of the ASC, said the allotment was received at the county office last week. Individual allotment notices will be in the mail by June 15, he believes.

A national referendum will be conducted on July 20, in which farmers will determine whether they wish to continue under marketing quotas and acreage allot-

The wheat picture, taken as a whole, shows a declining interest in the commodity in the eyes of Parmer County farmers. This slackening of interest began in the late war years, and was intensified with the development of irrigation and the introduction of cotton to much of the county's cultivated

However, a revival of interest in wheat production has been noted recently, especially during the past two years, when farmers with reduced cotton allotments and reduced prices for grain sorghums, have come to look upon their wheat allotment with more favor.





Ten Parmer County men attended a Farm Bureau meeting in Lubbock last Wednesday morning, to hear authorities discuss the present cotton situation, and plans for alleviating the surplus situation by market expansion to give cotton farmers a chance to continue their production at a volume and price that would yield a profit.

John Lynn of Washington, D. C., legislative director for American Farm Bureau, discussed the Bureau's seven-point cotton program aimed at solving some of the problems of profitable production and marketing that face producers today. He said that current legislation provided for export for five million bales of CCC cotton at 251/2 Tri-County Elevator cents per pound, which would provide some relief, temporarily. It is necessary, Lynn said, that we go further than this, and spend more money on research and marketing if we are to have a continually improving market.
