# TDA Official Expects To See Action

Texas Department of Agriculture officials say they are not sure yet what the TDA will do with the information it is gathering concerning the area's cotton damage, but it appears that something is bound to come out of the investigation.

Angela Lamb, TDA district supervisor, says there are three avenues which can be taken: "We can assist a farmer in any civil case that arises; we can file criminal charges and pull the license of whoever was responsible if we can prove they did it maliciously, or we can level an administrative fine."

Mrs. Lamb said she felt virtually certain that some litigation will arise from the local 2,4-D incident.

"We do not file civil cases, but we can file criminal charges, and we can levy administrative fines or pull the licenses of applicators who may have broken regulations as set out by the state," Mrs. Lamb pointed out.

The head of field operations for the TDA, Dan Ruiz of Austin, was expected to be in Friona on Friday for a first-hand look at the situation.

#### Police Chief Thieman In Resignation

Friona Chief of Police Bill Thieman has tendered his letter of resignation to City Manager Beelee Goodwin, effective as of August 31, 1984, it was disclosed this week.

In a letter to the city manager, Thieman said in part: "As you are aware, in May, 1983, I inherited a department that was suffering severe internal problems and external problems with the community. These problems have not subsided to my satisfaction, nor have the conditions causing the problems been removed.

"On the positive side, I feel that my significant contribution to the department have included: development and introduction of a department manual addressing organizational guidelines, disciplinary process and field station operating procedures; introduction of a command board as a means of participative management, and an improved process for hiring of department personnel.

"Regarding our community image,
I feel that it has improved and the
projects of vacation house watch,
fingerprinting of children and the
powder puff firearms has gained
public support for the department.


"The time with the Friona Police Department has been very challenging and intellectually rewarding. I have appreciated our candor in our discussions, and working for you as my city manager. However, my own goals have not been met and I feel it is time to step aside for the effort of others."

Goodwin said steps have been initiated toward selecting a new Chief of Police.

# TDA Officials Continue With 2,4-D Investigation In Cotton

The Texas Department of Agriculture has continued its investigation of damage to the area's cotton crop from the chemical 2,4-D this week.

The TDA moved a mobile office into Friona on Tuesday, and the number of personnel involved has grown to 12 men working the fields, and two men in the office.

"We have had a total of 85 complaints as of Thursday morning. We are seeing a lot of damage, in various degrees," said Al Hernandez, an administrator for the enforcement section of the Agricultural Environment division, Texas Department of Agriculture.

The TDA employees who have been doing the investigative work have driven their vehicles to Friona from all over the state. Hernandez pointed out that the men need vehicles once they reach their work site, so it's just as simple to drive.

Men have come to Friona from Beaumont (two), San Angelo, San Antonio (two), Odessa, Giddings, El Paso, Austin, Mount Pleasant and Columbus.

The Parmer County Commissioner's Court this week responded to the problem by passing a resolution banning the use of all ester formulations of 2,4-D. This is the type of the weed killer which has been blamed for most of the damage to the area's cotton.

In their mobile office, the TDA workers have radio as well as telephone contact with their field workers. They have a local telephone number, 247-8034, by which they may be contacted by farmers.

They maintain radio contact with the field men, and this proves to be convenient as it sometimes saves trips out to the fields.

D.L. Carmichael, manager of the Friona Farmers Co-op Gin, said Thursday that more damaged cotton is continuing to show up in the area.

"Every time we get one of these little showers, it brings some 2,4-D damage with it," Carmichael says. "The older damage is not responding as well as we had hoped," the local ginner added.

He said that only one field, belonging to Junior Renner about three miles south of town, had bounced back and appeared to be recovering.

In the meantime, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has withdrawn all permits issued to local applicators for spraying 2,4-D in its various forms in the county.

"The Texas Department of Agriculture is concerned about the farmers. We want to try to help them all we can," Hernandez said.

Carmichael points out that the loss of cotton yields hurts the farmer not only for the year in question. "It will affect the farmer's projected yield figure which the government uses in figuring any government payment for a five-year period," Carmichael said.

The local ginner, who has also been a cotton farmer in this area for a number of years, says the current year's damage from 2,4-D is the worst he has ever seen. "I've seen cotton destroyed before, but it's usually been just individual patches, not thousands of acres.

Other ginners contacted have indicated their customers likewise have crop damage. Army Armstrong, manager of the Bruegel

Bros. Gin just beyond the southeastern edge of the county line, said several of the farmers in his area were affected.

Similar stories were related by Tommy Chapman of Elgin, JeDon Gallman of Farwell Gin, Ovid Lawlis of Bovina Gin, John Baca of West Hub Gin, and Marvin Payne of Hereford.

At mid-week, cotton officials estimated that somewhere in the neighborhood of 30,000 acres of cotton may be affected by the herbicide drift. Parmer County has approximately 70,000 acres, according to Martin Chandler of the County ASCS office.

Carmichael was host on Tuesday to a gathering at which most of the county's ginners attended. Also on hand were television newsmen Carl McMillen of KAMR-TV, Channel 4; and Steve Pritchett of KVII-TV, Channel 7, both of Amarillo.

The two TV stations carried taped interviews with ginners and farmers on their Tuesday evening newscasts concerning the herbicide damage.

Also coming to Friona to document the crop damage have been representatives of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, the Amarillo Globe-News, and the Dallas Morning News, whose reporter David Hanners was compiling an in-depth feature story for this Sunday's edition. Lubbock's Channel 13 was also here on Thursday.

Hernandez indicated that in addition to looking at the herbicide's effects to the area's cotton, he also would be doing some inspection of records of sales of the harmone-type herbicides. He was not at liberty to say what action, if any, might be brought against applicators of the suspected spray.

Harry Hamilton, whose 77-acre field of cotton northwest of Friona appears to be one of the hardest-hit in the area, points out that this year's damage came at the worst of all possible times.

"This makes four years in a row for me," Hamilton said, explaining that in prior years he had experienced a devastating hail, followed by seedling disease problems, and then a year where too much moisture affected the yield.

Danny Murphree, who farms close to Hamilton, said, "We think we've lost 50 per cent right now, but we don't know if we're through with the damage or not."

55 YEARS AGO--JULY 19, 1929

W.W. Standiford of Amherst has leased the J.T. Browning feed mill here and will put it in operation at once, grinding all kinds of feed for the public. He will also install a special mill for grinding meal.

50 YEARS AGO--JULY 13, 1934

45 YEARS AGO--JULY 14, 1939

According to information reaching the Star office, the Lubbock Poultry & Eggs, a Lubbock institution, has rented the J.B. Weir building commonly known as the Corner Filling Station, at the corner of Main and Sixth Streets and will open there

a general produce station. The building is being repaired and improved.

86 and FM 214 in Parmer County,

Field Day Slated

Texas. Duval Burton, District Conservationist with the Parmer County Soil Conservation Service, has made the arrangements for this field day. Duval indicates, "This is a new concept in field days compared to those field days we have all attended in the past. We have planned six different demonstrations, but unlike traditional field tours, area producers are welcome to come see all the demonstrations, spend some time at each one, or just come by and visit the demonstrations that they are particularly interested in."

The irrigation field day will be set up from 9 a.m. until approximately 3 p.m. The planned demonstrations include: 1) Leon New, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Area Irrigation Engineer, will demonstrate the Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) center pivot sprinkler; 2) Phillip Johnson, farmer and secretary of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District Board, and Jerry Walker, Area Agricultural Engineer with the Soil Conservation Service, will

demonstrate a surge irrigation system; 3) Jerry Funck, Agricultural Engineer with the High Plains Water District, will perform a pump plant energy efficiency test including both pump and motor efficiency testing; 4) Soil Conservation Service personnel will display and discuss their use of the mini mobile field water conservation laboratory; 5) Drip irrigation will be discussed as it is used on irrigating windbreak trees; and 6) The use of gypsum blocks and resistance meters used to read the blocks will be demonstrated. Drip irrigation equipment, gypsum blocks and resistance meters are all available through the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.



About one quarter of all household water use can be traced to the kitchen and laundry room, says Parmer County Extension home economist Laura Jacobs. But with just a few adjustments, families can cut the amount of water they use for cooking and washing dishes, she

Here are some of the water-saving suggestions:

Because a kitchen faucet can deliver five gallons of water a minute, find ways to avoid running water. For example, use a pan of water to wash fruits and vegetables instead of doing it under the tap. If you wash dishes by hand, use a dish pan and rinse all the dishes at once rather than a few at a time.

Find ways to make double use of water. Ideally, the liquid from cooking vegetables and other foods should be used again as stock for soups or broth. But even if you don't intend to use it for cooking, don't throw it away. Cooking liquids can be used to soak baked-on food off of cookware before

Washing dishes by hand requires anywhere from 8 to 20 gallons of water. A dishwasher typically uses between 12 and 16 gallons of water, so the dishwasher should not automatically be considered a water waster. However, a dishwasher uses the same amount of water whether it is completely full or only partially full, so it pays to wait until the dishwasher is loaded to

The local team never really got untracked and played up to their full



Andre Duran was Friona pitcher.



Everyday farm chores that can result in sudden, blinding accidents can usually be circumvented simply by wearing goggles, the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness (TSPB) notes in connection with Farm Safety Week, July 25-31.

Working with agricultural chemicals, particularly anhydrous ammonia fertilizers, is dangerous and always necessitates wearing goggles, TSPB Eye Safety chairman Bobby Williams said.

"Ammonia is so dangerous because it penetrates the eye virtually

on contact, and total blindness can result as soon as in 10 to 15 seconds," Williams added.

"In the event such an accident occurs, the eye should be flushed with water for at least 15 minutes," he said, "and then medical help should be sought at once."


Under no circumstances should ointments or salves be used, since they tend to seal ammonia into the eye and might only increase the damage, Williams continued.

Wearing goggles and taking other common sense precautions can also prevent blindness that could be caused by other farm accidents, such as a strand snapping when stretching barbed wire, he said.

To acquaint the public with the dangers in using anhydrous ammonia, TSPB has a 16-minute movie, "For The Rest Of Your Life," which it will loan without charge to interested groups.


