IN THE MIDST of the campaign hoopla, name-calling accusations and counter-accusations, there's an important item on the November 6 ballot that's not causing any waves, but should be.

We're referring to the constitutional amendment, Proposition 2, which is designed to aid all of the colleges in Texas, and that means a plus for our own West Texas State University.

Until 1980, Texas had three ways of financing construction of its 34 public senior colleges. Five colleges, with the University of Texas and Texas A&M University system, were permitted to use the proceeds from an endowment called the Permanent University Fund (PUF). The constitution allowed 17 schools to use revenue from a state property tax. The remaining 12 colleges, which included some of the newer UT and A&M system schools, relied on biennial appropriations of general revenue.

But since that time, changes in the state assessment practices providing for the property tax revenue have undergone change and as a result, the non-PUF colleges are now only eligible for legislative appropriations.

Proposition 2 calls for restructuring of the PUF, and would create a Higher Education Fund to finance construction for Texas' 26 public colleges and universities that do not share in the PUF.

With no university dedicated funds for the non-PUF schools, these schools have been left with no source of funds to guarantee financing of new construction, building renovations and other capital improvements. Requests to the state legislature are the only means by which these schools, our school, can get funds for the building of laboratories and classrooms, hampering any attempts at long-range planning.

We recommend the passage of Proposition 2, which would create an annual \$100 million fund derived from general state revenues for all the state universities not included in the PUF fund. As has been pointed out by proponents, it doesn't necessarily mean an increase in taxes since general revenue is currently being used for such purposes. What it does offer a guarantee, making planning and budgeting operations more orderly for the schools involved.

Proposition 2 also would put all A&M and UT system schools under the PUF blanket to share in those proceeds, helping to relieve the strain on the state treasury.

Proposition 2 is not creating the headlines and hoopla of the candidate elections, but it certainly deserves the attention of voters November 6.

Absentee To Begin

Absentee voting begins Wednesday, October 17 at the County Clerk's office in Farwell, and continues through Friday, November 2.

Special absentee voting booths have been arranged for Friona, for the benefit of voters in that area.

Clerk's representatives will be at the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union on October 18, 25, 26 and November 1, during the Credit Union's regular hours, 9 a.m.-4 p.m.

Any registered voter may vote absentee if they think they might be out of the county for any reason on election day November 6.

A large turnout of voters is expected for the general election. County officials said there was a flurry of activity just prior to the deadline for registering, for those not holding valid registration forms.

Chiefs, Idalou Eye Vital District Game

All of the District 2-AAA games are important, but the Friona Chieftains' opponent for next Friday, the Idalou Wildcats, could be one of the team's biggest games of the season.

The Wildcats were rated pre-season as one of the teams with a good chance of making the class AAA playoffs. In their two district outings going into their battle against Muleshoe on Friday, Idalou had played two close games, holding a 13-6 win over Tulia, then falling to Littlefield, 21-14.

"They're going to be tough, and we definitely need a win, to keep our playoff hopes going," said Chieftain coach Tommy Moss.

In a lot of respects, Idalou came into the 1984 football season with the same situation as Friona. The Wildcats had compiled a 7-2-1 record in 1983. Their only two losses were by a combined nine points, and this knocked the 'Cats out of the playoffs.

Idalou lost only to Childress, 14-12, and to Post, 21-14. They returned 12 starters and 28 lettermen from last year's squad.

Returnees include Isaac Jackson, a 5-9, 185-pound tailback who is molded along the lines of Friona's Alfredo Mata. Jackson rushed for 1,171 yards and ten touchdowns in 1983.

Wingback Stacy Phillips, fullback Steve Wilbanks and

quarterback Jim Pruitt round out the backfield, which accounted for over 300 yards rushing and 25 points per game in 1983.

Tom Ritchey is head coach of the Wildcats, in his tenth season, and number-wise he has about as many athletes out for the sport as does Friona, with 51 players on the varsity and 110 boys in the entire program.

Wilbanks, a 5-8, 190-pounder, is also an anchor for the team's defense, which allowed only 190 yards per game and 8.6 points per outing to ten opponents in 1983. It will be noted that last week Idalou held Littlefield to its lowest point total (21) since the Chieftains held the 'Cats to 13 in the regular-season finale of 1983 (although Littlefield played without potent Steve Green in that game).

Idalou is one of the two teams which were moved into District 2-AAA this year by the University Interscholastic League, the other being Floydada.

The Friona-Idalou series isn't exactly one of the most regular in the region—in fact this will mark only the second meeting in history on the gridiron by the two schools, which says something about the new UIL alignment.

The only other time the teams met was on a cold and snowy November 26th, 1952, in a class B bi-district playoff game at Plainview, with the Wildcats

scoring a 19-0 win.

Some of the players for the Chieftains that day included Glenn Reeve, Jr., Teddy and Arnold Fangman, Doyce Hammett and D.O. Robason. They were coached by Raymond Cook.

Meanwhile, Coach Moss will be hoping to have most of his troops ready for the Wildcats. Ben Neelley re-joined the team this week after missing two games with a knee injury. Pending a visit to his doctor, Mata might be available for duty, but probably would not start.

This past week, receiver and cornerback Rodney Allen had the flu and strep throat, but was a probable starter against Floydada on Friday.

"If we can just get everybody well, we would be all right against almost anybody," Moss said.

Harvest of the area's corn crop has been estimated at from 40 to 50 per cent complete, with more dry weather needed for its completion.

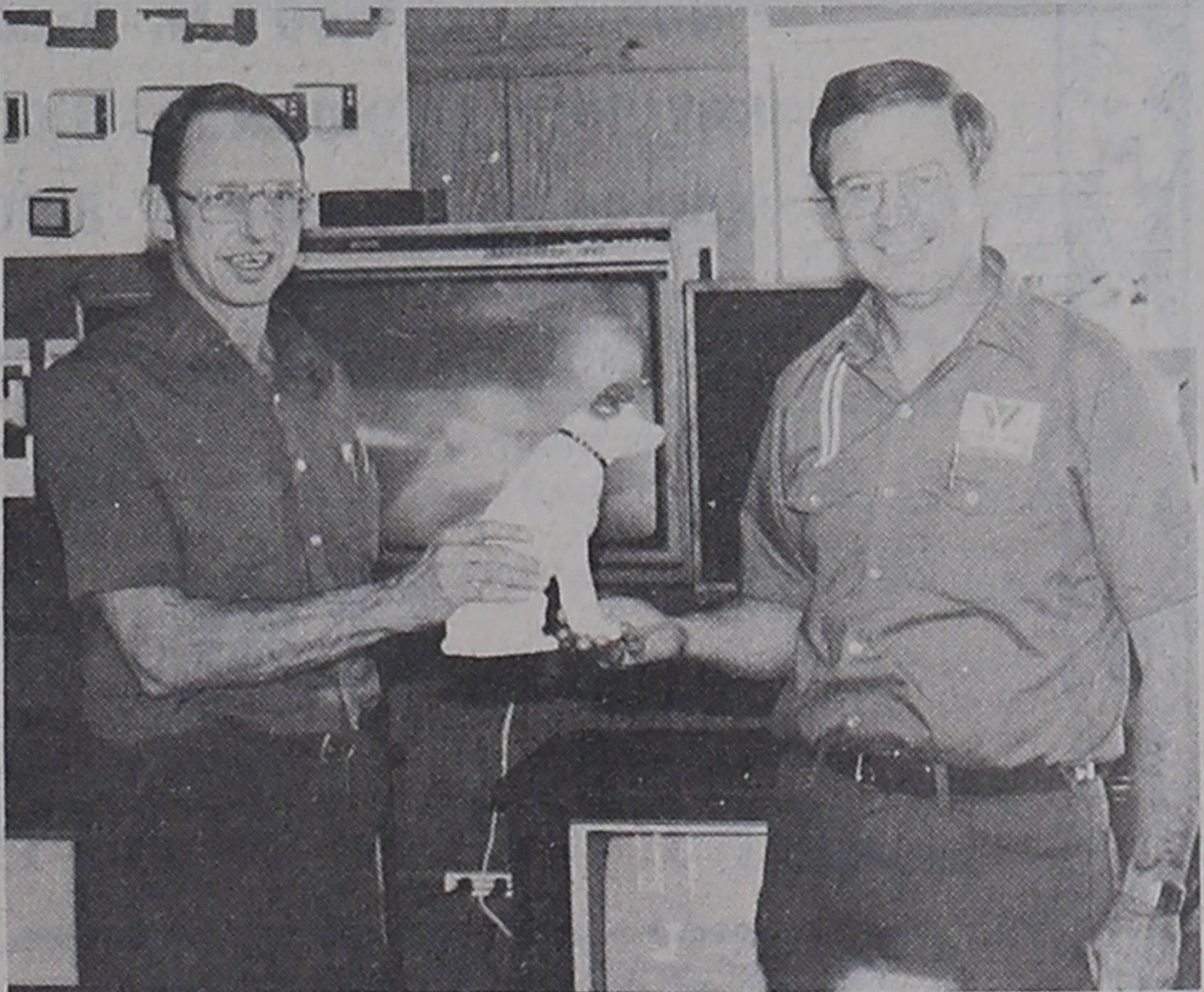
Store Sets Opening

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

....from the files of The Friona Star

55 YEARS AGO--OCT. 11, 1929

Dr. A.P. McElroy has let the contract for the erection of the building that is to house the new Friona laundry, Thomas & Thompson being the contractors. The building is being erected on Main Street in the McMillan-Fergus addition to Friona, on the north side of the city.

W.J. Coffman, living several miles south of town, was the first to bring a bale of cotton to his Friona gin this season. The bale was brought in last Thursday.

50 YEARS AGO--OCT. 12, 1934

Those in charge of Friona Consumers Company filling station and oil depot came near witnessing a serious fire in the building on Thursday morning of last week, when a heater got on fire. An over amount of distillate had gotten into the oil burning heater. It appears that two school boys who live in the country, had missed their bus the evening before and had spent the night at the company's sales room with Roy Williams, who was in charge as night man that night. About 5 o'clock Thursday morning while Mr. Williams was outside attending to his duties, the boys proceeded to light a fire in the heater and allowed too much fuel to get into the fire pot of the stove causing flames to cover the stove and fill the building with smoke.

45 YEARS AGO--OCT. 13, 1939

The severe drought of nearly three months duration in this locality, was broken last Saturday when clouds began during the forenoon, to drop their moisture in gentle showers, covering this locality and Parmer County and extending practically to all parts of the Panhandle. The rain left from one to two inches of moisture in the Friona territory.

40 YEARS AGO--OCT. 13, 1944

While working on a windmill tower at the Ivie farm, 15 miles southeast of Friona last Friday, Raymond Adams lost his balance and fell to the ground. No bones

were broken, however, he was severely bruised and shaken.

30 YEARS AGO--OCT. 14, 1954

Law officers are investigating the robbery of the Piggly Wiggly Store in Friona Wednesday night at which time \$257.01 was taken from a cash register by someone entering the building through a jagged hole in a rear door. The thieves pried the bars that cross the glass slightly, then broke the glass.

25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 15, 1959

Hurshel Harding of Farwell has announced his candidacy for the office of county attorney, a position he now holds. His announcement is made subject to the Democratic Primary May 7.

Early reports of this year's grain sorghum harvest show decided signs that this year's crop may even exceed the 18,000,000 bushel proportions which was estimated earlier in the year. According to managers of several elevators in the Friona and northern Parmer County areas, the per acre yield is running quite a bit above last year's county average of 3,300 pounds per acre.

20 YEARS AGO--OCT. 15, 1964

Preliminary dirt work began last Friday toward construction of the new \$1 million high school building in the west part of town. Contractors say the building will be ready for classes next fall.

Merylene Massie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W.M. Massie, was crowned Football Queen during the Friona-Hale Center game last Friday.

15 YEARS AGO--OCT. 16, 1969

Carleen Greeson was crowned Homecoming Queen during the coronation last Friday.

The Friona area was startled last weekend with a killing freeze,

which came earlier than usual, and may have damaged crops not harvested.

10 YEARS AGO--OCT. 13, 1974

Clay Bandy, Friona High School senior backfield star, was cited this week by both the Amarillo Globe-News and the Lubbock Avalanche Journal as "Player of the Week" for his role in guiding the Chiefs to their 14-6 victory over Hart last Friday.

Funeral services were conducted here Wednesday for Bert Shackelford, 81, a longtime Friona resident. Shackelford had lived in Perryton for the past two years.

5 YEARS AGO--OCT. 21, 1979

The theft of \$21.06 worth of gas from a Bovina service station last Friday led to a high-speed chase across two counties, and an exchange of bullets which left an 18-year-old Iowa man wounded.

Vandals have been responsible for hundreds of dollars worth of damage to store windows in Friona during the past week, and as a result, a group of local merchants have moved to find the responsible parties. The merchants have posted a \$500 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those responsible for the vandalism.

For the 37th year the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University, Canyon, are again sponsoring the National Spelling Bee for students in public and parochial schools in this area.

Directors of the 46 counties of the Panhandle of Texas, parts of Oklahoma, New Mexico and Kansas are being named to handle their respective events. Directors select the dates of their county bees and report their champions to the Amarillo newspaper. The director for Parmer County will be James

Craig, principal of the elementary school, Farwell.

Information relating to the county program may be obtained from the director. Other information concerning the 1985 Regional Bee, scheduled for April 27 on the campus of WTSU, will be available on request from Gene Parker, bee coordinator. Parker is director of placement for WTSU.

"We are looking forward to having these outstanding young people on the campus of WTSU next April. The university takes a great deal of pride in working with this educational program and placing great emphasis on learning," Parker said.

The deadline for directors to report their county champs to

Jeane Bartlett, Spelling Bee Editor for the Amarillo newspaper, will be April 6. The winner of the 1985 Regional Bee will be sent to Washington, D.C. to take part in the National Spelling Bee, early in June, with all expenses paid, courtesy of the Amarillo Globe-News. This includes expenses for one parent.

Rules, established by the national sponsors, the Scipps-Howard Newspapers, state that any student who will not be older than 16 by June 1, or in a grade higher than the eighth by the end of the current school term, may participate.

A Junior Bee for younger students, grades six and under, will also be conducted in each county if directors so desire. The county junior winners do not spell in the Regional Bee, but are special guests of the sponsors and will be recognized and awarded trophies.

The booklet, "Words of the Champions," containing more than 3,000 words and prepared by the national sponsors, is used in most school events and county contests. the team made a bundle of mistakes, and staked the visitors to a 9-0 lead early in the game, before settling down.

Again, it was the horrible snaps from center on the team's punting game which dug the Chieftains an early hole. And the nine points which were the result of the early mistake proved to be too much, against the big-play Indians, who had beaten Muleshoe, 22-16 earlier this season.

This time, the bad snap happened early in the game, on Friona's first possession. The Chieftains had won the toss and received the opening kickoff, but found themselves facing fourth down and 14 from their own 16 yard line.

The snap sailed about ten feet over Barnett's head, and he chased it hopelessly into the end zone and the ball finally rolled out the back of the EZ for a safety, giving Morton an early 2-0 lead.

Sam Montoya usually booms kickoffs 60 or 70 yards, but on the free kick which followed the safety, he shanked the ball only out to the Friona 46 (26 yards), and the Chieftains' early-game luck continued bad.

Morton took advantage of the situation, and tailback Keith Hawkins sprinted 46 yards around end for a touchdown. The kick gave the Indians a 9-0 lead, and only 2:22 had elapsed from the clock.

Brad Moyer, filling in for the injured Alfredo Mata, did a great job during the game. He turned in a 36-yard run on Friona's second possession, but a quarterback sack against Barnett forced a punt. Thankfully, the snap was good and Barnett was able to get the punt away.

Friona's defense dug in, and forced Morton to punt, and this led to Friona's first score of the game.

John Aguirre fielded the punt at the Morton 48, tucked the ball under his arm, and raced up the west sideline untouched for the score. Montoya's kick was perfect,

and the score became 7-9 with 5:39 left in the opening period.

Friona held the Indians and forced a punt. Morton was offside, and Friona asked for a re-kick, and then fumbled the second kick. However, defensive end Leroy Mercado made up for it by intercepting a Morton pass two plays later.

Again Friona couldn't move, and had to punt the ball. The good news was: the third straight punt snap which was good.

The Chieftains appeared to have held the Indians big, when they had Morton third and 33 at their own 20 yard line. However, the Chiefs were flagged for pass interference and Morton got a first down out of the deal.

This led to one of Morton's big plays when Hawkins took a screen pass and rambled 65 yards for a TD. The kick gave the visitors a 16-7 lead with 4:19 left in the first half.

Friona put together a snappy drive from their own 28, paced by the running of Wendell Woodruff, Aguirre and Moyer, and a big fourth down pass completion from Barnett to Rodney Allen, which moved the ball to the Morton 30.

Aguirre slanted across the middle for 15 yards, and a third down pass to Mercado gained to the Morton eight.

With their snapping record so questionable, Coach Tommy Moss gave up what would have been an easy field goal for Montoya, and went for it on fourth and three. However, the option pitchout was bobbled, and Morton took over.

Failure to get any points from this otherwise nice drive resulted in the team having to settle for a tie late in the game.

The fourth down play was the next-to-last play of the first half.

Morton took the second half kickoff and made a first down on a pass completion to midfield.

Two plays later, Mercado raced in front of a Ricky Williams pass, caught it at about his own 40 and followed some good blocking 60 yards to the end zone and a

touchdown. Montoya's kick made the score 14-16 with 9:33 left in the quarter.

An interesting point was the fact that Friona's first two touchdowns were scored on (1) a punt return and (2) a pass interception return, both for long yardage.

Late in the third quarter, Friona had the ball on the Morton 38 and elected to punt. However, the ball was snapped high over Barnett's head, going for a 30-yard loss to the Chieftain 32.

Morton fumbled the ball back to the Chiefs, who ran three plays and brought up another punting situation.

The third high snap of the ball game resulted in a partially blocked punt this time, and a net of only four yards. Morton again obliged, by fumbling the ball back to the Chiefs on first down.

Early in the fourth quarter, the Chiefs faced a fourth down needing one from their own 40. They decided that by trying for the yardage at least you don't lose 30 yards, and Moyer gave the team a first down.

However, three plays later Barnett suffered his first pass interception of the season to end the drive.

Friona took over on their own 28 after a Morton punt, and moved to midfield helped by a pass to Mercado, but again had to punt. Luckily, it was a good snap this time.

The Chieftains played an outstanding defensive game for the most part, with Morton's big play offense accounting for the visitors' yardage and scores. One of the big plays came next, when Friona had backed the Indians inside their 20, and Morton faced a third and 18 situation.

Hawkins again caught a pass, and then evaded the Friona defenders enroute to an 81-yard scoring play. The Chieftains blocked the point-try, which became important as Morton hiked its lead to 22-14.

The aroused Chieftains drove 64 yards in only five plays. Barnett hit

Mercado on a nice, 31-yard pass play. A pass interference penalty against the Indians moved the ball to the Morton 28.

Morton expected a pass, but Aguirre took the ball on a draw play and raced 28 yards for the score. This made it 20-22, with only 1:56 left in the game.

The Chiefs had no choice but try for two points. Barnett rolled to his right, saw Aguirre open in the end zone and lobbed the ball his way. Aguirre hugged the pass for a two-point play, to tie the game at 22-22.

The two teams ran 14 plays in the last 1:50 of the game. Morton threatened to re-take the lead, driving from their own 24 to the Friona 20, mostly on passing.

But Lonnie Phillips intercepted a pass in the Friona end zone to stop the threat.

However, Woodruff coughed up the ball after a 16-yard gain on first down, and Morton had the

ball again with 39 seconds left to play.

On Morton's third down play, Mercado made another spectacular catch, intercepting the ball at the Friona five.

The Chieftains, having seen the ball swap hands three times in the last five plays from scrimmage, elected to fall on the ball twice and run out the clock, settling for a tie.

"We felt fortunate in being able to tie the game, since we had played as poorly as we did in spots," said Coach Moss, who praised the team's character in being able to come back for the touchdown and two-point conversion it needed to tie the game.

The Chieftain mentor had words of praise for Brad Moyer, the fill-in for Mata. "Brad did a great job. He may not be as fast as Alfredo, but he has the moves, and everything it takes to run the tailback position," Moss said.

'Faces Edge JV Chieftains

The Friona Junior Varsity Chieftains, in spite of being weakened somewhat by injuries and illness, managed to play the Hereford Sophomores a close game at Hereford last Thursday, losing, 18-12.

Coach Lynn Weiland said he was extremely proud of the team's play, which rolled to 387 yards of total offense, 348 yards rushing and another 39 yards passing.

The team rushed 51 times for 348 yards, a nifty 6.8 yards per try for the team. The JV Chiefs attempted 17 passes, completing three and having two intercepted.

Jimmy Williams scored first for Friona, on a 60-yard run in the first quarter. Charles Walker got into the end zone later on an 11-

yard run. Williams was Friona's leading rusher with 165 yards on 19 tries, 8.1 yards per carry. Walker racked up 92 yards on 24 tries, or 3.9 yards per carry. Shy Burney added 91 yards on only seven tries, a gaudy 13.0 yards-per-try average.

Outstanding defensive efforts were turned in by Tracy Carthel, who had a pass interception during the game.

The game left Friona with a 2-2 season record. The team stands 1-0 in district play.

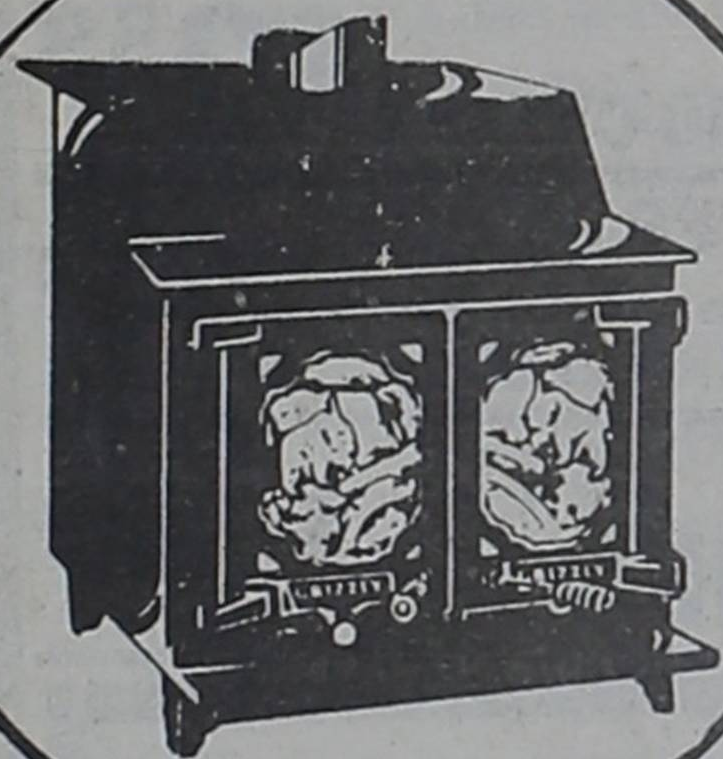
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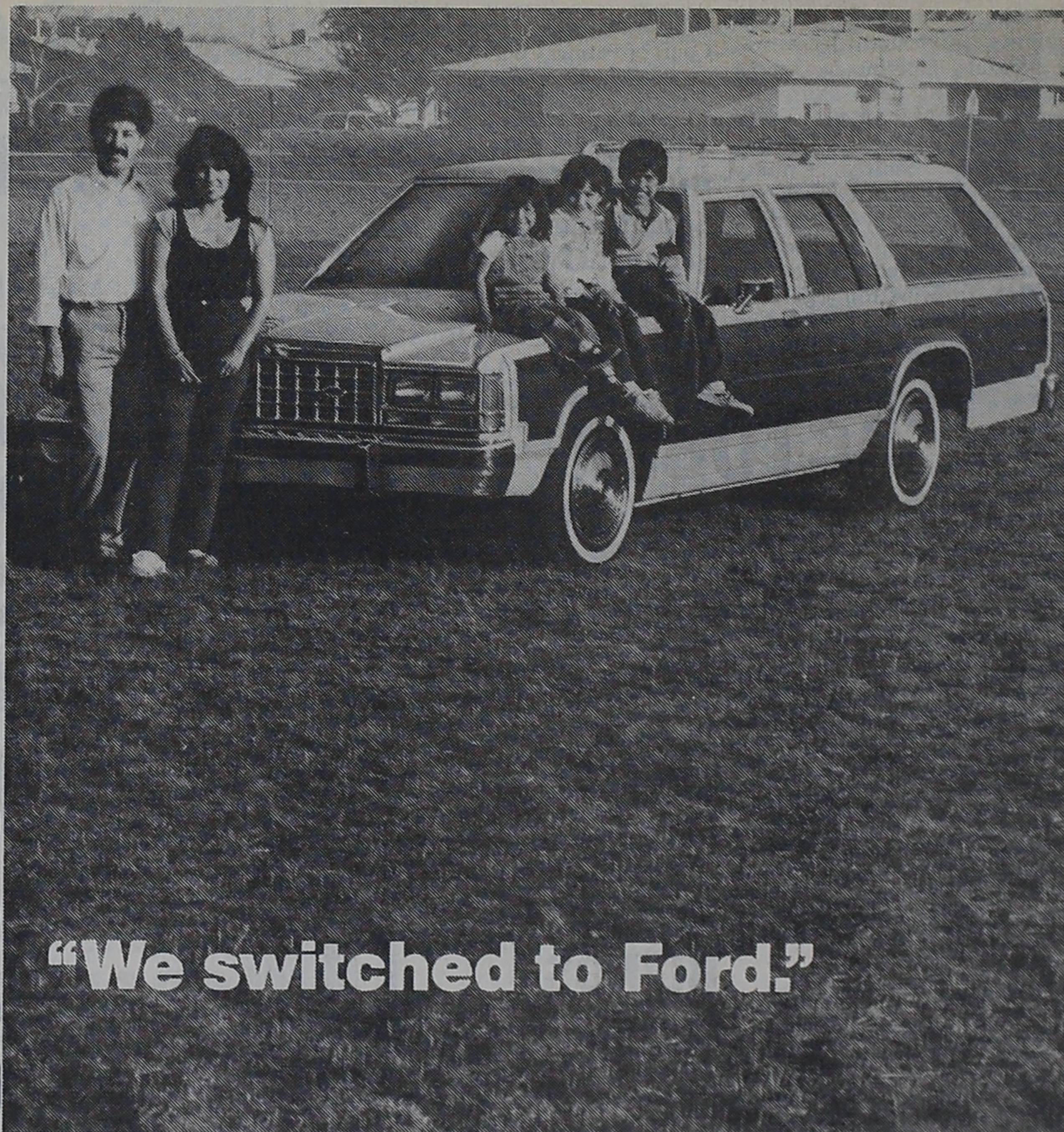

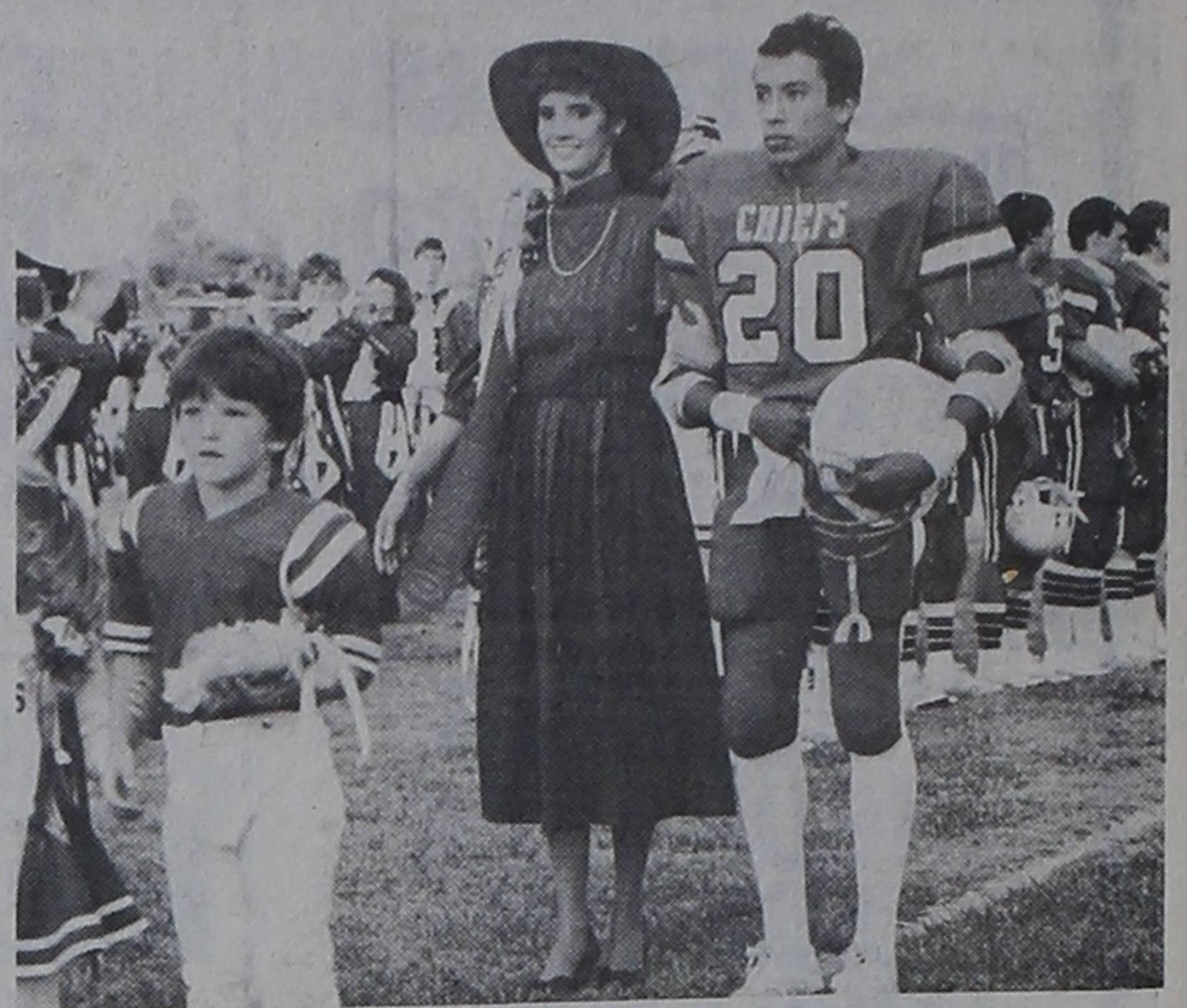
