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Heart of Flood Control.

Early in July, in the state of Oklahoma, a ceremony of great significance took place. The Governor of the state and other notables dedicated the Number 1 Detention Dam on the Cloud Creek Water shed, and so put into practical application a program of flood contro which may set a precedent for the country as a whole.

The program marks the first attempt by the government to help solve the problem of flood damage to small areas on the headwater tributaries of streams - the areas where actual water destruction is often greatest. Efforts to start it began as long ago as 1930, and were advanced by Congressional action in 1936. Surveys indicate that the program can provide a return of \$3.85 in benefits for each dollar invested.

The program has various phases. First of all, it is confined t flood control, and flood control alone. The measures taken include small detention reservoirs, major gully control structures, flood water diversions, special silt traps, erosion prevention, and so on Heavy emphasis is placed on holding water on the land. Farmers are voluntarily cooperating by pursuing scientific means of soil utilization. A marked reduction in the extent of flood damage in the region is confidently anticipated. On top of that, it is expected that irre placeable wild life resources will be protected and increased.

More and more experts who have studied the problem of water damage have come to the belief that this program is representative of the right approach. Despite political propaganda, it is evident that great power dams, which must be kept nearly full of water to pro duce sufficient fall, are virtually useless for controlling floods Oklahoma is to be congratulated on putting through a project whose significance is at last appreciated.

In a single word the answer would be, COURTESY. That's the belief of George Clarke, managing director of the Texas Safety Association.

"All rules of the road boil down to this fundamental concept courtesy," said Mr. Clarke.

"The biggest collision-maker we have on the highway today is the fellow who refuses to yield right-of-way," he declared. "Yet the simple exercise of courtesy could prevent most mishaps.

The Association is cooperating with the National Safety Council's safety education program for August, emphasizing courtesy and defensive driving. These rules were offered for life-saving on the


