Code Label Collection Underway

LARRY COMBEST, congressman-elect, was in Parmer County recently on a post-election, get-acquainted tour.

One of the newly-elected congressman's main objectives as a new member of congress is to secure a seat on the House of Representative's Agriculture Committee, which is chaired by a Texan, Kika de la Garza.

During the campaign, during which Combest and Don Richards locked horns, agriculture was a main issue.

A seat on the House Agriculture Committee will be of major importance to our area, since House members will be drafting a new farm program during the 1985 session of congress.

Combest made a trade with newly-elected Republican Beau Boulter of Amarillo. Boulter agreed not to seek a seat on the Agriculture Committee, and will instead aim for the House Science and Technology Committee, the body in the House of Representatives that has jurisdiction over the Pantex nuclear plant near Amarillo.

Under the current set-up, both the Agriculture and Science and Technology committees have 41 seats, 15 of which belong to Republicans. The numbers may change if committee ratios are changed next year. There is a possibility that Republicans could gain a couple of seats on each of these committees, and this would help Combest and Boulter in their efforts to become members of the committees on which they hope to serve.

Combest has made some headway in hiring a staff for his Washington office, which will be established soon after the first of the year. Elvin Caraway, who has been an aide to Senator John Tower, has been named Combest's administrative assistant.

Trudy Lewis, who accompanied Larry and Sharon Combest during their recent stops in Parmer County, will become the congressman's press secretary.

Students in Friona are currently conducting a collection drive that can earn their buildings a free IBM PCjr Computer System. As part of a program called COMPUTERRIFIC, IBM and Procter & Gamble are offering free computers to schools in exchange for UPC product code labels from Procter & Gamble participating brands. The UPC code label is the bar code label which appears on the package.

"We hope to collect 22,500 product code labels before the drive ends on February 28, 1985. That's how many we'll need to receive three computers," said Cheryl Weatherly, coordinator of the drive.

UPC Code Symbols from Bounty paper towels, Citrus Hill orange juice, Coast deodorant soap, Crest toothpaste, Crush carbonated beverage, Encaprin pain reliever, Luvs diapers, Prell shampoo, Pert shampoo, Sure deodorant, Scope mouthwash, Jif peanut butter, Puffs tissues and Tide laundry detergent are being collected.

"We know we have many friends in the community who will want to help our school," said Mrs. Weatherly. "They can do so by saving the UPC Codes from these popular household products and giving them to our students; dropping them in collection boxes at Bi-Wize Health Mart, D.L.'s Thriftway, and White's Supermarket; or bringing them to one of our school's libraries.

Jim Shelton Joins Claborn Floral

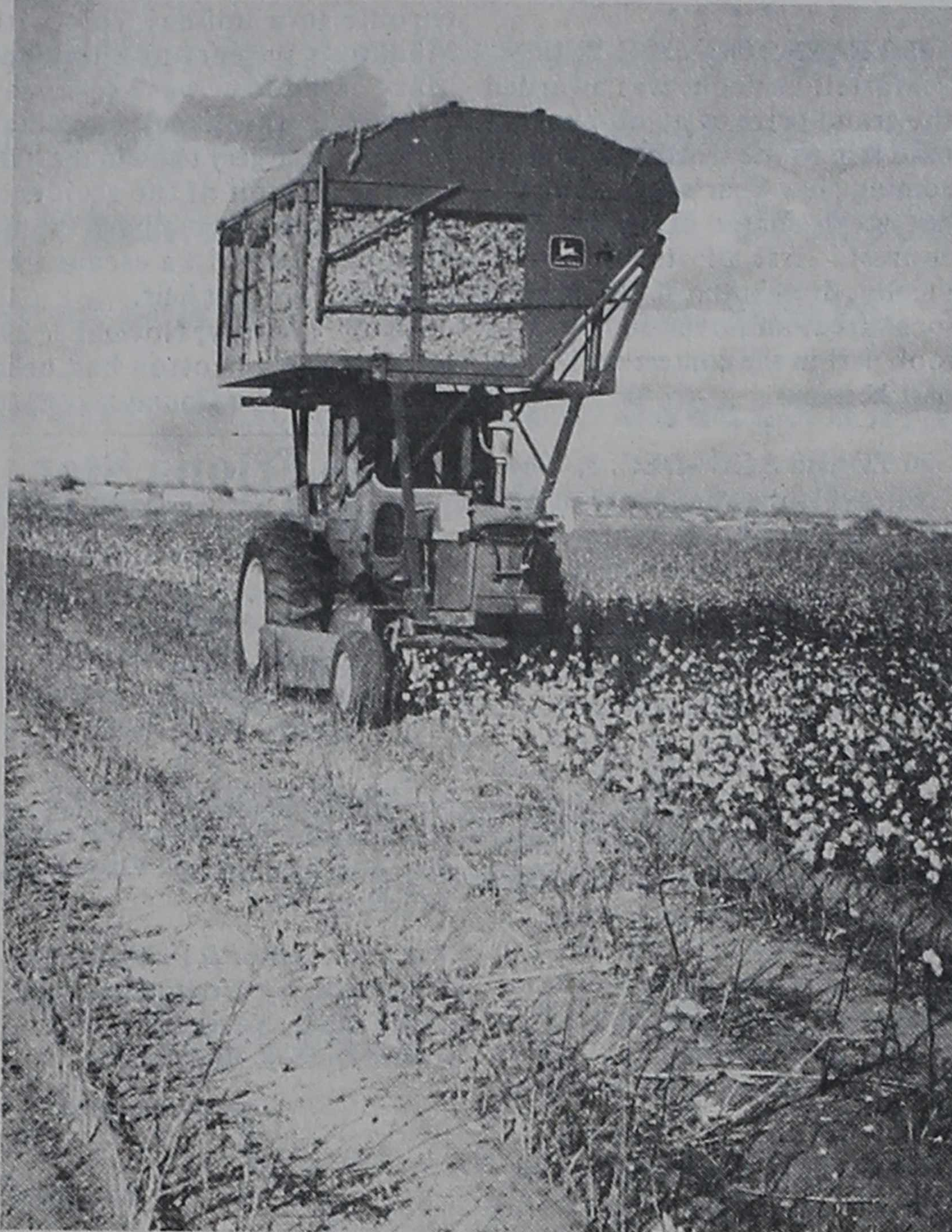
Jim Shelton is now associated with Claborn Floral, having joined the working staff this summer as office manager and part owner of the business.

Signup Underway For Xmas Project

Signup period for the 1984 "Project Christmas Card" is now underway, and continues through December 14, it was announced this week by Mary Moseley, chairman of Modern Study Club's annual event.

Project Christmas Card is being sponsored by the club, in conjunction with the Friona Star, for the 29th consecutive year.

Proceeds from the project will go to benefit Parmer County Community Hospital. Since its inception, Project Christmas Card has raised over \$60,250 for new hospital equipment. This is in addition to approximately \$7,000 worth of advertising space which has been donated to the club's project by the Friona Star through these 29 years.

Mrs. Moseley says that money raised this year will go to help pay for the recent re-paving of the hospital's parking lot; as well as purchasing new office furniture to equip a new doctor's office, and also to pay for a new accounting machine for the hospital.

The paving job was done

recently at a cost of around \$5,000, paid from the hospital's general fund.

Residents of the area are requested each year by Modern Study Club to donate to the fund rather than mailing Christmas Cards to local friends.

Names of those contributing are published on a full-page ad in the Christmas edition of the Star as a community-wide greeting to everyone in the area, as well as those outside the area who receive the paper. The Star donates the page ad to the project each year.

Donations to Project Christmas Card may be made at Friona State Bank, as well as at a number of businesses in town, where containers have been placed. Donors are reminded to indicate exactly how they wish their names to appear in the "Greeting" list.

There is no set amount for the donations, but families are requested to donate at least the amount of money they would normally spend on Christmas

Tommy Moss Holds Lead In Contest

In spite of having what he thought was a "horrible week" on the high school and college games, Tommy Moss not only held onto the overall lead, but increased it by a couple of points, heading into the last weekend of the annual football contest, sponsored by the Friona Star.

Moss scored a 17 for the week--getting all eight of his professional game predictions to come through--and stands with a score of 200 going into the last weekend of the 13-week contest.

Kent Patterson held onto second place, although he trails Moss by three points going into the last week. Patterson's overall score is 197, after posting a score of 15 last week.

R.L. Blakely, Bruce Patterson and Rick Tullis are tied for third place at 196, still very much in contention, and Mike Field of Dalhart is in fourth place, six points behind the leader with a score of 194. Field's standing dropped somewhat after a score of 14 in last week's contest.

Scores of all the leading contestants can be found elsewhere in this issue.

Winner of the twelfth week's contest was Donnie McDonald of Lazbuddie, one of two contestants to correctly pick 18 for the week. Todd Widler of 1512 West Fifth Street was the other contestant to post the highest score, but McDonald captured the week's top prize on the basis of the tie-breaker score, hitting the Miami-New York Jets' Monday night game score right on the money, 28-17.

Widler missed the score by just 14 points, but when someone nails the score exactly, it's hard to beat.

Nikki Osborn, Friona's 1984 Maize Queen, will be on hand to perform, along with the Trebelaires. Canna Ray, Friona's Little Miss, will serve as Santa's helper.

Friona merchants have been registering their customers for door prizes this past week, and will continue to do so until December 3. Names will be drawn from these individual merchants at the tree ceremony. Winners must be present at the park to win their prizes.

Several businesses plan to be open following the tree lighting event, for open houses and Christmas specials. Santa Claus will also be at "Santa Land," at 620 Main Street, across from the Chamber office.

This year, in addition to the tree lighting, the Women's Division is also sponsoring a gift-wrapping booth at Ann Gee's Cafe.

"Be watching for stores to be open on Thursday nights until Christmas," said a spokesman for the group.

Court Awards Bid For New Pickup

Awarding of a bid for a new pickup for the County Agent was on the agenda of the Parmer County Commissioners' Court, at the court's meeting on November 13.

Three bids had been received for the new vehicle, from Friona Ford Sales and Reeve Chevrolet-Olds of Friona and Hagelgantz Ford of Clovis, N.M.

Motion was passed to accept the bid from Reeve Chevrolet-Olds for a trade difference of \$4,877.99.

Motion was passed to allow the Friona State Bank to substitute securities.

Dr. Paul Spring of Friona was re-appointed as the County Health Officer.

A motion was passed unanimously to allow the Friona Chamber of Commerce and the City of Friona to move at their expense the old Santa Fe depot to the City Park in Friona.

Approval was given of bills for foster children care, in the amount of \$301.00, which amount will be reimbursed by the state.

Motion was passed to pay the county's 1985 dues to the Texas Association of Counties, in the amount of \$820.00.

A discussion was held concerning the distribution of free cheese in Parmer County. Due to problems incurred in the past dealing with the distribution, it was decided to look into the matter further before taking action.

Sheriff Bill Morgan was given authority to get estimates for repairing restrooms in the courthouse, as well as for the repair or replacement of the county's emergency generator.

After some discussion, motion was passed to leave the regulation banning all ester formulas of 2,4-D from being used between the dates of April 15 and October 1.

Pheasant Season Kicks Off Dec. 8

The 1984 pheasant season will kick off next Saturday morning, December 8.

For the first time since pheasant hunting began in the local area, the bag limit has been increased, and hunting officials say the increase couldn't have come at a worse possible time.

For the 1984 season, the bag limit will be three cocks per day and six in possession. Only the cock pheasants are legal game.

Jack Patterson, spokesman for the pheasant season, says the crop

this year is the shortest in a number of years. "We just barely have any pheasants out our way. I wish the state officials had checked the hatch situation a little more closely before they increased the limit," Patterson said.

A large influx of hunters is expected for the opening weekend of the season next weekend. The number coming in may be less than usual, due to the reports of the tougher hunting prospects, along with the rumor that has been making the rounds that the season might be cancelled.

55 YEARS AGO--DEC. 6, 1929

Mr. Roden has sold a half-interest in his present drug store to his brother Ralph Roden, who will have charge of it after the new store is established.

50 YEARS AGO--DEC. 7, 1934
Friends of Mr. R.F. Fleet were considerably surprised to learn of the sale last Saturday of the grocery store and meat market operated here under his management for the past five years. L.M. Crow has purchased the business, and will be in complete charge tomorrow. Mr. Fleet expressed himself as having no definite plans for the immediate future.

45 YEARS AGO--DEC. 8, 1939

The football game here last Thursday to decide the District

championship between the Hereford Whitefaces and the Friona Chiefs had a hairbreadth ending, with Hereford winning, 14-13. Hereford scored first and added an extra point for a 7-0 lead. Friona followed soon with a touchdown, but missed the extra point, to trail at the half, 7-6. During the last half, the Chiefs scored a touchdown and an extra point, taking the lead, 13-7. The score was held at that point until two minutes before the end of the game, when their opponents rushed in for a touchdown and took the win, 14-13.

35 YEARS AGO--DEC. 2, 1949

30 YEARS AGO--DEC. 2, 1954
Gins in the Friona area are operating around the clock to accommodate cotton growers. A picture on the front page of the Star shows the gin yard at the Mills & Fleming Gin at Hub, where some 700 bales were waiting in trailers on the gin yard and along the highway. The gins of the area, including the North Plains Gin, L&H Gin and Mills & Fleming Gin have ginned a total of 12,510 bales

to date, with some 1500 still on trailers in the gin yards.

25 YEARS AGO--DEC. 3, 1959
Martell LeVeque was awarded the grand prize of an all-expense paid trip to the Cotton Bowl this coming New Year's following the last weekly contest in the Star. This contest, first of its kind held locally, drew interest all over the local area, and over 100 persons took part in the contest during the past 12 weeks.

20 YEARS AGO--DEC. 3, 1964
Sheryl Long, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wes Long, representing Friona High School FFA, was named "district sweetheart" in competition with 15 other girls in the Littlefield district on Monday. She will compete in the area contest next May.

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ABFP Recertifies Dr. Alexander

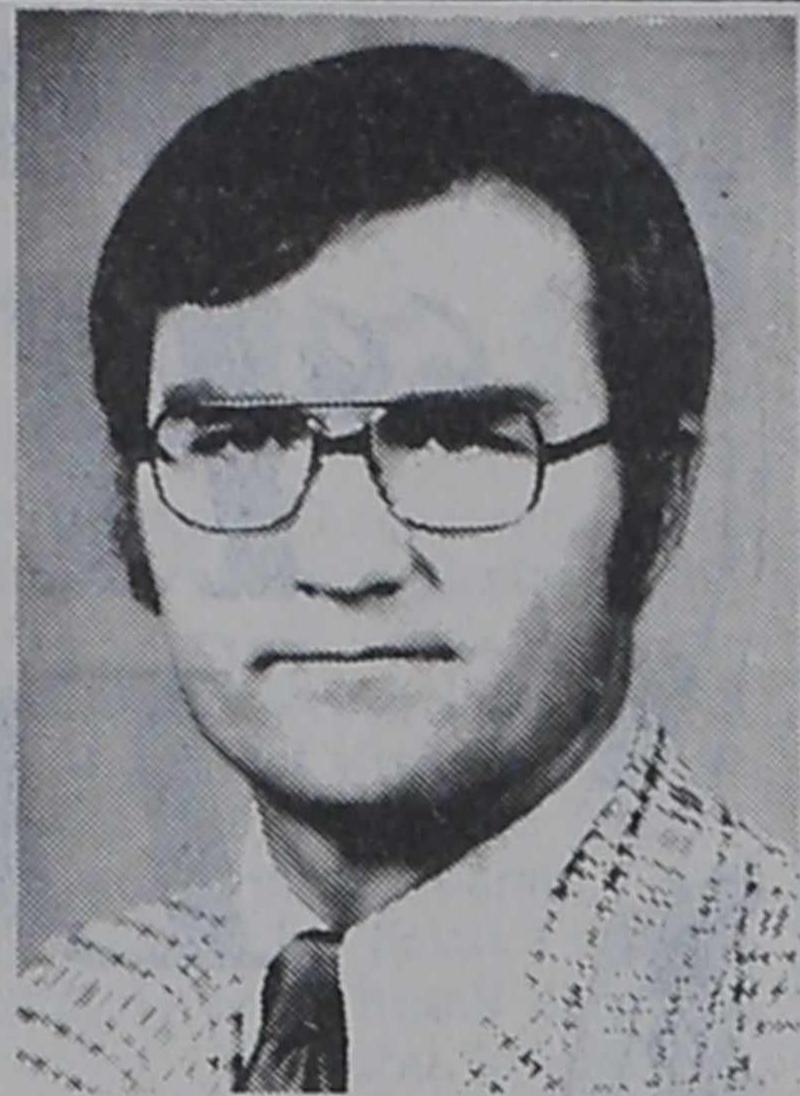
Dr. Robert J. Alexander of Friona has been recertified as a diplomate of the American Board of Family Practice (ABFP) as a result of passing a recertification examination offered by the ABFP. The physician thus maintains specialist status in the medical

specialty of family practice. ABFP diplomates must continue to show proof of competence in the field of comprehensive, continuing care of the family by being recertified every six years. Family practice was the first medical specialty to require diplomates to be recertified on a continuing basis.

The written examination is designed to prove the candidate's continuing competence in the basic components of family practice--internal medicine, surgery, obstetrics and gynecology, pediatrics, psychiatry and neurology, and community medicine.

To qualify for certification initially a physician must have successfully completed three years of residency training in family practice and passed an intensive certification examination. There are some 385 residency training programs in teaching hospitals and university medical centers across the United States.

There now have been certified more than 29,000 diplomates in the specialty. Most are members of the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy was the first national medical group to require members to take continuing study, and was chiefly responsible for securing specialty status for family practice.

The meeting closed with the club members repeating the "club collect" and a social hour was conducted with Donna Mears and Eva Miller serving refreshments to the seventeen members present.

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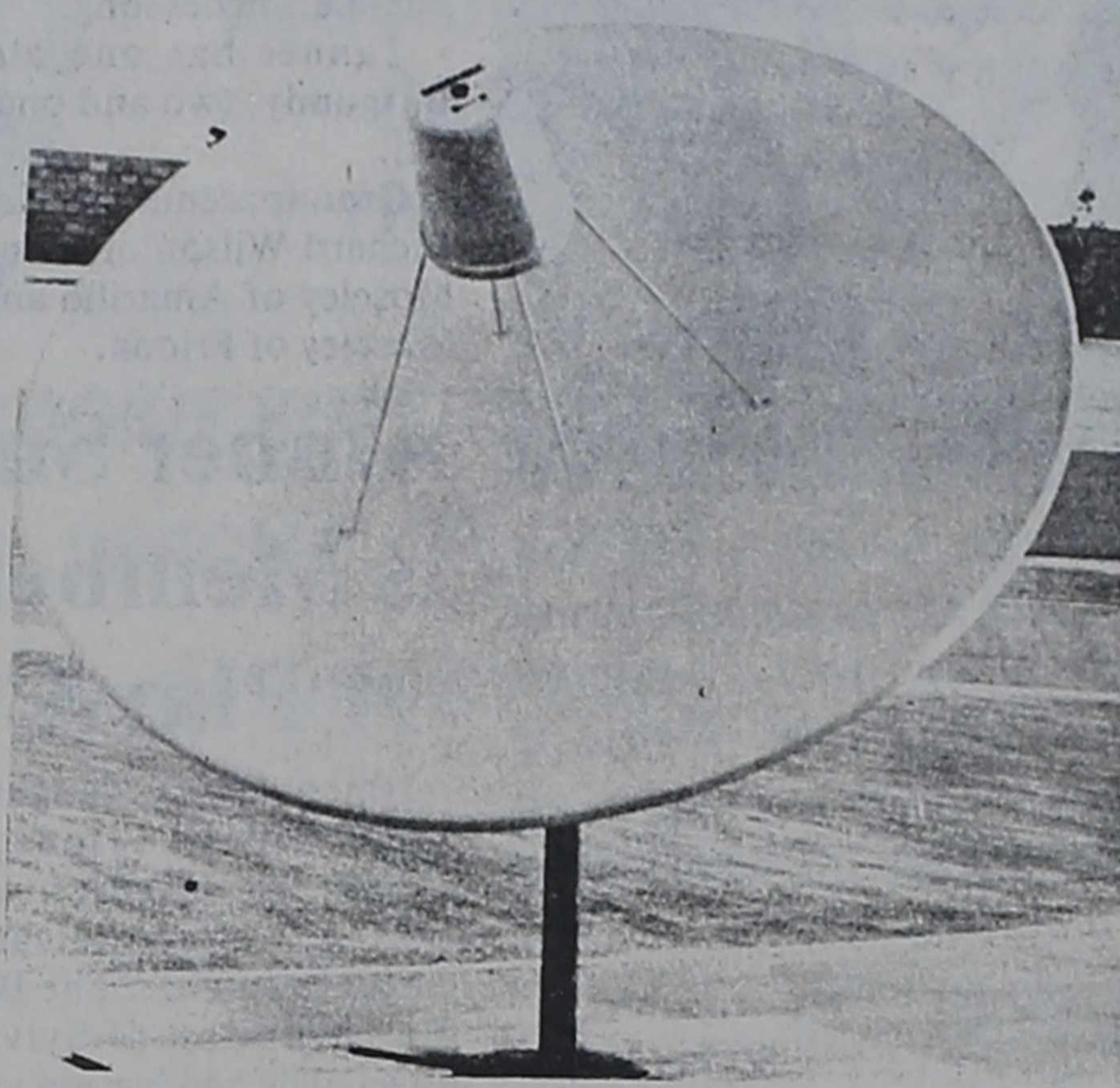
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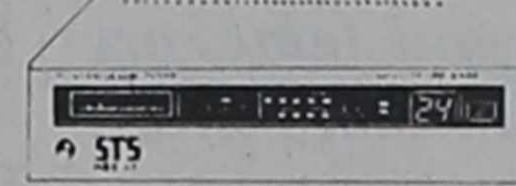

More than 50 representatives from government, agriculture, and social service organizations participated recently in an all-day tour of project sites that utilize workers from the Green Thumb senior employment program.

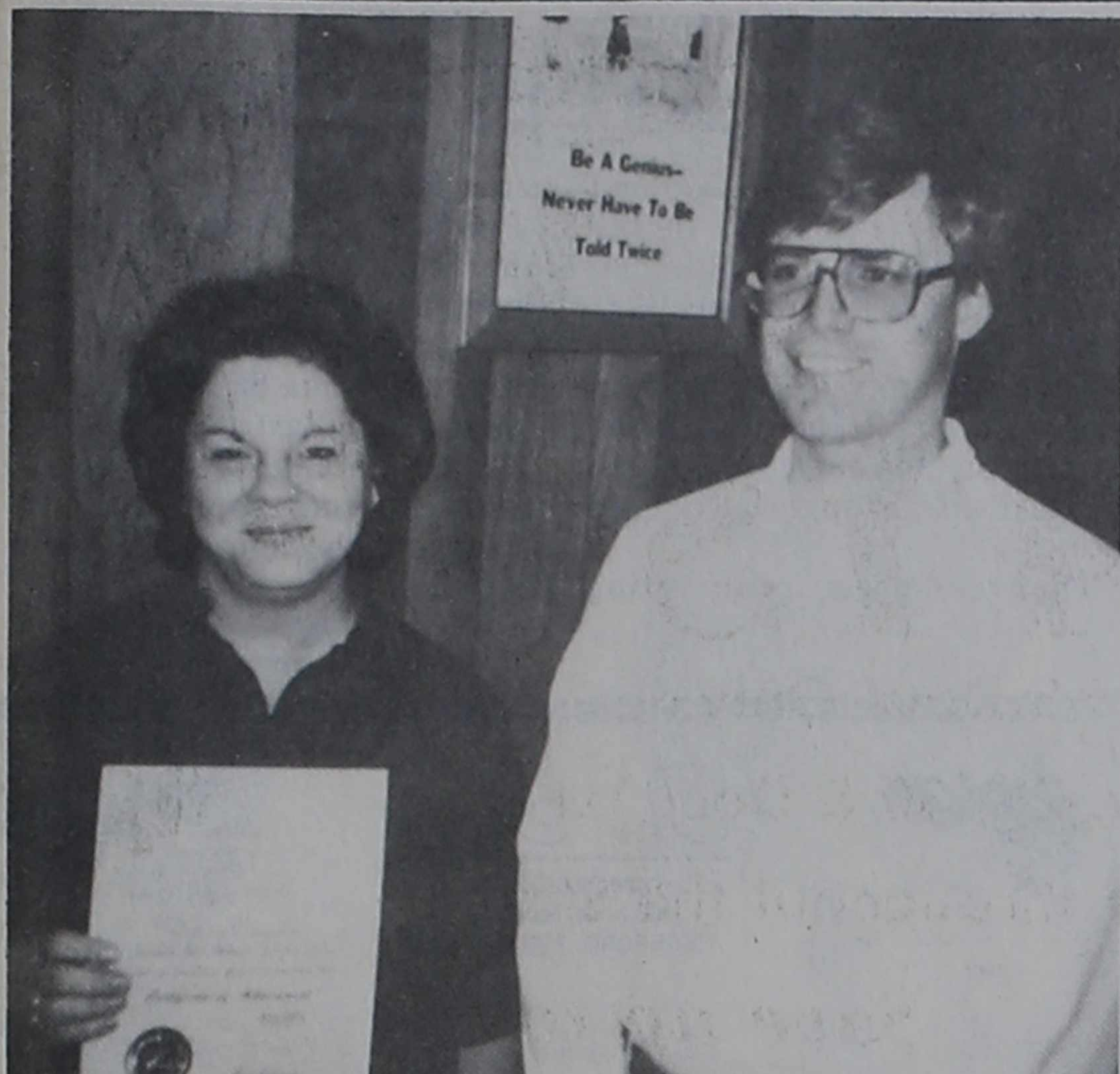

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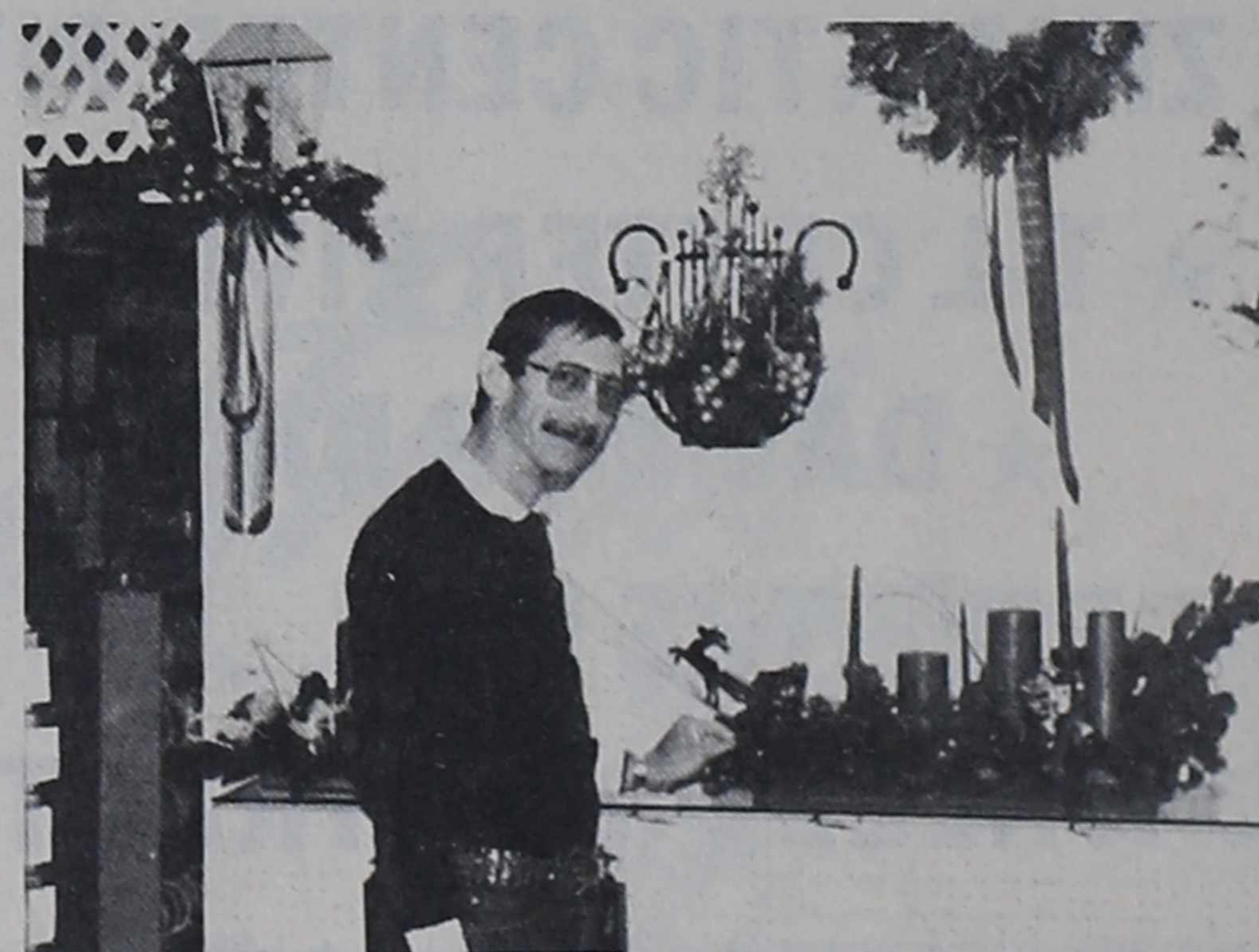
