

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

THOMPSON FORCES READY

The forces backing Ernest Thompson have been held closely in check during the past few weeks by the canny Colonel's advisors, permitting the McCraw candidacy to gain large headway. Thompson always has been a believer in a short, intensive campaign, instead of a long-drawnout effort, as resulting in a much better timed "peak"; while McCraw's technique has been the oppositea campaign that has been carried

on almost continously since his second election as attorney general. The runoff between the red-headed candidates is regarded as certain by most observers here, and a campaign that will be a "sizzling" exhibition. Both are splendid campaigners, and both have public records that will be subject to discussion. Poll tax payments this year, while not breaking any record, show 1,133,704 Texans paid poll taxes, which, with an estimated 15 per cent additional exemptions, brings the total potential vite to to 1,300,000-only 31/2 percent below the 1936 voting strength in a presidential election year. State headquarters for both candidates will probably be located in Austin, with regional offices in various sections of the state. NEXT LEGISLATURE Both gubernatorial candidates have




