## Get Polio Booster **Shots This Month**

Medically speaking, this is the peak season for colds, the time to get polio booster shots, and to avoid catching cases of mumps measles or chicken pox, all of which are prevalent in the county but none are in epidemic propor-

Although probably 50 per cent of the children who received their first polio shots last year and are due for the third shot in the series this month, have received their polio vaccinations, County Health Officer Dr. Paul Spring reminded parents that their children should definitely receive their third shots one year after the second vaccines

for public agencies and to commercial vaccines insofar as private physicians are voluntarily observing priority established by the State

Department of Health. Health officials strongly urge the vaccination of children now as a protection against a rising polio incidence this spring and summer.
