

## Star Doubles Mailing Fee

the country's postal system, when Postmaster Arthur Summerfield disclosed that funds were insufficient to provide for "normal" operation of the system. In this connection, it was revealed that of the huge operating deficit suffered by the system each year, \$218 is lost to the handling of newspapers, magazines, and periodicals.

The Star has editorially supported increases in mailing rates for all patrons of the system to bring about realistic accounting procedures for this agency of the government. The Star doesn't feel that the general taxpayers ought to help the newspaper publisher, the direct mail advertiser, or anyone else send matter through the

The Star is attempting to voluntarily double the postage paid for mailing this newspaper. The following letter, written to the local postmaster by W. H. Graham Jr., publisher, is self explanatory.

Mr. Leo McLellan Friona Postmaster Friona, Texas Dear Mr. McLellan,

You have informed me that it will be impossible for you to accept the enclosed \$1.40 as a voluntary additional postage payment to mail The Friona Star, for the reason that no proper accounting of this money can be made in your records, and the law does not provide for any additional payment on postage of newspapers or other mailed matter.

I will consider it a great favor if, then, you will accept the enclosed \$1.40, together with this letter, and forward it to Mr. Arthur Summerfield, postmaster general of the U.S. Postal Department, requesting that he find ways and means of incorporating this amount, plus an additional \$1.40 each week hereafter, into the operating budget of the Post

My reason for this action is that I feel that the second class mailing rates for The Friona Star, and many other publications of a similar nature, are too low as to represent a realistic fee for services performed by this agency of the government.

Although the rate varies from time to time, depending on the size and weight of any given issue, and also the location of subscribers, this \$1.40 will approximately equal the postage now being paid

That amount is roughly one-tenth of one cent for each paper mailed. Even though there are no records maintained by the Post Office to show what the cost of providing this service would be, reason and common sense moves us to conclude that such a service cannot be performed for the prevailing rates. Therefore, we are voluntarily doubling the amount, and we still suspect that we are getting a tremendous bargain.

Newspapers in general and weekly newspapers in particular have never felt that paying a fair rate of postage would be disastrous to their business. As proof of the growing uneasiness we feel concerning this subsidy, although it is a small amount compared to our many other expenses, let us cite you a resolution adopted at the 48th Annual Convention of the Panhandle Press Association held in Amarillo

"Resolved . . . that we favor whatever increase in second class rates may be necessary to make the payment on newspapers cover the full cost of mailing, provided that a sincere effort be made by the Post Office to adjust all postal rates so that they cover full cost of the service."

The Star does not want to wait until favoritism has been removed for others; The Star wants to pay a fair rate for postage now. Will you consider our offer to double the postage paid for our weekly

If you will, I further hope that you will then find it easier to remove other favored patrons of the mail from the positions they now commercially exploit at the expense of the taxpayers at large.

Large circulation newspapers, magazines, third and fourth class permit holders, and the mailers of 'junk" unaddressed mail make up the bulk of the postal deficit, as I believe your records will indicate. The subsidy to the community press of America is not large, but there is no more excuse for it than there is for special favors to any individual or busi-

We hope that you will give this matter your favorable attention.

raffic laws in the state of Texas s that concerning the passing of passenger-discharging school buses. The indignant howls of school bus drivers have been loud and long for a number of years now, demanding that law enforcement officers remedy the situation. Yet, citizens continue to violate this particular law with methodic regularity.

Here's how it reads:

"The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of a business or residence district upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of eceiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such

Listed under the heading "equipment" are a number of regula tions which in the past have proved to be thorns in the sides of drivers. One such law is concernng tail lamps. It reads:

'Every motor vehicle, trailer emi-trailer, and pole trailer, and any other vehicle which is being drawn at the end of a train of vehicles shall be equipped with at least two head lamps with at least one on each side of the front of the motor vehicle, which head lamps shall comply with the requirements and limitations set forth by the Texas state traffic laws.

"Every motor vehicle, trailer, semi-trailer, and pole trailer, and any other vehicle which is being drawn at the end of a train of vehicles shall be equipped with at least one tail lamp mounted on the rear, which when lighted as herein before required, shall emit a red light plainly visible from a distance of five hundred (500) feet to the rear, provided that in the case of a train of vehicles only the ail lamp on the rearmost vehicle need actually be seen from the listance specified.





In fact, graphs prepared from the tests made it appear that water can be "stacked" under a well in the water-bearing formation as though the water were dominoes or some other firm-bodied material.

Thus, it would appear that Farmer Jones, for example, should not feel that it would be a waste of time for him to return water from a lake during wintertime to the sand under his farm through his irrigation well, for the often suspected reason that the water would, in a period of several months, move away through the sand and benefit Farmer Brown who lives one mile south-

In checking the soil temperature

Now that planting season is ductive. One practice that is a step in the right direction of keeping land productive is interplanting cowpeas with grain sorghum. This is a summer legume crop which will add nitrogen to the soil when inoculated, thus making more available for next year's

crop. Cowpeas can be interplanted with grain sorghum with a special attachment for this purpose. They should be planted at the rate of 4-8 pounds per acre, at a depth of 1.5-2.5 inches. Attention should be given to the variety planted as some varieties such as Babhan tend to cling to and climb the feed stalks. Babham should be
