



Will This be the Next Step?

Integration has drawn few headlines in the Panhandle in recent months, despite the intensified flare-ups in the South.

For those who might be complacent about the issue in this area we point out the following: The colored race does not merely want its children to attend the white schools. Next step is demand for colored teachers to enter our faculties, teaching your children and mine, along with the negroes.

Are we ready for that?

Internal Issues Most Vifal

Internal problems such as this racial issue cause us to be more apprehensive about affairs within our own country than of those overseas. We personally think the next administration should be chosen on its platforms involving segregation, states rights, the farm program, and labor. We cannot continue to be god father to all the world if our own house becomes shaky.

A Man of Yesteryear—

We often lament the good old days. But there was one institution of those days that no one would really want to return to-the horse and buggy doctor."

That point was made by Dr. F. S. Crockett, a co-founder of the American Medical Association's Council on Rural Health, in keynoting the Council's eleventh annual conference at Portland, Ore.

Medically speaking, he said, those good old days just weren't good-"They were terribly destructive of human life . . . I need only to refer to the typhoid, malaria, pneumonia, smallpox, scarlet fever, diphtheria and other contagious diseases that resulted in the death or crippling of such appalling numbers."

Nowadays, the country doctor, just like his city cousin, has at his command the revolutionary discoveries that have been made in medicines and medical treatment. He may, as Dr. Crockett observed, be a bit short on social visiting during office hours—but he does know now

Then Dr. Crockett offered an important suggestion—that, to make rural practice attractive, the community should use its local doctor's services rather than bypass him on the way to the city doctor's office. As he put it, "Using him just for night calls and bad weather is not a satisfactory professional relation-

A Word to Tourists

Many of us could, with profit, study the ctourtesy and graciousness extended to visitors by our friends south of the border in Mexico.
