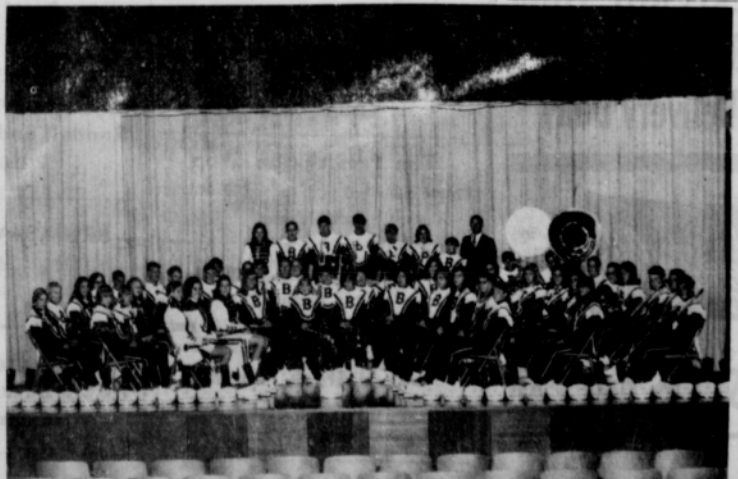

Gov. Smith Proposes Plan to Involve Citizens In Crime Prevention

AUSTIN — A statewide effort to reduce crime by stimulating public awareness and participation in law enforcement was launched today from the office of Governor Preston Smith.

In an appeal to Texas newspaper publishers, Gov. Smith asked them to initiate, coordinate and publicize "Operation Crime-Stop" in their respective communities as part of the Governor's Crime-Stop program. The plan has been endorsed by the Board of Directors of Texas Press Association, to which most of the publishers belong. It seeks "to enlist the aid of newspapers across the state and to join them with other resources in their home communities in the campaign to involve all citizens in crime prevention and control."

The role of the law enforcement agency (police or sheriff's department) in Crime-Stop, the Governor explained, consists principally of providing a tel-

ephone number for citizens to call to report suspicious persons or circumstances, and of making the necessary response to such calls. Though the police agency naturally prefers to know the identity of all callers, it gives assurance that those wishing to remain anonymous may do so.

Beyond this, the program is largely one of creating public awareness of the crime problem, advising citizens of precautions which can be taken to prevent certain crimes, and persuading citizens to observe suspicious persons and circumstances and to report them by calling the Crime-Stop number.

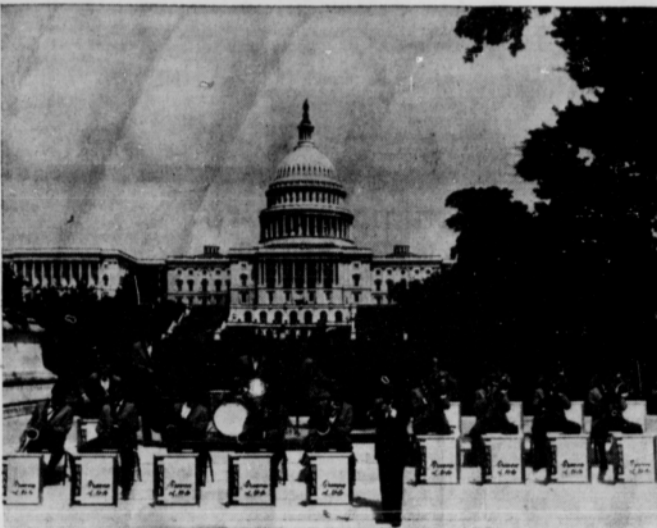
