IN THE MIDST of the campaign hoopla, name-calling accusations and counter-accusations, there's an important item on the November 6 ballot that's not causing any waves, but should be.

We're referring to the constitutional amendment, Proposition 2, which is designed to aid all of the colleges in Texas, and that means a plus for our own West Texas State University.

Until 1980, Texas had three ways of financing construction of its 34 public senior colleges. Five colleges, with the University of Texas and Texas A&M University system, were permitted to use the proceeds from an endowment called the Permanent University Fund (PUF). The constitution allowed 17 schools to use revenue from a state property tax. The remaining 12 colleges, which included some of the newer UT and A&M system schools, relied on biennial appropriations of general revenue.

But since that time, changes in the state assessment practices providing for the property tax revenue have undergone change and as a result, the non-PUF colleges are now only eligible for legislative appropriations.

Proposition 2 calls for restructuring of the PUF, and would create a Higher Education Fund to finance construction for Texas' 26 public colleges and universities that do not share in the PUF.

Schueler Elected By SWCD

Raymond Schueler of the Rhea Community was recently re-elected to the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors, Tuesday, October 2. Schueler represents Zone 1 of the district.

The purpose of the Parmer County SWCD, with headquarters in Friona, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farms and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.



CATARACTS--Intraocular Implants

After removing cataracts using one of the modern methods described in a previous article, most surgeons are replacing it with an intraocular lens implant. The implant is a high power replacement lens for the cataractous lens made out of a high quality plastic. Most designs now in use are placed in almost the exact place the original lens was located. Vision immediately after surgery is very good and improves steadily as the eye heals. By using the implant, having to use thick cataract glasses or contact lenses is avoided. Regular, thin, light-weight glasses are all that are needed to give normal vision to the postsurgical cataract patient.

The intraocular implant is the greatest improvement in the treatment of cataracts since the first cataract was'surgically extracted in 1748. Vision with the implant is more natural than the 30 per cent magnified vision and inconvenience obtained with contact lenses. Unfortunately, it is not possible to perform the implant technique on all cataract patients for a variety of eye health reasons. As surgical techniques improve, more and more patients are enjoying restored vision.






