Due to the fact that we were running the statements of the two local banks, the Brownfield State and First National, in the columns of this paper last week, we made no comment on the matter. We just decided to let the facts of figures soak in a week, and then have our say.

Most of us that listen to radios or read, are aware of the fact that the big banks in the larger citites of Texas, are right now advertising to the general public that they are prepared to take care of customers after the war for new businesses or for expansion of the present business. The only condition is that the applicant must be reliable and of good report. This is only justice to the stockholders of the banks, as well as to their depositors.

Here at home it is presumed that our banks are going to be in position to take care of many wants of their customers when the war is over and expansions of business can really start.
