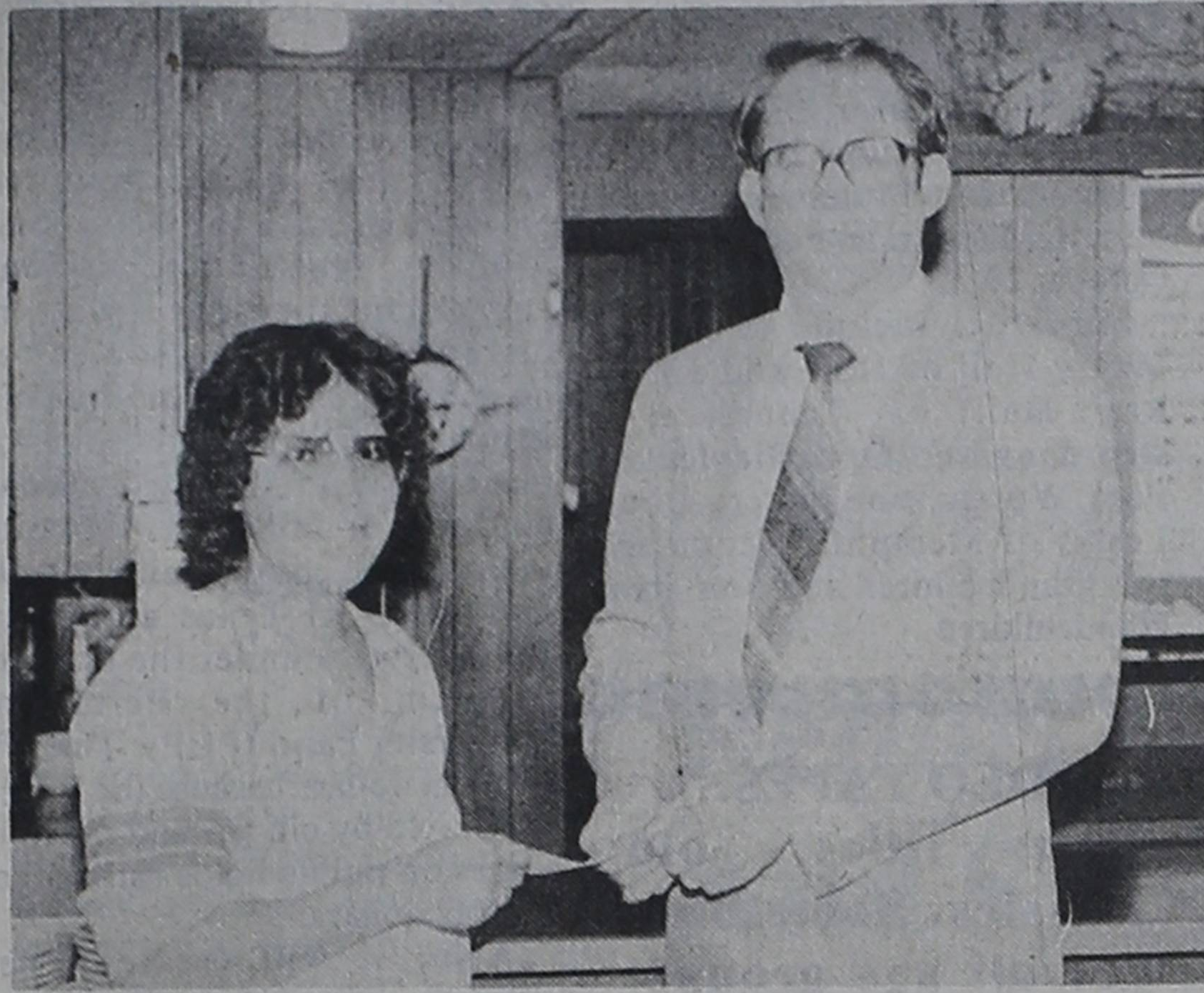
If you saw the movie "Airplane," which was a parody on the many films about airline disasters and dramas, this movie is intended to be the same for the other space horror films.

## Gramm Deserves Voters' Support

In order to maintain the state's conservative voice in the U.S. Senate, area voters are urged to cast their ballot for Phil Gramm in the senatorial race.

For the past 24 years, Texans have been represented in the Senate by John Tower, who retires after this year, after a distinguished career in the upper house of congress.

Phil Gramm is cut from the same mold as Tower, who set some sort of precedent by being the first Republican elected to the U.S. Senate from Texas in over 50 years. He proved during his career that the voters did the right thing in electing him.

Gramm's opponent, Lloyd Doggett, has maintained a clear support of liberal issues, including tax increases, and has resorted to "scare tactics" during his campaign, wanting older people to believe that Gramm would cut their Social Security benefits if elected.

Gramm helped guide President Reagan's 1981 tax reduction of 25 per cent, as well as the elimination of the "marriage penalty" on income tax returns and inheritance tax.

A clear choice faces voters in the U.S. Senate race, and it behooves West Texans, who have traditionally supported conservative candidates, to turn out strong, in order to offset Doggett's liberal coalition on election day.

### Polling Places Given For Voting

Polling places for next Tuesday's General Election have been announced by County Clerk Bonnie Warren. They are as follows:

- Precinct 1 (Black)--Tri-County Elevator; Precinct 2 (Friona)--Fire Station; Precinct 2-1 (Friona)--Calvary Baptist Church; Precinct 2-2 (Friona) Friona Community Center; Precinct 3 (Bovina)--American Legion Hall.
- Precinct 4 (Farwell)--County Courtroom; Precinct 5 (Lazbuddie)--school; Precinct 6 (Oklahoma Lane)--Community Center; Precinct 7 (Rhea)--parish hall; Precinct 8 (Lakeview) J.D. Willard residence.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

County Clerk Bonnie Warren said Monday afternoon that a total of 120 absentee ballots had been cast, and she felt this was a very good turnout of absentees. Deadline for voting absentee is Friday, November 2 at the clerk's office in Farwell.

# Senate, Congress Choice Face Voters

Although the presidential election holds the most interest for the majority of voters, the race for U.S. Senate and the U.S. Congress also will be vital races in the 1984 general election next Tuesday, November 6.

Former conservative Democrat-turned Republican Phil Gramm faces the liberal Democrat Lloyd Doggett in the senate race.

Doggett edged area congressman Kent Hance last June in the Democratic runoff, or else the race would feature two members of the "Boll Weevil" group from the U.S. Congress.

In the congressional race to name a replacement for Hance, the congressman's former aide, Don Richards, is the Democratic candidate, opposed by Republican Larry Combest.

Richards used a coalition of support from the rural counties in the May election, to post the primary win.

Three other state races are opposed, although they have not generated a lot of interest. Democrat Mack Wallace is opposed by Republican John Henderson for the Railroad Commission.

John L. Hill, former attorney-general, is the Democratic candidate for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. Hill's opponent is John L. Bates.

Candidates for the judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals are Sam Houston Clinton (Democrat) and Virgin E. Mulanax, Republican.

In addition to the races, there are eight proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

Amendment 1 would provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks.

Amendment 2 would create from general revenue a special higher education assistance fund for construction and related activities, to restructure the Permanent University Fund, and to increase the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the Permanent University Fund.

Amendment 3 would authorize the legislature to provide for payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of certain public servants killed while on duty.

Amendment 4 would abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties.

Number 5 would authorize the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor.

Number 6 would permit the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on certain insurance contracts of mutual insurance companies authorized to do business in Texas.

Number 7 gives the State Commission on Judicial Conduct

authority to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts.

Number 8 would provide a "per

diem" for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator.

## Star Endorses Don Richards

Voters in Parmer County are urged to continue the strong support they gave Don Richards in the primary, when they vote in next Tuesday's General Election.

Richards is a native of this area, and understands its problems, particularly as they relate to agriculture and agri-business.

Since he worked for Congressman Kent Hance as an aide, he already has the background, contacts and knowledge that will enable him to be "ready to roll." At a campaign rally recently, one supporter said it would take Richards' opponent a term, if he were elected, to reach the experience level that Richards already has.

Richards is a down-to-earth, hard-working individual, who is genuinely interested in doing his very best as a representative of this area.

One of the best recommendations a candidate can have, it has been pointed out, is that he has been hired by, and then endorsed by a congressman.

He has conducted his campaign on the basis of being the lowest per-vote spender of any candidate for congress who is seeking office this year. He promises to run his congressional office on the same basis. Personally, we like this kind of thinking in a congressional candidate.

Richards knows this area. He has relatives in Parmer and Bailey counties. It behooves our voters to come out and give him a giant boost next Tuesday.

This area "fumbled the ball" last June in the senatorial runoff, simply by not voting. We have a chance to partially redeem ourselves for that error on November 6.

## FI Shows 38 Pct. Gain In Earnings

Friona Industries reported an increase of 38 per cent in net earnings on a 29 per cent sales gain for the first quarter of its 1985 fiscal year.

Net earnings of \$947,000, or 43 cents per share, on sales of \$85 million for the first quarter ended September 30, 1984, compared with net earnings of \$688,000 or 30 cents per share, on sales of \$66 million in the same quarter of the prior fiscal year.

"More Company-owned cattle sold at better profit margins contributed significantly to our improved profitability," said Ron Davenport, chairman, president and chief executive officer.

In the first quarter of the current fiscal year, the Company marketed about 43,400 head--41 per cent more--for an operating profit of \$830,000. During the same quarter of fiscal 1984, about 30,660 head were sold and resulted in an

operating loss of approximately \$8,000.

"All seven of the Company's industry segments achieved satisfactory profitability," explained Davenport. "In addition to Company-Owned Cattle, Custom Feeding and Transportation had higher operating profits than in last year's first quarter."

Custom Feeding benefitted from a 15 per cent increase in average occupancy at the Company's four feed yards. A larger volume of feed and grain hauled for outside customers was responsible for the Transportation segment's operating profit increase.

The Meat Processing and Distribution segment sold 18 million pounds of hamburger meat to an average of 916 Wendy's Old Fashioned Hamburger Restaurants in 15 states.

head coach of the Buffs, and he came to Canyon from Laredo Junior College.

As a collegiate player, and as an assistant and head coach, Moss has compiled a winning record of 80 per cent in 302 games.

In the past three years as head coach at Laredo Junior College, Moss' teams compiled an 80-14 won-lost mark, and last year they accomplished a feat that no other junior college team has ever done--the team was ranked number one nationally from the first poll through the last.

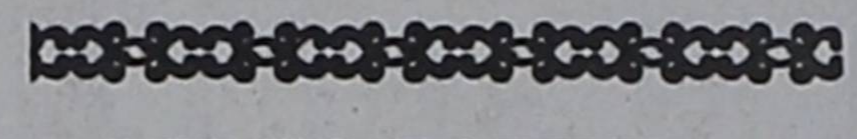
## Mrs. Hall's Rites Held

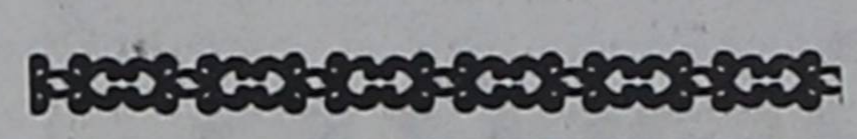
Burial was in the Friona Cemetery.

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## Letter To The Editor

To The Voters Of Parmer County: When we as Texas voters go to the polls to make our choices in the presidential and state elections, we will have an important opportunity to help our state colleges. That opportunity is Proposition 2, a proposed constitutional amendment.

Proposition 2 will make sure that our state-supported universities have the classrooms, libraries, labs and educational equipment they need with no increases in taxes! How is this possible? It's possible because Proposition 2 restructures the way that dedicated funds are divided up among our colleges. It would include all components of the University of Texas and Texas A&M System under the bonding program of the Permanent University Fund (PUF). This will save tax dollars because the PUF is supported by oil, gas and ranching leases on public lands rather than our tax dollars.

Also, it will create a new dedicated fund for all colleges outside the UT and Texas A&M Systems.

Proposition 2 will save tax dollars another way by allowing our colleges to use the new dedicated fund's bonding program to pay for repairs and

rehabilitation projects, instead of just new construction.

I believe Proposition 2 is a major step in the right direction--for our universities, their students, and us, the taxpayers. After studying this proposal, I hope you will decide it deserves your support on November 6.

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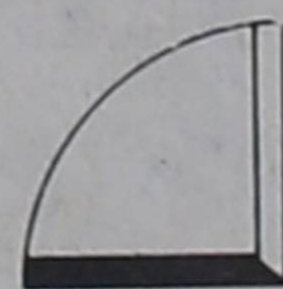

The movie was a comedy spoof on the science fiction horror films which were popular in the 1960s, as the film "Airplane" was a spoof to the many air disaster movies.

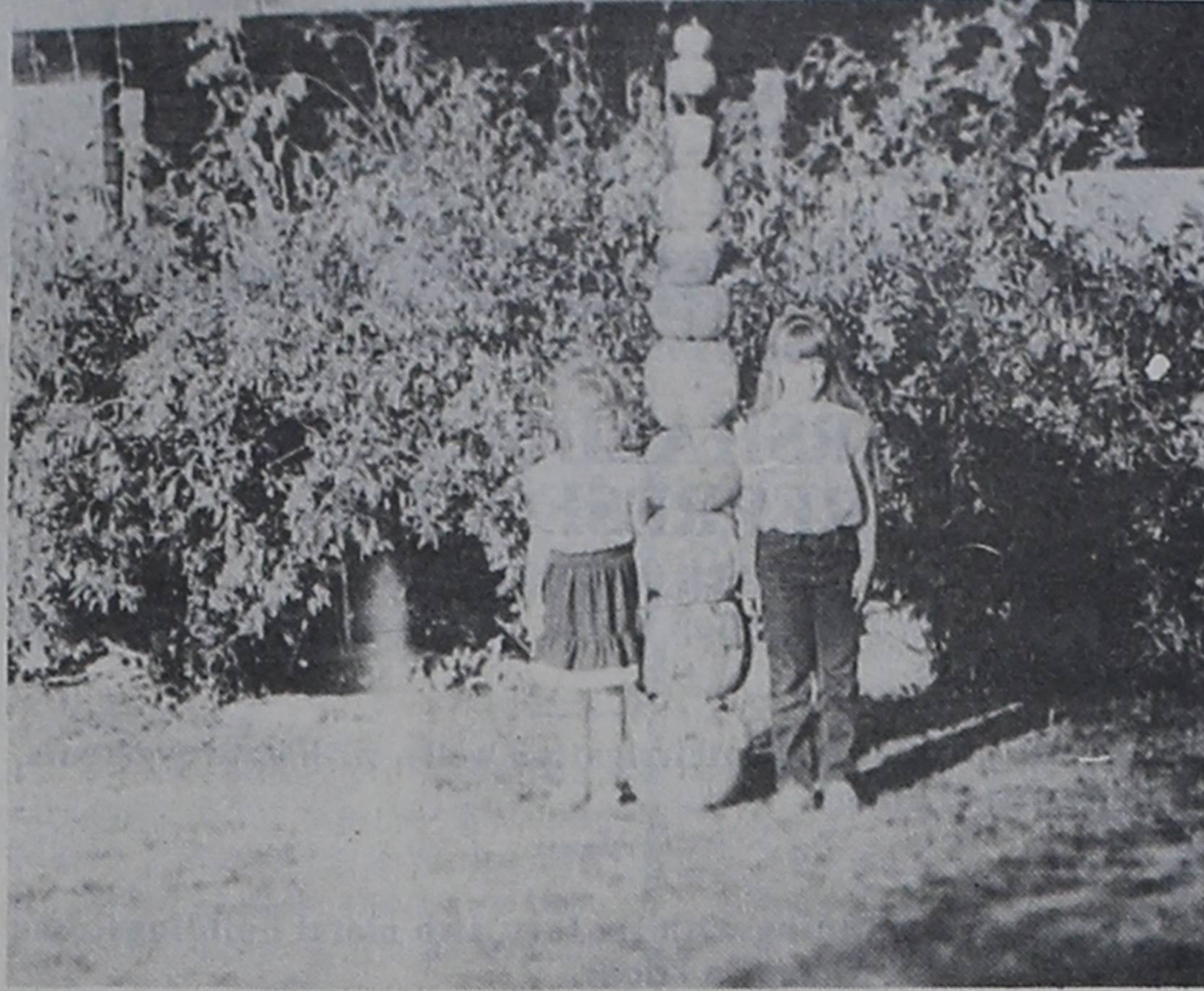

## Report Shows Less, And Smaller Farms

The number of small farms and the value of all agricultural product sales increased between the 1978 and 1982 agriculture censuses, preliminary data from the Commerce Department's Census Bureau shows.

Farms of less than 50 acres increased 17 per cent to 637,000, according to the 1982 census, conducted in 1983. Their growth helped to keep the total farm loss under 1 per cent, one of the smallest declines in recent decades. The new count is 2,241,000 compared with 2,257,000 in 1978.

At the other end of the scale, the number of farms with 2,000 acres or more rose by 1,224 between censuses to a total of 64,525.

The market value of agricultural products sold amounted to \$131.8 billion compared with \$107.1 billion in 1978, up 23 per cent. Average sales per farm grew to \$58,815 from \$47,424. Farms with sales of \$100,000 or more gained by 80,723 for a total of 302,964. The dollar figures have not been adjusted for inflation during the period. The Bureau points out that the Consumer Price Index (CPI), based on the costs of food and beverages, was up 35 per cent for food for the same period.

Livestock, dairy and poultry products in 1982 accounted for 53 per cent of sales, or \$69.5 billion; livestock alone brought in 33 per cent or \$43.5 billion. Other totals were dairy products, \$16.3 billion or 13 per cent; and poultry, \$9.7 billion or 7 per cent. Crop sales totaled \$62.3 billion, or 47 per cent of all sales; grain accounted for more than half.

Small farm growth was greatest in Texas, which saw an increase of 14,109 farms under 50 acres to 44,587. This was a 46 per cent gain from the 1978 census and small farms now account for one-fourth of the state's farms and ranches. Vermont's increase was 59 per cent, to 1,026.

The census data show that large operations continue to dominate sales and production. Here are some figures:

\*Only 1 per cent of farms sold 500 or more head of cattle and calves but they had 43 per cent of cattle sold.

\*Those selling 500 or more head of hogs totaled 16 per cent of farms selling hogs but captured 70 per cent of hogs sold.

\*Farms with 20,000 or more

hens and pullets comprised only 2 per cent of producers but had 79 per cent of inventories.

Other findings from the 1982 Census of Agriculture:

\*The farmland total of 984.8 million acres was down from 1 billion acres from 1978.

\*Harvested cropland was 326.3 million acres, up 3 per cent.

\*There was relatively little change in the number of acres irrigated between 1978 and 1982. This is against the background of an expansion in irrigation from 39.1 million to 49 million acres from 1969 to 1982. In that period, the West gained 14 per cent to 26.1 million acres, 8.5 million of it in California. The North Central Region's irrigation doubled, from 5.1 million to 10.9 million acres.

\*In acres harvested, wheat edged out corn, 70.9 million to 69.9 million. Soybeans increased from 61.3 million in 1978 to 64.8 million acres in 1982.

\*The milk cow total rose from 10.2 million to 10.9 million.

\*Broilers sold rose from 3.1 billion birds to 3.5 billion, but producer farms declined from 31,743 to 30,104.

## SIDS Program Set Nov. 8 In Clovis

A program on SIDS, Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, will be presented Thursday, November 8 from 6:30-10:30 p.m. in the Caduceus and Auxilian Rooms of Clovis High Plains Hospital.

Sponsored jointly by CHPH and Curry County Field Health Office, the program is designed for parents of SIDS victims, ministers who provide counseling for families of SIDS infants, and anyone interested in learning more about SIDS.

Speaker for the program is Beverly White, RN, MS, who works with the SIDS program at the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque.

SIDS is a major cause of death in infants after the first months of life, and it cannot be predicted or prevented. Commonly known as "crib death," this disease is not hereditary, and it is not contagious in the usual sense. Although a viral infection may be involved, it is not

a "killer virus" that threatens other family members or neighbors. SIDS seldom occurs after one year of age. There also appears to be no suffering; death occurs very rapidly, usually during sleep.

Virtually every parent feels responsible for the death of his child, until the facts are known. In thousands of cases much needless blame has been placed on one parent or the other because of a lack of knowledge about SIDS. To help alleviate some of these problems and to provide additional information about SIDS, Clovis High Plains Hospital and Curry County Field Health Office are encouraging area residents interested in SIDS to attend this free program.

This special project will consist of a donated Christmas tree with hand-made ornaments, made by Prairie Acres residents and anyone in the community who would like to make an ornament for the tree.

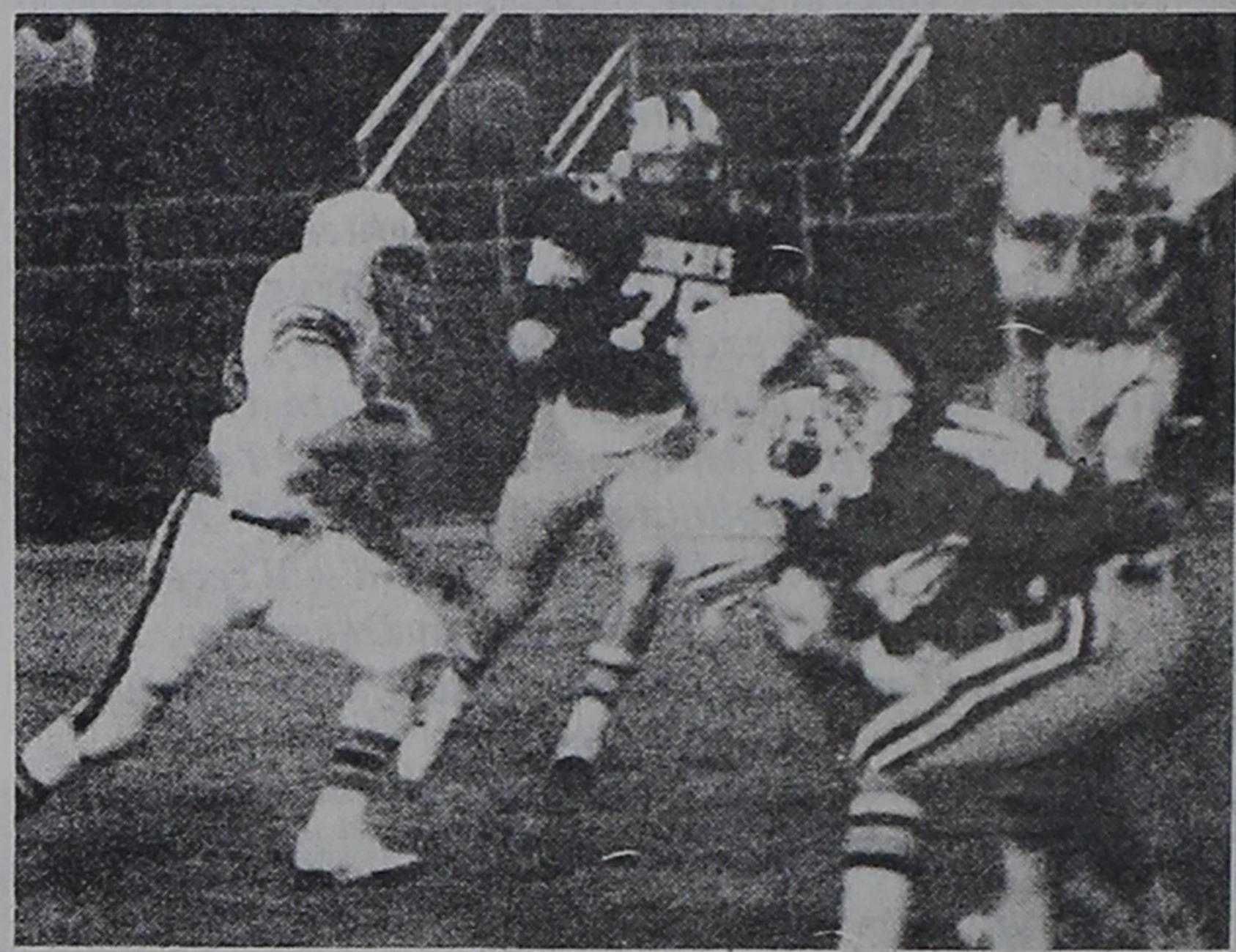
The tree and ornaments will be raffled off on December 3. All proceeds will be donated to individuals who would benefit from additional funds during this special time of the year.

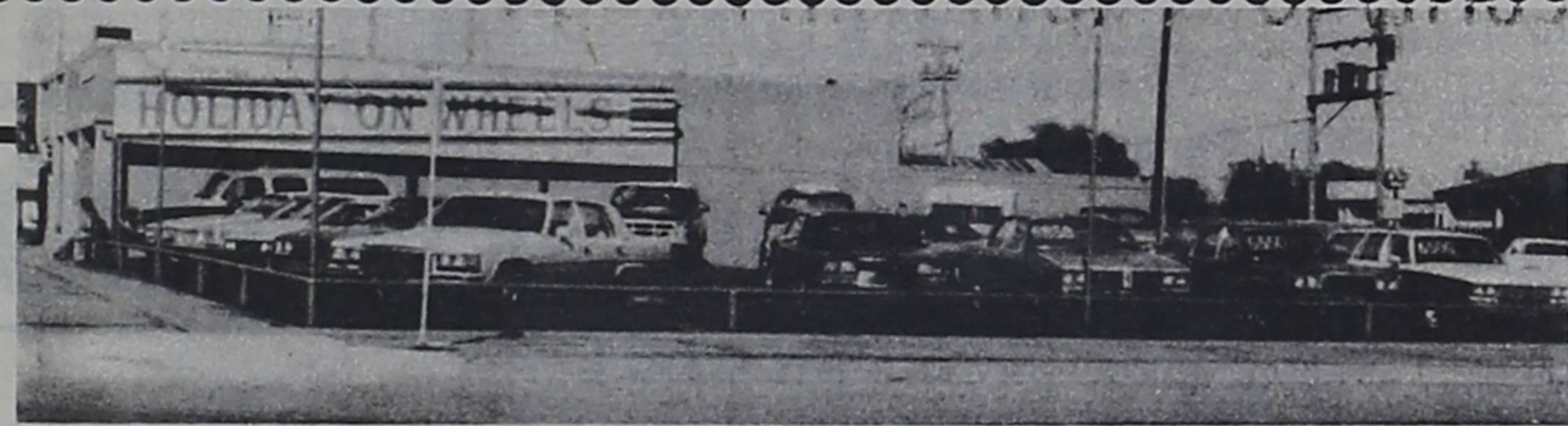

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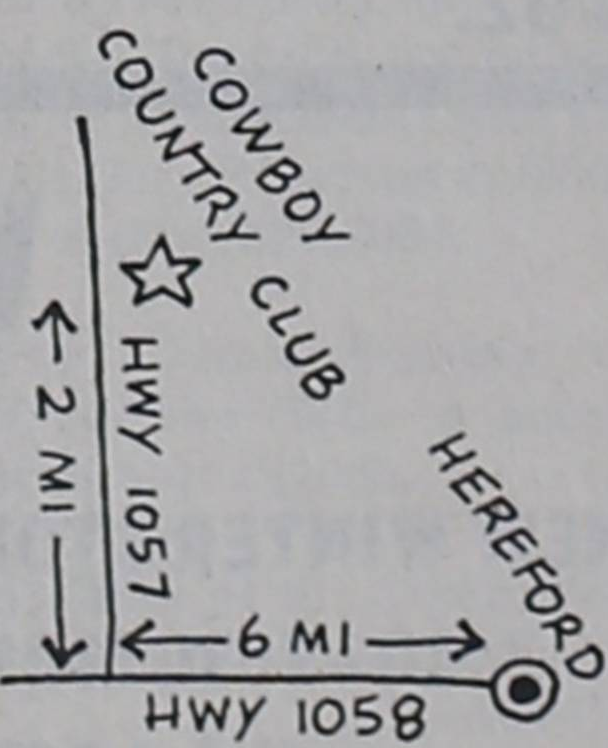

# Bobcats Borrow From Past In 3-0 Victory

The Dimmitt Bobcats borrowed a page from the past last Friday, when they ignored the predictions and instead relied on tradition, and scored a 3-0 win over the visiting Friona Chieftains.

Friona had the ball for five plays inside the Dimmitt ten yard line, including four plays from the Bobcat one, and came away without any points from the drive, and this failure to score cost Friona the game.

For the fifth game in a row, faulty snaps from center, this time on field goal tries, proved costly to the team. In addition, Friona received some very untimely penalty flags, one of which killed a promising drive, and another helped set up Dimmitt's field goal. But the series which came back to haunt the team was Friona's first possession. The team took over the ball at the Dimmitt 40 after a short (13-yard) punt gave them excellent field position early in the game.

Alfredo Mata, starting after missing three weeks due to an injury, gave the team a first down to the Dimmitt 28, and John Aguirre ripped 12 yards to the

zone when they took over on Friona's 29. Friona held and took control at their own 11-yard line.

Neither team threatened seriously the rest of the quarter, although Dimmitt tried a 49-yard field goal as the half ended, but the kick was wide and short.

Friona took the second half kickoff and seemed determined to get a scoring drive going.

They found themselves with fourth and needing a yard at midfield, and went for the yardage. Mata popped through the drawn-up line, and raced all the way to the Dimmitt 30. But a flag was dropped at the end of the play.

When Coach Tommy Moss questioned the meaning of the flag, he received another 15-yard penalty, and instead of being on Dimmitt's 30, the team was shoved all the way back to its own 30. This net loss of 40 yards was another severe blow to the team.

Friona was driving again later in the period. Mata's running gave the team first downs at the Dimmitt 39 and 15. Alfredo has crashed to the Dimmitt five, when another penalty moved the ball back to the 21-yard line.

On fourth down the team again lined up for a field goal try, but the snap went over everyone's head and Friona again came away scoreless.

Doug Moyer came in for a nifty 15-yard run, and John Aguirre duplicated this on the next play, as Friona moved to the Dimmitt 29, but this time a fourth down pass went incomplete to stall the drive. This came with 2:40 left in the game.

Friona held the 'Cats, and took over the ball at their own 38-yard line with just 58 seconds left on the clock.

Once again, they gave it their best effort. Barnett hit Rodney Allen for 16 yards and a first down to the Dimmitt 46.

Then John Aguirre caught a pair of passes, one being a great catch

Barnett fired a pass for the end zone, but opposing quarterback and defensive back Woody Glass was the nearest receiver. The Dimmitt star wrapped his arms around the ball, and that was the end of a frustrating night for the Chieftains, who led the game in every statistical department except for the one that counted.

Longtime Friona football fans just chalked the game up as a typical game when you play at Dimmitt--the only thing that changed was the details.

## COMBEST COMMENTS

### Cotton Prices and the '85 Farm Bill

Going into the '84 crop there was a realistic hope for good prices. At the time of sign-up it didn't look like there'd be much of a deficiency payment. The demand was there, surplus was low, and carry over stocks were at a level we could live with. So a lot of producers went outside the program.

This year cotton yields are good, not great, but better than the 330 averages we've been getting lately. But the price is not there. Consumer demand is off; mill demand is off. Cotton farmers are facing no demand this year and loan price; surplus next year and loan price. The base loan rate is 55.2 cents for the South Plains and we're lucky if our cotton will average 50 cents. Farmers can't put their cotton in a government loan and make a living at it.

Part of the reason for the low demand and low price is the high value of the dollar overseas. Also China has come into the market with 20 to 25 million bales taking over some of the markets we developed. We need additional export credits or restrictions so that when we develop a market it has to stay with us for a certain period of time.

I believe another reason is the \$50,000 payment limitation. With a 400 pound yield and a estimated deficiency payment of 19.8 cents in 1985, it only takes 631.3 acres to reach the payment limitation. That's not good

enough to encourage participation by a lot of family farms. We need to raise the limitations so more farms can participate and program controls will be more effective and fair for ever, one.

Also, the present method of figuring the deficiency payment is not fair to us. Market prices for California producers, who historically do not participate in the program as much as we do, drive the market price up and decrease deficiency payments for us. They benefit from receiving a higher price for their product and from our lower market price which increases the deficiency payment they would get otherwise. This is just not fair. We need to seriously consider setting market price on a regional basis so that our payment is based on a fair consideration of our market situation.

We need to do all we can get all the cotton belt producers going in the same direction and participating fairly in program. This year we made a good crop and look what happened. What's going to happen next year if we don't make a crop?

We can't afford to be pushed aside when the '85 Farm Bill is written. The administration has got to be made aware of the value of our production and participation in farm programs. We contribute more than our share and we deserve to have something directed towards us. Something that will help raise

our prices to a profitable level.

An effective farm bill must ensure that the price is going to be there. To do that we need more controls on production. It's better to raise 100 acres at a profit than 125 acres at a loss. And a loan is not the answer.

Next year's farm programs must address the price problems of the South Plains. Our future depends on it. I ask your support for Congress to see that this is done, to listen to your problems and suggestions and then to fight for your future when the next farm bill is written.

I farmed in West Texas for most of my life. I know our future depends not only on the weather but on the farm programs made in Washington. I know how hard it is for the family farmer to make a living today.

No one has all the answers, and I don't believe I can change things overnight; but, if elected, I will make the government aware of our critical problem of low prices. I will stand up for the interests of the South Plains when the farm bill is written. And I will meet with the Secretary and his staff before any farm program is written or announced and do everything I possibly can to see that it is fair and effective for West Texas.

I will represent you in Washington. I ask for your support on November 6th.

The local chapter's primary ongoing activity is service to military families. Many contacts are made for service men and women and their families in time of need--usually in times of illness or death of some family member.

The local chapter has also helped many children obtain eyeglasses, or other needed medical and dental help when no other source of funds was available. Funds for a needed trip to a doctor for elderly adults have also been provided when no other help was available.

Friona, and Parmer County, have been very fortunate that no

disaster, such as tornado, has occurred; but should such happen, the local chapter would be on the job to help, along with the national organization.

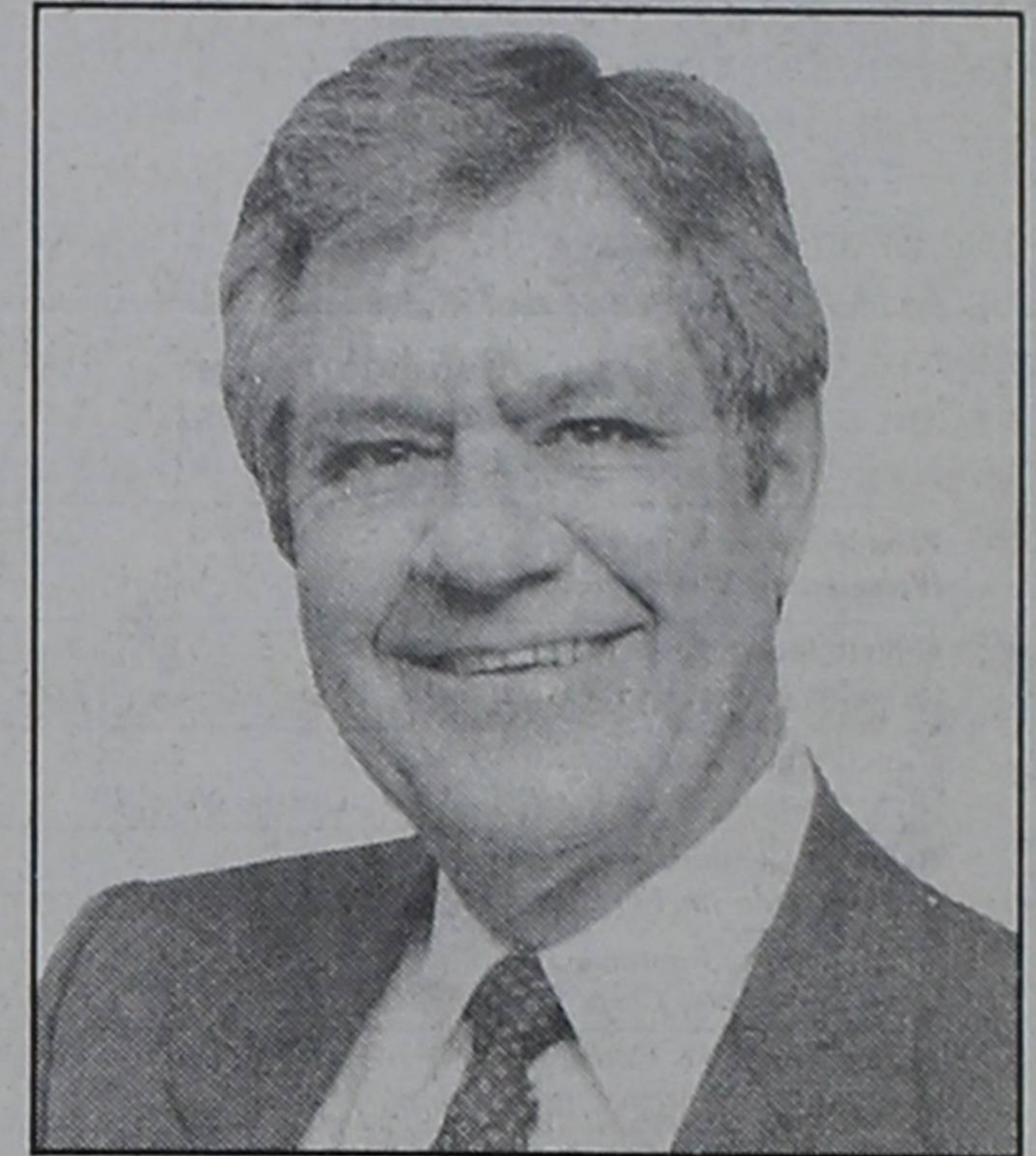
One-half of the funds received remain with the local chapter, and the other one-half goes to the American National Red Cross to be used for disaster relief--such as the hurricane which recently occurred on the Texas coast.
