





The following accomplishments of Farm Bureau are, of necessity, brief and inconclusive. Officers and directors of Parmer County Farm Bureau present them as one means of informing farmers of past and

COUNTY ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Contributes annually to expenses for 4-H boys and girls to Texas Round-up; Organized noxious weed eradication committee in cooperation with County Agent, County Commissioners and others; Secured bedding annually for County Fairs and Livestock Shows; Secured State Seed Inspectors to inspect fields of certified grains for foreign plants; Holds annual "Open Forum" meetings to learn desires of farmers; Currently paying in excess of \$20,000 dividends per year in Parmer County to participants in Farm Bureau Stock Insurance Companies; Provides free farm-used fuel tax exemption service, resulting in more than \$20,000 refunds per year in Parmer County; Provides opportunity for members to participate in Blue Cross Hospitalization Service, which has paid in excess of \$35,000 in benefits in Parmer County; In 1935, Parmer County Farm Bureau petitioned, with the assistance of Texas FB, the Federal Land Bank of Houston to consider irrigation in the deep water area when appraising land for loans. This action resulted in a raise from \$25 per acre to \$75 maximum.

TEXAS FARM BUREAU STATE LEGISLATIVE ACTIVITY

Every year, Farm Bureau has been responsible for legislation continuing the refund of road users tax assessed on farm used fuels (this is the legislation that keeps over \$20,000 in Parmer County farmer's pockets each year); Recommended and secured increase in funds for Texas A & M, extension service and experiment stations; Secured passage of bill prohibiting feeding of raw garbage to swine in an effort to control vesciular extenthema; DEFEATED HB 3 which would have increased State Ad Valorem Texas, robbing individual counties of this source of needed revenue; In 1949 and subsequent years, by direct appeal to Washington, secured O.K. for USDA loans on grains temporarily stored on the ground, saving Texas farmers millions of dollars by enabling them to "hold" through a harvest depressed market period; Secured passage of Texas Wareehouse Act , which provides for issuance of NEGOTIABLE warehouse receipts by all dealers issuing CCC re-

American Farm Bureau promoted the following important acts



that have been vital to the survival of rural people: Capper Volstead Act for Farm Cooperatives; Packers and stockyards act; Capper-Ketchum act for Extension Work; Agricultural Adjustment act of 1953 the first American Agricultural Assistance Act) and 1938; Emergency Farm Mortgage Act; Rural Electrification Act; Economic Cooperation Act; Hill-Burton Hospital Construction Act; Research and Marketing Act of 1946; Agricultural Acts of 1948-49; Rural Telephone Enabling Act (RTA); Commodity Credit Corporation Charter Act; Early in 1953 Farm Bureau began working successfully for passage of cotton allotment program providing the well known 65-40-50 formula for 1954 plantings; This session, gained passage of legislation to exempt far mproduction fuels from two cent per gallon road use federal use, which will mean a saving of more than \$10,000 annually to Parmer County farmers; After USDA had announced in December, 1954, its intentions of setting grain sorghum supports at 60 per cent of parity, American Farm Bureau insisted on a minimum of 70 per cent and got it.


