

The second bill, Senate Bill 224, would require county attorneys, criminal district attorneys and district attorneys to institute suits in behalf of the county school district or any other political subdivision within their jurisdiction for the recovery of

such misused public funds. "The misuse of funds of the Veterans Land Board and the embezzlements which arose out of the Duval County political mess merely serve as cases in point, terrible examples of what these proposed laws are designed to prevent and punish," Senator Rogers said. "We have seen instances in Texas in which justice was impossible to gain because local county officers, judges and prosecuting attorneys were enmeshed in a powerful web of political filth and intrigue.

"Senate Bill 223 will make it possible for such cases to be brought to the attention of public prosecutors away from the heat of local controversy and free from the pressures of local politics and

The Childress lawmaker said that "increased latitudes of jurisdiction and requirements that suits in the public interest be filed by the public attorneys are our only workable answer to the continued existence of machine politics in Texas." He emphasized that since the bills cover only those offenses relating to misuse and recovery of public funds, the principle of local self-government is in no way compromised.

"A fellow hasn't got any business putting in a crop (of vegetables) if he can't afford to lose it," he says. That being true, it would seem to mean that Neill thinks small acreages—around 20 acres per farm—and more of them, are the natural way to grow into the vegetable business. Neill doesn't have any enormous acreages himself. Last year, his lettuce was a little too early to catch the big prices, but he still grossed about \$5,000 from 25 acres.

"The eleven electric utilities which formed the foundation will jointly carry on their research and development work in the nuclear field in a program designed to assure for Texas the benefits which develop from this new source of energy," Cunningham said.

"The program of the foundation is long range, since the natural gas now used by utilities in the Southwest is a particularly good fuel and will be competitive with nuclear energy for many years. The appraisal of problems of this nature will have a high priority in the program of the foundation.
