

A man was killed by gunshot early Sunday morning four miles east of Bovina near Highway 60. How he was killed remains a mystery, Frank Smith, Parmer County deputy sheriff, says. The cause of death might have been murder, suicide or accidental.

However, the fact that death was caused from a shot from a .22 caliber gun has been established, Smith says.

Dead is Clifford Leon Conley, 29, who has been working as a farm hand for A. B. Kent near Bovina for the past year.

Smith was awakened at his home about 3 a. m. Sunday by some Negro men. They told him that a man had been shot on the Hopgood farm four miles east of Bovina.

Conley was dead when Smith arrived at the scene. Smith estimates that he died about 2:30

The three suspects were picked up Tuesday morning, and after questioning, one revealed the whereabouts of the death weapon. The weapon was a .22 caliber automatic pistol, believed to have belonged to Conley, Lovelace says.

Relatives of the victim were in Norman, Oklahoma, attending the funeral and were not immediately available to identify the gun as that of Conley's.

Conley was born May 31, 1927. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Conley of Natalia; a sister, Juanita Hale of Lubbock; and a brother, Dewane Conley or Bovina.

In addition to voting on candidates for national, state and local offices, Texas citizens on November 6 will weigh several amendments to the state constitution which, if accepted, will have far-reach-

One of the more controversial of these proposed amendments is No. 5, which provides for reorganization of the veterans' land program in the state, including the issunce of an additional \$100,000,000 in bonds to expand its activities.

# On November 6, the people of

Texas will go to the polls to decide, among other things, the fate of the Veterans' Land Board in Texas. We have all heard of the graft and scandal which has been connected with it in the past, but have you heard the good things about the operation of the board?

In the first place some of the individuals responsible for the graft are now behind prison bars, and the State of Texas, as of August 31, 1956, has recovered judgment for \$1,896,041.16 in the courts of Texas on the land purchases found to be fraudulent. The administration of the program now is in the hands of a new land commissioner on the Veterans' Land Board, and in the hands of Veterans' Land Committees appointed by the commissioners courts in each of the 254 counties of Texas.

Since the program started, there have been 16,960 purchases under the program up to August 31, 1956. That figure is only 1.79% of the eligible Texas veterans. Of this number of purchases, 784 accounts have been paid in full. Also, of this amount, the state has had to foreclose on only 143 contracts. This land has been resold to the highest bidders for \$28,777 .-40 more than was due on the

Under the program, the Veterans' Land Board is authorized by law to issue bonds with which to obtain the funds to be used in the purchase. By previous amendments approved by

the people of Texas, the Veterans Land Board has issued \$100,000,000 in bonds, and has sold them to commercial investors at an average interest rate of 2.13%. The money, in turn, has been loaned to Texas veterans to buy land with at an interest rate of 3%, resulting in a profit to the State of Texas amounting to \$2,307,-

Now, you are asked to decide whether or not this program should be expanded and continued. You will be asked to vote on an amendment which would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue an additional \$100,000,000 worth of bonds, making the total fund amount to \$200,000,000.00. Also, under the proposed amendment the Veterans' Land Board would consist of the commissioner of the general land office, and two citizens of Texas appointed by the governor, and approved by

the Texas house and senate. We believe, in spite of the black eye given this program by some who tried to make personal gain out of it, that it is the soundest and best of all government money programs ever devised, and strongly urge that you vote for Amendment No. 5 on November 6 when you go to the polls.

To date, the State of Texas has indebted itself \$100,000,000 for a land buying program which has benefitted fewer than two percent of the eligible veterans in the state. The very nature of the veterans' land program in Texas is of the type that is an open invitation to graft. Surely the history of the last two years of the program has illustrated the impractibility of controlling unprincipled men simply by their oath of office.

Most eligible and deserving veterans in the state are still buying land. The 98 percent which have not participated in the program must have found it possible to utilize the already existing federal and private lending resources to good ad-

If you are building a new home remodeling an old one or re-doing a kitchen, be sure to look into the possibility of having a grease proof wall around your range.

The wall can be made impervious to grease spatters and easy to keep clean. The paneling to make the wall is plastic finished hardboard, which is available at many lumber yards. This material has a baked coating in wood grain and marble designs as well as solid colors.

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

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
