Area Gets Snow, Low Readings

IF YOU'RE WONDERING what became of the Friona Invitational basketball tournament, which has been played this particular weekend for a good many years, perhaps an explanation is in order.

FHS Athletic Director Tommy Moss explains that it had been hard the past few years, under fairly normal conditions, to fill the slate of teams, and with all the tightening of regulations, the local tournament had to be dropped this year.

Since you can no longer miss school for athletics or other activities, basketball tournaments are one of the activities which are vitally affected. Previously, tournament games were played on Thursday and Friday mornings, or early afternoons.

This weekend, though, they are using two different gymnasiums at Sudan, with the first games starting at 4:30 p.m. Basketball tournaments never show a profit, and now you have to have two sets of officials, two snack bars--it's quite a headache.

"We've thought about trying to get together with Bovina, and if one of us could hold a boys tournament, the other could have the girls teams from the same school, and not have to double up so much. We're close enough that fans from visiting schools could drive back and forth, if need be. It's just an idea. But we're definitely working to get a local tournament back on the schedule next year," Moss said.

SOMETIMES WE THINK we are overburdened with rules and regulations, but the fact of the matter is that rules have been around for a long time, and they probably are here to stay.

Millionaire Game Expected Shortly

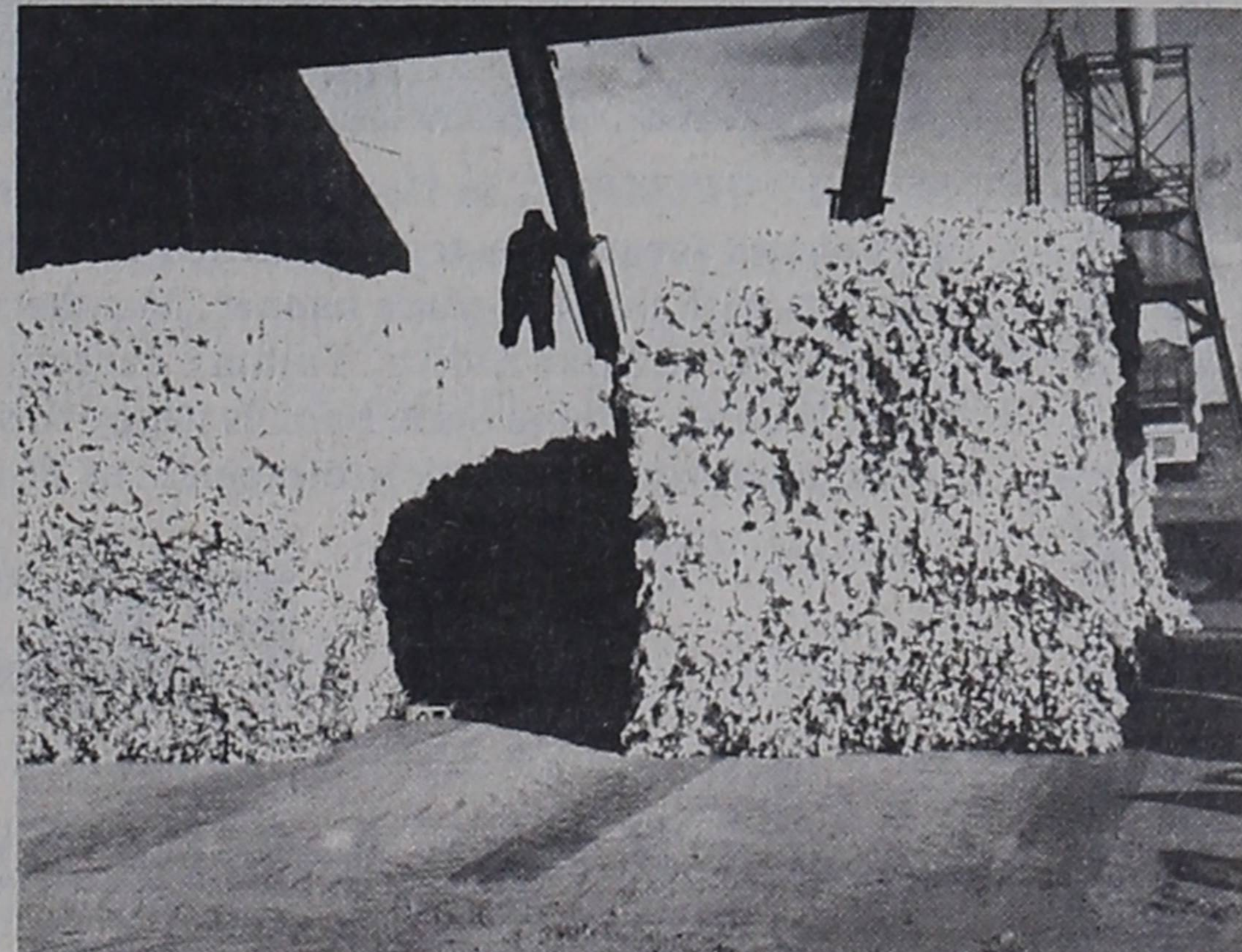
The Millionaire is coming to Friona! Word was received this week at the Chamber Office that the Millionaire Game is scheduled to arrive in Friona the week of December 10.

Game boards, featuring local businesses, will become available to the public just as soon as they are processed and distributed to the sponsoring merchants.

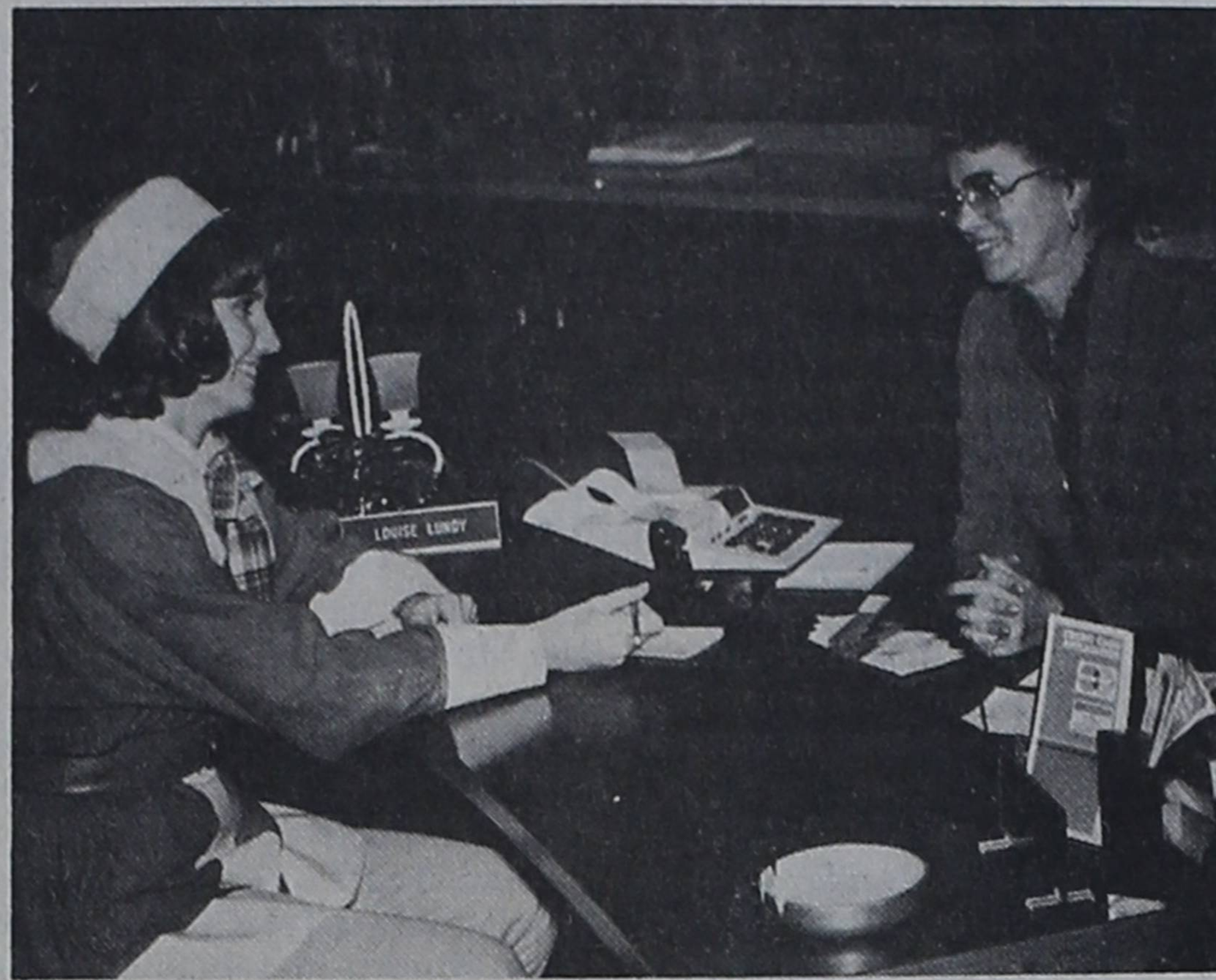
The game is very similar to Monopoly with players beginning with \$300,000 "cash." With the throw of the die, players move around the board landing on various local businesses and purchasing them if they so desire. The purchased businesses may be expanded by adding small, round, plastic chips that are the same color as the player's playing piece.

When an opponent lands on your properties, he must pay you a "trespassing fee" if you will. The more expansions the business makes, the more the trespassing fee. The four corners of the board are reserved for the professions of medicine, law, media and banking. When a player lands on one of these corners, he must draw a card from that stack and follow the directions...."bankruptcy" for example.

The first player to attain \$1 million in assets is the winner...unlike Monopoly in which the game can go on for hours and hours until someone finally wipes out everyone else.

Proposed Merger Discussed By FI

A proposed \$40 million merger between Friona Industries Inc. and the Houston-based Eller Enterprises is "not supposed to" result in the loss of any jobs,

Friona Industries financial vice president Charles Hughes said Thursday.

"This deal is not locked up. It's all subject to approval by the board of directors and our stockholders," Hughes said.

FI has been listed on the American Stock Exchange since 1978.

Should Eller acquire majority shares in FI, "it likely will be delisted," said Eller representative Tom Easley.

Hughes said it was his understanding that Eller Enterprises wants, if the merger is approved, "everything (at FI) to continue on as it has...they very much want the current management to continue."

A total of 700 people are employed by FI in the Texas Panhandle, Columbus, Ohio, and Atlanta, Georgia, Hughes said.

"We have no firm agreement," Easley said. "Should an agreement be reached, it would be our intent to have Friona operate as it always has."

FI is engaged in meat processing and distribution; manufacture and sale of commercial cattle feeds; retail marketing of animal health supplies; custom feeding of customer-owned cattle; purchase, fattening and sale of cattle owned by the company; operation of grain facilities; and transportation of grain and feed.

FI has three operating feed yards; Friona Feedyard and Peco in Friona, and Swisher County Feedyards near Tulia.

Eller Enterprises is involved in agricultural activities, also, Easley said, adding that it is interested in FI because "we feel it's an excellent company."

David Eller of Houston owns Eller Enterprises. He also owns Granada Land and Cattle Co. His firm is involved in breeding, feeding and embryo transfer of cattle.

Richard L. Falter, a director of FI, and his brother, John C. Falter, granted Eller an option to purchase their shares of Friona common stock for \$17.25 cash per share. The Falters own a total of 487,725 shares--22 percent of FI's outstanding common stock.

Because of the potential of securing such a large share of the company, Eller had to announce merger negotiations, Hughes said.

Eller is waiting for Friona's stockholders to take the lead, Easley said.

Friona closed Wednesday on the stock exchange at 161/8, down 1/8.

Pheasant Limit Is Rolled Back

After considering remarks from area hunters and landowners at a public hearing Monday in Amarillo, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission voted Wednesday to lower the bag limit from three to two pheasant per day during the hunting season that starts Saturday.

The 5-1 vote also means the "in-possession" limit is reduced from six to four. Only cocks can be hunted during the 16-day season.

While some have complained that word of the change may not reach all hunters by Saturday, local Game Warden Chuck Cosper said the limit will be enforced nonetheless. "Anyone caught with more than two birds will be filed on," he said Wednesday just after the decision was announced.

The action was based primarily on the fact that the pheasant population in the Panhandle is down as much as 48 per cent this year. The Commission has not been able to give a definite reason why the census is low, but said heavy hunting of cocks does not seem to contribute to the decline.

Tommy Moss Wins Football Contest

Tommy Moss, head football coach and athletic director at Friona High School, reigns as the "champeen" football game predictor in the Friona Star's annual contest for 1984.

Moss withstood the challenge of numerous contestants during the last couple of weeks of the event, to post the win.

He scored 16 correct during the final week of the contest, the same score as his nearest competitor, Kent Patterson, to win the grand prize by three points, 216 points to 213 for Patterson.

Mike Field of Dalhart, and Rick Tullis tied for third place with scores of 211. R.L. Blakely of Hereford and Bruce Patterson were next at 211.

Moss went into the final week's event with a three-point lead over Kent Patterson, who was facing the need to pick the right upsets. Moss and Patterson differed on eight of their picks, and they wound up splitting even on the eight games.

Moss won out on SMU-Las Vegas; Iowa-Hawaii; Buffalo-Indianapolis; and Cincinnati-Cleveland. Patterson showed gains on Panhandle-White Deer; Alabama-Auburn; St. Louis-New England, and L.A. Raiders-Miami.

Moss receives a cash prize of \$100 for his efforts, along with bragging rights for the next year. He becomes the first head coach at FHS to ever claim the contest championship.

Ironically, Moss never was a weekly winner, although he did finish in the top three. The secret, he discovered, was in posting a steady score throughout the 13-week event.

Winner of the final weekly contest was Jerry Bentley, who repeated his showing of a couple of weeks earlier. Bentley and Mike Field of Dumas, were the only contestants entering the final week's event to post a score of 18.

Bentley took first place on the Seattle-Detroit tie-breaker score, (Continued on Page 9)

55 YEARS AGO--DEC. 13, 1929

Beginning last week the post office at Friona receives and dispatches mail four times daily. The regular morning west bound mail and the noon east bound mail will remain as they have been for several years, but instead of these constituting the only mails received and dispatched, there will be an out-going mail in the evening, at six o'clock, and be received by the west bound train that passes here at night, and carried as far as Clovis, where it will be sorted and all east bound mail will be transferred to the east bound train and forwarded to its destination.

McCarty, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department in Lubbock, Texas, has stated that the following State highways and roads in his area are scheduled for work under this program: Seal coat on U.S. 60 from Farwell to Castro County line, a distance of 27.0 miles; Seal coat on FM 690 from U.S. 84 to 0.5 mile East of FM 299, a distance of 16.7 miles; Seal coat on U.S. 84, from New Mexico State line to Bailey County line, a distance of 10.7 miles.

The Friona High School Forensics team competed in the Amarillo High School Speech Tournament December 1, with some gratifying results.

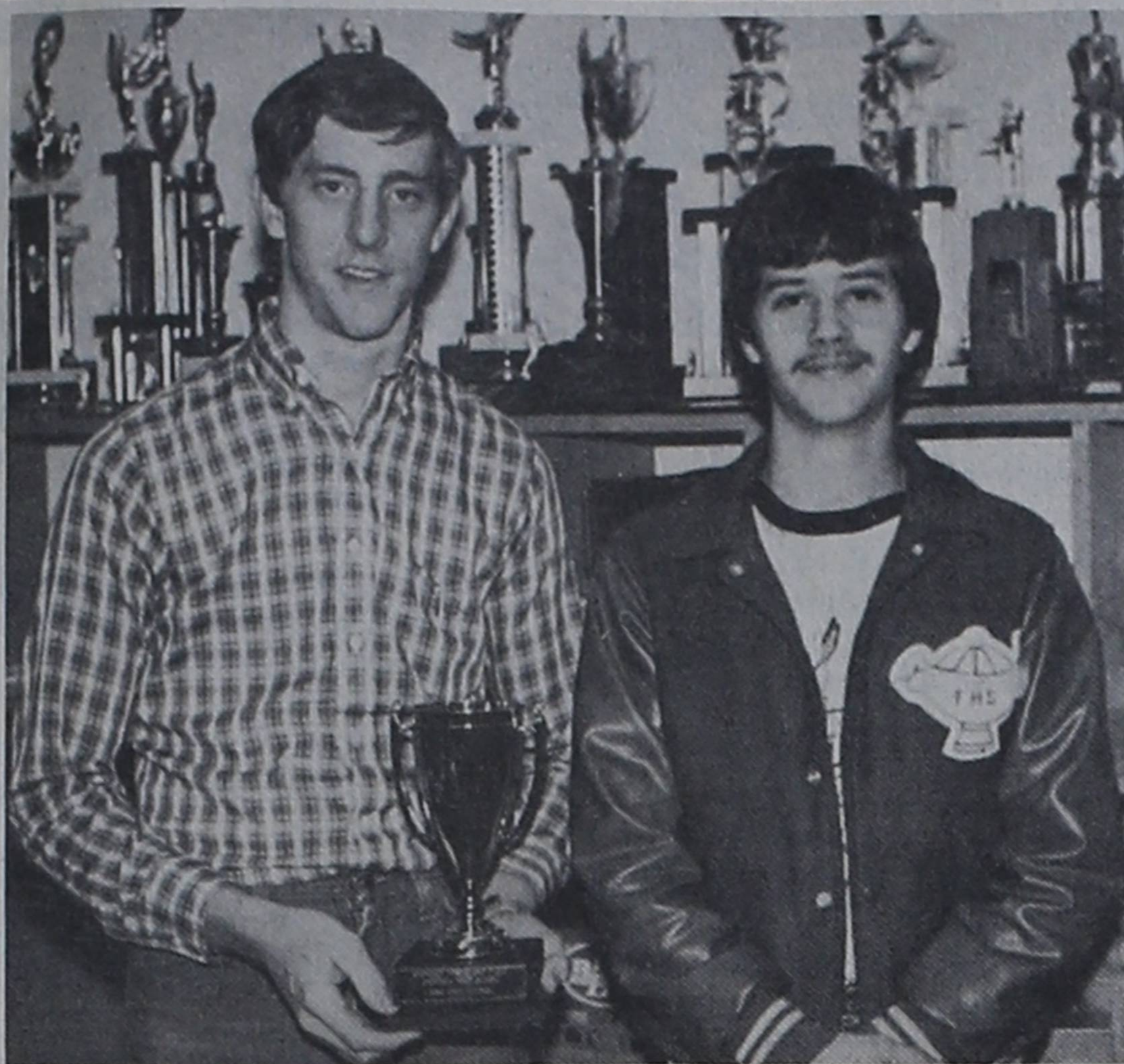
Brent Hinkle and David Small placed first in debate, for the best showing by the Friona youngsters.

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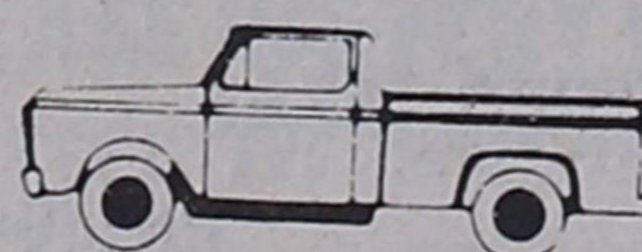

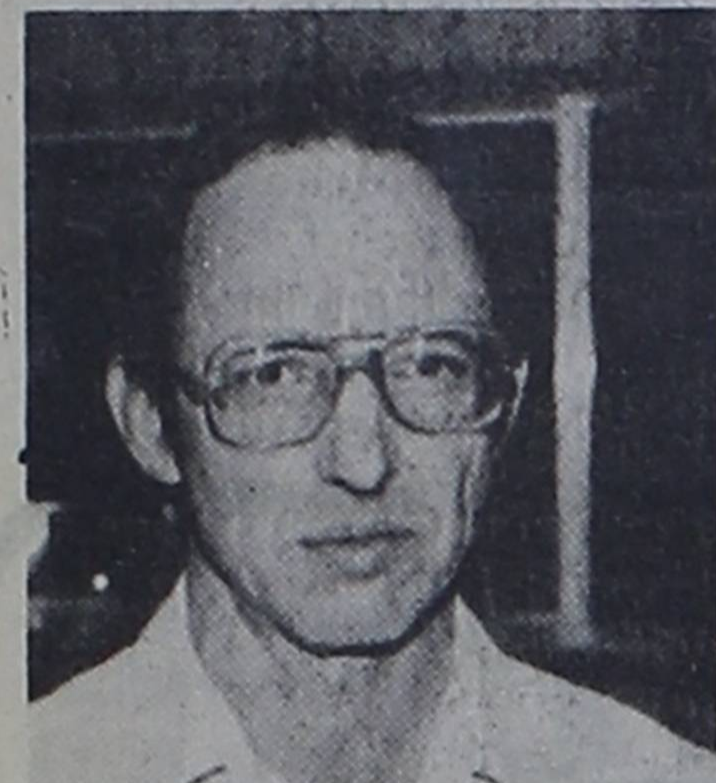

WANT ADS WORK WONDERS

SATELLITE SIGNALS

From JOE WILHELM



About two months ago a gentleman came into our store and asked if we rented video tapes overnight. I told him we did then we started talking about the number of premium quality shows that he could get on satellite every day, and how he could start his own private library of titles if he had a dish. The idea intrigued him as it did me when I first got interested in satellite television.

It is very easy to record movies, sports, specials, or anything else from satellite and it is also perfectly legal. That is, it is legal as long as you use it for your own personal enjoyment with no intent of reselling or re-transmitting the programming for profit.

Recording from satellite is as much a hobby for many of us as it is a great source of media entertainment. On a typical evening, I set my dish on SATCOM 3 and record STAR WARS or some other first run movie. Then I swing my dish around to COMSTAR where a Monday night football game is being aired. After that, I would breeze past SATCOM 4, the Playboy Channel--whoops; turn the recorder off! Then I'd go to WESTAR 4 and capture a recording of Jacques Cousteau on PBS. He was looking for tuna or something at the bottom of the Indian Ocean. Next, I'd go to GALAXY to tape part of a heated debate live from the House of Representatives. Just then, the Marx Brothers' all-time classic movie, ANIMAL CRACKERS was starting so I recorded it in its entirety and have since played it back somewhere around 400 times or so.

The consensus is, recording your own shows from satellite is fun and can save you money on rentals and movie tickets. The selection is never depleted and the quality of your recordings should be as good as factory-pressed tapes.

By the way, the gentleman who was intrigued in the beginning bought his own satellite system the next day and says he has recorded over 40 good movies and a couple of concerts in his first two months. If you plan to tape from your dish, here are a few tips which will save you from the trauma of disastrous recordings:

1. Find out from a reputable satellite dealer which receivers tend to "drift" off frequency. You definitely want one that is stable in order to get the finest reception and the best recordings.
2. Choose a large enough antenna size to ensure sparkle-free reception for this part of the country. Generally, you are safe with a ten foot dish except in remote regions of the U.S., Canada and Mexico.
3. Be sure to get a dish with a very sturdy mount, one that will not blow off satellite in the wind. There is a world of differences between the workmanship that goes into antennas. Look around and compare the quality of systems and then make your choice.

J. Hull Is Member Of Task Force

The National Food and Energy Council has appointed James Hull, president and general manager of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, to a task force composed of twelve members from utilities located throughout the United States.

The purpose of the task force is to promote prudent use of electricity on the farm. This will include reducing system demand peaks, encouraging off peak electrical sales, increasing electrical efficiency, encouraging rural development, and enlisting the support of farm equipment manufacturers into this program.

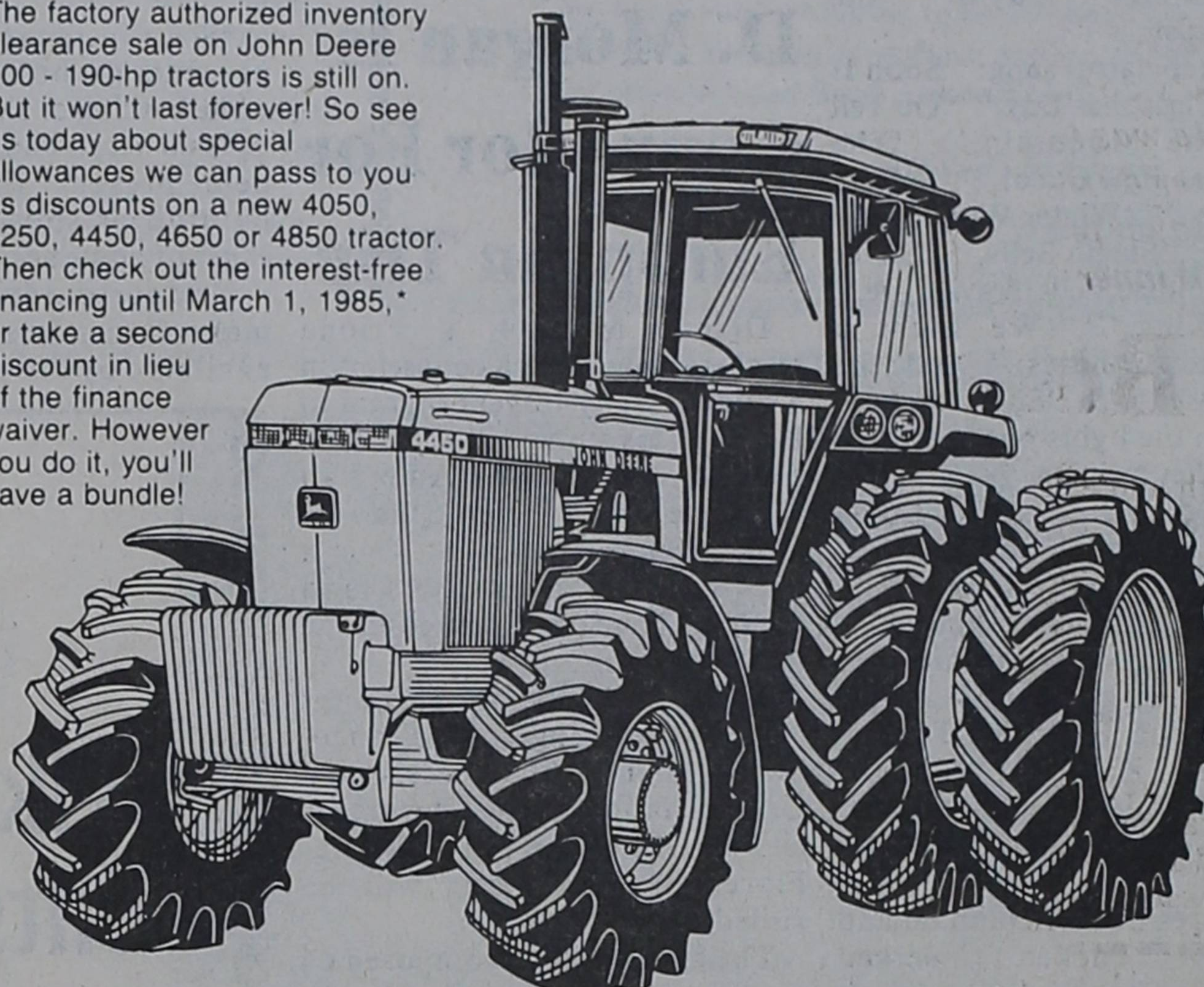
Hull's appointment to the task force was based in part on the fact that sixty-four per cent of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative's power is sold for irrigation use. This 135,000 horsepower irrigation load induces a high summer demand peak with a corresponding low annual load factor. The latest survey indicates that power suppliers of this area account for about twenty per cent of all irrigation load in the United States. Obviously, the need for selective marketing will be explored, not only for Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, but also for all power suppliers with this common problem.

Hull has served on many national and state boards and committees during his sixteen year tenure with Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative. These include past president of the Board of Directors of Texas Electric Cooperatives, chairman of the Texas A&M Job Safety and Training Committee, vice-chairman of the National Rural Electric Cooperatives Association Resolutions Committee, Texas Electric Cooperatives Co-op Power Committee and is currently the president of the newly formed Golden Spread Electric Cooperative.

"Bathroom Safety Gifts For Elders"

Bathroom accessories are excellent Christmas gifts for aging parents and grandparents. Besides being convenience presents, they are also safety investments.

Some bathroom changes may require professional installation, but many safety aids are inexpensive and readily available in hardware and variety stores. Here are some possibilities:

*Soap attached to a string prevents grabbing for wet soap while bathing or showering.

*Tub decals and rubber tub mats help prevent slipping in the bathtub or shower, a frequent cause of home accidents.

*Indoor-outdoor carpet will make floors less slippery. It is available by the yard or squares

that are easy to install.

*Grab rails may be installed on the tub and in other locations to help maintain balance. Some are available in hardware and department stores, others may be ordered by catalog.

Changes and additions to plumbing equipment also add to safety and convenience. A hand-held sprayer attached to the tub faucet makes bathing easier. A kitchen-type spray attachment for the sink will make it easier to clean. Lever-handled faucets may be easier to use than knobs.

Lighting can usually be improved to make it brighter and more evenly diffused. The addition of fluorescent lighting may be helpful. The use of a small, soft night light is an economical way to prevent groping for the switch in the dark.

Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

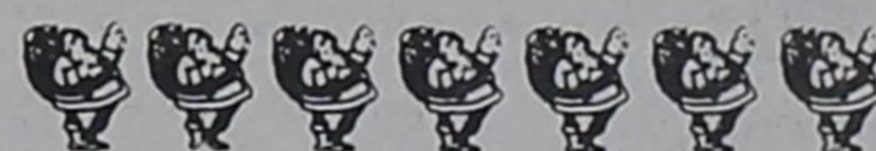

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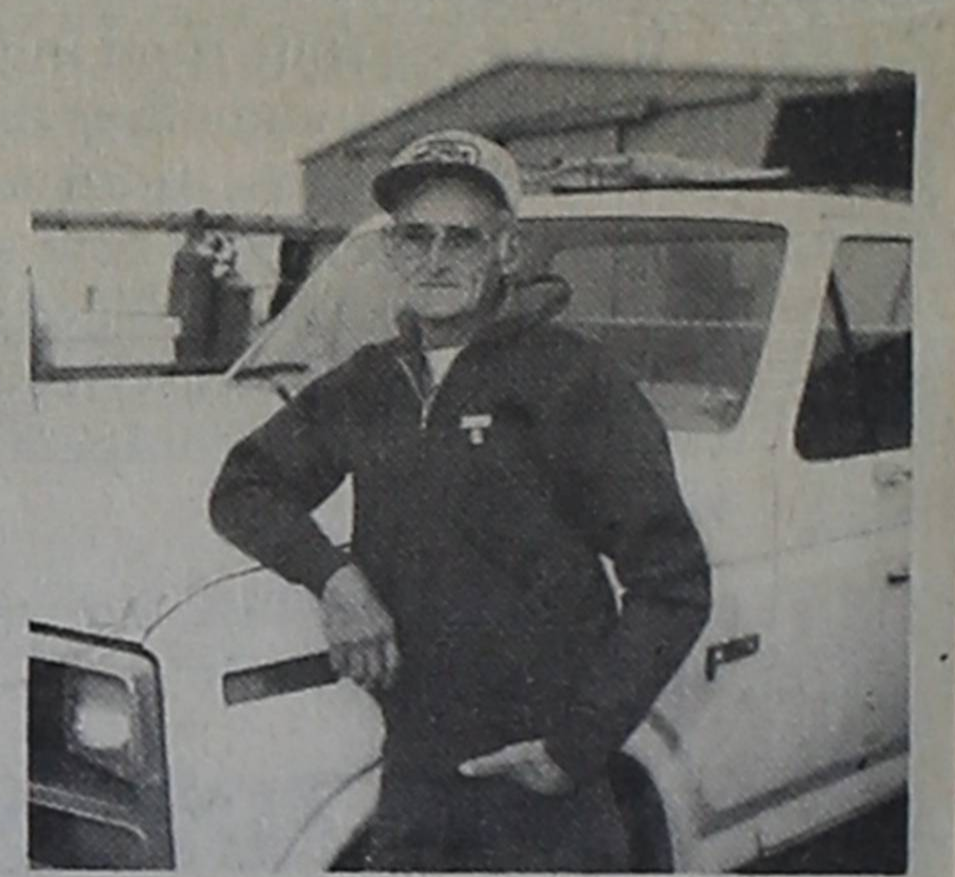

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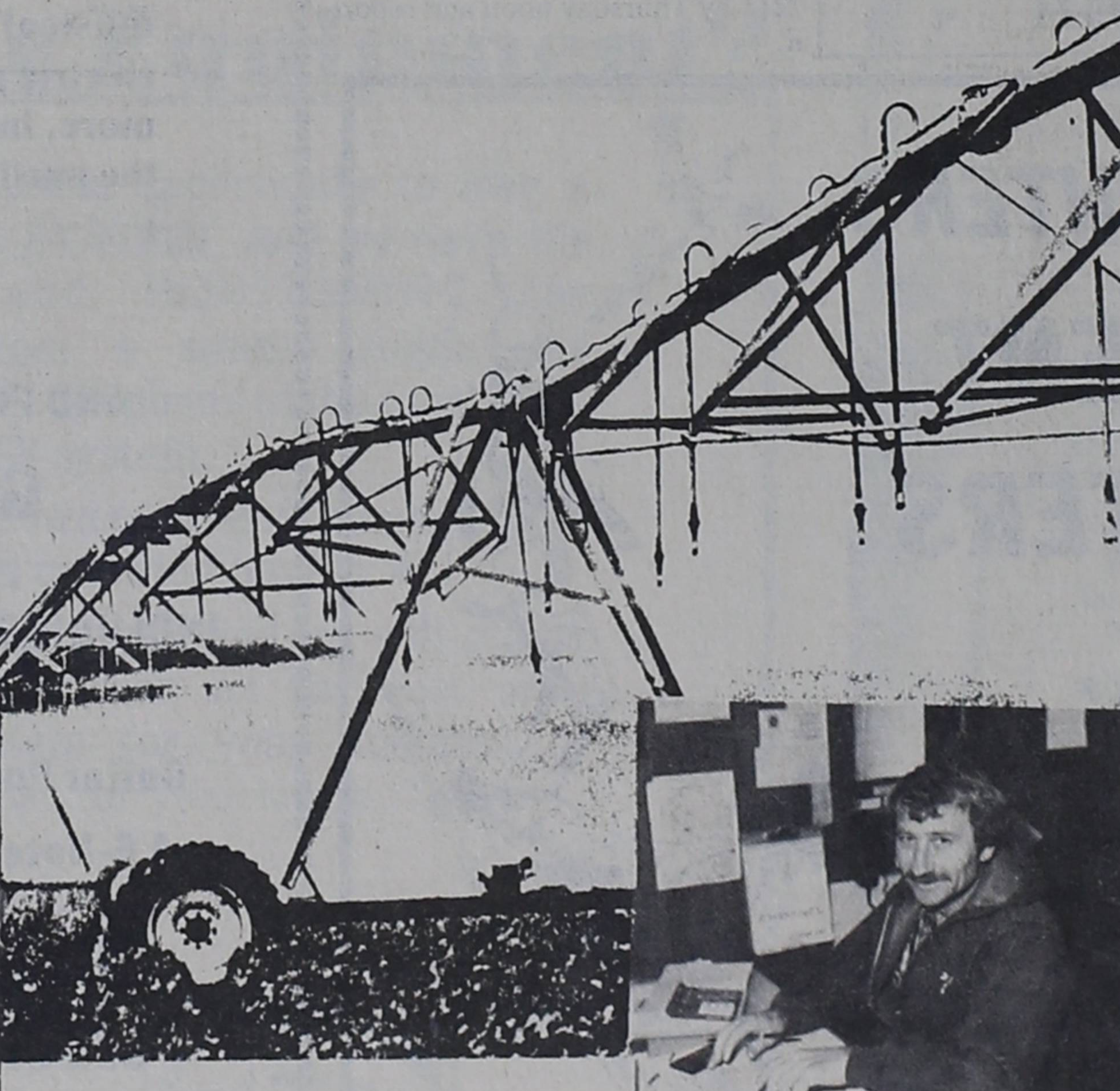
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
