Jim Foy, county agent urges all farmers not to purchase any dusting and spraying products that are not officially labeled. Some farmers were misled on purchases earlier this week and they still are bothered with

Farmers should not cut down on the amount of insecticides that they are using or they will have to dust twice as many times. If farmers will use enough in the first spraying or dusting, they will not be bothered with the pests, Foy stated.

Twenty-one mix and calciumarsenic are the best sources of killing the leaf worms and bugs. Foy says that 10 per cent DDT is not to be used for spraying





#### BIBLE COMMENT

#### Christ's Servants, Like Soldiers, Must **Practice Endurance**

TT is not only the soldiers serving in Korea that are being offered, in the words of Winston Churchill; "blood, sweat and tears"; vast numbers of our fellow-Christians across the world are also suffering cruel persecutions.

They have been enduring hardness and manifesting courage as truly and manfully as those who have been bearing arms. And endurance is the great, ultimate mark of the true and effective soldier. The long process of training is to make him hard and strong and firm of muscle and spirit, as well as efficient.

Paul himself exhorted Timothy to "endure hardness" as a good soldier of Jesus Christ. Paul knew from experience that a Christian could not live in the hostile environment of that ancient pagan world without suffering.

In offering his counsel to the runaway slave, Timothy, Paul felt the terms of warfare and soldiering aptly defined the nature of Christian life. It was his contention that the earthly soldier serves under imperfect commanders. He may be called upon to obey orders that are mistaken, and he may even know they are mistaken-"Into the valley of death rode the six hundred."

But the decisions of the Divine Commander are always wise, couched in careful planning and delivered with compassionate consideration of man's weaknesses and limitations.

The rule of Christ is from within. It is not a law from without. Christ leads; he does not compel. And we cannot be good soldiers without enduring the petty trials and tribulations of workaday life and meeting major disappointments and heartaches in soldierly fashion.

That is why Paul urged Timothy to be strong and firm.





#### Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief Act in Effect

The Selective Service Act of gress), as amended, which is now payment of taxes. in effect provides that the "Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief Act" of 1940 as amended, shall apply to person in military service, the of the U.S.

This act applies to any person in the military service only when in the opinion of a court that such person's opportunity and capacity to perform his obligations are impaired by reason of his being in the service who:

(a) Becomes a defendant in a court action.

(b) Has dependents occupying a dwelling for which the agreed rent does not exceed \$80 a month. (c) Prior to entry into service, contracted to purchase real estate or personal property upon the installment plan.

(d) Has obligations relative to mortgages on real estate or personal property.

(e) Holds policies of life insurance of a face value not exceeding Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Patton, 1008 Tahoka Road, completed her

(f) Has taxes or assessments upon personal property falling . . and-or (g) has initiated or acquired a right to lands owned or controlled by the U.S.




