## County In Change On Insurance

A representative from the Texas Association of Counties met with the county commissioners at their last meeting to explain the workers compensation and employees liability fund through the state association.

After a comparison of the costs currently paid by the county and the cost through the TAC, a motion was passed to join the Texas Association of Counties for this insurance coverage at a very large savings to the county.

A bill was approved to Richard Collard, attorney, who had been appointed attorney ad item in a mental hearing.

Following a discussion of the problems involved in finding out phone numbers of the various county offices in other parts of the county, it was voted to have the numbers published in the phone book received by Friona and Bovina telephone customers, at a cost of \$125 per year.

A discussion was held concerning the condition of the courthouse. A motion was then passed to give the courthouse a thorough cleaning for \$560.00.

Extension agents Laura Jacobs and Seth Ralston reported that their summers are busy with 4-H projects.

Soil conservation work was approved, to be performed by county machinery whenever available, on the farms of Charlie Gilbreath, Don Gerles, Ronny Dyer, James Haseloff and Gene Hardage. Cost of such work will be re-imbursed to the county by the individual farmers.

## Miller Is Named To SCD Board

Mike Miller of Lazbuddie was recently appointed to the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Directors. Mike will be representing Zone V for the remainder of the term of Dan Smith. Smith of Lazbuddie, resigned after ten years on the board.

The purpose of the Parmer County SWCD, its headquarters in Friona, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Miller will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

Mike and his wife, Pamela (St. Clair) have four children, Kurt, Kristine, Scott and Jon Colby. The Millers belong to the First Baptist Church of Muleshoe.

Mike graduated from Muleshoe High School in 1964 and from West Texas State University in 1969. Although he started farming after graduation in 1969, he taught science one year at Sudan.

The Millers live and farm in the Lazbuddie area.

In Texas there are 201 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government, organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the power of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature.

Organized in April 1948, the Parmer County SWCD has worked jointly with the Soil Conservation Service to serve all landowners and operators equally.



 It's that time of year when many of us are cleaning out our closets, storing winter clothes, and getting a bundle together for the drycleaners. While drycleaning can do a great deal to improve the appearance of many garments, it can't do everything.

Drycleaning requires reading the labels on garments for care instructions and determining precisely the type of fabric, weave and dyes that make up the fabric. The construction, color and degree of soiling must also be considered. Based on this information, the drycleaner removes spots and stains with water and special chemicals.

Drycleaning also involves replacing sizing, water repellent and other finishes, and pressing the garment on steam equipment to restore its original shape. It can include replacing missing buttons, performing minor repairs, and packaging the garment neatly.

Although drycleaning offers many positive features there are some things that even the best cleaner cannot do.

So before you take a load of clothes to the drycleaner, inspect them carefully. Know what you can and can't expect in the way of getting back garments that look "like-new" again.






