Hereford Man Tops Entrants

It's appropriate that the Democratic challengers for president and vice president are a former U.S. senator and a current House member. Republicans have held the presidency half the time since the end of World War II, but Democrats have dominated control of Congress in that time.

With the debacle of the Nixon presidency, Congress vaulted ahead of the presidency as the stronger of those two institutions. In the wake of the 1974 elections, Democrats controlled two-thirds of each house.

Ronald Reagan has tried, through a variety of means, to restore the presidency to equal power with Congress. He has not been able to cut federal spending, though he has been able to slow its growth by cajoling Republicans and conservative Democrats into temporary alliances on specific bills.

His tax cuts were really a "teaser," in one sense, to create public support for something Reagan and many others consider absolutely crucial: indexing personal income tax rates.

Without indexing, Congress could care less about tax cuts. Those are temporary waves in the federal revenue graph. What will force fiscal restraint on Congress is indexing, which will prevent federal revenues from rising automatically as inflation occurs.

Reagan has made other thrusts for presidential parity. Chief among those is the line-item veto, which merely would allow the chief executive to approve bills the same way Congress writes them: piecemeal. And, just as with the current all-or-nothing veto power, a two-thirds vote in each house overrides any veto ever wielded.

So, what has been going on these past four years is not the near-destruction of the country, but one of periodic readjustment in the relative strengths of Congress and the presidency. In that context, it's not surprising that an ex-senator and a congress-woman from the opposition party have found that period somewhat unsettling.

For the second week in a row, the season best score was improved by a point in the Friona Star's football contest, when the winner posted a score of 21.

Absentee Voting Continues

Absentee voting began Wednesday, October 17 at the County Clerk's office in Farwell, and continues through Friday, November 2.

Special absentee voting booths have been arranged for Friona, for the benefit of voters in that area.

Clerk's representatives will be at the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union on October 18, 25, 26 and November 1, during the Credit Union's regular hours, 9 a.m.-4 p.m.

Any registered voter may vote absentee if they think they might be out of the county for any reason on election day Tuesday, November 6.

A large turnout of voters is expected for the general election. County officials said there was a flurry of activity just prior to the deadline for registering, for those not holding valid registration forms.

R.L. Blakely and Bruce Patterson are third with 118 points, then it drops to 115, where Hank Outland and Jimmy Walker are tied.

Kevin Beavers, James Clark, David Gowens, Danny Murpree and Rick Tullis are next at 114. A list of all the top contestants may be found elsewhere in this issue.

The Parmer County Commissioners Court opened bids on a proposed new pickup for the county agent at its regular meeting Monday, October 22, and after considering the two bids received, decided to reject these bids and advertise for new bids on different specifications.

The new set of bids are scheduled to be opened on Monday, November 13 at 11 a.m.

Gayle Koeninger, of El Paso Natural Gas Co. met with the court requesting a 25-year right-of-way be signed for his company. After some discussion, it was voted to turn down the request. The court informed the guest that Parmer County prefers to grant right-of-way requests as they are needed.

Motion was approved to pay \$200 for travel to Galveston for an indigent citizen in need of medical treatment.

Bids for a motor grader for Precinct 2 were received from Peek Industrial Equipment and West Texas Equipment Co. Motion was passed to accept the bid of W.T. Equipment, on a bid of \$48,470 with trade.

Motion was approved to hold a hearing at 4 p.m. November 13, on the control of 2,4-D herbicides in the county.

Mrs. Marjorie Watkins, District Clerk, appeared to tell the court that she would be needing a part-time clerk, due to Mrs. Lovelace leaving. Permission was granted for Mrs. Watkins to take applications to hire a replacement.

Since November 12, which would have been the next meeting date, is a holiday, a motion was passed to hold the next Commissioners' meeting on Tuesday, November 13.

Commissioner Ernest Anthony presided at the meeting, in the absence of Judge Porter Roberts, who is still hospitalized in Amarillo with his illness.



The son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Johnston, Bryan is married to the former Allison Campbell. They are parents of a daughter, Katherine, 18 months old.







Idalou Shuts Door On Chieftains, 18-0

To say that the Friona Chieftains found it hard to make yardage against the Idalou Wildcats in their big District 2-AAA encounter here last Friday night would be like saying Alaskan winters are slightly cold.

The Wildcats took advantage of some Friona mistakes, and completely shut down the Chiefs in the game, 18-0.

Idalou, helped by a couple of bad snaps on punt attempts, held the Chieftains to just 12 yards rushing, 14 yards passing, and 26 total yards. This is the lowest offensive total for a Chieftain team in some 20 years.

The lowest offensive total for Friona in the past decade was in a 1976 game against Lockney, when the Chieftains managed only 40 net yards.

The Chiefs managed only three first downs in the game, all in the first half. During the second half, as an indication of how the defense-minded Wildcats dominated play, Friona was held to no first downs and minus four yards rushing.

Friona, meanwhile, helped seal their own doom by carrying out their "good neighbor policy," which the team exhibited in their other home district game against Muleshoe.

However, like many fans had predicted: "You can't make many mistakes against a team like Idalou and still win."

The Chieftains and their supporters may always wonder "what might have been."

The team took the opening kickoff, and John Aguirre made a good return, out to the 31-yard line. Two runs by Brad Moyer gave Friona a first down at their own 41.

Then, on a third and one play from the Idalou 49, Moyer had a gaping hole, but never got control of the ball. Idalou recovered the fumble.

If Friona had made the first down, and kept that initial drive going, is it possible the Chieftains could have scored first, and then given Idalou the shaky field position, on which situations the Friona defense has really come alive this season?

But it never happened, and although the Chieftain defense did stiffen after allowing a pair of Idalou first downs, and forced a wide field goal attempt, the Chieftains were not through with their "early Christmas spirit."

Rick Barnett had a kick that was caught by the stiff south breeze, netting only 17 yards, and Idalou took the ball at the Friona 37.

It took the Wildcats just four plays to score. Jace Green ran 21 yards for the touchdown, and the kick gave Idalou the lead, 7-0, with 2:49 left in the opening quarter.

Brent Gatlin gained five yards, and Moyer four and a half, and Friona faced a big fourth and 1/2 from their own 37. The Chiefs decided to go for it, and made a first down to their 40, when Moyer gained three yards.

But an incomplete pass and Aguirre being tackled for a two-yard loss brought up fourth and long from the 39. The team should have gone for the yardage again.

Barnett, in punt formation, got a high snap from center, and was tackled at his own 20 for a 19-yard loss. This set the Wildcats in motion for their second score.

It took just seven plays, with quarterback Jim Pruitt passing to Matt Stanton on a big third down play for the TD. The kick was foiled by (of all things) a high snap from center, but Idalou had a 13-0 lead, 9:37 before halftime.

The Chiefs were still plugging, and Moyer gave the team a first down on their next-to-last possession of the half, but failure to convert passing attempts forced the team to punt.

The Chiefs benefitted from an Idalou punt into the wind, and got the ball at the Wildcat 32 with only 37 seconds left in the half.

But once again, Aguirre was tackled for a big loss, and Barnett couldn't find a receiver on two passes.

Sophomore Sam Montoya came in to try a 56-yard field goal on the last play of the quarter. Montoya gave it his best effort, but the kick fell just short. This turned out to be Friona's best scoring opportunity of the game.

The rock-ribbed Idalou defense shut down the Chieftains completely in the second half.

In six second-half possessions, the Chiefs punted, then snapped the ball over the punter's head for a two-point safety, punted again, fumbled, and then failed twice on fourth down to make the necessary yardage.

Beside getting the safety in the third quarter, Idalou took over the ball after another short punt and turned it into a 25-yard field goal by Pruitt for the game's final margin with 5:13 to play.

Considering the fact that Friona "gave" the Wildcats their two touchdowns with good field position and then contributed the safety and the field position for the field goal, fans had to wonder what might have happened if the

team could have played a mistake-free game.

"I don't know if the kids were just nervous, or what it was. I do know that this was the first big game that a lot of them had ever played in, and this probably made a difference. We just couldn't seem to 'loosen' them up," said Coach Tommy Moss.

"The kids played hard—they did as much as we could ask of them, but we made some mistakes, which helped Idalou score," the Chieftain coach continued.

He pointed out that Idalou had three or four boys, including a linebacker and noseguard on defense, and a running back, who had been out of action (missing the team's 21-14 loss to Littlefield), but were back in the lineup against Friona.





Vega Sets Tour On Solar Heat

Final plans for a tour November 3 of solar installations in Oldham County have been announced by officers of the Tri-State Solar Assn.

Participants will receive available cost data and technical information at each tour stop, Walker said.

The Tri-State Solar Assn., organized during the past year with guidance of the Oldham County Extension staff, plans to sponsor a tour and another educational meeting each year. Association members monitor their different systems for energy savings and share their results and experience with each other. The group's purpose is to promote the development of solar energy resources through individual and community efforts, Walker said.

Persons wanting on the organization's mailing list may send their name and address to County Extension Office, Box 380, Vega, Texas, 79092. There aren't any membership dues or fees, but donations will be accepted to help defray costs, Walker said.

8. Some cataracts are so slow in developing or begin so late in life that they never come to need surgery.
9. Recent advancements in cataract surgery have caused the operation to be considered minor surgery. In some cases the surgery can be performed in the surgeon's office.
10. Following cataract surgery with an intraocular implant, the eyeglasses you receive from your optometrist will look like ordinary eyeglasses. It will not be necessary to wear thick cataract eyeglasses or contact lenses.
11. Cataracts are very difficult to see without the use of special instruments. With these instruments, your optometrist can easily detect and classify which type you have and determine when a second opinion is needed.

New Pastor To Be Installed At Rhea


Rev. Leonard E. Riddle has been named new pastor of the Immanuel Lutheran Church at Rhea.

Pastor and Mrs. Riddle will reside in the church parsonage at Rhea.

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

4-H Clubs Benefit From United Way

(Editor's note: The Friona 4-H Club is one agency that benefits from the United Way drive. Pace-setters are already at work, contacting businesses prior to the drive kick-off, which is scheduled for November 5.)

Each year, beginning in September, more than 100,000 Texas boys and girls aged 9 to 19 join millions of others throughout the country in the world's largest youth organization—4-H.

What is it and why do they do it? A brief look into the nature of the 4-H program and what it has to offer youth and their families can provide the answers to these questions.

First of all, 4-H is fun. 4-H'ers take part in a wide variety of enjoyable activities—club meetings, recreation, camps, learning laboratories and project work. Meanwhile, their families have the joy of working together on projects, participating in fun days, and enjoying a host of other opportunities.

Secondly, 4-H offers educational experiences. Youngsters learn that learning can be fun. 4-H learning takes place in small group work, in individual work on projects, and in conjunction with adult volunteers and family members. They learn at fairs and project shows of various sorts and in a variety of other "non-classroom" environments.

4-H encourages "learning-by-doing" and provides citizenship and leadership skills. 4-H wants to involve all youth—rural, urban, suburban, teens and pre-teens, and from all races, creeds, ethnic and economic backgrounds. 4-H youth learn, work and play together.

In 4-H, young people can learn how to make things, grow things, take care of things and repair things in a wide variety of projects.

And the great part about the whole program is that 4-H youth can select what they want to do. Projects include things such as nature study, wildlife entomology, animal science, beef cattle, horse

and pony, dog care, plant science, gardening, field crops, home economics, foods and nutrition, clothing, automotive, bicycle, small engines, mechanics, electricity, personal development, citizenship, leadership and public speaking.

4-H requires no membership fee or dues. It is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service which is a part of Texas A&M University and by local, state and national donors.

4-H has a lot to offer. So if you have a desire to learn and want to get involved in an action-oriented program, contact the County Extension office, at 481-3619.

Through this network, human and material resources are channelled to people in great need in every part of the world, according to a spokesman for the group.









COMBEST COMMENTS

Prices, Profits and Jobs

This year most farmers have had good yields—better than we've had in the last few years. But prices are so low that many farmers still won't make a decent profit. Sometimes it seems like the family farmer can't win for losing. If the West Texas weather doesn't get us, low prices do.

The problems facing the future of family farming are complex. No one has all the answers, but I believe the job of your Congressman is to find the causes of these problems and work for their solution.

In this column, I'll discuss what I believe is a fundamental problem with our federal government, one that has hurt our family farmers. I'll also offer a proposal that I believe has great potential to solve this problem and help increase farm prices, profits and jobs.

Farm profits are dictated by prices, and a good way to increase prices is to increase demand. In the last decade foreign exports have contributed more and more to the demand for our products. Last year half a billion dollars in goods and services were exported from our region. One-eighth of our manufacturing jobs and one fourth of our farm jobs depend on our ability to export—at a profit.

Increasing foreign sales offers us our best chance to increase demand for our products; but, unfortunately, our country's international trade policy has been inconsistent, inefficient and sometimes counterproductive.

When it comes to our international trade policy, it seems like the right hand doesn't know what the left hand is doing. Policies adopted for one group hurt other groups more. For example, grain exporters say that

during the time we were negotiating an increase of \$34 million in cotton textile imports from the Peoples Republic of China, we lost \$550 million in grain exports to them.

And the disastrous grain embargo that was intended to hurt the Soviet Union hurt our farmers more. Trade embargoes also hurt our producers' dependability in the eyes of the world. First we're in the market, then we're not, then we are.

The problem is our international trade policy lacks consistency and continuity. Farmers can't predict it. Manufacturers can't predict it.

We've seen what can happen when the State Department dictates agricultural policy, but it's not just the State Department that's involved. Our international markets can be affected by any one of more than a dozen government agencies including the departments of State, Labor, Commerce, and Agriculture as well as the S.B.A., the International Monetary Fund and the Import Export Bank. We've even got export licenses that have to be approved by the C.I.A.

With all these agencies working on their own goals without looking at the big picture, it's no wonder that our trade policy is erratic and ineffective.

I believe these are strong reasons to develop a Department of International Trade, a cabinet level department that would bring all the agencies which now deal in international trade under one umbrella. Much research and study has already been done on this, and there are many benefits:

First, it would provide for a unified, consistent, long range international trade policy. We

could then make long term trade agreements with other countries and put the world on notice that we're going to be there, that our policies, our producers and our supply can be depended on. This would greatly strengthen our position in the world market.

Second, it would make international trade an integral part of the farm bill making it possible to adopt farm programs and production levels that can be profitably supported by domestic and foreign demand.

Third, by combining existing agencies that deal with international trade under one umbrella we would reduce duplication of efforts and prevent the actions of one agency from undermining the actions of another. The right hand would know what the left hand is doing and both would be guided by the same unified policy.

I spoke in support of the development of a Department of International Trade in a debate sponsored by the West Texas International Trade Forum. In that debate, my opponent said it was a good idea but he was against it because he thought it would be too costly.

But, as I said here and in that debate, creating this department would reduce costs. It would not add to the agencies already in existence, but would combine the efforts of those agencies. It would replace 25 federal agencies and eliminate job duplication in the many departments that deal with international trade. It will save money by taking people already on the payroll and making them more efficient and effective.

And a consistent, unified international trade policy would increase tax revenues, reduce trade deficits; and, most important, it would help provide new jobs and a brighter economic future for West Texans.


