Loyd ran into a little bit of bad weather while at the factory, and discovered he'd have to lay over for a while before it would be advisable to begin the flight home.

hear of a place called Friona?" Naturally, Loyd was surprised and pleased that he had run into someone familiar with this neck of the woods, so he told him he was from Friona, and sought to find

Fortunately, as he lost altitude, the atmosphere became more dense, and he finally levelled off a few hundred feet above the ocean. He made radio contact with emergency rescue operations on Greenland, and they advised him to "ditch" his plane instead of trying to bring it in.

One look at the icebergs floating around in the water below made him decide he'd rather take his chances on his crippled ship, though, so he gave his one good engine all it had and headed for land.

Joe finally made it, says Loyd, although he came scooting into the field at treetop height, and with his one engine seriously strained from so much wide-open throttle operation.

An experience like that would put us out of the flying business, we think, but it wasn't long until Joe was off again with the same plane (but new engines) to make the delivery. He made it the second try.

Incidentally, we thought that the main advantage of having a two-engine plane was to avoid catastrophe when one engine fails. That's true of most aircraft, says Loyd, but the particular one Joe was trying to shuttle over the Atlantic was a converted job that didn't have this advantage.



This interesting map, prepared by hydrologists for the Texas Almanac, shows principal water-bearing formations of Texas. As can be seen, the Ogallala formation is one of the major reservoirs, and is the one from which practically all ground water on the Texas Plains comes. It is a common misconception that the Plains north of the Canadian River have a different underground formation than the South Plains, but they do not. In most cases, they are deeper, and that is the principal difference.

jump from \$4.15 to \$5.25 for one party line, \$3.30 to \$4.50 for two party line, 75 cents to \$1 for residential extensions, and would offer new service on a four party line for \$4.

Rate examples during 1952 were \$6.50 for individual line ousiness, and \$3.75 for individual line residential. In 1954 the extended area ser-

vice was made available to Friona and surrounding communities which brought cost of phone service up to the present evel, Kemper told the council. Kemper said the return on the phone company's investment amounted to 3.73 percent, based on figures compiled last year He figures the increase asked for would bring the return to 6.74 percent, assuming operating expenses of last year. He said the company has about \$126,100 invested in service for Friona and the annual net income for the company has been only \$4,400. His figures for the new net annual income for the company, if granted the rate increase, would be \$7,900.
