# THE STAR'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

## Worth a Court Case?

The threatened suit of the City of Friona vs. the County of Parmer may be justified in principal, but it is doubtful that a decision on the points involved would result in a solution to the problem.

This talked-of court case originated five years ago in the spring and summer of 1951 when Friona was in the midst of its first big paving project that had plenty of local complications, and would have been a hair-puller for city dads even if the trouble with the county had never developed.

To turn back the pages of history, it is recorded that George G. Wright deeded the city block in question to Parmer County "for the purpose of a location for the courthouse." That was about 50 years ago.

The county apparently has considered it to be county property on several occasions, the most notable of which was in 1948 when the county stood the cost of curb and gutter on Main Street—the west side of the block.

Three years later when Friona was first trying to grow with a big paving program, the question of paving around this vacant block faced the city's commissioners. To omit paving around this block in the heart of the city seemed unthinkable at the time, and was something the commissioners desired to avoid if at all possible.

Mack Bainum, then mayor, and Dan Martin, a sign-up man for Brown & Root of Houston, paving contractors, visited the county commissioners and appealed that they agree to pay for the paving, but failed to obtain consent. Emmett Day, then commissioner of the Friona precinct, also appealed to the court on behalf of the city with a similar request. Records show that his motion that the county pay for the paving died for lack of a second.

Meanwhile, paving was being laid by the block, and in a move to insure that the block not be left out, the city commissioners met and agreed with Brown & Root that they would be responsible for the cost. It was the hope of the city dads that the problem could be ironed out later and Friona be reimbursed.

In short, we see little benefit to be derived from a court suit that would only further inflame the feelings of all involved, and most likely could not result in a satisfactory judgement for the city.
