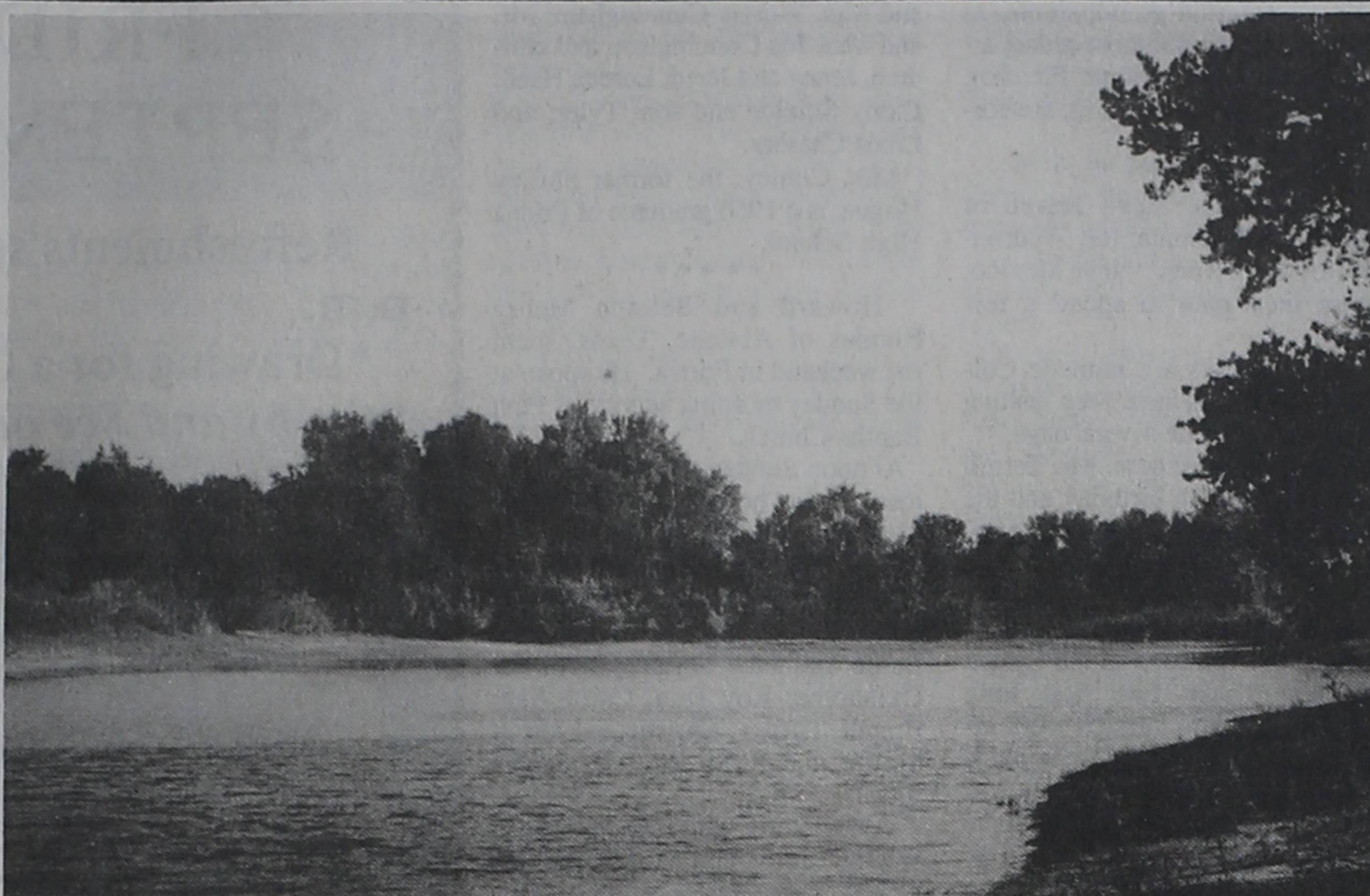

## New Law Affects Vehicles

In September, the simple matter of registering a motor vehicle in Texas will become a little more complicated.

The change is a result of insurance reform enacted by the 72nd Legislature.

Beginning September 1, the owner of a motor vehicle must submit current proof of financial responsibility with an application for initial registration, renewal of registration, or transfer of registration. This new requirement is a must, regardless of whether registration is accomplished in person or by mail.

The most common evidence of financial responsibility is a liability insurance card issued to the policy holder by the insurance company. Examples of other types of acceptable proof include insurance policies and binders, pool coverage documents and certificates of self-insurance, bond, etc.

The original or a photocopy of the evidence will satisfy the requirement for proof of financial responsibility. All original documentation will be returned.

Questions about proper evidence of financial responsibility may be directed to your automobile insurance company, your local County Tax Assessor-Collector, or to the local Division of Motor Vehicles Regional Office.

## Co. Officials Given Raises

Parmer County employees and elected officials were given a raise in the 1991 proposed salary schedules, in a split vote by the commissioners in a recent meeting.

The salary increase will amount to five per cent for employees and seven per cent for elected officials, and a dollar amount of \$52,000 in the budget.

Voting for the motion were commissioners Robert White and Tom Ware, with commissioners Ernest Anthony and Raymond McGehee opposed. County Judge Bonnie Clayton broke the tie with a favorable vote.

"With all the objection I've heard about elected officials voting themselves raises, I wasn't about to vote in favor of this increase," commented Commissioner Anthony of Friona.

In other matters on the agenda, two bids were awarded to Friona Motors for dump trucks for Precincts 2 and 4. The bid was \$44,975 for the truck for Precinct 2, and \$44,496.17 for the truck for Precinct 4.

The other bid received on the trucks was by a Lubbock firm that had a used truck for sale.

Bids were also opened as per the recent legal notice for repairing 1.5 miles of pavement running north from FM 1731 to West Plains Feed Yard in Precinct 1. Parmer County and the feed yard share equally in the cost of this project.

Successful bidder was Appian Construction of Hereford with a low bid of \$14,474. This was more than \$5,000 below the other bid received, from Liphram Construction Co. of Aspermont.

A proposal by Friona Independent School District to use part of their funds from the Permanent School monies in the amount of \$30,258.62 was approved. The money is to be used to make improvements to the junior high fieldhouse in Friona.

A motion was passed to pay \$3534 for foster children care in Parmer County.

Approval was given for uniform allowances for Bob Davis and Randy Geries.

The commissioners canvassed and approved the results of the Constitutional Amendment election August 10. A total of 215 county voters voted in favor of Amendment #1, with 210 against. The second proposal was defeated locally, 256-170.

Soil conservation work was approved, when machines were in the area and not needed otherwise, for Nick Collier and Mike Riethmayer.

## School Enrollment Increases

Enrollment in Friona schools showed an increase of 37 students over the first week of 1990, according to Superintendent of Schools Hal Ratcliff.

The primary school showed a gain of six students, 242-236; elementary was up by 17, 397-380; junior high gained by 18, 276-258, while high school fell off by four students, 314-318.

Total first week enrollment was 1229, up from the total of 1192 a year ago. Third grade is the largest grade with 105 students. There were 104 in kindergarten, 99 in fifth grade, 97 in second grade and 97 in second grade. Fourth grade registered 96 students, with grades six and seven having 93 each.

The enrollment is expected to continue to rise somewhat until after Labor Day.

## School Sets Tax Rate

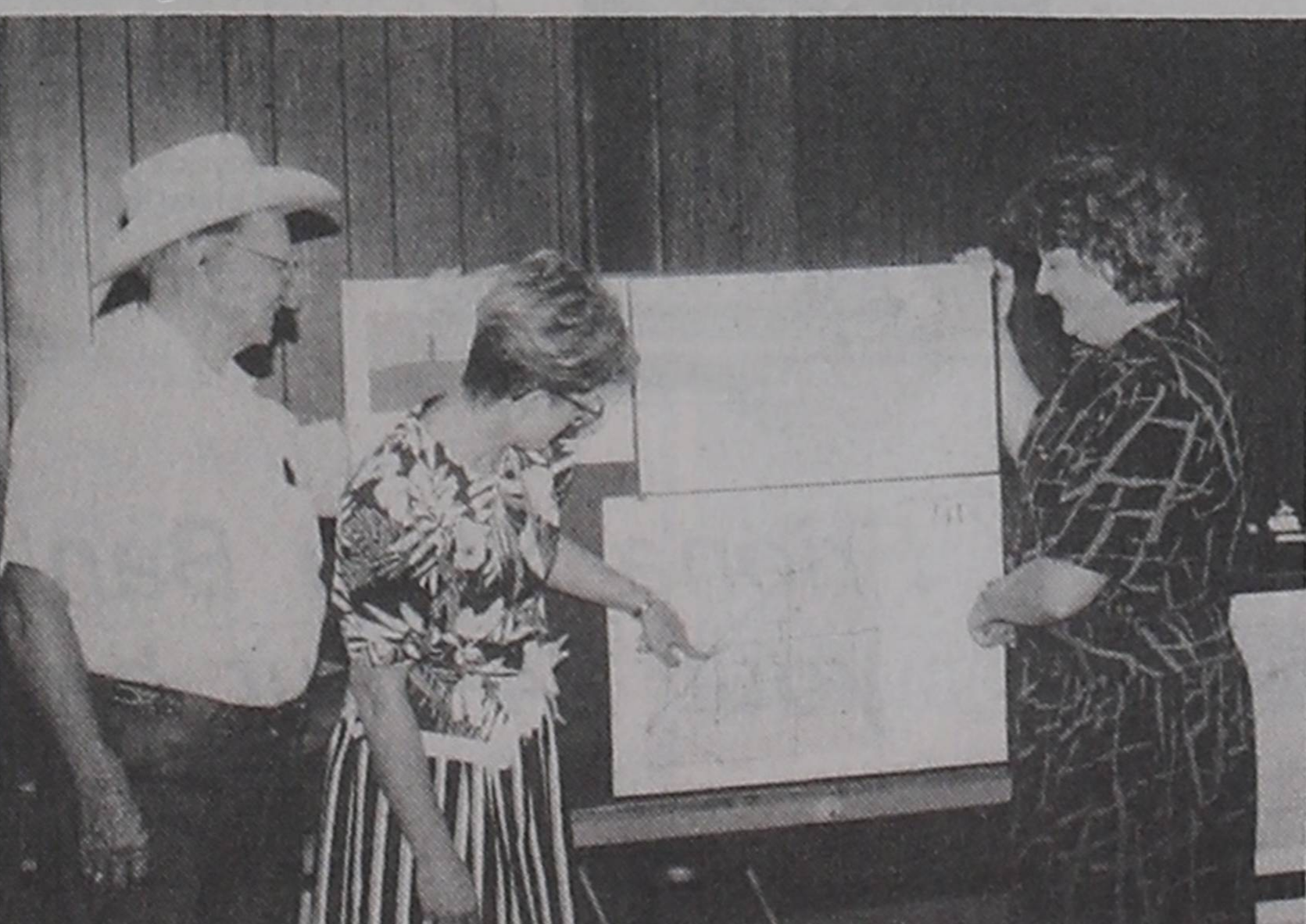
The Friona ISD Board of Trustees adopted the 1991-92 school budget, and set its tax rate at a special meeting on August 27.

The local budget will be \$5,120,330, a 3.8 per cent increase over last year. The tax rate will be set at 16 cents per \$100 value, the lowest amount necessary to cover the 1991-92 bond payment of \$239,000.

Combined with the County Education District, the overall rate will be 88.5 cents per \$100. This amounts to about an 8.5 per cent increase.

The board of trustees of the Parmer County Education District met August 27 for a public hearing on the 1991-92 CED budget.

The board adopted a CED tax rate of .725 per \$100 value for the 1991-92 school year.

# Killing The Spirit Of The Child "Why Their Fathers?"

Why do fathers sexually abuse their children? One out of 100 women will be sexually abused by their fathers before they reach 18 years of age.

A 37-year-old man's story starts out this way. The husband and wife are dependant on each other. Strained communication develops between him and his wife. The wife is hospitalized. This causes the 11-year-old girl to step into her mother's role.

He says, "She took care of us all. I loved her and she loved me. I'd sit and watch television and she would snuggle up next to me. I began to fondle her. Then it got to be more." He said that he would quit for a few months, because he knew it was harming the girl, but it would always start up again.

In these cases, the child victim is set up at an early age. These children become little adults. One woman said, "It was as if she was a spectator, sitting on a shelf, watching other children at play. Stolen is their childhood."

All types of people molest their children. The ethnic and economic breakdowns of families conform to the overall population. The average

offender is white, he is a professional or skilled blue collar worker. While basically middle-class, they are not involved in the community. They lack an extended family. They are isolated.

There is no typical offender. Some of the characteristics that many sexual offenders share are:

- (1) A rigid and authoritarian background. The man makes every decision.
- (2) Heavy alcohol use. One-third of sexual assaults involve use of alcohol by the offender. The offender uses alcohol as an excuse to abuse, the alcohol does not cause the abuse.
- (3) Someone who was abused as a child seems more likely to abuse as an adult.
- (4) Men who batter their wives will frequently abuse their children as well, often sexually. They may also sexually assault other children.
- (5) Loners. Someone with difficulty relating to people of the same age.

Be aware that none of these are certain indicators of danger to the child. "The best protection for the child is knowledge and an open line

of communication with YOU!"

In the eight years I have worked with these children, I have seen more of the chain reaction: grandfather sexually abuses his children, these children grow up to sexually abuse their children. The girls in these families will grow up to marry men who will sexually abuse their children. It will go on if the chain is not broken. The best way to break the chain is to help the child.

In both cases, the offender will deny the abuse if caught. It comes down to the abuser's word against the child victim's. If the abuser admits to the crime, he will blame the child by saying, "The child seduced him."

The mother is a very dependant woman. She was probably sexually abused as a child; her self-esteem is very low, and chances are the offender is physically abusing her. He tells her he will kill her and the children if she tries to leave him. She chooses not to believe her daughter and stays with the abuser.

The child cannot return home under these circumstances. The vic-

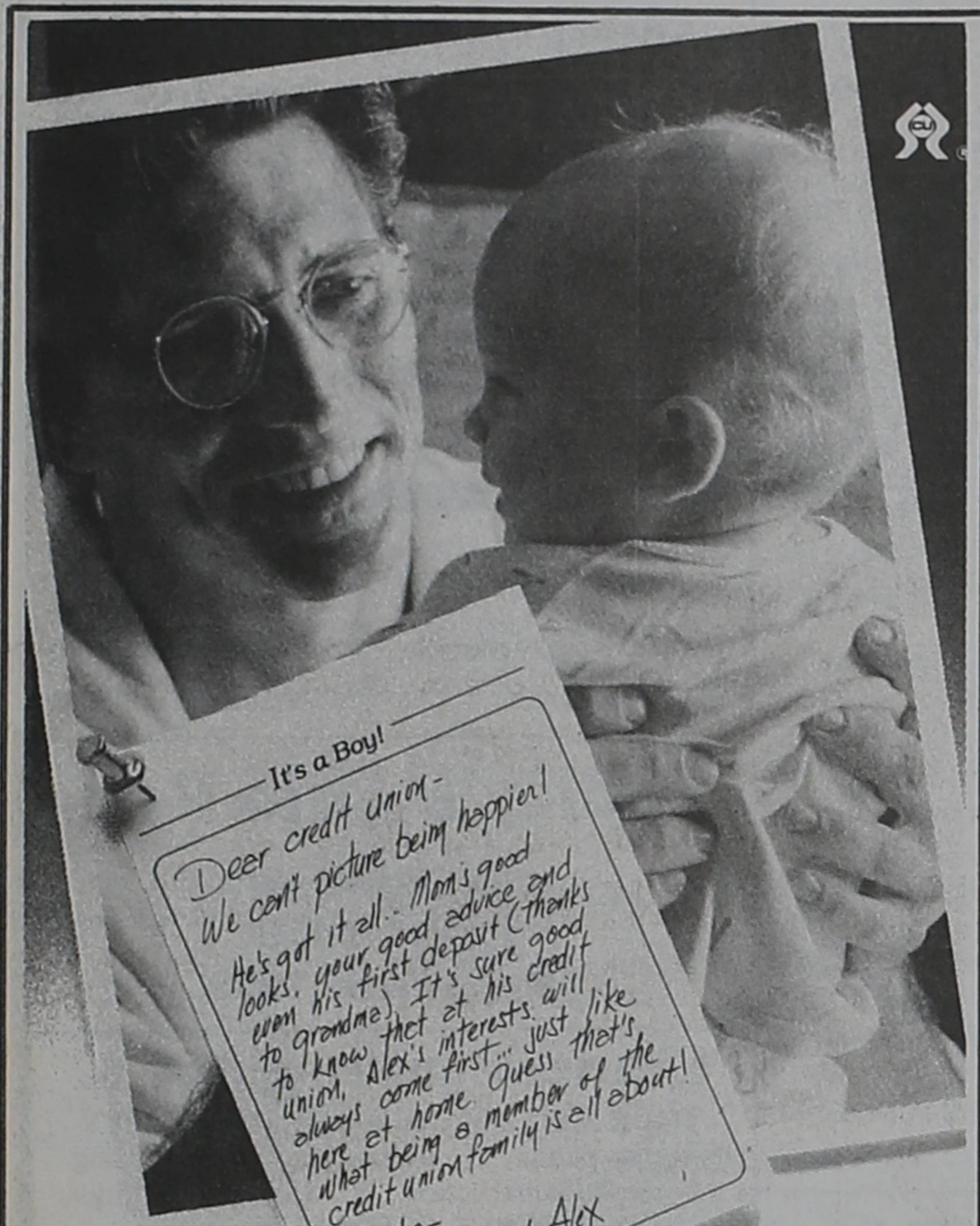
tim is placed into the emergency housing or foster home.

The social workers will do all that is possible to get the family together again. Counseling for parents and child, parenting classes, and visits with the child will be arranged. If the parents accept this help and are willing to work on the problems, the family can be saved.

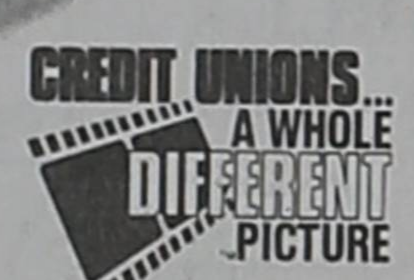
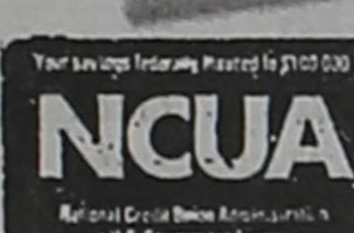
But this seldom occurs. Children can be in foster care for years. These children are living in limbo, going from foster home to foster home, social worker to social worker, until the child reaches the age of an adult or runs away, whichever comes first.

In some cases, children are returned home because judges are not educated to the problem of sexual abuse. These children have no chance. They will be abusive parents, while turning to crime and prostitution.

There are a few children who do make it. Their lives have changed and they have broken the chain of abuse. The others we continue to love and pray for and we hope that sometime, they will overcome the abusive chain.

Friona opens its regular season September 6 at River Road.

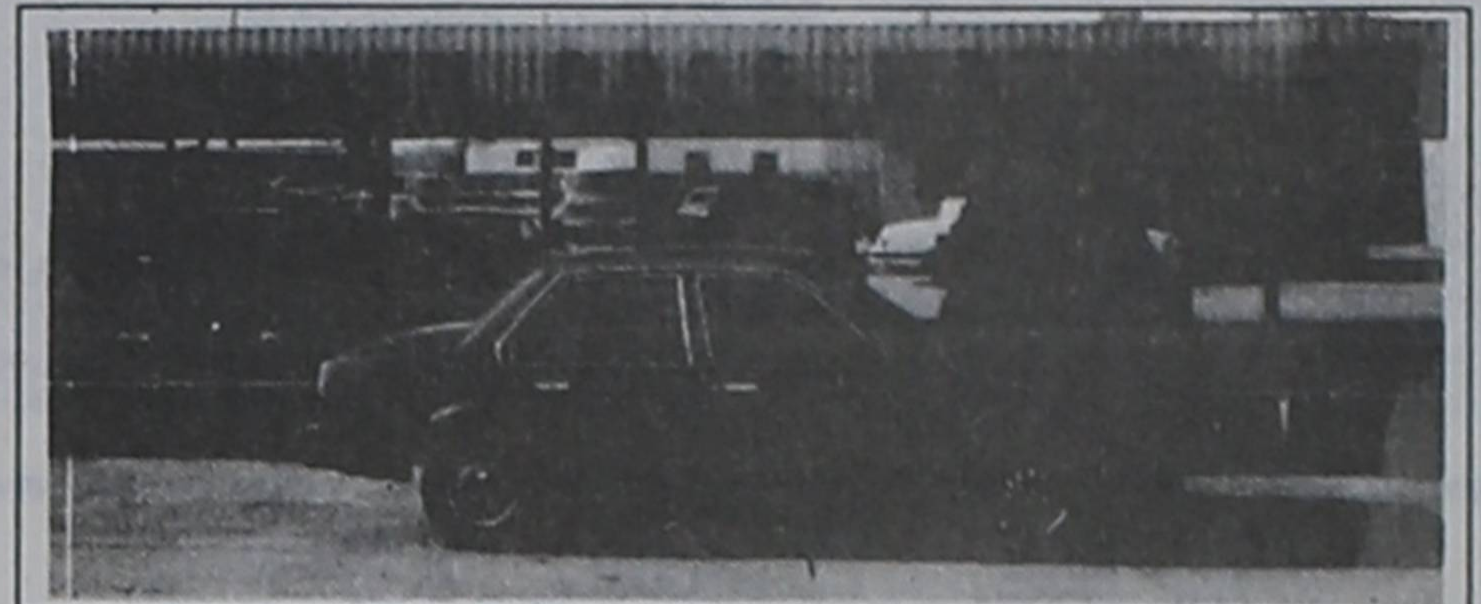

## NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (S.B. 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$3,803 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (S.B. 351) that same rate now provides \$3,982 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.7250 for County Education Districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Friona School District hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of .16 that will provide \$4,115 per student in state and local revenues.

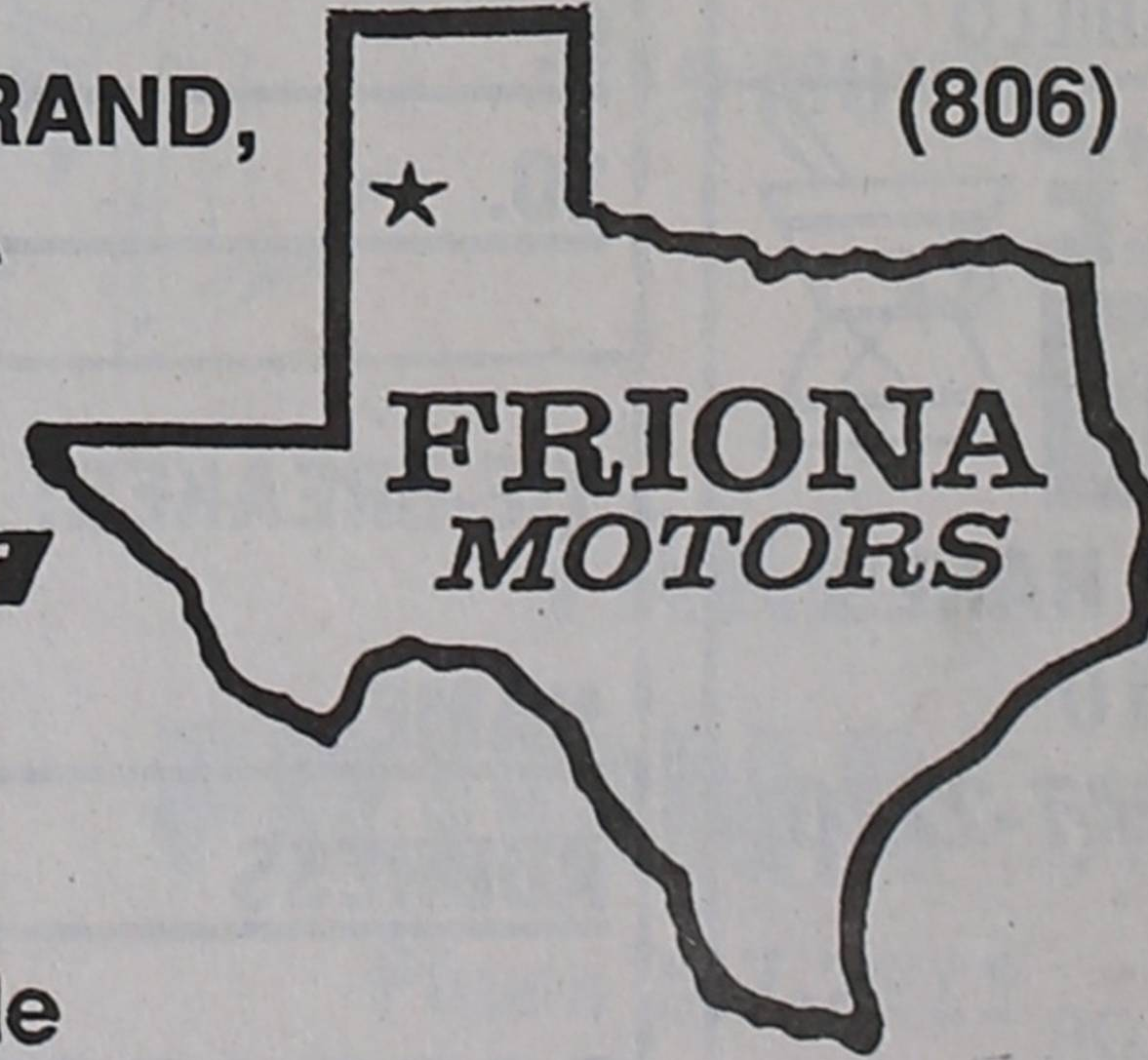

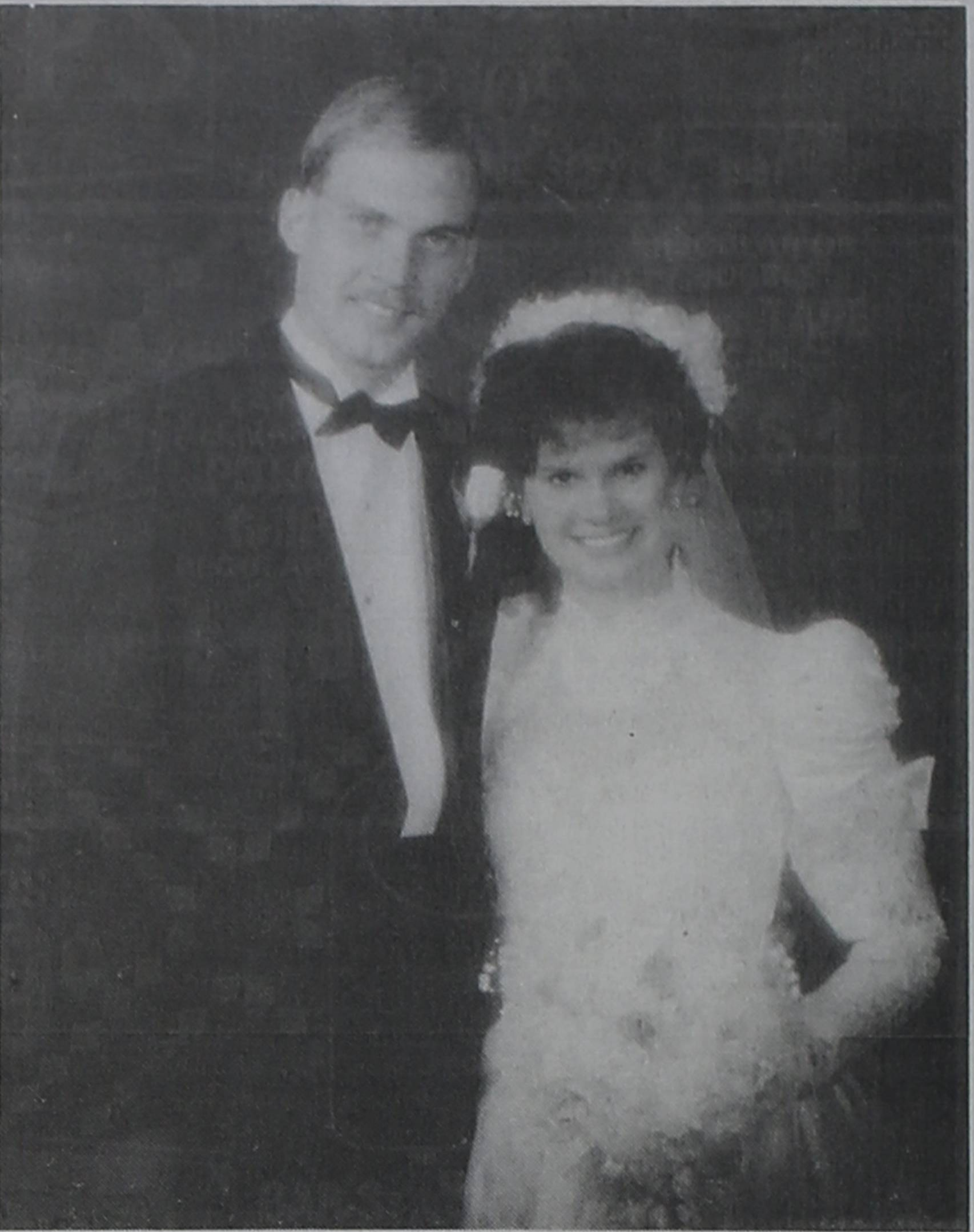

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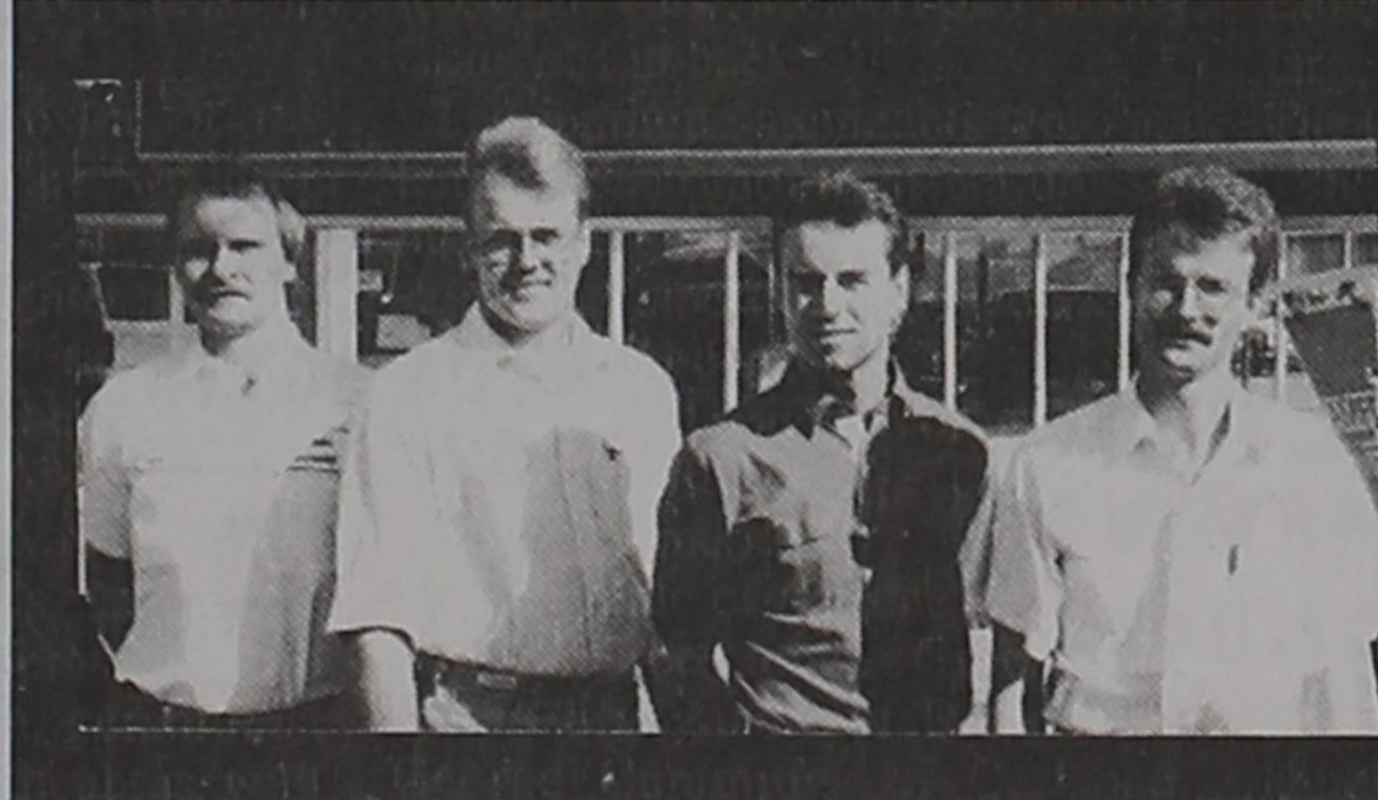

### Successful Investors Dare To Try

The National Association of Investors Corporation (NAIC) is an organization whose purpose is to teach sound investing principles, and its rigid investing criteria are designed to double its members' money every five years. That means their money must compound about 14.5 per cent annually.

According to the NAIC, during its most recent five-year reporting period (1986-90), the 12 stocks featured at the beginning of the period had, on average, "no change in market price through year end 1990." During the same period, the Dow Jones Industrial Average grew 45 per cent.

If that were the whole story, it would be a weak defense for selective investing. There is, however, more to this story than meets the eye.

Don Danko, editor of the NAIC's *Better Investing*, says, "The results certainly point out the risks associated with common stock investing." Although the NAIC's Securities Review Committee does all it can to offer securities that look good from a long-term value perspective, Danko says that "seldom has there been so much change in underlying fundamentals as there has been with the 1986 stocks."

Don't confuse Danko's facts with excuses. Although the NAIC's in-

vesting strategy offers no guarantees, its long-term benefits have proved profitable. Since the NAIC began its stocks-to-study program in 1952, there have been 35 five-year periods. The total average Dow Jones appreciation during these 35 periods was 31.11 per cent. Compare this to the NAIC's total average appreciation of 63.34 per cent for the same period, and you see that a disciplined plan of selective investing can outperform the general averages. In fact, the NAIC program outperformed the Dow in 24 of the 35 five-year periods (1956-1990). The NAIC's yearly average of combined appreciation and income was just over 15 per cent, which surpassed the 14.5 per cent required to double your investment.

Even during periods of disappointing performance, there are lessons to be learned. The most important, Danko says, is to follow your stocks. "Companies change, fundamentals change, and the best way to keep up with the changes is by following your companies closely." When investments no longer meet your criteria, it's time to determine if there is still growth and value in the company.

Investing is a challenge, even for the professionals. The biggest barrier to success is often the fear of failure. Leon Sokolsky said it best: "Those who have never made a mistake work for those who have dared to."

## YOUR EYES



### WHAT ARE CATARACTS?

Despite popular misconceptions, cataracts are not a film over the eye, but a "clouding" of the natural lens that focuses light to enable a person to see clearly at different distances.

Most of the time, cataracts are simply part of the normal aging process. However, a blow to the eye may cause what is called a "traumatic" cataract. Certain medications, such as steroids, taken over a long time, may cause the condition. And some diseases, such as diabetes, make a person prone to cataracts.

Can you protect against cataracts? To some extent. Wear effective sunglasses out of doors, especially in strong sunlight. Eat well; good nutrition and adequate levels of vitamin C and E seem to help. Don't smoke; smokers are more likely to get cataracts.

Your optometrist will check for cataracts in your regular eye exams, in between, watch for changes in vision, colors not as bright as they used to be, or lots of glare from lights at night.
