Although the records are not couplete, we are enthused to note that the ones kept many years ago are, and that only in recent years has the practice of recording precipitation in Friona been erratic.

For that reason, we have high hopes that perhaps there is a person-or even several-who can supply us with rainfall records in order to fill in the gaps we have in the records. Our plan is to publish in some

form or another a complete record of rainfall for Friona as far back as can accurately be determined, and it appears that if someone will help us out for recent years, we can do this fairly successfully.

The statistics sent us by the state climatologist indicate that official records began in November ing quite a few gaps, up until March of 1951, when the records are complete again up to the present time.

The rainfall is recorded on a monthly basis. If you, or anyone you know of, can supply us with any statistics that are reasonably accurate in this period from May, 1944, through March, 1951, will surely appreciate the help.

We believe that it will be a real service to be able to get a complete record of precipitation in Friona, and this is the only way we know how to go about it.



Accomodations Available

The move under study which would involve a change in the location of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation offices from the courthouse in Farwell to a downtown location in that city deserves the attention of Friona residents this week.

Because of already overcrowded conditions in the present courthouse location and since with the expansion of the government farm program into the soil bank plan next year, which will entail even more activity in the ASC office, a change to more spacious quarters is being sought.

The needs of the county are growing, too, and all available rooms in the courthouse are being, or soon will be, made use of. The coming full-time FHA office for the county, plus the coming separate office of tax assessor-collector, pinpoint the expansion of government on the county level.

Since additional room seems unavailable at the courthouse, a move to other quarters is the only solution. The county ASC committee has requested that a business building in downtown Farwell be leased for the purpose of housing the government offices.
