Villa Acuna (pronounced, the natives tell us, Vee-ya-Ah-coon-ya), across the big international bridge, is Del Rio's answer to El Paso's Juarez, but in our opinion, it's a whole lot tamer than the Mexican city up the river.

The Mexican government (the Del Rio chamber men tell us) is building a road from Villa Acuna into the interior of the country, and also has plans for a railroad within the next few years.

That, predict the Del Rio men, will turn Del Rio into another gateway city, just as highways and railroads have Laredo, El Paso, and Brownsville.

Villa Acuna, to judge from outward appearances, doesn't seem to be too hepped up by its promising future. The residents have all the earmarks of being the easy-going Mexicans that story books say they are (which is not, was you may know, the case with Juarez citizens).

He and the fellow he leased the business from went "halves" into the Christmas tree business as sideline and made almost \$1,000 apiece from the short-lived pronotion, Davis confided.

We asked him if he was ever worried about getting caught with onsiderable surplus on December 25, and he said they had no trouole in that respect the past year. In fact, he said, they sold com-
