Five File For City Election, Personnal History Outlined

Five persons have filed for candidacy in the upcoming city council election. The places to be filled are the Mayor's post and two council seats.

Two people have filed in the race for mayor. They are Ray Hass and Frank Payne.

Mr. Hass has lived in Baird since 1952. He and his wife, Helen live at 537 Poplar Street. In addition to being retired from the military, he is a 30 year member of the Lion's Club, a lifetime member of the DAV and a Baptist.

Mr. Payne has been a resident of Baird for 40 years. He is a retired electrician, president of the Baird Cemetery Association, serves on the Baird Housing Authority Board, is present secretary of the Masonic Lodge and past Master and District Deputy of the Masonic Lodge.

Frank lives at 640 E. 5th with his wife Cora Mae.

Three people are running for the two council spots being vacated. They are Buddy Brame, DiDi Helton and Eva-

Four File For Three School Board Places

Four persons have filed for candidacy in the up-coming April 3 School Board election.

Three terms will be expiring at this time. Those whose terms are up are James Grant, Stan McCormick and Bruce Williams. They have all filed for re-election.

James Grant, who is Maintenance Construction supervisor for the Department of Highway and Public Transportation of Callahan County, lives in Baird with his wife, Janice and their two children, Sid who is a senior, and Loretta who is in the 8th grade.

Local Appraisal Review Board Members To Attend Orientation

Newly appointed review board members of appraisal districts and taxing jurisdictions in the area will attend a training session this week conducted by the State Property Tax Board to orient them to the duties and authority of the ARB. Functions of the ARB have been expanded by the legislature over those of the old boards of equalization.

The seminar will be held in Abilene on Wednesday, March 31, in the Central Jury Room, third floor, new Taylor County Courthouse, South Third and Oak Streets. It begins at 9 a.m. and is one of a series of such meetings scheduled at ten regional locations during March and April.

According to Kenneth Graeber the agenda for each session included an overview of ARB service, discussion of rule-making authority and presentation of the minimum requirements of administrative due process. The meeting will be led by members of the state agency's Office of General Counsel and Education & Standards Division.

"Instructors will review protest and challenge issues, management of hearings and record requirements and appeals of ARB orders to the district court", Graeber said.

While the old board of equalization was limited to review and hearing of protests of property values only, the ARB is empowered to hear and determine such issues as improper granting or denial of exemptions or special-use valuation, questions of proper jurisdiction to tax a property by a particular appraisal district or tax office, and a variety of chal-

lenges by taxing jurisdictions.

Like the previous BOEs, however, the ARB has no authority over tax rates or budgets of taxing jurisdictions.

The ARB has the right to subpoena witnesses and certain records, to request assistance from the State Property Tax Board and to consult legal counsel if the appraisal district has budgeted funds for that purpose.

In addition, the ARB must maintain records of its proceedings and issue written orders concerning its findings.

As was the case with the BOE, a property owner must be given notice of the appraised value of the property 20 days before ARB hearings are scheduled to begin. The notice must be sent if the appraised value is greater than the value rendered or greater than it was in the preceding year, or if the property was not on the preceding year's tax roll.

The property owner must now file a written notice of protest in order to be entitled to hearing and determination by the ARB.

According to the Texas Property Tax Code, appraisal district board of directors may, by resolution, expand the number of members to as many as 30, depending on the population of the district.

Graeber noted, "The presentations will be applicable to appraisal district ARB members and to members of review boards of taxing jurisdictions in counties where appraisal districts have postponed implementation."

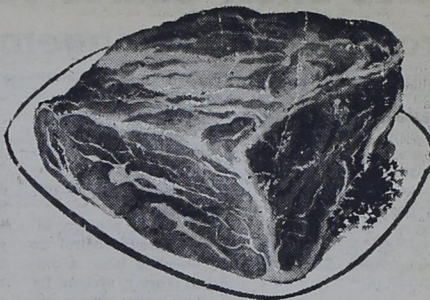

Horse Short Course To Feature Production, Management

Horsemen in Callahan County are invited to attend the annual Horse Short Course at Texas A&M University April 4-6 for the latest production and management information.

A day-and-a-half program at Rudder Center on the A&M campus beginning April 5 at 8:20

a.m. will feature discussions that should be of interest to every horseman, says Greg Gerngross county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Topics will concern internal parasite control on the breeding farm, a condition scoring system for maximizing broodmare performance, methods of feeding young horses, abrupt versus gradual weaning system, horse research at Texas A&M, colic in horses and the current status of the blister beetle problem in Texas.

Of special interest will be a talk on "A Scientific Approach to Maintaining Soundness and Increasing Speed in the Race Horse" by Tom Ivers of Oklahoma City, exercise physiologist and director of research with Celestial Acres Stud, Inc.

The program will also feature a discussion on the Texas Reined Cow Horse Association by the organization's president, Jack Brainard of Gainesville.

Other speakers include officials of Texas A&M's Department of Animal Science and College of Veterinary Medicine.

Two horses training sessions will also highlight the short course, points out Gerngross. One will be at 6:30 p.m. April 4 and will deal with "Training Horses in the Snaffle Bit." Professional horse trainer Bobby Ingersoll of Pleasant Grove, Calif., will demonstrate the basics of making

young horses into working cow horses.

The other horse training session will be at 1:30 p.m. April 6 and will be on "Training the Western Riding Horse." Professional horse trainer Buddy Roulston of Brenham will demonstrate the basics of biting, riding and training horses to prepare them for western riding.

Registration details for the horse short course are available at the county Extension office.

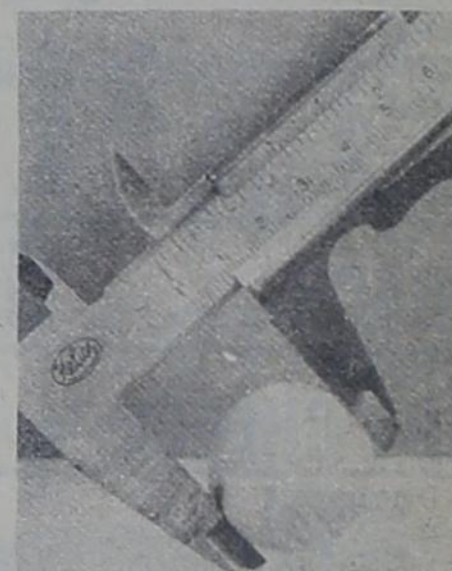

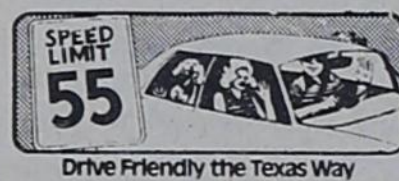



Sioux Natural Gas Corp., Houston, completed two Callahan County wells three miles south of Baird in the Mexia Creek Field.

No. 13 R.L. Griggs is located 600 feet from the north and 4,500 feet from the east lines of Thomas Asher Survey 528.

Daily potential was 40 barrels of 43.5 gravity oil, plus 10 barrels of water. Flow was through a 21-64-inch choke from perforations at 4,269-74 feet, treated with 1,000 gallons of acid.

Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 4,392 feet. Total depth was 4,422 feet and plugged back to 4,392 feet.

Gas-oil ratio was 10,000-1.

Other well is No. 10 Griggs, located 800 feet from the north and 2,000 feet from the east lines of the same survey.

Completed on a pump, it had a daily potential of three barrels of 43 gravity oil, plus nine barrels of water.

Production is from perforations at 4,083-87 feet, treated with 750 gallons of acid.

Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 4,212 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 4,228 feet.

N.D.C.L. Inc. from Dallas spotted No. 1 Henry W. Turner as a proposed 1,800-foot wildcat in Callahan County.

Location is five miles southeast of Putnam on a 40-acre lease.

Drillsite is 14,000 feet from the north and 150

feet from the east lines of Matilda Cherry Survey 4, A-110.

Morrison Drilling & Production Co. Inc., Abilene, will drill No. 1 McIntyre in the Jessica Field five miles east of Oplin.

The planned 4,100-foot venture is located on a 258-acre lease.

It spots 330 feet from the south and east lines of Section 3, I&GN Survey.

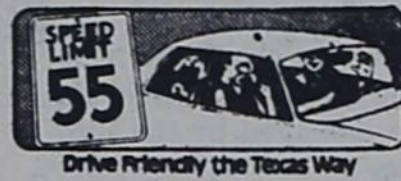

Tornado Season Safety Hints Given

There are steps you can take to protect yourself, your family and your valuables in a tornado catastrophe.

The most important is not to try to outrun the storm in your car. A study following the 1979 tornado that killed more than 40 persons in Wichita Falls, showed more than half those killed were attempting to flee the tornado in their cars.

The study by the Bureau of Epidemiology at the Federal Center for Disease Control in Atlanta resulted in the following recommendations:

1. Those in a single-family dwelling in tornado prone areas should identify

and reinforce some interior portion of their home as a shelter.

2. Mobile home parks should provide a community shelter for their residents.

3. All public buildings should have clearly designated tornado shelters.

4. Those in motor vehicles should seek shelter immediately when they hear a tornado warning.

The study of the storm, among the severest three percent of all tornadoes, concluded that adequate advance preparation is not enough. Critical to safety is what people do once they have been warned.

AFTER THE STORM

Broken power lines, shattered

glass, splintered wood and other sharp objects are among the hazards that may be encountered after the storm has passed, according to the Insurance Information Institute. Extreme care should be taken when moving about in the area damaged by the tornado.

Homeowners and businessmen who have suffered

damage to their property should make temporary repairs to prevent further damage from rain and wind and to prevent looting. Insurance representatives should be contacted as soon as possible. Prompt service usually is available within hours after a tornado or other disaster strikes a community.

Bingo Laws To Be Enforced

State Comptroller Bob Bullock today announced that Texas' new Bingo Enabling Act will be enforced by the letter by the Comptroller's office.

"Today I wish to put on notice everyone who conducts or enjoys the game of bingo in Texas that they will have opportunities to vote on this issue April 3 and August 14," Bullock said.

"In areas where there has been a vote on this issue, we are not going to second-guess the voters. Where they have approved the game, will be conducted according to provisions of the Bingo Enabling Act."

"Where the game has

not been approved, we will also be following provisions of this law, which went into effect November 10, 1981," Bullock added.

The Bingo Enabling Act's Section 42(c) provided that if the act is knowingly violated, "the court shall order all proceeds from the illegal bingo game or games to be forfeited to the appropriate governing body as a civil penalty."

Further, Bullock pointed out, violations of the act also carry criminal penalties under the Texas Penal Code.

"A word to the wise should be sufficient," Bullock said. "We mean to enforce this law."

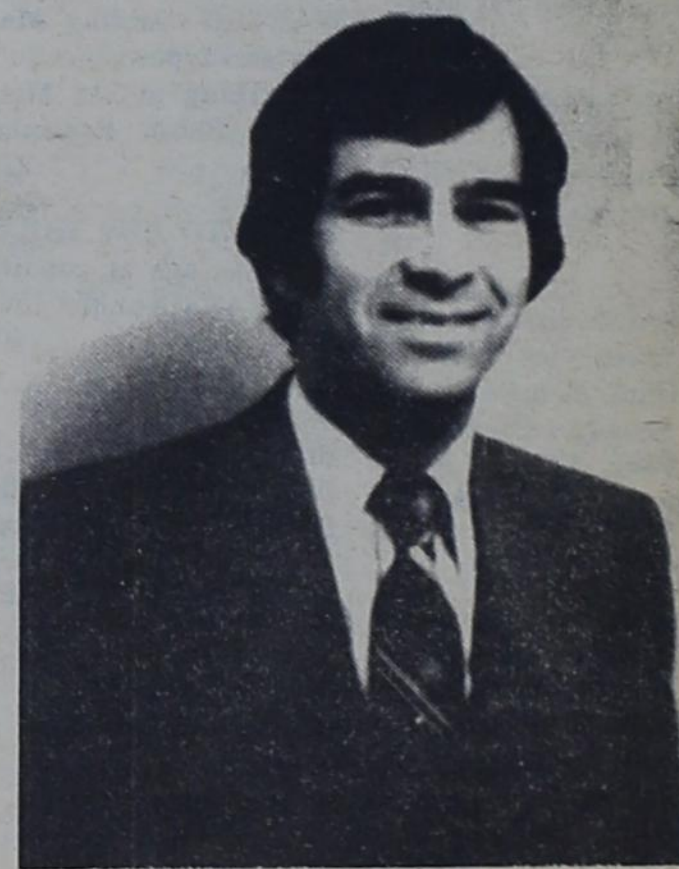
