Under the heading "How We Finally Got Back From Old Tennessee," part of a series of travelogues the Brownfield editor wrote on his vacation trip, he said:

"Perhaps there are a few people who are wondering how we finally got home from old Tennessee, and perhaps there are those who don't or didn't give a tinker's dam whether we ever returned or not. But for the benefit of a few of the former readers we are going to give a brief outline of the return home. . . ."

That's tenn' it to 'em Andy Jack—and honest confession is still supposed to be tolerably good for the soul!

The above was from the pen or typewriter of our friendly enemy, Sharley Armour Guy, chief ramrod of the Hubbock Ambulance-Shurnal. But Sharley, we didn't reach home, we left ourselves at Monroe, La., still smelling the swamps. But we must come out this week. Now, as to our butchering FDR's English, we plead guilty. In the first place we don't know any better, and in the second, we might make ourself better understood as is. Our American English is a great language, and people from all sections understand the other. Local Man Killed In Lubbock Thursday

Clarence Hildreth, local stock man and trader, was killed at Lubbock last Thursday, October 1, by being dragged by a horse on a trailer, when the horse jumped out, and in some way the rope became fastened to Hildreth. After hitting the ground the horse ran and was stopped by a negro man, who ran in and grappled the rope.

The injured man was carried to a hospital, but died a few hours later. The body was brought to Brownfield Friday, and funeral services were held at the Baptist church by the pastor, Rev. Forest G. Rodgers. After which the body was taken in charge by the American Legion and buried in the Brownfield cemetery.

Deceased was about 49 years of age, and served in the 38th balloon corps during the World War. He was married in 1922, from which union was born three boys and one girl, the oldest boy being 12 years of age. His wife and children survive, and have a home in the eastern part of the city. He also has other relatives here, we understand.

The sympathy of the entire community goes out to the widow and orphans in this sudden death of their husband and father.

Two-Thirds of Compliance Papers Filed

Up to the present time men doing compliance work have turned in 630 compliance papers and measurements. This is practically two-thirds of the total for the county.

The payments this year will be five cents per pound of lint cotton based on adjusted yields which in most cases were taken from the 1935 Cotton Contracts. The feed and corn payment will average \$8.60 per acre for the county.

Cogent Facts Relative To Amendment No. 6

By George Moffett of Chilli-cothe, Texas, Member of the House of Representatives.

Unless our present Constitution is amended, population will continue to be the only yard stick by which are allotted the various counties.

Thirty states take geography as well as population into consideration in laying out legislative districts. Between 1920 and 1930 the population of Texas increased 1,161,000.

Most exactly one-third of this increase occurred in the three most popular counties. By actual census figures 69 rural counties showed a decrease in population between 1920 and 1930. Power farming probably accounted for most of this decrease. The trend of population is unquestionably toward the large cities.

If Texas were redistricted today under our present Constitution, Dallas would have ten members and Houston eleven. In 20 or 30 years more this would be doubled. County commissioners' precincts, city commissioners' precincts, judicial districts, school districts and many other districts are not laid out on a population basis but usually with an eye to giving each section or community adequate representation. Geographic and territorial considerations play an important part in shaping the aforementioned districts and should likewise be considered in laying out representative districts instead of using population alone.

Our forefathers wrote it into the Federal Constitution that the President and Vice-president of the United States should not come from the same state. They opposed concentration of power and Amendment No. 6 does the same thing. The U. S. Supreme Court in 1932 definitely held that Congressional Districts need not be even approximately equal in population.

A fair and impartial study of the problem clearly shows that Amendment No. 6, should be adopted by the people at the November election.

Terry Farmers May Be Able To Sell Feed

More than 250,000 car. lbs. of surplus hay and other roughages have been listed to date with the Federal Livestock Feed Agency, according to R. N. McClain, County Agent.

The Livestock Agency reports that 27,000 of these car loads are from Texas. The Agency points out that the winter livestock feeding season will soon get under way in sections of the drought area. As a result it is being made to keep the surplus of roughages up to date on inquiries for feed may be taken up as rapidly as possible.

Terry County farmers having a surplus feed which they want to dispose of in this way are requested to immediately advise the Livestock Agency at 755 Livestock Exchange Building, Kansas City, Missouri.

Good Crops From Here To Big Spring

There is about as good average crop from here to Big Spring as there has been for several years past. In fact, we believe that they will be above the average for the past ten years. Cotton most of the way from here to Big Spring will average a third of a bale or better. We had a view of the situation last Saturday afternoon going to Coahoma in Howard county to visit the wife's kin folks, and returning Sunday afternoon.

Now we did not fairly burn the wind, but took more than three hours to drive the 110 miles, and therefore had a good chance to see the crop. Our prediction is that if we do not have an extraordinarily early freeze, the three counties, Terry Dawson and Howard will gather 100,000 bales of cotton. Dawson will do 50,000 itself.

Corn, of course is short the whole distance, but headed and bundle stuff will be fine. The only trouble is that most of the old maize and higeria heads are black, which will knock on their sale. However the grain, for feeding purposes will be just as good as if they were their natural golden or silver colors.

Had a short conversation with District Judge Gordon B. McGuire while at Lamesa. He informed us that the labor shortage in Dawson county was very acute. His son-in-law, who is working one of the Judge's farms has 40 bales open and no hands, he stated.

The same complaint of labor shortage was general, and there were instances in which some from this section were accused of going down to Howard county and enticing Mexican cotton pickers to come up here with a promise of higher rates.

The folks are doing well all the way down, and from the crowded conditions of the towns, and the surge to and fro on the streets, the merchants are in for a busy fall.

Well Here Comes The Rain Once Again

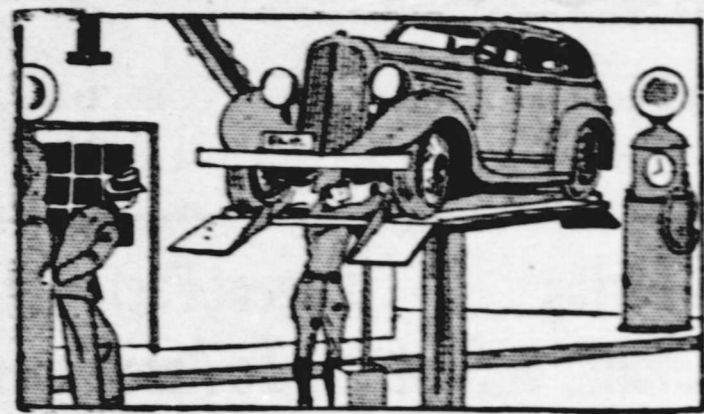

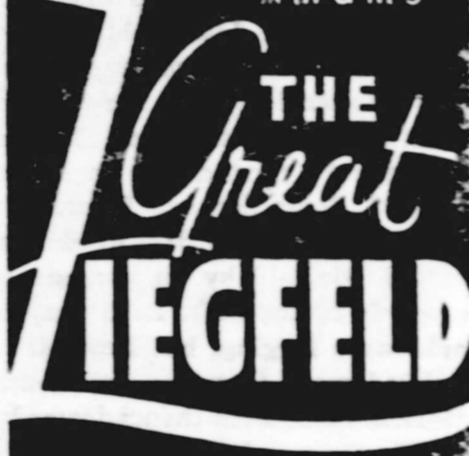

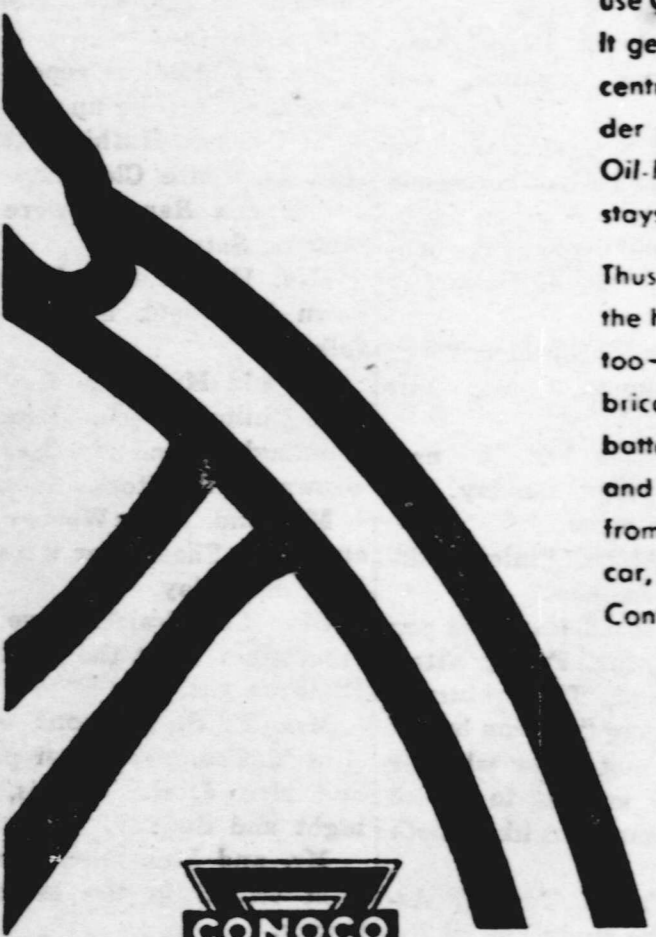
