S. Bridwell, convention program chairman, announced today.

Mayor LaGuardia, chief executive of America's No. 1 city, is one of the most colorful figures in "public life in our country today, and his address before the WTCC Convention here in Wichita Falls will be one of the most popular drawing cards on the three-day program, and should attract "special attention," Mr. Bridwell said.

WHY THE CONSTITUTION?

Something over eight months ago, a German citizen, the Reverend Martin Niemoeller, an outstanding anti-Nazi Protestant pastor, was arrested in Berlin because of his outspoken opposition to Adolf Hitler.

Later he was found guilty of the "crime" of having discussed and criticized government measures from the pulpit. He was sentenced to seven months in prison and a substantial fine. Because he had been in prison for a longer period awaiting trial than that to which he was sentenced, he was set free. But—he was immediately arrested by Secret Police and without trial was sent to a prison concentration camp.

All too often we take our own Constitution and the rights it gives us too lightly.

In contrast to Germany, the Reverend Niemoeller under the protection of the American Constitution would in the first place never have been arrested for criticizing the government for its acts; he would not have been held for eight months awaiting trial and then upon his release could not be arrested and sent away to a prison camp without trial. All because such things are forbidden by our Constitution.

Truly we take too lightly this document which guards our every right as Americans.—Abilene Times.

BIG BEND "DISCOVERED"

"More and more scientific groups are discovering the rich and varied materials useful and interesting to them which may be found in the Texas Big Bend country," notes the San Antonio News. "Just now Peabody Museum (Harvard University) is putting the final touches to its plans for five months' exploration and first-hand study of the Basket-Makers' caves. . . . In that enterprise Sul Ross State Teachers College at Alpine, which has an excellent museum of its own, will co-operate. Besides, the National Geographic Society will send several geographers and relate scientists to explore, picture and report on the area designated for Big Bend International Park. . . ."

"Again, Dr. Walter Prescott Webb—on leave from the University of Texas—with numerous assistants, has been studying the park area at first hand during the past year. . . . From these combined sources the world generally—but more particularly motorists who plan to go touring—will hear more and more about the Big Bend both as a playground and a scientific treasure-house. As Herbert Maier, the National Park Service's regional director, lately said about Santa Helena Canyon—

in the center of the area—in time the whole world will come to the rim rock, the most gorgeous panorama on the American continent! When the trek shall start, it will mean more tourist trade for this State. As The Texas Weekly comments, the Big Bend National Park proposal is simply a good business enterprise. The area is also a sanctuary of the almost vanished frontier spirit."

PSALM XV

When President Roosevelt faced the Washington correspondents on the fifth anniversary of the New Deal, he told them that a good "lead" for an account of his remarks would be in the Fifteenth Psalm. At least one great newspaper, the New York Herald Tribune, actually used the Psalm as the prelude to what the president had to say of his accomplishments and objectives.

Short and beautiful is this Psalm of David. It contains but five verses. For the benefit of those who did not find it in newspaper reports of the president's fifth anniversary interview it is here set forth in its entirety:

1 "Lord, who shall abide in thy tabernacle? Who shall dwell in thy

holy hill?
2 He that walketh uprightly and worketh righteousness, and speaketh the truth in his heart.
3 He that backbiteth not with his tongue to his neighbour, nor taketh up a reproach against his neighbour.
4 In whose eyes a vile person is contemned; but he honoureth them that fear the Lord. He that sweareth to his own hurt and changeth not.
5 He that putteth not out his money to usury, nor taketh reward against the innocent. He that doeth these things shall never be moved."

RAIL RATES HERE AND ABROAD

Those who rise up and howl at the suggestion that the American railroads should be given a moderate rate increase in order to save this industry, with its billion-a-year purchasing power, its hundreds of thousands of investors, and its vast army of highly-paid workers, from ruin, would do well to read an analysis of the rates charged by the railroads in the principal foreign countries, published in the Cleveland Trust Company Business Bulletin.

In France, the average rate per ton-mile is 3.48 cents. In Great Britain, it is 2.73 cents. In Italy, it is 2.71 cents, and the European average is 2.68 cents. In Australia, it is 2.50 cents, and in Argentina, it is 1.74 cents.

In the United States, by contrast, the average ton-mile rate is under one cent—94 cents, to be exact. Only one important foreign country has a lower rate than this country—Japan, with .77 cents.

Highly significant is the fact that four countries are in a class by themselves in the matter of cheap rail transport. Two of these, Canada (with .98 cents rate) and the United States have similar systems, and pay very high wages. The other two, Japan and India, pay extremely low wages, which would be considered starvation pay here or in the Dominion to the north.

In some of the foreign countries, the railroads are wholly or partly owned by the government—and even the high ton-mile freight charges don't always carry the lines—the taxpayer being assessed for losses.

We get the best railroad service in the world and, wages considered, the very cheapest. Freight rates high enough to return the lines a small profit wouldn't noticeably affect the operating cost of industry. They would, on the contrary, spur a railroad betterment program that would be felt directly in every state and by every investor and worker.—Exchange.

NO KISSING WOULD STOP T. B. IN 25 YEARS

Sanatorium, Tex., March 1.—Kissing and careless coughing and sneezing are perhaps the greatest factors in the spread of tuberculosis, de-

clares Roy W. Henson, director of the Division of Correspondence of the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium.

"One authority has said that tuberculosis would be extinct in 25 years if a law were passed prohibiting kissing and requiring all persons to cover their mouths and noses with handkerchiefs when coughing or sneezing," says Mr. Henson, who is author of "Avenues of Infection in Tuberculosis," a new free booklet of the State Sanatorium. "A wag has been heard to remark that 25 years seems a long time between kisses, but nevertheless, abolition of the osculatory habit would without doubt greatly aid in the reduction of tuberculosis."

"Direct tuberculosis infection occurs when germs are transmitted from a tuberculous person who has germs in his sputum or saliva to another person," Mr. Henson explained. "These germs may be transmitted by kissing, or may be expelled by the tuberculous individual during the act of open coughing, sneezing or spitting. Indirect infection may result if an uninfected person uses a drinking glass or other articles previously used by a tuberculous individual."

Mr. Henson's booklet on tuberculosis infection and other literature on tuberculosis may be obtained free by writing to the sanatorium.

THE EYES WILL GET IT

Although grapefruit eaters in 43 of the 48 states tasted the Texas variety in 1937, more people in more states are due to taste it in the next few years. There are a greater number of young grapefruit trees, ranging from 3 to 12 years, in the lower Rio Grande valley now than in any other producing area in the United States. This means that the biggest increase in production will probably be in Texas, since few of these trees are yet full-bearing. The bulk of trees in Florida and California are 13 or more years old.

Our people are criminally negligent in driving automobiles. And America is criminally complacent in its attitude of more or less bored indifference toward the accident toll. Juggernaut is no more—but the automobile more than fulfills its gory role.
