ONCE AGAIN, politics has reared its ugly head, and as a result, the Olympic Games will be affected in 1984

It is unfortunate that the Games, which were revived in 1896 as a means of bringing nations together for friendly competition, have to serve as a "whipping boy" for the powerful nations.

Of course, it is obvious that the Russian pullout of the 1984 games is nothing short of retaliation for America's similar action at the Moscow games of 1980. That, plus a chance to threaten a black-eye to President Reagan, whom the Russians fear and would like to negatively affect his re-election campaign.

It is regrettable that politics have to affect the Olympic Games, but they do, and they have practically ever since the modern Olympics were conceived, so there appears nothing to do but go ahead with the games and not worry about the Russians.

One writer points out that the Russians were not a threat to win any gold medals in the track and field (men's division) anyway, and with the absence of the big, manly Soviet-bloc women, the rest of the world's entrants, many of whom you might even recognize as women, will make for a better-looking group of contestants.

One national news magazine's feature headline in its current edition asks "Are the Games Dead?" We would hastily answer that question "Of course not." The Olympic Games have survived more threats than the current U.S.-Soviet cold war tactics, and they no doubt will be strong enough to outlast this brush fire

Former Olympics have been completely cancelled during wartime-in 1916 during World War I, and then twice, in 1940 and 1944 during World War II.

Both times, the Games were resumed whenever peaceful conditions once again prevailed.

America's boycott of the 1980 summer Olympics, and the Soviets' pullout of the 1984 games are not the first such occurence.

In 1976, the entire African continent stayed away from the Olympics because they felt blacks might be discriminated against. There are other lesser incidents involving the Olympics.

Each time in the past, the Olympics have continued, and the athletes who have trained and waited for this once in a lifetime opportunity--are the big losers, when they are banned from competition.

It would be nice if the International Olympic Committee could go about its work without the intervention of national governments. But as long as there are nations with differing views, this problem is probably going to exist.

But the Olympic tradition and ideal is worth preserving, even if every so often it has to be tarnished by the actions of governments. It behooves governments to back off from the Olympic Games, and let the competition continue, unmolested.

It's not fair to the athletes to plunge the Olympics into international disagreements. And the boycotts such as those of 1980 and 1984 probably fail to achieve their intent. Americans were split on the boycott issue in 1980, and many felt our team should have competed. This probably hurts the cause of nationalism more than it helps, and our leaders need to take this into consideration. This, plus the fact of ruining the chance for those who had waited and trained for their big chance to win a medal.

Mostly Routine Items Face School Board

Mostly routine matters were considered by the Friona School Board at its regular meeting Monday.

Board member Kathryn Goddard was selected to be the board's delegate at the state convention of the School Board Assn., to be held in San Antonio in October. Pat Fleming was named alternate.

Due to an anticipated increase of the enrollment in the high school band for next year, the ordering of 15 additional uniforms was approved.

Superintendent Tom Jarboe gave a report to the board regarding the recent monitoring visit by the Texas Education Agency on the district's Chapter I, Chapter II and bilingual education programs. Some discrepancies in the bilingual program were noted, but are being (or have been) corrected.

The board considered the addition of a Chapter I Language Arts program in the elementary school.

Considerable time was spent reviewing the high school preenrollment figures in various subjects with Hal Ratcliff, principal.

The new state Board of Education rules on student absences for extracurricular activities was reviewed and discussed. No action was taken at this time, as the matter is to be reviewed more at a later time.

Tax report showed 92 per cent collection on the 1983 roll. Harriet Nichols presented an updated policies and procedures manual for the Parmer County Special Education Co-op, which was approved.

Due to conflicts, the board has rescheduled its next meeting for June

Warning Given For Young Bikers

School has closed for the summer and children will be enjoying summertime activities. However, in their enjoyment of play, one may soon forget about the dangers in the street. Inevitably this results in an accident which may lead to anything ranging from a good scare to someone seriously injured, says Friona's Chief of Police, Bill Thieman.

In the average year, there will be over 500 bicycle related fatalities and 25,000 disabling injuries. Since seventy per cent of bicycle accidents occur between April and September, and eighty per cent of the victims of these accidents are elementary and junior high school aged children, it is important for drivers to be especially alert during these oncoming summer months.

In order to lessen the chances for a mishap, here are a few hints that parents should pass on to their children about play either near or on the street.

Candidates Schedule TV Debate

The runoff candidates for the 19th Congressional District seat will be featured in a televised debate at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 30 on KAMC Channel 28 (Channel 2 for Friona Cablevision viewers).

Sponsored by the Lubbock League of Women Voters, the program will spotlight the Democratic candidates, Don R. Richards and Thomas M. Richards, in a question and answer session, followed by the Republican runoff candidates, Ron Fleming and Larry Combest.

The runoff election for each of the party primaries will be Saturday, June 2.

(1) Children riding bicycles should ride near the right hand side of the roadway. Two or more people riding together should ride in single file and not abreast of each other.

(2) Remember, bicycles like cars, are required to obey all traffic signals such as stop signs, etc. Of all of the accidents involving bicyclists, in eighty per cent, the cyclist was violating some traffic rule. In thirty per cent of these accidents, the cyclist struck the motor vehicle.

(3) Riders should wear brightly colored clothing to aid in their being seen by motorists, and give signals to indicate any change of direction.

(4) Although seventy per cent of bicycle traffic accidents occur during daylight hours, bicycling at night should be avoided. However, if one is riding at night, the bicycle should have appropriate lamps and reflectors to aid in its visibility.

In addition, not all childrens' play will put them on a bicycle, but in a yard or somewhere near the street. A few suggestions to them will include:

(1) Cross the street at intersections or with the aid of an adult. Drivers do not look for children crossing or entering the street from mid-block.

(2) Always be sure to stop and look both ways for approaching cars and trucks before entering the street. Safety is just as much the child's responsibility as the drivers'.

(3) Never start to cross the street from behind or between parked cars. These cars block the drivers' view of anyone entering the roadway.

Although the above suggestions are intended for bicyclists and pedestrians, motorists need to keep a watchful eye for youngsters enjoying themselves either near or in the street. Two often, the accident which ruins everyone's summer is a combination of two people not watching out for the other guy.

Court Will Purchase New Motor Grader

Parmer County Commissioners voted to advertise for a new motor grader for Precinct 3 during their regular meeting on Monday, May 14. Bids on the new piece of equipment will be opened on June 11.

Commissioner Ernest Anthony, who presided over the session due to the absence of Judge Porter Roberts, pointed out that he had been approached by Parmer County Community Hospital asking help on care provided to indigents, amounting to \$4,227.85. A motion was passed to pay this hospital bill

Due to the court's next meeting scheduled to fall on Memorial Day, a motion was passed to hold the next meeting on Friday, May 25 at 10 a.m.

Market funds; two \$100,000 CDs

These funds are invested for short terms, to be accessible when needed.

Boarding care bills were approved on foster children located in the county, in the amount of \$2,070. This money is re-imbursed to the county.

A discussion was held on the \$5 tax the state allows the county to charge on registered vehicles. The tax is used for the upkeep of roads and maintainers. Motion was passed to continue charging the tax.

A group of Parmer and Bailey County men met with the court to discuss forming a Bailey-Parmer County Agricultural Development Corporation. Following a long discussion, the matter was tabled in order to secure further information.

A letter had been received expressing interest in leasing some Parmer County school land in Gaines County. The interested party is to be asked to meet with the court on June 11 to discuss the matter.

Poll Sites Are Given

The polling places for the Democratic and Republican runoff primaries will be basically the same as they were for the primaries, it has been announced.

All of the Democratic polling places will be the same. The Republicans from Precinct 2 and 3 will be voting at Reeve Chevrolet-Olds. Polls for both runoff elections will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Absentee voting for the runoff began May 23, and will end Tuesday, May 29 at the courthouse. The courthouse will be closed on Monday, May 28 for Memorial Day.







The Black Study Club met Thursday, May 17, for their annual spring luncheon, in the home of Ann Carthel.


Following the luncheon a short business meeting was conducted by Mildred Welch, club president.



QUESTION: Sometimes my vision is blurred, and I wonder if I may have an astigmatism. What causes

ANSWER: The blurred vision caused by astigmatism is caused by a cornea (the "window of the eye") that is out of shape. A cornea in good shape has a perfect curve, with the same degree of slope on all sides of it. The rays of light that pass through the cornea come together at a single point on their way to the retina or back wall of the eye, sending a clear image to the brain. When you have an astigmatic eye, the rays of light don't come together at the same point. That causes a blurred image. An eye examination will reveal the kind and degree of astigmatism and how glasses can be prescribed to correct it.

Child Abuse Termed A Major Concern

Child abuse is a serious offense, and there were 40 cases investigated in Parmer County in 1983, according to the Parmer County Child Welfare Board.

Child abuse is repeated mistreatment or neglect of a child by parent(s) or other adult(s), resulting in injury or harm.

Child abuse may take many forms, such as (1) physical--shaking, beating, burning; failure to provide the necessities of life, or

(2) emotional--failure to provide warmth, attention, supervision, normal living experiences;

(3) verbal--excessive yelling, belittling or teasing; or (4) sexual-incest, or other indecent sexual activity.

The 40 cases of child abuse investigated in Parmer County during 1983 were broken down as follows: five cases of sexual abuse; 15 of physical abuse; two of emotional

abuse; five of lack of supervision; 12 of physical neglect, and one involving medical neglect.

"Child abuse can happen anywherein poor, middle-class or well-to-do homes, and in rural areas, suburbs or cities. We now know that child abuse is a symptom that can be treated successfully, but first, more people have to understand and care, said a spokesman for the Child Welfare Board.

To report child abuse or neglect locally, people may call the Texas Department of Human Resources in Hereford at 364-6841, or they may call the 24-hour Child Abuse Hotline number, 1-800-252-5400. This call is toll free.

As a community awareness project, the Parmer County Child Welfare Board will be presenting articles to help you better understand this increasing problem and what your responsibilities are.



THE FASCINATING HISTORY OF EYECARE-PART VII

The Oxford frame a variation of the pince-nez frame, was invented in 1910 in New York. It folded so that the two lenses could be used as one and was often equipped with a handle for holding. Oxford frame prices ranged from \$18 to as much as \$800 for special models.

New York and Chicago society women started a monocle fad that spread to the masses in many large American cities by 1913. The pincenez, however, survived the fads and, in 1919, was still the most popular style worn. During the "Roaring Twenties" eyeglasses with temple pieces were beginning to appear more frequently. Popular especially among the young were tortoise shell spectacle with large round lenses, such as those worn by silent screen comedian Harold Lloyd.

During the depression years of the 1930's eyeglasses were in wide use. Even children were being examined by Optometrists and fitted with eyeglasses when needed; something never heard of before since eyeglasses were thought to be for elderly adults only. Tinted lenses had been worn for many years. But when people learned to fly, a great need for sunglasses to enable fliers to cope with high altitude glare developed. To meet that need, an American optical manufacturer developed a green tinted sunglass lens called "Calobar," which is still in use today. In every part of the United States, sunglass lenses were available in many different tints. That demand has never ceased. Sunglasses ware practical in helping to filter out the harmful light rays of the sun, ultraviolet and infrared, which are thought to contribute to the development of cataracts. This is one reason so many farmers and ranchers wear sunglasses when outside.



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
