IN CASE YOU had not noticed-- Friona's business district has been in a state of change in recent weeks and months.

Some businesses have expanded, or are planning expansions. Several others have moved into new, more roomy locations.

All of this activity speaks well for the pulse of Friona's business, which seems very strong and vital, indeed.

This week, for example, two different merchants have scheduled Grand Openings in their new facilities. One, Rick's Country Kitchen, is a brand-new business entirely.

D.L. Harguess, who may have started all of the activity in the first place, will hold Grand Opening for D.L.'s Thriftway on West Highway 60 beginning Monday.

If you haven't been inside D.L.'s newly remodelled and expanded store lately, you need to go out and look around, because you will be pleasantly surprised. The expansion added over 50 per cent to the store's floor space, and shoppers will enjoy the wide aisles, convenient arrangement, and attractive decor.

On the heels of D.L.'s move of course, Mike Hanes and his crew at Bi-Wize Health-Mart Drug moved into D.L.'s old location at 902 Main Street, and have been doing their own remodeling and expanding.

Things are looking better all the time, and we're enjoying having such things as bus freight and photo service, along with all of Mike's other offerings, right here in our block of Main Street.

THE MOVE by Bi-Wize opened up that location, and Rick Nash landed that building, and is holding the other Grand Opening of which we spoke--Rick's Country Kitchen--this Saturday, March 3.

Nash's leader is to be a local pizza outlet, with submarine sandwiches and salad bar. But don't be misled, because he has a complete restaurant menu, including plate lunches, steaks, etc.

Nash has re-worked the former Bi-Wize location into an attractive setting, and we wish him success in his venture. He will also operate an arcade in the south half of the building.

Edward White is planning to expand White's Super Market, to include the area formerly occupied by AnnGee's Country Store. This will give Edward about 50 per cent more space, after he knocks out the wall and expands. He also expects to be able to offer new brands and items for his customers.

With White's proposed expansion, Ann and James Gee have moved AnnGee's into the Sixth and Main Location most recently occupied by Friona Upholstery and Trading Post.

The upholstery shop, owned by David and Leon Smith, has moved to Highway 60, where they have bought the property formerly owned by Troy Young.

In the meantime, we understand that Leroy Cox is busy getting ready to open a hardware store in Effie Hicks' former building just across the street north of ourselves and Friona Cablevision.

Mickey Harrelson has moved his business, Irrigation Engine Service, to West Highway 60, and is planning a Grand Opening soon. Bob Clark bought the former Big T Pump location for Bob's Pump, and 4-Way Pump Service, Inc. has moved into Bob's former place on 14th Street.

If we've missed anyone, we're sorry--let us know what you've done.

We at the Star have looked around for a bigger and better place, but guess we'll just try to re-negotiate with the landlord and stay put. This being our fifth leap-year in the same location should qualify us for a rent reduction, don't you think? Or maybe at least an "old-timer" award from the Chamber.

In 1986 Texas will have had her independence for one hundred and

fifty years and Texas plans to celebrate this event in a big way.

Allo Reeve and Beth Thompson have been appointed to represent Parmer County on the Sesquicentennial committee and Friona has until December to qualify for the Texas Sesquicentennial catalogue listing the tourist attractions of Texas.

Friona plans to qualify for this catalogue by first drawing attention to this area through post cards. Pictures will be taken Saturday, March 17, by Bill Bradley of Hereford, of Bruce Parr's stage coach and team of oxen, the Santa Fe depot with the worlds largest inland grain elevators in the back ground, the Santa Fe train and antique cars, etc. If you would like a picture taken of yourself in costume, or with your vintage car or whatever, make arrangements to be there ready for pictures at 9 a.m.

"We also plan to take a picture of the mural adjacent to Friona Public Library, also. Picture taking will last two hours, so don't be late," Mrs. Thompson concluded.

Bruce Parr will be available for further pictures by organizations or persons following the pictures for the post cards. Appointments can be made at the Chamber of Commerce office. Call Kathy Beard at the chamber office for an appointment.

D.L.'s Schedules Grand Opening

D.L.'s Thriftway will hold a Grand Opening Sale in its newly-remodelled and expanded location on West Highway 60 next week, it was announced this week by D.L. and Ruth Harguess.

Mr. and Mrs. Harguess first came to Friona in 1975, when he became minister for the Sixth Street Church of Christ, a position he held 2½ years.

Then in September of 1983, they bought the former Jack and Jill Supermarket store from Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Moore. They continued to operate both stores through the end of the calendar year.

The new store on West Highway 60 has been expanded by more than 50 per cent in floor space, with a number of items added, plus a greater selection of sizes and variety.

During the Grand Opening sale, customers will be asked to register for a ten-speed Huffy bicycle, which will be given away on Saturday, March 10.

D.L.'s will give customers double Circle W Blue Stamps throughout the Grand Opening week sale.

"We invite everyone to come out during our Grand Opening Sale and see our store. We are anxious to serve all of the people of the Friona area," Harguess said.

Ruth's father, John Cooper, is associated with the Harguesses in an advisory capacity. He is a veteran of over 50 years in the grocery business, 30 years at McLean and 26 at Tucumcari, N.M.

The Harguesses are parents of two daughters, Dee Ann, 17, and Tammy, 15.

55 YEARS AGO--MARCH 1, 1929

Charley Gonce of Bovina took first place; J.W. Ford of Friona, second and Bud Queen of Rhea, third in the old fiddlers' contest held at the school auditorium Wednesday night. The large room was filled with spectators. The winner will enter the Tri-State contest at Amarillo March 7.

W.H. Warren, Friona's leading mule buyer, shipped 50 head of good mules to parties in Fort Worth on Monday.

50 YEARS AGO--MARCH 2, 1934

Coach Bill Stevens, who was serving his fourth term as coach at Friona High School, resigned his position this week for a similar position at Levelland.

The basketball game scheduled here last Friday between the Friona Squaws and Farwell girls, was called off due to disagreeable weather. The two teams, winners in the county tournament, were playing a best two of three game series. The Squaws had won the first game, played at Farwell.

45 YEARS AGO--MARCH 3, 1939

Business concerns will give prizes away during the annual livestock show this weekend, valued at around \$100. Persons visiting the show will need to register at some place of business, prior to 2 p.m. on Saturday. At that time, a drawing will be held to

see who the winner of merchandise will be.

40 YEARS AGO--FEB. 25, 1944

Joyce Ann Miller, 10-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Miller, was a guest singer on the Army Air Base broadcast over Station KGNC last Thursday. Joyce was a hit at the recent bond rally, at which she also sang "Marezy Doats" and Army Air Corps song.

Uncle John White's "Sons in Service" letter column included letters from Gilbert Schueler, Robert Collier, George F. (Frank) Baker, Harley Bulls and Duke M. Baker.

30 YEARS AGO--FEB. 25, 1954

Well-drilling and irrigation has become big business in the area. Since April of last year, some 323 permits have been issued for drilling of wells.

Lt. Bill Sheehan, who has been serving as legal council for the Wm. Beaumont Army Hospital in El Paso, has announced his candidacy for the position of County Attorney. He will be released from active duty in late May.

25 YEARS AGO--FEB. 26, 1959

Dr. Paul Spring and Mrs. Eva Miller were named "Man and Woman of the Year" at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Banquet Tuesday night. Bill Nichols was installed as president

of the chamber for 1959.

The USDA's announcement Wednesday that the 1959 price support on feed grains will be drastically reduced has been met with repercussions in the Parmer County area. Grain sorghum was supported at \$1.83 per hundredweight in 1958 and the support price for 1959 has been announced at \$1.52. This drop could cost farmers in this county alone from \$2.5 to \$3 million.

Farmers Are Invited To SCS Seminar

Farmers interested in learning more about cutting operating expenses, increasing profits, and reducing soil erosion are invited to attend a Conservation Seminar in Clovis, New Mexico, March 7-8.

M.C. Osborn, Chairman of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District in Friona, said the meeting will be held at the Elks Lodge in Clovis, starting at 8:30 a.m. both days. Attendance is free.

"The meeting will feature farmers who are using conservation tillage as well as speakers who will discuss state-of-the-art irrigation water management practices," said Osborn.

Farmers from Parmer County on the program are Charles Hough, to discuss conservation tillage and Phillip Johnson, to discuss surge irrigation. Several kinds of conservation equipment, including planters, sweeps, and chisels, will be on display.

On the afternoon of March 8, conservation tillage equipment will be demonstrated on a farm near Clovis.

The seminar is sponsored by the Central Curry and Roosevelt Soil and Water Conservation Districts, in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service.

DPS Needs Applicants

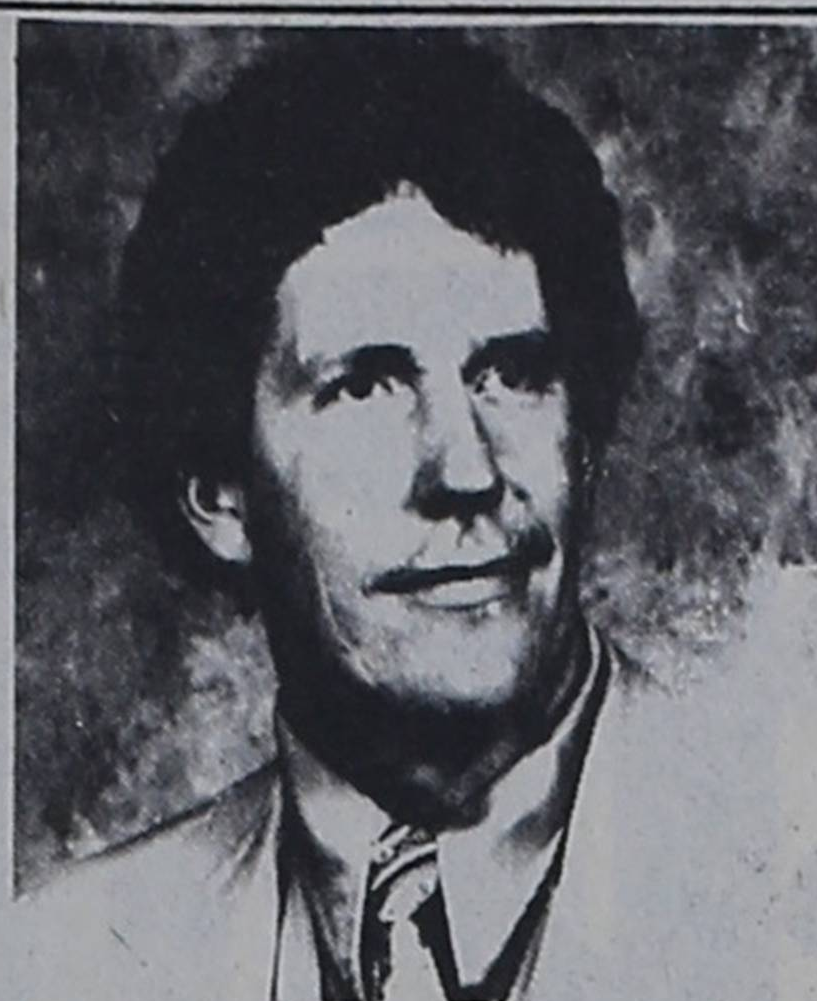
Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander in Lubbock says DPS is now taking applications for the position of recruit trainee. DPS says Yes! To Those Who Qualify.

Basic requirements are 20 to 35 years of age, sound physical condition, weight for males is not less than two pounds per inch of height nor more than three pounds per inch of height, weight for females is not less than one and three-quarters pounds per inch of height nor more than two and one-half pounds per inch of height, visual acuity must be correctable to 20/30.

Applicants must have a minimum

of sixty semester college hours, or two years military, or two years law enforcement experience. Applicants must be a citizen of the United States. They must possess a valid Texas drivers license.

Each applicant must obtain a satisfactory grade on physical examinations, oral examinations, interview and other portions of the screening process. SCORING AND SHOOTING

Veazey Leads Chiefs In Three Categories

Senior guard Charlie Veazey led the 1983-84 Friona Chieftain basketball team in three categories, according to final season statistics compiled this week by Coach Oscar Bronniman.

Veazey was the team's leading scorer, coming up with 560 points, good for an even 20-point scoring average for the 28 games he played.

Veazey's point total is the most since the 1975 team, featuring the all-time Friona High School record-scoring duo of Gene Strickland and Dale Cleveland. Strickland scored 725 points that year, and Cleveland 575.

In fairness to Veazey, the Chieftains of 1975 played 33 games, which was four more than the 1984 team played. However, Strickland's average for the entire season was 22 points per game, and Cleveland averaged 17.4.

Veazey is the first player since Strickland to average 20 points for a season.

The 5-10 Chieftain playmaker also was the team's leading shooter from the field, making 231 of 426 attempts, 54.2 per cent of his shots.

Veazey also was the leading free-throw shooter, sinking 98 of 148 attempts for 66.2 per cent for the season.

Robert Escalante was the team's second-leading scorer, with 311 points for the year in 29 games, or 10.7 per game.

Veazey edged out teammate Charlie Morgan for the field goal percentage lead. Morgan hit 82 of 154 shots, 53.2 per cent.

Ricky Barnett made 30 of 51 free throws, 55.5 per cent, and Johnny McLellan made 21 of 38 tries, 55.3 per cent.

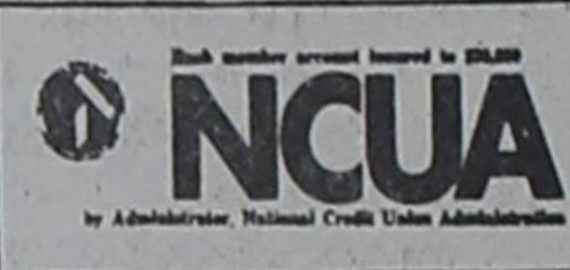
At the present time there are 30 members of the Fire Department. Eighteen of these are certified. The rest of the members are currently working on their certification.

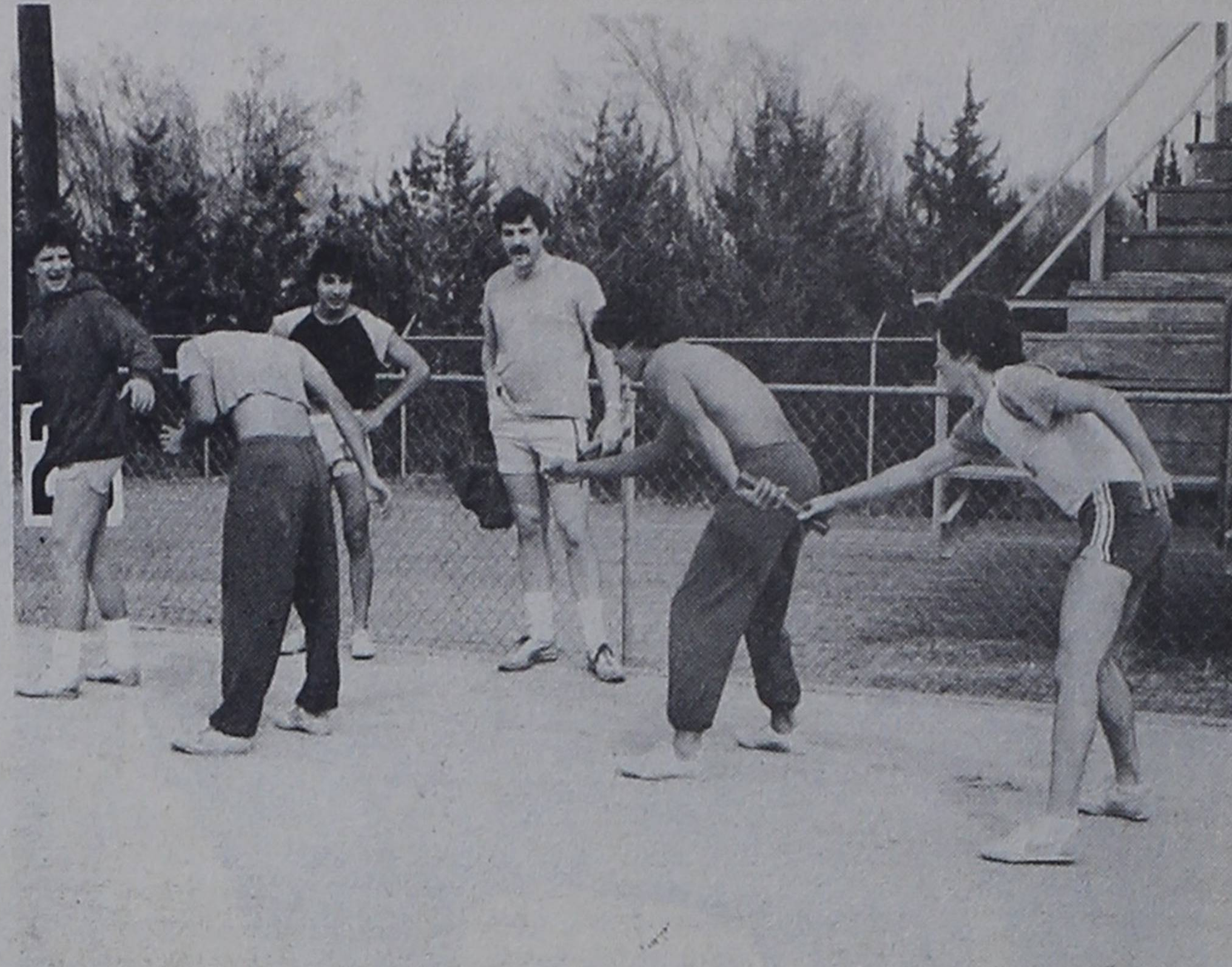
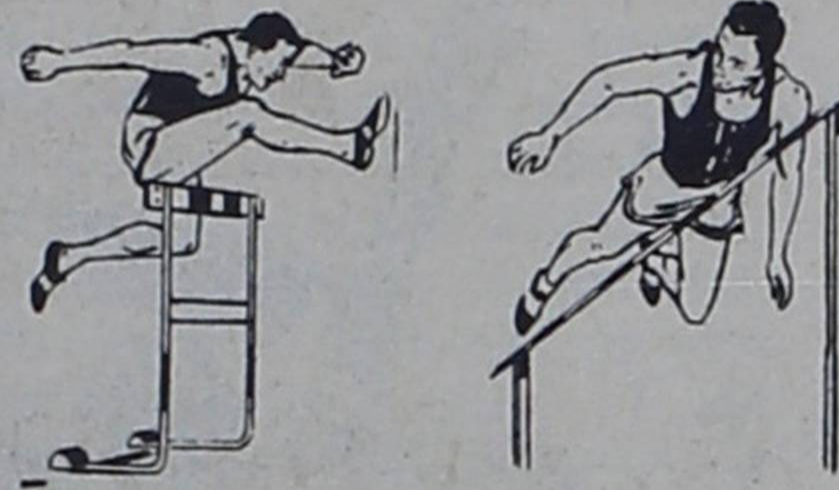
