As usual, the celebration will kick off with the Friona Noon Lions Club's annual barbecue lunch, starting at 11:30 a.m., through 1:30 p.m., at the Community Center.

The Friona Young Homemakers will sponsor a cake walk, just in time for dessert.

Eva Miller's stage band will be playing music during the barbecue, for the enjoyment of those attending.

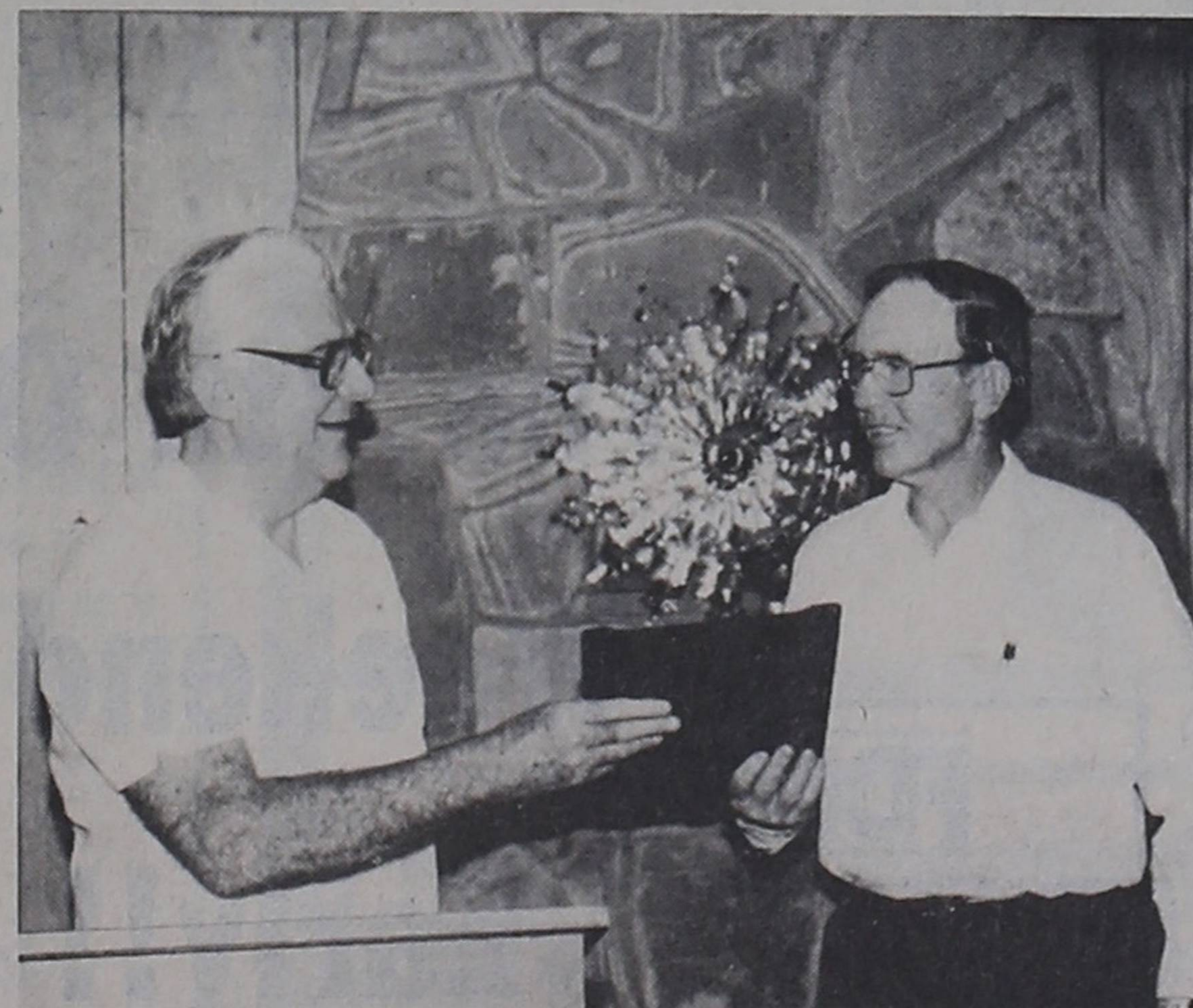

DRIVE IS SHORT

Storm Warning System Fund Drive Needs Aid

The fund drive continues by the Friona Volunteer Fire Department, which is needing to raise \$5500 for a tornado and storm warning system to be used by local cable television subscribers.

As of Wednesday of this week, a total of \$2700 had been raised, leaving the department \$2800 short of their goal.

"We have ordered the equipment, on faith, and have guaranteed the \$5500. I hope the residents of Friona who have not responded will do so, as the Fire Department is definitely not in a position to absorb this cost," says fire chief Ralph Shirley.

The warning system will be entirely local in nature, and can be activated by a dispatcher at the Friona Police Department.

All channels on the local cable

system would be blanked out, with a "voice over" message giving details on where the storm is located, its intensity, etc.

The selling point of the system is that it can be broadcast to all channels, including HBO, so that anyone having their television set on should get the message.

Also, the warning will be local in nature, not depending upon Amarillo or Lubbock radio and/or television to put out warnings.

Local civil service volunteers will be out monitoring a threatening storm, and will be in radio contact with the police dispatcher.

Whenever anything is spotted that the cloud watchers deem dangerous, the message will be radioed, and immediately broadcast on the cable system. The proposed cost amounts

to only about \$5.50 per household, but so far only about 500 residents have responded.

House Check Follow Up Is Needed

The Friona Police Department is enjoying excellent response from the public regarding the vacation house check program, states Police Chief W.D. Thieman.

"The public seems well pleased with the department's efforts and has readily accepted the program by calling in and advising us of their departure date and other information," Thieman says.

"However, after enjoying their vacations, people need to remember to call the Police Department when they return. It only takes a few minutes, and the dispatcher will readily take your call and remove your home from the list," the police chief adds.

If people fail to call upon their return, the patrolman is apt to notice lights being changed or a window or door open and begin to investigate for a possible burglary.

"Notification could save some embarrassment for all parties involved," Thieman says.

Prospect Steer, Heifer Show Is Expanded

The prospect steer and heifer show has been expanded for 1983, and will be a five-county show, according to David Barnett, a spokesman for the event.

The "Beef Capitol Prospect Show" will be held July 23 at the Friona Community Center.

Showmen with animals living in Parmer, Bailey, Castro, Deaf Smith and Lamb counties are being invited to participate in the show.

Prize money will include \$500 cash for the Grand Champion steer, and \$300 for the Reserve Champion steer; \$200 for the Grand Champion heifer and \$100 for the Reserve Champion heifer.

Entry fees will be refunded through the top three places in each class.

All prizes will be paid from entry fees, which is \$35 per head.

Deadline for entering is July 10. A late charge of \$10.00 will be made for entries after the deadline.

Friona State Bank announced this week that it once again would hold its free watermelon feed on Friday, July 1, on the bank lawn, beginning at 10 a.m. and lasting until 3 p.m.

Funeral services for Newman Jarrell, Sr., were held Monday, June 6, at 11:30 a.m. in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

Letter To The Editor

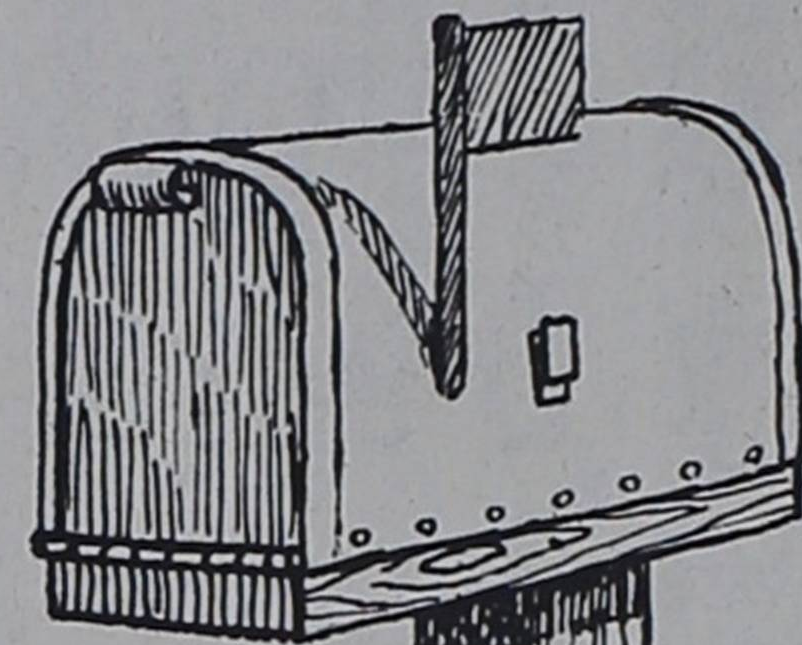
Dear Bill,

The reluctance of many cable TV customers to pay the \$5.50 for the tornado warning hook up may be because they simply do not understand how it works.

After a conversation with Ralph Shirley I can pass along this information:

Whenever bad weather threatens the Friona Volunteer Firemen and other responsible citizens will range the countryside on a cloud watching mission.

They will be in constant radio contact with our police dispatchers. If a dangerous storm is sighted its location and probable path is radioed



to headquarters. The dispatcher makes one quick phone call to the TV tower. Automation takes over. All channels coming over the cable system are immediately blanked out in favor of our own individual tornado warning.

This will be a "voice-over"; those who may be unable to read or in another room will benefit as well as anyone watching the TV set, anyone within hearing range.

Lest this be confused with the warnings sent out by Amarillo or Lubbock remember that by the time those stations get the warning and put it on the air a tornado could very well have wiped Friona off the map.

Our cable system is one of the best in Texas; installation and service are tops. Of their several hundred customers only about 500 have signed up. Funds for the warning system amount to about half of what is needed. The cost to the fire department is \$5500.00. So far \$2700.00 has been donated. We must come up with the remaining \$2800.00 and not leave the Fire Boys holding the bag.

They put their lives on the line for us every time they answer a call. Surely \$5.50 per household is little enough to contribute for such services.

Around The House In Parmer County

Warm weather brings out both seasoned athletes and "fair-weather" sports lovers. Whether you and your family "athletes" are Little Leaguers, joggers, gymnasts, or week-end tennis players, each should know how to take care of him or herself while exercising during the long, hot and often humid Texas summer.

Most athletes know that they lose water through the skin as the body lets out heat through perspiration. But what many don't know is that it is virtually impossible to replace all the water lost by sweating.

To partially replace lost water, drink small amounts frequently during exercise, in addition to the water you drink before and after the activity. Remember that during strenuous exercise, even if you have quenched your thirst by drinking water, you may not have satisfied your body's need for fluid replacement.

Athletes also lose sodium, or salt, through sweating in hot, humid weather. An athlete eating an average diet gets enough sodium except when sweating is excessive. If

additional salt is needed, you can add an extra sprinkle from the salt-shaker to meals and eat saltines, nuts, snack crackers or cheese after exercising. You can also make a homemade solution of one teaspoon salt to six quarts of water, or buy one of the "sports" drinks which are diluted solutions of sugar, glucose, salt and artificial sweeteners.

Salt tablets should not be used because they contain such a high concentration of minerals. In fact, excessive salt from tablets will reduce an athlete's efficiency because it results in water retention and causes stomach upsets, excessive excretion of sodium and a loss of potassium.

Some weather conditions make it very difficult for the body to retain the salt and fluids it needs. If temperatures are over 84 degrees and the humidity is over 90 per cent, it would be best to simply postpone strenuous exercise until a cooler time of the day.

Smart athletes make sure they get enough water and salt to avoid the risk of heat stroke or other problems that can ruin their summer fun.

The Texas Low-Level Radioactive Waste Disposal Authority was established in 1981 to construct a facility for the burial of low-level radioactive waste. Low-level waste include materials contaminated with radioactivity from hospitals, laboratories, and other industries which handle or process radioactive material, but does not include spent fuel from nuclear power plants.

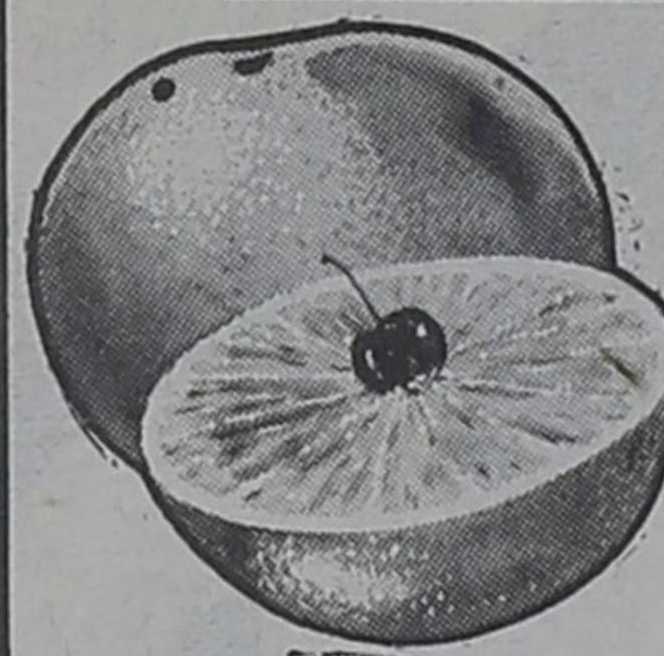

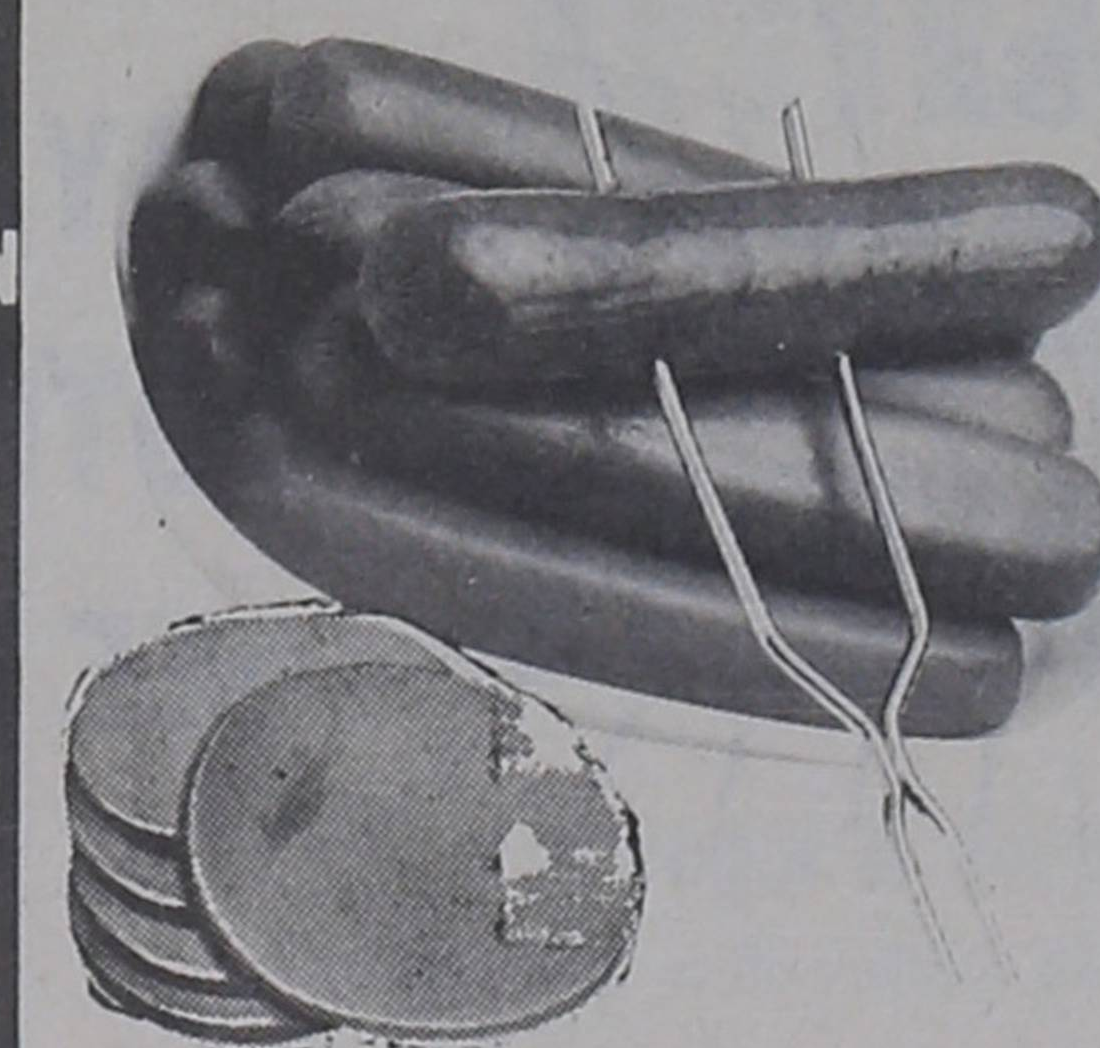

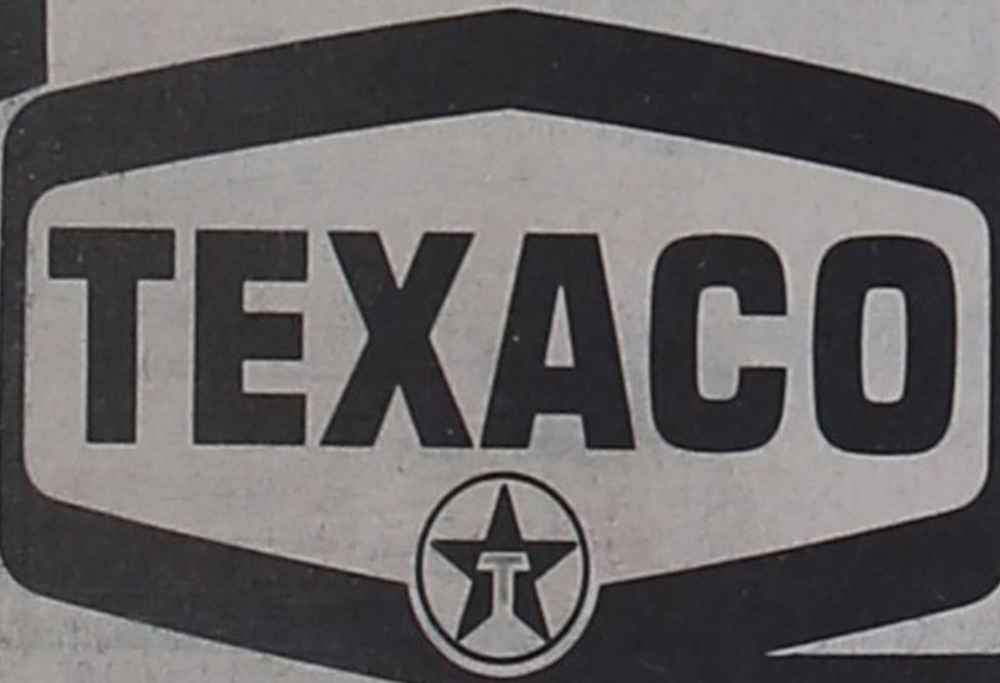

Charles Caudill served as installing officer.

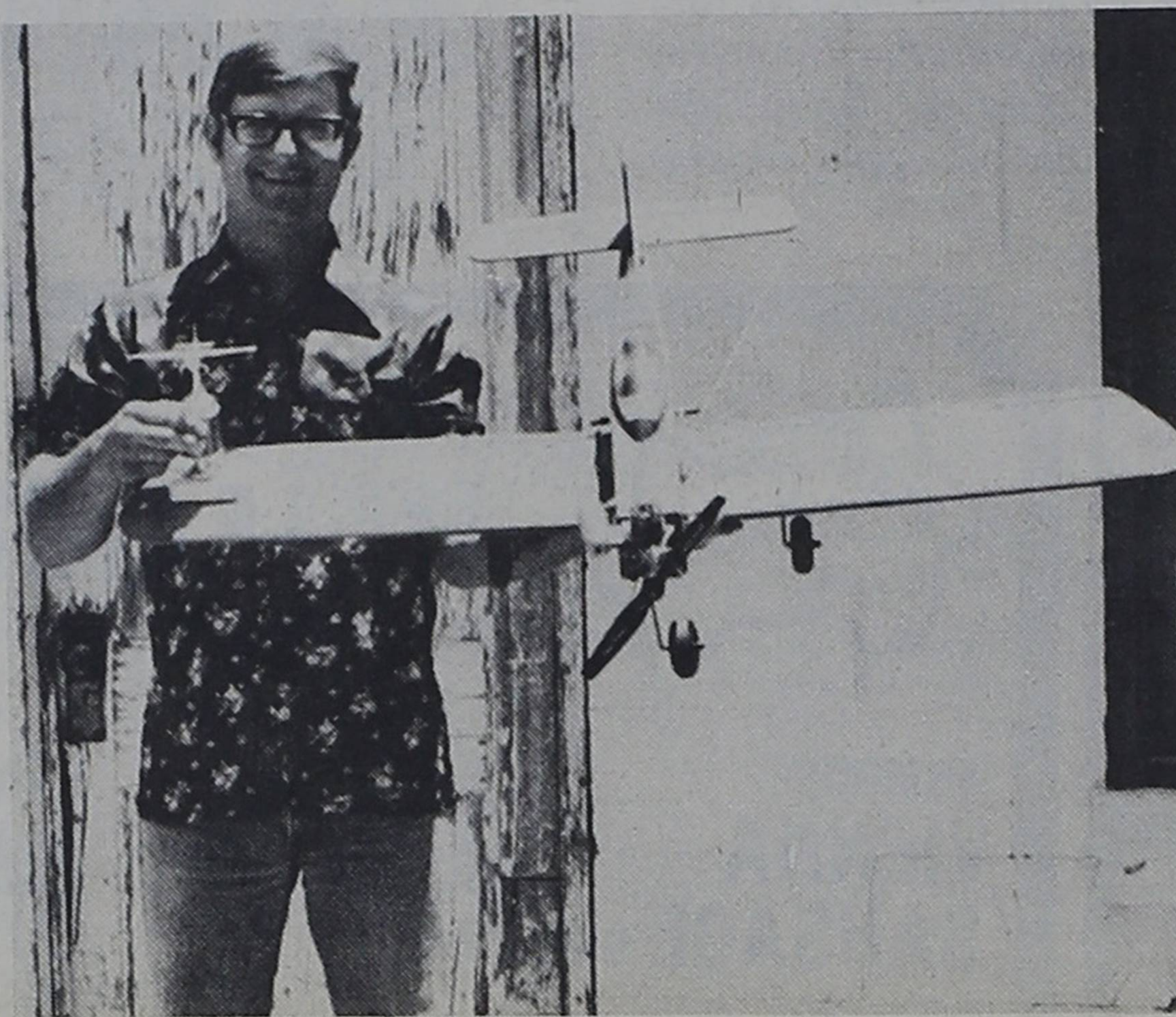

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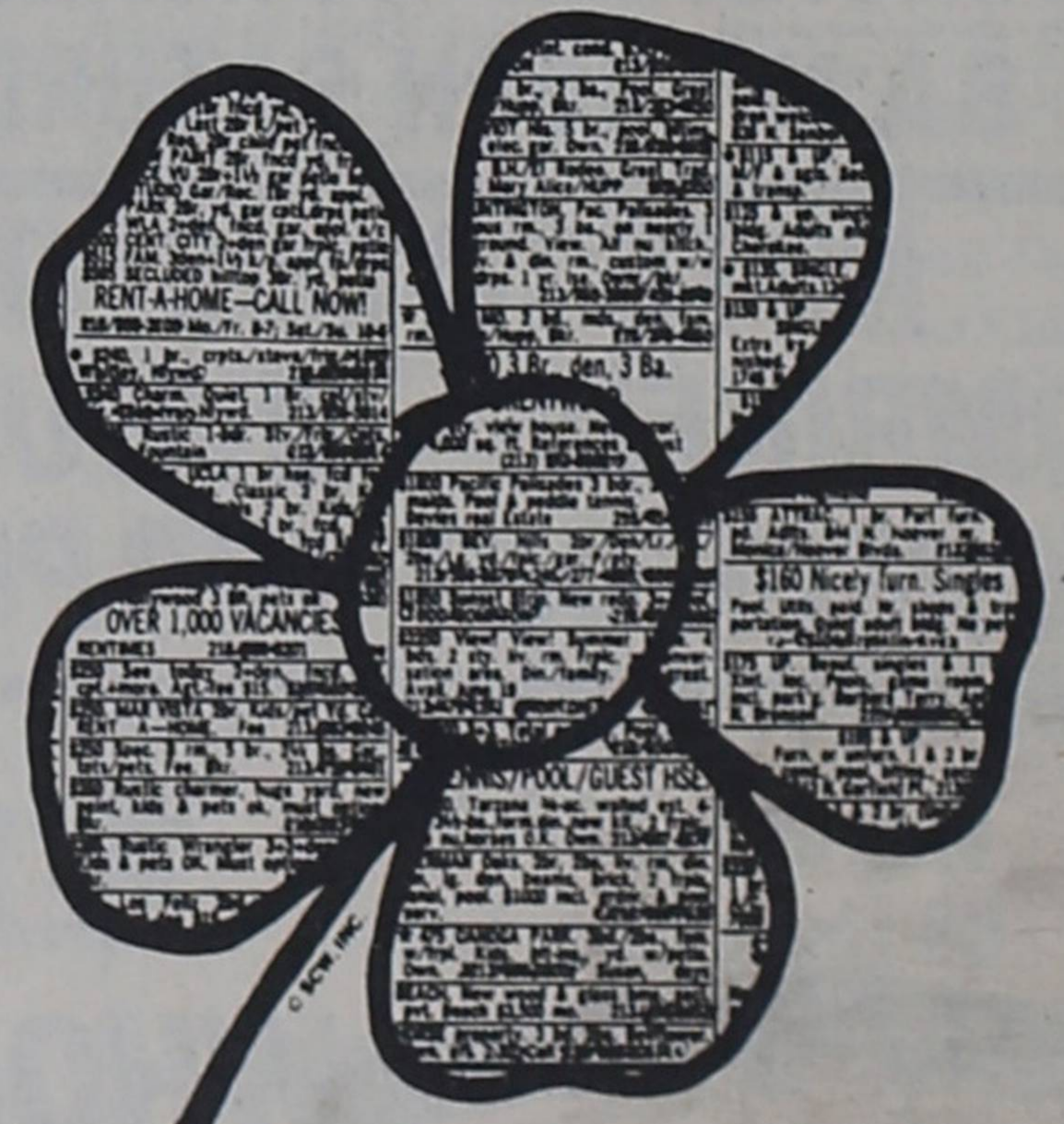
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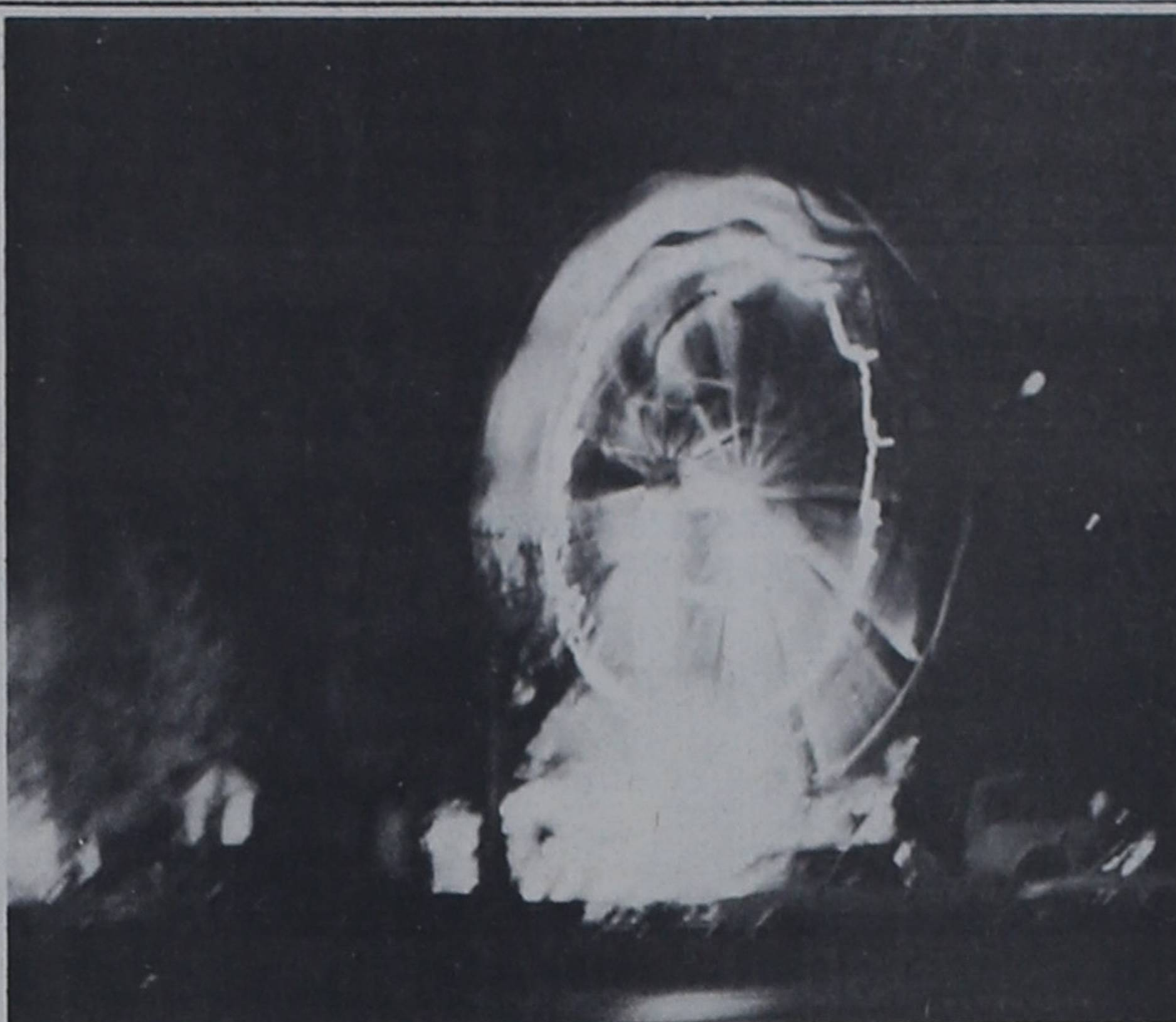

Clements, Deon L. Clements, Darin Clements and Damon Clements, all of Lubbock; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dee Clements of Muleshoe; his grandmother, Mrs. Dora Chaney of Muleshoe; and one brother, Olan D. Clements of Albuquerque, N.M. Two of Clements' sons are involved in law enforcement, and his father served as Bailey County Sheriff for a number of years.

Around The House

June is National Dairy Month and it just so happens, it is also the time many people start craving a freezer of home made ice cream.

Dolly Madison, wife of the fourth president, introduced ice cream during a presidential reception in the early 1800's. Now we all love it!

You should know the Extension Service Food and Nutrition specialists only recommend the cooked variety of home made ice cream. There is a risk of food poisoning from raw eggs if you use the no-cook method.

See if your family doesn't like this ice cream and its many variations—I think they will!

GRANDMA'S VANILLA ICE CREAM

- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 3/4 cup granulated sugar
- 2 tablespoons flour
- Few grains salt
- 2 eggs, or 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
- 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla

1 1/2 cups heavy cream

In double boiler, scald milk. Mix next three ingredients; stir in enough milk to make a smooth paste. Stir into rest of milk in double boiler. Stir until thickened; cover; cook 10 minutes. Beat eggs slightly; stir in milk mixture; return to double boiler; cook 1 minute. Cool. Add vanilla and cream. Freeze in 2 quart crank freezer until difficult to turn, using 8 parts crushed ice to 1 part ice cream salt. Makes 1 1/2 quart.

CHOCOLATE

Put 2 sq. (2 oz.) unsweetened chocolate in milk before scalding. When chocolate is melted, beat till smooth with egg beater.

COFFEE

Substitute 3/4 cup strong black coffee beverage for 3/4 cup milk.

PEACH

Just before freezing, add 1 1/2 cups sieved fresh peaches combined with 1/4 cup additional granulated sugar (or enough to sweeten) and few drops almond extract.

PINEAPPLE

Substitute 1 tablespoon

fresh, frozen or canned lemon juice for vanilla. Just before freezing, add 2 cups well-drained crushed pineapple.

RASPBERRY

Just before freezing, add 1 1/2 cup crushed raspberries mixed with about 1/4 cup additional granulated sugar and few drops almond extract.

BUTTER PECAN

In 1/4 cup butter, margarine or salad oil in skillet, saute 1 cup broken pecan meats until golden. Add, with 3/4 teaspoon salt, to cooked milk mixture.

CHOCOLATE PEPPERMINT SAUCE

Yield: 3 cups
1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter
2 squares (2 oz.) unsweetened chocolate

1 1/2 cups sugar
1/8 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup light cream or half and half

1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup whipping cream, whipped

1/2 cup coarsely chopped peppermint candy

Melt butter and chocolate in heavy saucepan over low

heat, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat, stir in sugar and salt gradually, mixing until well combined. (Mixture will be thick and dry.) Gradually stir in half and half. Return to heat. Cook over low heat until sugar is dissolved, about 5 minutes. Cool. Stir in whipped cream and candy. Refrigerate; serve cold over ice cream.

HONEY BUTTER SAUCE

Yield 1 1/2 cups
Melt 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter in a saucepan. Blend in 1/4 cup honey, 1/8 teaspoon cinnamon and a dash of salt. Remove from heat and stir in 1/2 cup whipping cream until smooth. Cool. Serve over your favorite ice cream.

CHOCO-PEANUT BUTTER SAUCE

Yield: 1 1/2 cups
Melt 2 squares (2 oz.) semi-sweet chocolate. Beat melted chocolate into 1/2 cup chunk-style peanut butter. Stir in 3/4 cup milk and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Serve hot or cold over ice cream. (If sauce becomes too thick after storage in refrigerator, stir in a little additional milk.)

Drivers Urged To Be Alert

The Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety called on drivers to use extreme caution in traveling the streets and highways in Texas during the July 4th holiday weekend.

Major Vernon Cawthon said, "We realize the added dangers of traveling by motor vehicle during holiday periods and want to help motorists avoid the tragedy and suffering which could mar this otherwise happy occasion."

He pointed out that the DPS will be conducting its holiday "Operation Motorcade." He said, "We will continue to work with the news media to keep motorists posted on unusual traffic conditions and to advise them on where and why serious holiday accidents are occurring."

Cawthon said, "Excessive speed and driving while intoxicated continue as the primary law violations contributing to fatal accidents," and he warned, "DPS troopers have been directed to be especially watchful for motorists exceeding speed limits or under the influence of alcohol."

Cawthon also reminds motorists that many lives could be saved and serious injuries could be reduced during the crowded driving time through greater utilization of seat belts.

He added, "The DPS will place all available troopers on the state's highways during the holiday, and we urge every Texas driver to join in an all-out effort to make the July 4th holiday as safe as possible."

Sarpalius' DWI Bill Signed By Governor

The Governor has signed into law a bill which all Texans can be proud of. The signing of Senate Bill One, a bill we authored and sponsored, represents a significant step toward increasing the safety of motorists who travel the roads and highways of Texas.

The new DWI law will go into effect January 1, 1983. The new measure calls for tougher penalties for repeat DWI offenders and it encourages alcohol rehabilitation. The new law also eliminates deferred adjudication, which in the past, allowed offenders to keep their record clean by serving probation without committing another offense.

We believe the tougher penalties, which will be assessed against DWI offenders beginning next year, will discourage intoxicated persons from getting behind the wheel of an automobile.

Under the new law, the courts will be allowed to suspend a motorist's license for up to one year on the first DWI conviction if the offender refuses to participate in a DWI education course. A second offense can result in a suspension of six months to two years.

A first time DWI offender will face a possible maximum fine of \$2000 and a jail term up to two years. A first time offender can receive probation without going to jail by participating in an alcohol or drug dependency evaluation and by completing other necessary conditions of probation.

Jail time will be mandatory for repeat offenders. Second time offenders will face jail time of from fifteen days to two years and a fine of from \$300-\$2000. On a second DWI conviction, a person will have to serve at least three days in jail as a

condition of probation.

A third time offender will face from thirty days to two years in the county jail or from sixty days to five years in the Texas Department of Corrections and a fine of from \$500-\$2000. On a third conviction, a person will have to serve at least ten days in jail as one condition of probation.

Penalties will be further enhanced in DWI cases involving death or serious injury.

Juveniles who are arrested for drunken driving will lose their license after their offense unless they take a DWI education course. After a second DWI conviction, a juvenile will lose his or her license for a year or until he or she reaches the legal drinking age, whichever is longer.

The new law also includes a new definition of intoxication. A person will be considered legally drunk if a test for alcohol in the blood shows a concentration of 0.10 per cent or more. Studies indicate that anyone with a 0.10 per cent blood alcohol level is too drunk to be driving.

The new law makes refusal to be tested for alcohol in the blood admissible as evidence in court.

The new measures are designed to keep drunken drivers off our streets and highways and encourage them to seek help in alcohol treatment programs.

We believe the new law will help save the lives of innocent victims across the state. Statistics show that from 1976 to 1981, fatal accidents in Texas increased by 48 per cent, and 79 per cent of the fatalities were caused by drunken drivers.

Everyone is invited to come by the Friendship House and help Mrs. White celebrate her birthday.

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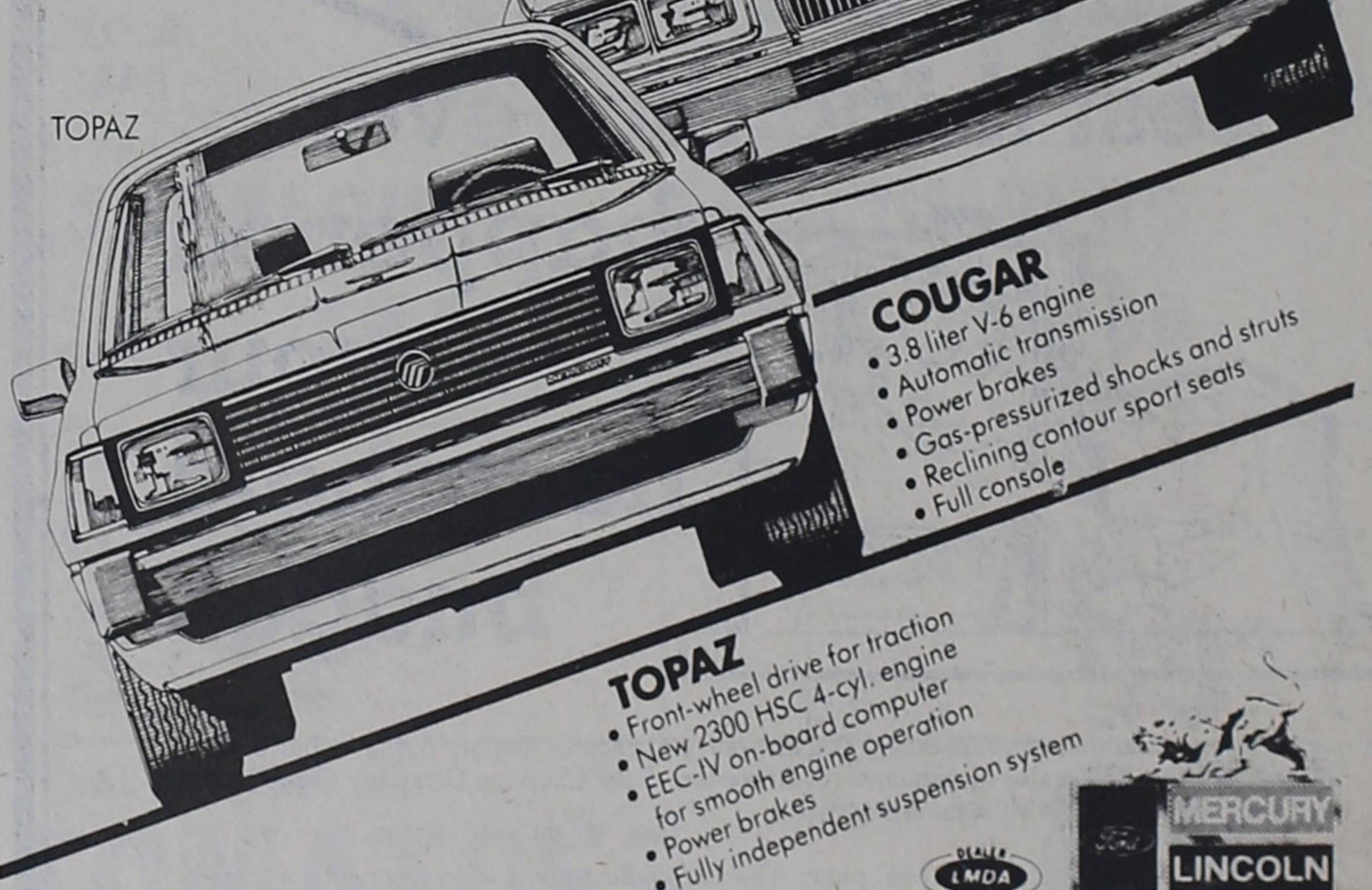
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Double Ring Ceremony Unites Shayla Coker, Ross Armstrong

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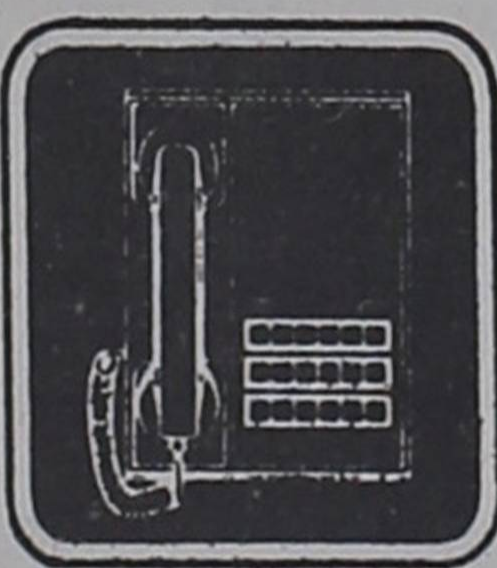
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
