Armyworms & Greenbugs Found In County Small Grain Fields



Greenbugs are a species of aphids that suck sap and inject toxins into small grain plants. Greenbugs - as the name implies - are green in fields during the warm part of the day.

Both of these insects can be controlled with proper use of insecticide; Insecticide recommendations are made in Bulletin MP-339, Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Mites on Small Grain, available from the local County Extension office in Baird.


