WHAT HAS HAPPENED to the "Yellow Dog Democrats?"

In case you are not native to the area, there was a common saying in years gone by, that if a "yellow dog" ran for office on the Democratic ballot, most people in this area, or in Texas for that matter, would vote for him.

It's hard to realize that this type of voter would hold Walter Mondale in lesser esteem than a yellow dog, especially since his running mate was the first-ever woman to seek one of the nation's two highest offices.

No, it appears that there must have been other factors at work in last Tuesday's General Election.

Consider the fact that voters in the 13th Congressional District went against five-term officeholder Jack Hightower (a Democrat), and elected a virtual unknown.

Also, in our own 19th Congressional District, voters had the choice between Don Richards, who had considerable experience in Washington, to Republican Larry Combest. They opted for the Republican.

It used to be that voters in Texas, and particularly in this region of the state, when they gave their majorities for a Republican president (such as Eisenhower, Nixon, and even on Reagan's first term), would still "cross over" on their voting and vote for Democrats on the state and district level (more of the "yellow dog" syndrome?).

Not so in 1984. Not even close. So, what has happened to the Democratic party, to cause longtime voters to desert it in droves?

In states such as Michigan and Pennsylvania, where blue-collar workers are in the majority, and where the unions have a lot of power, you would have expected the Mondale-Ferraro ticket to have at least slowed down the Reagan landslide, but it didn't happen.

Some spokesmen for the Democrats, particularly on the local and county level, blame the new ultra-liberal factions which have "adopted" the Democratic party with the resounding defeat the party suffered last Tuesday, equally as much as the popularity of President Reagan.

These factions include the various "minority" groups, such as the black segment, the Spanish bloc, the women's rights segment, and the gay-rights group.

These various segments have been much in evidence at recent state and national Democratic conventions, and they never fail to expound the "You support us and we'll support you" theory in getting included in all of the party's doings.

A lot of rank and file Democrats apparently have decided that they don't necessarily need to support any of these groups when casting their votes. In fact, voters who might otherwise have felt obliged to one or more of the factions must have felt the same way.

Many longtime Democrats seem to have been saying, "We didn't leave the Democratic party--but the party left us," according to their actions and votes in the recent election.

Merchants Asked To Decorate

Last year during the Christmas season, Friona's downtown area lost its Christmas lights, due to a new city ordinance which rendered the city's holiday lights unsafe.

This year, in an effort to beef up the holiday decor in the downtown area, merchants are being urged to light their buildings.

The special Christmas lights have been made available to merchants at a reduced price, from Bi-Wize Drug and White's Auto.

Virginia Jennings and Joe Mejia have been visiting merchants both on Main Street and Highway 60, asking them to participate in the lighting venture.

"We want to find out if the merchants themselves want to take part in this program," Mejia said. Those business people who cannot put up the lights themselves have been offered some manpower from the City of Friona.

The lighting of the Community Christmas Tree has been scheduled for December 3, and merchants who decorate for the Christmas season will be asked to turn on their lights at the same time.

A local give-away program also is in the works, with merchants planning promotions in their individual stores. Drawings for door prizes will be held at the tree ceremony.

Jack Clark Wins Event Second Time

Jack Clark, one of the longtime veterans in the Friona Star football contest, said he was "needing to make up some ground," going into the tenth week of the annual contest.

That's just what Clark did. He

gained five points on the overall leader, and more than that on most of the field. His score of 20 earned Clark first place in the contest for the second time this year.

Once again, a tie game, Roswell vs Carlsbad, caused every entrant to get one automatic "miss" on the slate of games. Otherwise, Clark just missed three games in capturing the weekly first prize.

So far did Clark outdistance the field that the second place winner for the week, Jerry Bentley, had 18 games right--and he was the only other contestant to correctly pick that many games.

R.L. Blakely of Hereford took third place. He was one of six contestants to correctly pick 17 contest games, and took the third cash prize on the basis of his tie-breaker score prediction on the Friona-Littlefield game.

(One contest game was listed in error--the Notre Dame-Penn State game, which isn't played until this current weekend. All contestants were given a "right" score on this game.)

Clark's only "real" misses were Texas-Houston (which caught most of the contestants); WTSU-Drake and New York Jets-Indianapolis Colts. He correctly picked the Rams over Chicago, Tampa Bay over the Giants, and the Cowboys over St. Louis, three pro games which caused most of the contestants a lot of headaches.

In the race for grand prize, a three-way tie developed at the top, with Mike Field, Tommy Moss and Kent Patterson all deadlocked with scores of 165.

Bruce Patterson and R.L. Blakely are next with scores of 164, and next comes Rick Tullis at 163.

Community Service Is Slated Sunday

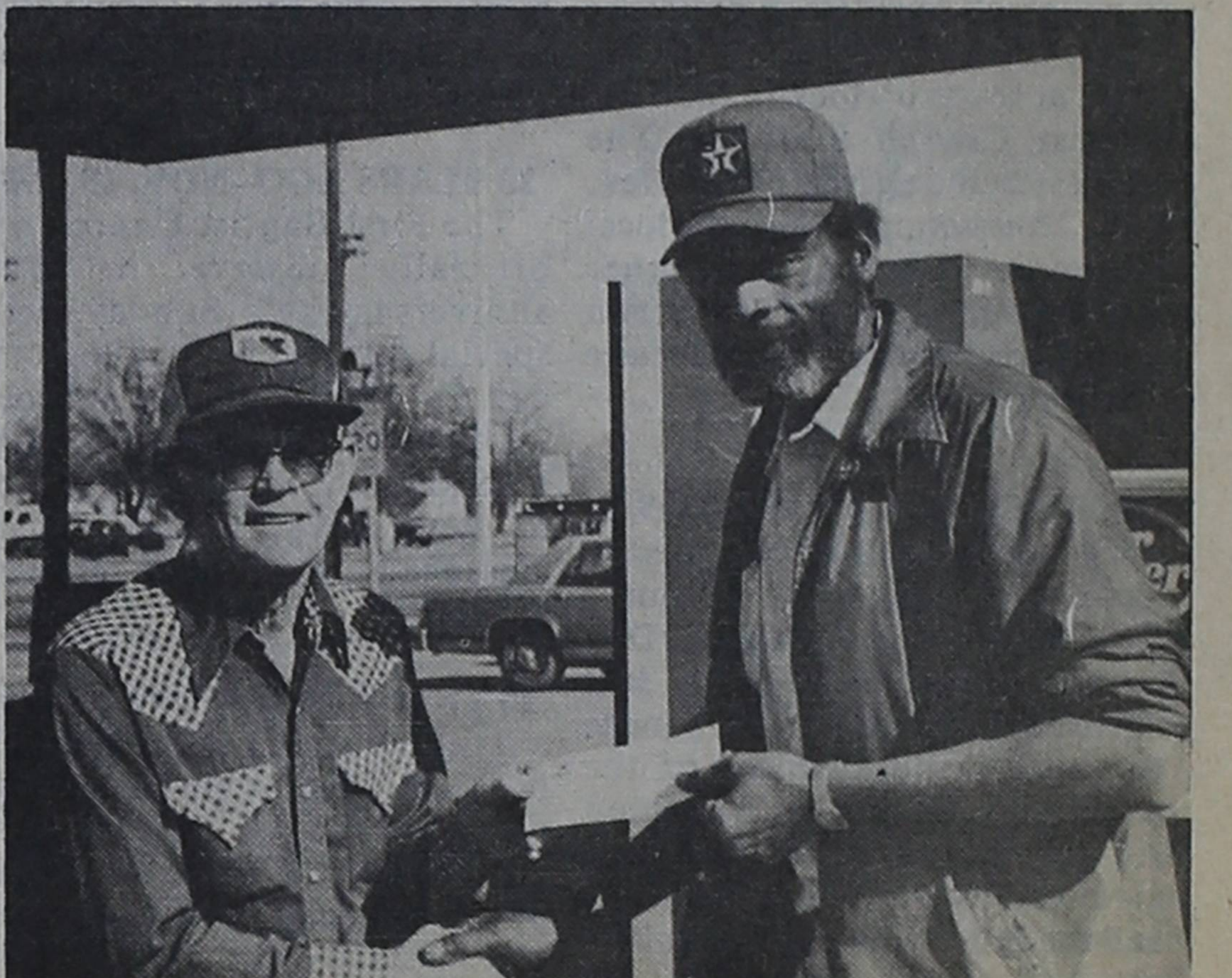

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

...from the files of The Friona Star

55 YEARS AGO--NOV. 22, 1929

Street commissioner F.W. Reeve has a force of men with tractors and teams employed loosening and removing the dirt along Main Street from the places where it is too high to the low places, thus making it of an even grade in all places. It is Mr. Reeve's plan to thus level the street thus make it perfectly smooth, with grader and drag and thus get rid of the bumps and chuck-holes and allow the water which falls to be carried away by the gutters. Then it is planned to treat the entire business portion of the street with a thick covering of caliche and give it a thorough packing, followed probably with a coat of tarvia or some cheap oil filter. If this can be done, Friona's Main Street will be in A-1 condition and should last several years.

50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 23, 1934

The annual Thanksgiving service in which all our Friona churches unite, will be held next Thursday night at seven o'clock in the First Baptist Church building. The address will be given by the Rev. H.L. Thurston, pastor of the local Methodist Church. All other ministers in the city will share in the services, and appropriate music will be provided.

45 YEARS AGO--NOV. 17, 1939

The nicest parade, perhaps, to have ever traversed Friona's streets, was the Armistice Day parade, that was given last Saturday afternoon. The parade was under the auspices of the American Legion and Legion Auxiliary and sponsored and arranged by these organizations and the Entertainment Committee of the local Chamber of Commerce.

40 YEARS AGO--NOV. 17, 1944

Just as the Chiefs were getting ready to play their last game of the season and pack their suits away, they found themselves in a tie for the district championship. The Chiefs defeated the Tulia Hornets earlier in the season, and then fell

to the Hereford Whitefaces. Tulia, then, stinging from the defeat handed them by the Chiefs, ran roughshod over the Hereford eleven. This makes Hereford and Friona all even, and Tulia still has a game to play with Dalhart, and could make it a three-way tie.

35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 18, 1949

Don Edwin Lewis, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lewis of Friona, will be the featured soloist on the Co-op round-up radio program over Station KFDA, Amarillo, on Saturday. Young Lewis will sing two songs, "The Old Refrain" and "When Irish Eyes Are Smiling."

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 19, 1954

Organization of a local credit association Tuesday evening became a reality for Parmer County. The Friona Texas Federal Credit Union now chartered, completed organization at an open meeting in the Friona Legion Hall, with all supervisory personnel elected.

20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 19, 1964

The First Baptist Church will officially observe its 50th anniversary this Sunday, with special services throughout the day. Former pastors and members will be the speakers for the occasion. Rev. Russell Pogue, now of Petersburg, will bring the message at the Sunday morning service.

15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 20, 1969

Tragedy struck the community of Friona another blow during the past week, as two city teenagers died following a wreck a mile west of town. Becky Broyles, 14, was killed instantly, and Billy Rushing, 15, died Tuesday, after the car in which they were riding went out of control about 11 p.m. last Saturday night. Investigating officers said the right front tire on the 1967 Ford LTD blew out, causing the car to turn over. The vehicle skidded some 250 feet. Both occupants were thrown out of the car.

10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 17, 1974

The cotton harvest season was kicked off here Friday when Jean K. Anthony brought a bale in to Friona Farmers Co-op Gin, the gin's first bale of 1974 cotton. The first bale weighed an even 500 pounds, and yielded 760 pounds of seed. The turnout averaged 26.1 per cent.

The Friona Area United Fund drive stood at 46.5 per cent completed as of Thursday, it was announced by Don Gatlin, general chairman of the 1974 drive. Amount deposited to the fund at Friona State Bank amounted to \$3,301.15.

5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 18, 1979

County Judge Paul Fortenberry, who had three years remaining on a new four-year term of office, tendered his resignation this week to the Commissioners' Court, effective December 31, 1979.

Vandalism and thefts affected the local area again during the past week. They hit the Richard Lupton farm, 12.3 miles southeast of Friona on FM 2397, breaking windows in a John Deere combine and a cotton stripper, flattened tires on the cotton stipper and knocked a carburetor off an irrigation well near the implements. Damage was estimated at \$3,456 by the farmer. Three vehicles belonging to Bruegel Bros. Gin, about a half-mile away from the implements, had their windshields and mirrors smashed.

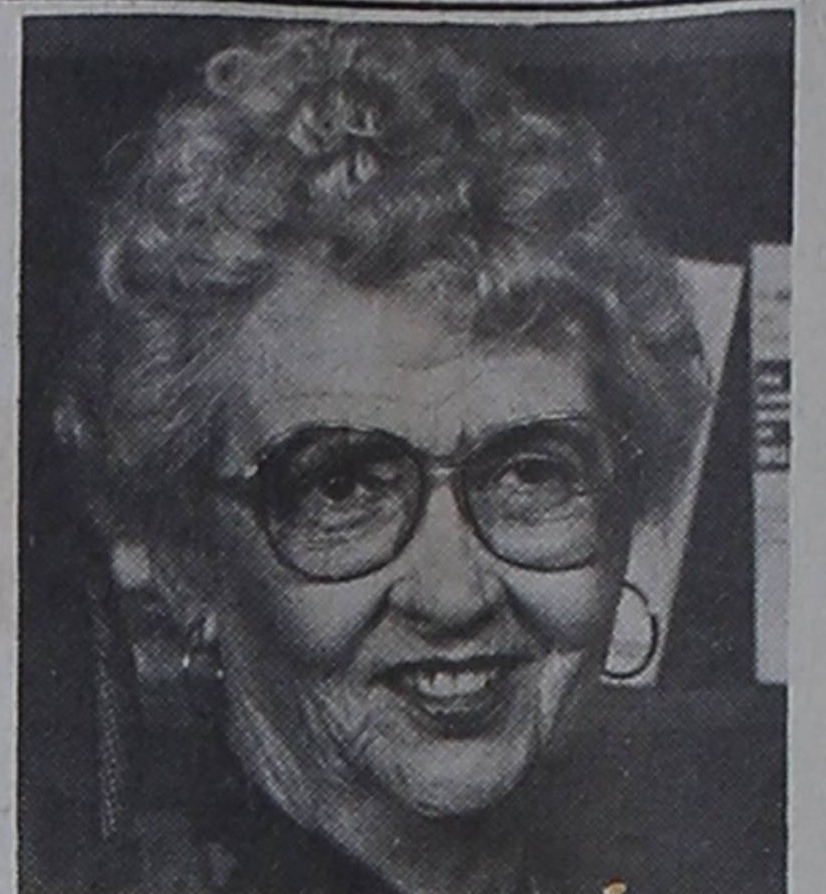
Mass was celebrated at 10 a.m. Monday in St. Joseph Catholic Church in Slaton with the Rev. Larry Hemp, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Englewood Cemetery in Slaton under the direction of Englund's Funeral Service.

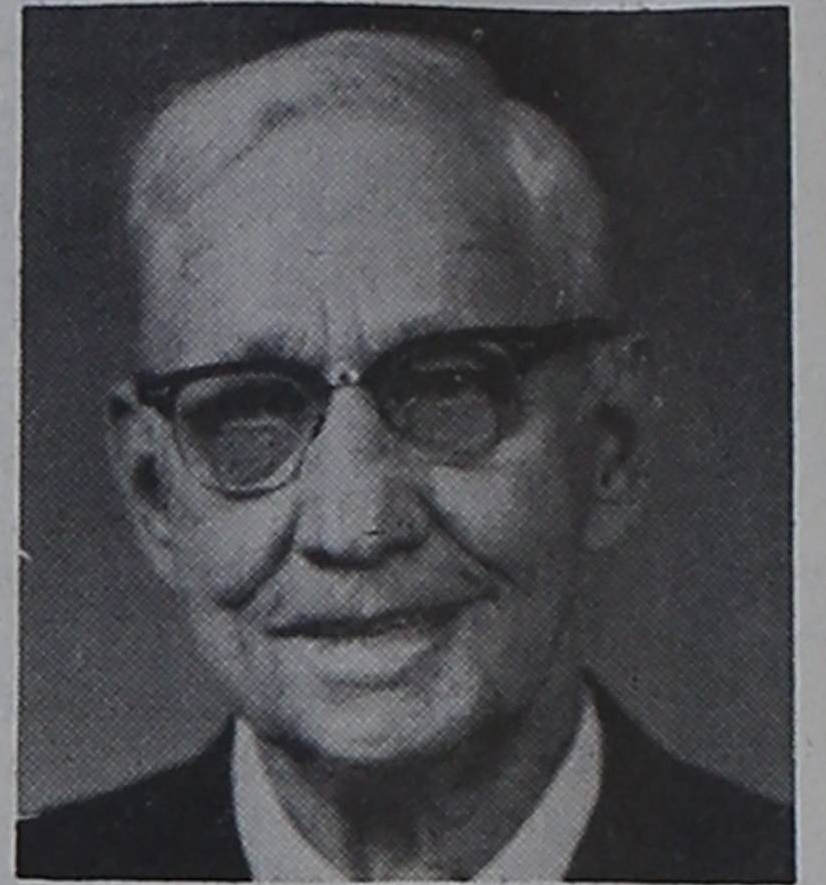
Schilling died Friday morning in his home. Justice of the Peace Arvin Stafford ruled natural causes in the death.

JV Falls To 'Cats By 6-0

The Friona junior varsity Chieftains ran into some bad luck in the form of turnovers in their final season game against Littlefield, and their 6-0 loss to the Wildcats cost them the district title.

Friona moved the ball well throughout the game, and led in first downs, 10-9.

But three pass interceptions and a lost fumble proved costly to the JVs.

Friona enjoyed good field position during the first half, and were moving the ball well. They got inside the 20 in the second quarter, only to lose the ball without scoring.

Littlefield scored the game's only touchdown on a 55-yard run in the second quarter.

Jimmy Williams gained 52 yards on 12 carries; Peter Malouf had 92 yards on seven carries, and Shy Burney had 13 yards on six tries.

Patches Fleming was zero for four in passing, and punted for a 34-yard average.

Coach Lynn Weiland said the team didn't play quite as well overall as it had the previous couple of games.

He singled out middle linebacker Malouf for a good defensive game, along with Burney, Fleming, Darron Nash, and Rod Britting, the secondary, which kept Littlefield from completing a pass all night.

Tracy Carthel and Jerry McDowell, guards, played well, as they have all season on the sweep plays, Weiland said.

The junior varsity finished their season with a 5-4 record, and 4-2 in district, winding up in second place.

Powerful Wildcats Shut Out Chieftains

Just for the record, the Friona Chieftains won the toss of the coin last Friday night at Littlefield. The coin flip was about the only thing that went in Friona's favor all night.

The Littlefield Wildcats, putting the finishing touches on a perfect 9-0 season and tuning up for the Class AAA playoffs, blanked the Chieftains, 46-0 in the season wrap-up game for the Chiefs.

Also worth noting: Friona held the Wildcats to just 12 points in the first quarter. The previous week, Littlefield had blasted off to a 31-0 lead against Muleshoe in the first period.

After taking the opening kickoff, Friona ran three plays, found themselves entrenched on their own six-yard line, and had to punt.

Rick Barnett was rushed; the ball went off the side of his foot out of bounds at the 11-yard line, and Littlefield had the greatest of field position.

However, the Friona defense played probably their best series at this point, allowing the potent Wildcats only five yards in three tries, and Littlefield had to settle for a field goal, and a 3-0 lead at the 8:36 mark of the quarter.

On Friona's next possession, the Chieftains completed a pass, Barnett to Brent Gatlin, for 14 yards, but due to a loss, it brought up fourth and one at their own 33.

The team lined up to punt, but Barnett got one of those "sky snaps" which has plagued the team this season. He opted to chase down the ball, and ran it into the end zone for a safety. That produced the unusual score of Littlefield 5, Friona 0 with 7:08 left in the quarter.

Friona got a break on the free kick, when Littlefield's David Estrada had the ball popped out of his hands, Friona recovering at their 42. But again the Chiefs could not move the ball, and had to punt.

At least this time Barnett was able to punt the ball, and his booming 48-yard kick backed the Wildcats up to their own 11.

Here came Steve Greene and Company. They covered the 89

yards in eight plays, Greene going the last 30 for the touchdown. The kick made the score 12-0, as the first quarter wound down.

The second quarter was again the Steve Greene Show. The 200-pound tailback dashed 75, four and 55 yards for Littlefield touchdowns. Two of the scores were accomplished after Wildcat interceptions of Barnett passes. The 'Cats converted after each touchdown.

Meanwhile Friona didn't have a first down in the game until late in the period, when Barnett threw a screen pass to Gatlin, who battled his way 16 yards to the 39. Friona never made it to the mid-field stripe in the first half, and had minus yards rushing at the intermission.

The Wildcats held a 33-0 lead at halftime.

As if to add to Friona's misery, the wind shifted to the north midway through the second quarter, and the rest of the game was played in a howling north wind, which also played havoc with the two bands' halftime performances.

Brad Moyer, who replaced a shaken-up Alfredo Mata in the second half, came on to give the team a big boost with his running.

Moyer ripped off runs of 28, 10, 12 and 15 yards, giving Friona its first yardage on the ground all night. The only thing which broke up a possible scoring drive was that Moyer was separated from the ball after one of his runs. Littlefield claimed the ball, and set out on a 64-yard scoring drive of their own, Greene getting his fifth TD of the season.

To Friona's credit, the Chieftains held the Wildcats scoreless in the third quarter.

After Leroy Mercado had a good kickoff return, Moyer's running sparked the team as they moved the ball into Wildcat territory for the first time, to the 35-yard line. But on a third down play, Barnett suffered his fourth interception, and that stopped that Friona drive.

Littlefield drove for its final touchdown with reserve quarterback Lloyd Champion in the game, along with sophomore Steve Lair, who replaced Greene and dashed 46 yards for the TD.

The 'Cats missed their final point try, which was one of the few things they did wrong in the game, for a 46-0 score that turned out to be all the scoring.

Greene had entered the game needing 313 rushing yards to reach the 2,000-yard mark for the season. He made his goal with 38 yards to spare, gaining 349 yards on 39 carries, scoring five touchdowns in the process. For his performance, the Wildcat star was named "player of the week" by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, for all classifications.

When you consider the fact that going into the game, Friona was giving up an average of only 96 yards rushing per game against its first nine opponents, and is rated in the top five defensive teams in the region, Greene's performance takes on even more significance.

"Littlefield is a great football team. I've coached in 5A, and they're as good a team as you'll see at any classification. Plus, they played their best game of the year against us," said Coach Tommy Moss in reflecting about the game.

"We made some early mistakes, and then those three quick touchdowns just before the half just killed us. Thankfully, they will be graduating several members of their team this year," Moss added.

Early in the second quarter, with Littlefield holding a 12-0 lead, Chieftain safety John Aguirre intercepted a Littlefield pass at his own five and returned it to the 40-yard line. It took the Wildcat quarterback, the last man Aguirre had to beat, to knock him out of bounds. A Friona TD at this point could have made the score 12-7, and most important, given the team field position and a little momentum.

"That could have made some difference, especially at that point in time," Moss reflected.

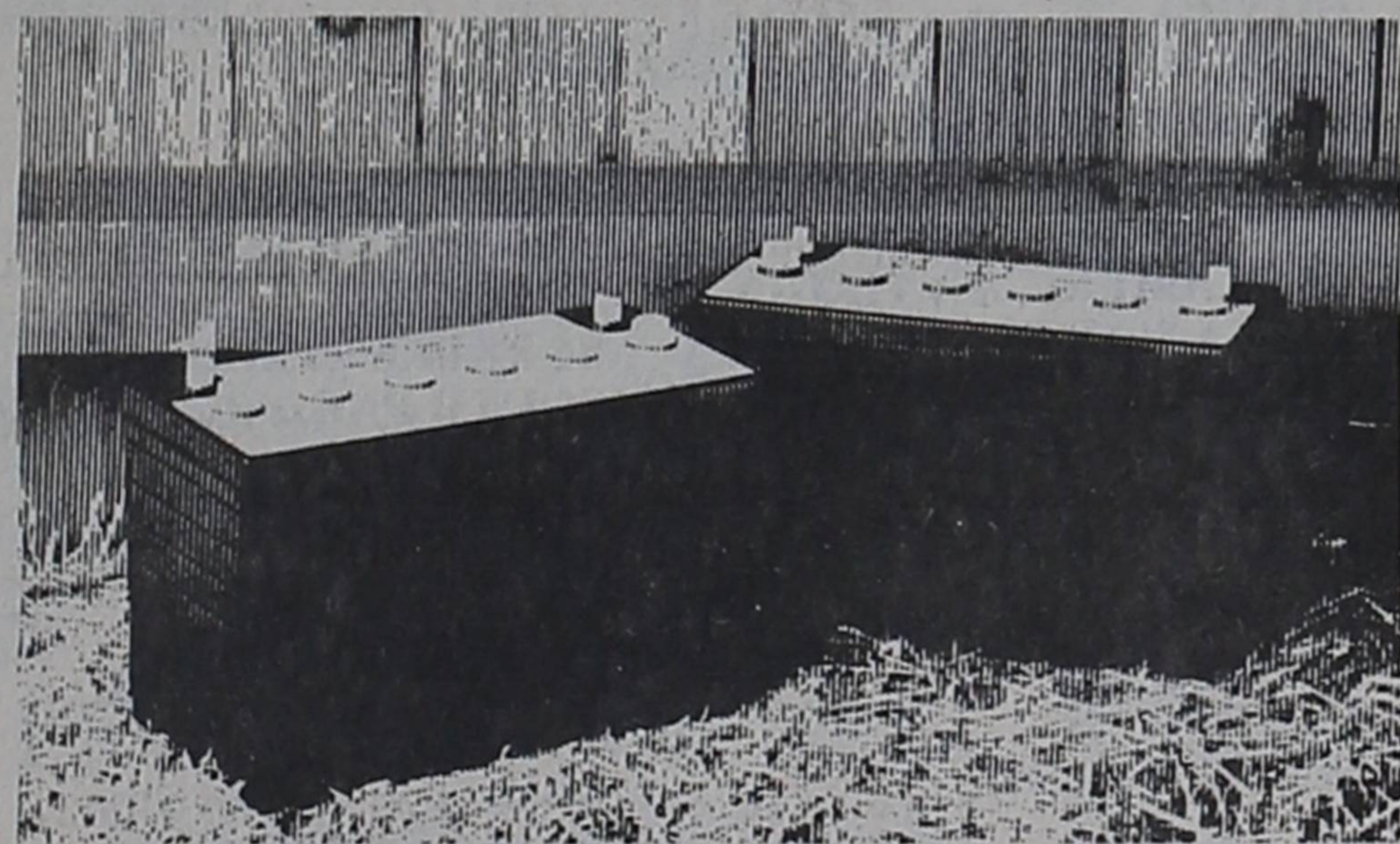

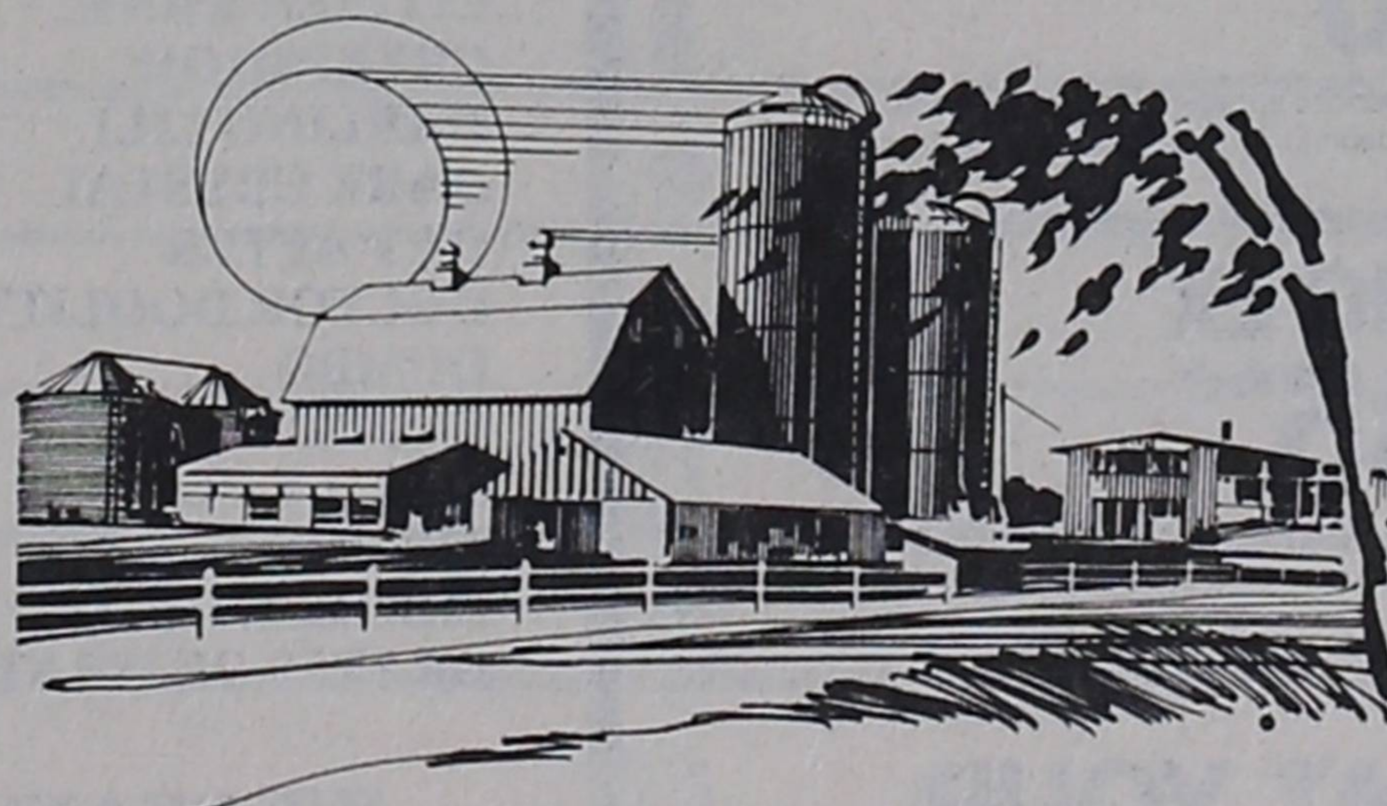

two years of nurturing before I could really make any headway with a child. But finally, I began to be aware of a few simple concepts that made me think maybe it was all worthwhile after all.

"Perhaps I can best explain it, if you will try a little experiment. Think of a single most vividly memorable, happy experience you can recall from your early childhood. If you are like 99 percent of us, that entire "happening" occupied a duration of only a few moments, or a few hours at most.

"And yet it is the one thing that we remember above all else. When I hold a four-year-old foster daughter in my lap, and look into her deep blue eyes, and say, "Gee, you're a beautiful, sweet girl," and give her a big hug, how long does it take for the joyful emotion to well up inside her? Certainly not two years. In the twinkling of an eye. And who knows for how many years she will carry the good feelings, born in the intimacy of that fleeting moment?

"You can't have mountaintop experiences if you are never allowed to visit the mountain. When a child stays with you for three months, that can be three months of at least visiting the mountain: That's why it's so important to expose our foster children to as much of the world around them as possible.

"It may be the only exposure they ever get as children. Yes, in a few short months they may go back to the same isolated, non-stimulating environment they came from.

"But they can go back far more enriched than they would have been had they never had their few months in your home. And if they never, in their childhood, have the opportunity to visit the mountain again, they may well think, 'That's OK. I've already been there, and it was great!'"
