Those who will be stationed on the dunking board will include Floyd Reeve, Mike Hanes, Hal Ratcliff, Tom Jarboe, John Mars, and John Blackwell, and many more.

Those on the "pie in the face" booth include Carl White, D.L. Harguess, the junior high and high school coaches, chamber board members and others.

"Anyone who would like to volunteer for either booth is welcomed to do so—we need you very much."

A photography show will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday, September 20-22 at 618 Main Street, sponsored by Modern Study Club. The club will also sponsor its annual Country Store at the building Friday and Saturday, with craft items, baked goods and other things for sale.

## Ex-Resident Dies In Pampa Stabbing

Funeral services for Earl A. Love, 32, of Pampa, were held Friday, September 21, at 2:30 p.m. in the Friona First United Methodist Church with Rev. Archie Echols, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in the Friona Cemetery under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Born April 17, 1952 in Friona, Love was a house painter. He was a member of the Methodist Church and was a U.S. Army veteran, serving in Vietnam. He received the Eagle Scout award, October, 1967 and was a former member of the Friona Boy Scout Troup No. 56. He had moved to Pampa from Friona.

Police investigators in Pampa arrested four men in connection with Love's death. He died in an Amarillo hospital from stab wounds.

Three men, all 19 years of age, were charged with aggravated assault in connection with the incident. A fourth, who was said to be just 17 years of age, was to be charged on Thursday with murder.

Bond for each of the assault charges was set at \$10,000 each by Gray County Justice of the Peace Margie Prestige.

Love was reportedly stabbed seven times in the chest and once in the arm with a knife as he and a female passenger, Ann Wright, 18, sat in a 1977 Ford at 1:30 a.m. Wednesday near a convenience store in Pampa.

Pampa Police Chief J.J. Ryzman said, "Our investigation shows that the victim and his passenger had been to the convenience store shortly after 1 a.m., and as they were leaving the store, noticed a group of males in an area just north of the store and stopped to talk with them."

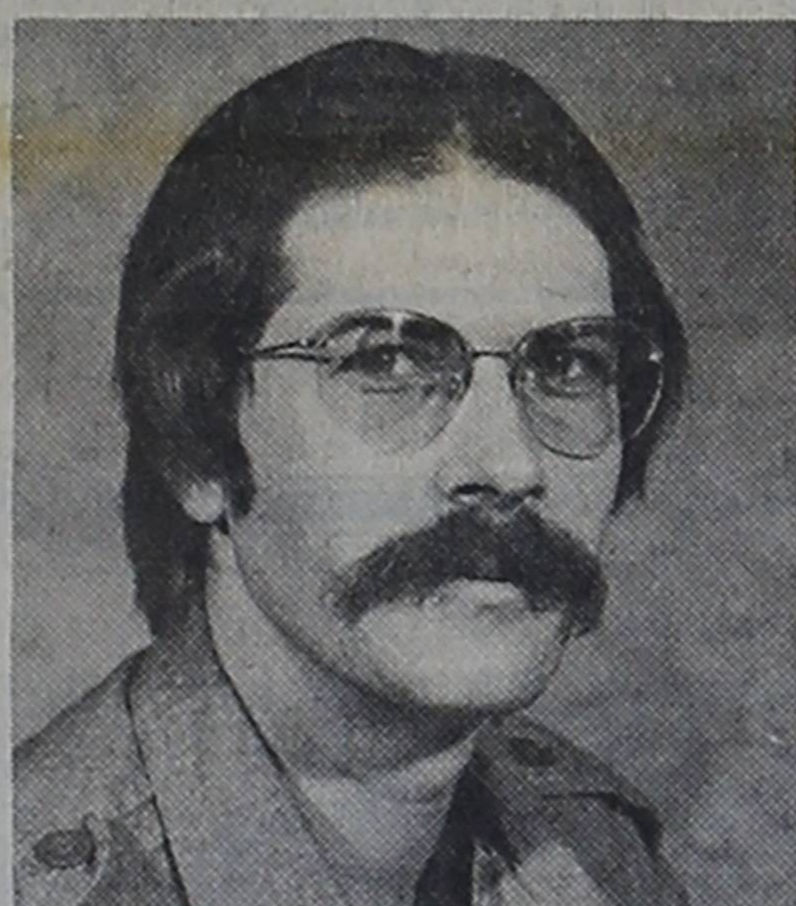
He said that during the conversation, two of the suspects "exchanged some heated words with the victim, and one of them struck him."

"Two of the males reportedly jumped onto the driver's side of the vehicle and the victim attempted to shake them loose by driving back and forth. He then backed out onto Ballard Street, where his car stalled," Ryzman said.

Ryzman said the two men continued to hang onto the car, at which point the assault took place.

Love then reportedly told Miss Wright to call police, and then drove the car to the front of the store. He was later found slumped over in the car's front seat.

Responding officers observed a blue Buick leaving the scene and

the vehicle and its driver were later stopped a block from the point of the assault.

Police said the vehicle's driver, Juan Estrada, 23, was found bleeding from a wound on the upper left arm.

As of Thursday, Estrada was not being charged in connection with the stabbing.

Love's survivors include two daughters, Nikkie Love of Friona and Heidi Love of Colorado Springs, Colorado; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Love of Friona; his grandmother, Mrs. Myrtle Love of Durant, Oklahoma, and one brother, Charles Love of Pampa.

Vergil T. Ichtertz is the new pastor at Friona's Calvary Baptist Church.

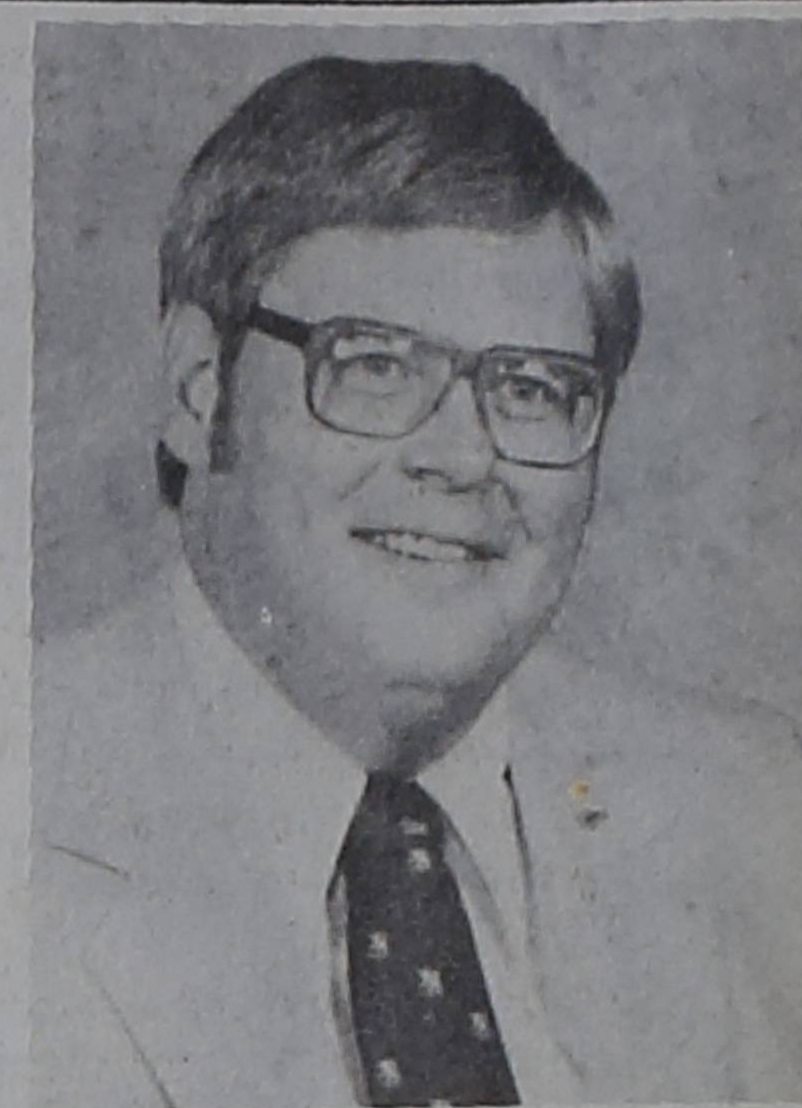
Rev. Ichtertz is a native of this area. He was born in Lubbock February 9, 1949, and graduated from Shallowater High School in 1967.

# Dalhart Entrant Wins Football Contest

Mike Field of Dalhart, a former Friona resident who has been for a number of years a regular entrant in the Friona Star's football contest, was the winner of the second week's contest, as once again the winning score in the event was 19.

For the second week in a row, a tie game marred the contest slate, when the Arkansas-Mississippi game ended in a tie. This game was counted wrong on all of the entries.

Also for the second week in a row, it was a husband-wife duo claiming the top two prizes, as Patti Field claimed second place in the contest. She also scored a 19, with the tie-breaker score being used to separate the winners.

Tommy Moss, head coach of the Friona Chieftains, took third place, likewise scoring a 19.

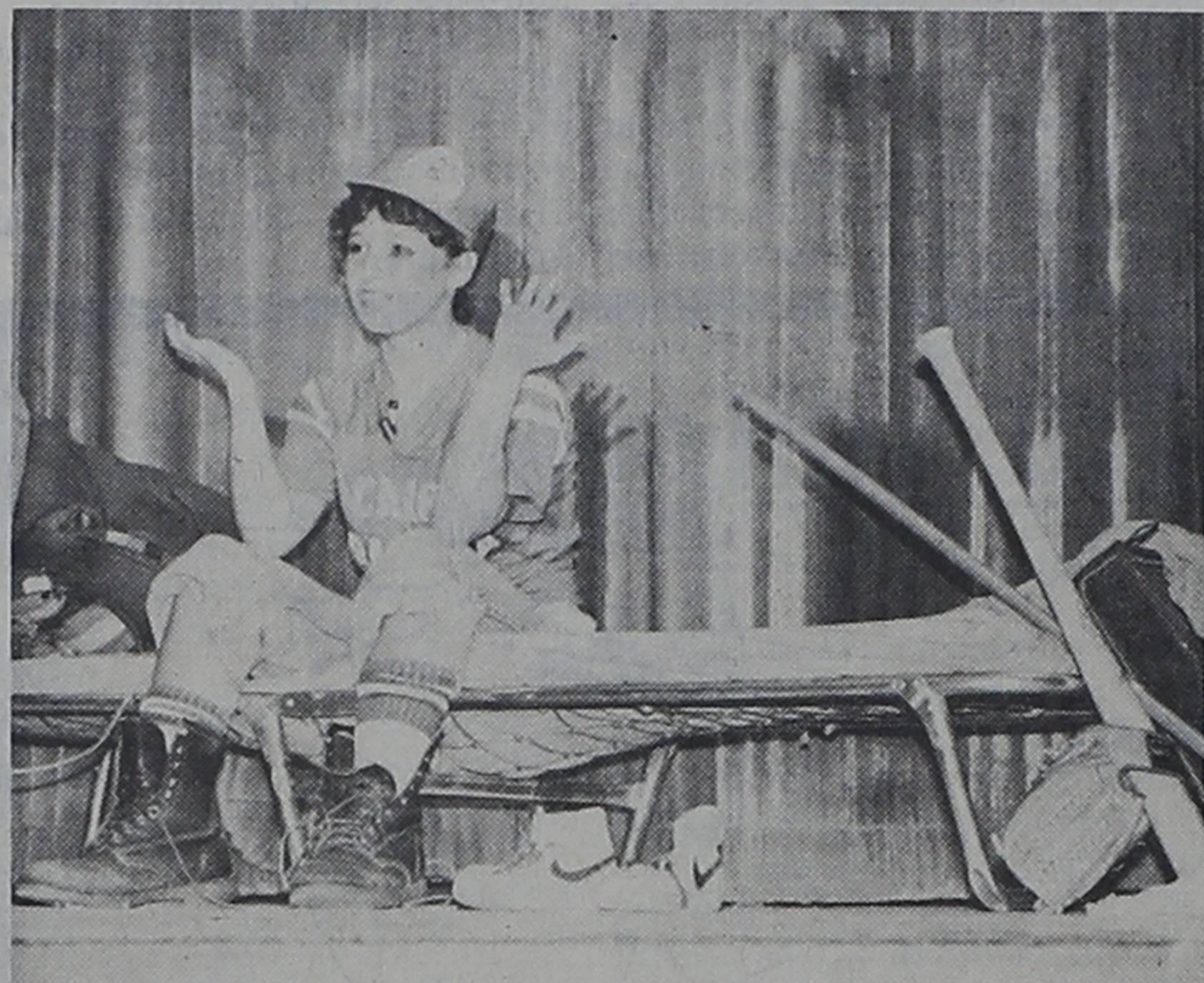

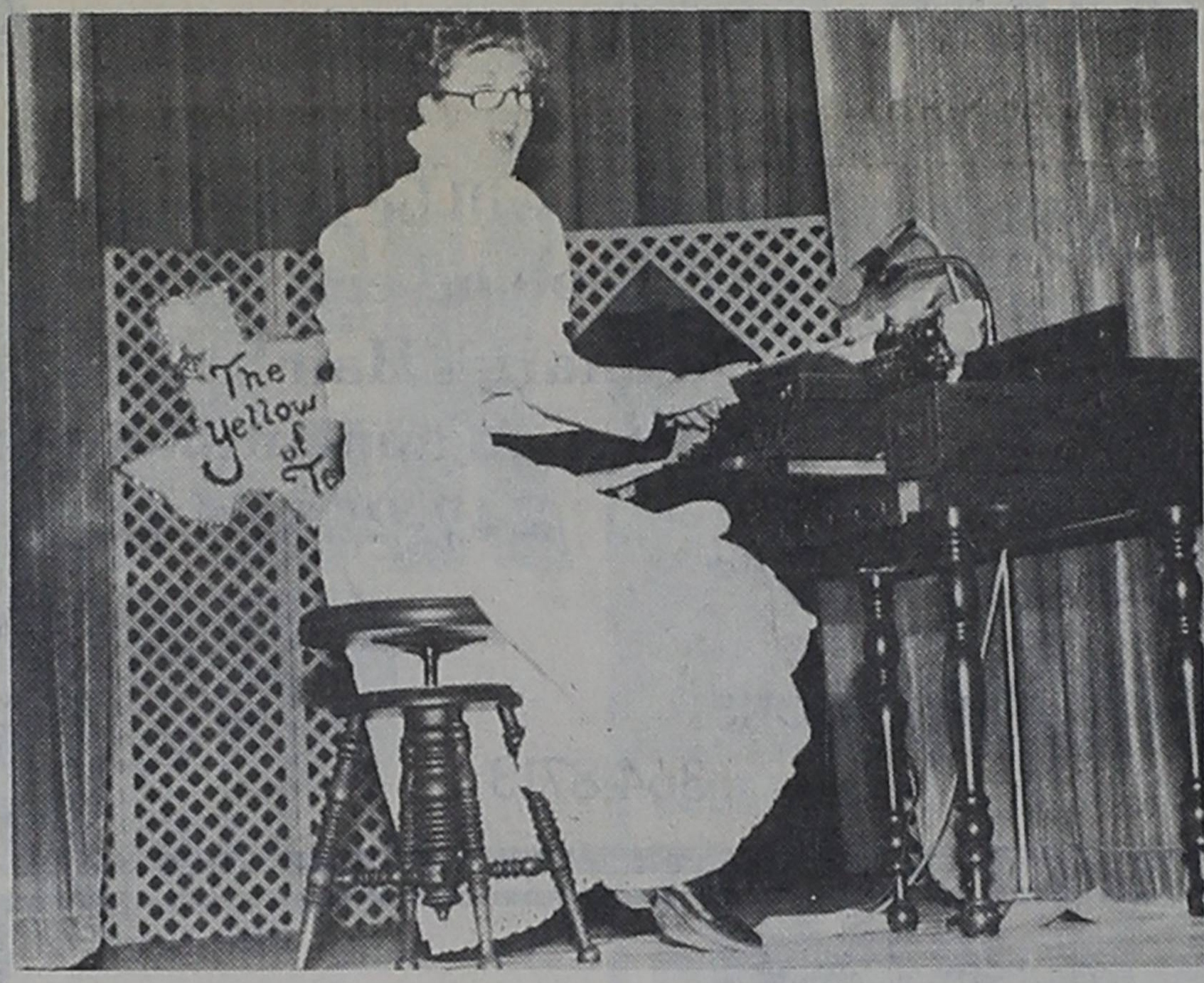

**CATARACTS--Determining The Type**

In the previous article the types and causes of cataracts were discussed. The most common type of cataract is the senile cataract which is associated with the aging process. However, we have seen congenital, infantile or juvenile, systemic, and traumatic cataracts in our practice here in Littlefield. We are generally able to determine the type and cause of the cataract by careful observation with the ophthalmoscope, but sometimes the cause remains unknown.

There are more cataracts found in Egypt than any other part of the world. More cataracts are found in the Southwestern (the sunbelt) than in the Northeastern part of the United States. It is known that excessive amounts of ultraviolet light can cause the formation of cataracts. For this reason, good quality sunglasses are recommended to farmers, ranchers, carpenters and any others who must be outdoors for prolonged periods. Because there are many other causes of cataracts, wearing sunglasses will not guarantee that a person will not develop cataracts but it IS a good preventive measure to take if you are outdoors a lot of the time.

Careful determination of the location and type of opacity is useful in diagnosing the cause of the cataract and in estimating its rate of progression. A cataract is usually considered immature if enough transparency remains in the lens that your optometrist can help you obtain usable vision, better than 30/50 or 20/60, by changing your eyeglass prescription. If a patient's vision is worse than 20/50 or 20/60 with the proper prescription, then they are advised that surgical removal of the cataract may be necessary in order to restore usable vision. Your optometrist will advise you when it is time to make this decision and will refer you to a surgeon for a second opinion.
