Friday's High of 104 Ties Record For Year, Cooler Weather Expected

Southern Baptist To Launch Sunday School Campaign

Southern Baptist Sunday School workers, in the closing session of a six-day leadership conference at Ridgecrest, N. C., last week launched a program to add 600,000 new pupils to the enrollment of their schools and to establish 3,000 new schools during the coming year. The largest gain in any one year in Sunday School enrollment was 265,000.

Dr. R. G. Lee, president of the Southern Baptist Convention said, "Southern Baptists are able to accomplish this enlarged program. The spiritual needs of our nation demand that this job be done now."

J. N. Barnette, secretary of Sunday School promotion for the Southern Baptists, speaking for the state and nationwide leaders, presented the major items in the expansion program. Mr. Barnette said the present Sunday School enrollment in Southern Baptist churches totals 4,100,000 but there are forty million white people in the territory of the convention not enrolled in any Sunday School.

W. A. Harrell, head of the department of church architecture, said that a recent survey of Baptist churches in the South revealed that thirty million dollars would be spent in the enlargement of church buildings in the next year, and three hundred million in the next ten years. He said that at the present rate of building, Southern Baptist churches would double the capacity of their Sunday School equipment in twelve years.

Dr. W. A. Griswell, pastor of the First Methodist church, Dallas, brought the closing message of the conference on "The Call of the Unfinished Task." Rev. Griswell used as his text the words of the Lord to Joshua, "Arise and lead this people over Jordan."

"Our forefathers have given us marvelous instruments of conquest," declared Dr. Griswell. "They preached, they taught, they built, they organized. Yet they committed to us an unfinished task — one of the most challenging in all of our history. Like our fathers of old, we will face this task courageously and accomplish it."

Employing visual aids, Mr. Barnette used sixty people to present dramatically the threefold emphasis of the expansion program — (1) the enrollment goal of 600,000 not gain, (2) expanded Bible teaching program and (3) a soul winning emphasis.

There is more said about the weather and less done about it than any other thing; and Ciscoans were saying plenty about it yesterday when thermometers registered a sizzling 104. The mercury hit the high mark at 4 p. m. and stayed there for almost two hours. The low for the day was 76, which was recorded early Friday morning.

The weather man, who suffers along with everyone else, has looked into his crystal ball, and examined what other gadgets he uses and has come up with some encouraging news. He reports a cool front located over the plains area and heading this way. According to his report, the mass of cool air should reach suffering Cisco citizens some time Sunday.

The incoming cool front should lower temperatures as much as ten degrees, according to the report. The high for Sunday was estimated to reach 95.

In spite of the excessive heat, water officials were able to keep the pressure to the desired level except for a short period late in the evening. They said that fittings for the new pump house to be constructed at the recently finished reservoir on College Hill were expected at any time, and work would start immediately on completing the job.

Meanwhile they are working night and day to assure Cisco citizens of sufficient water for home and business use.

Draft Boards To Receive Surplus Office Equipment

Surplus office equipment originally costing approximately \$100,000 has been turned over to the Bureau of Federal Supply for distribution to Selective Service Boards throughout the region, the Grand Prairie office of War Assets Administration reported today.

The equipment is being used to set up draft board offices in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana and Mississippi. There are approximately 800 such offices to be established within the five state area served by the WAA region.

The WAA said that much of the surplus was originally set aside for sale to World War I veterans, but was withdrawn when the national defense needs of selective service became evident during recent months. A large part of the equipment was made available by contraction of WAA offices at Grand Prairie, Houston, San Antonio, New Orleans, Oklahoma City, Little Rock and Jackson, Miss.

Materials include typewriters, desks, chairs, tables, costumers, filing cabinets, staplers and other office supplies.

Charters Issued To 341 Businesses

AUSTIN, Aug. 21 — Texas charters were issued to 341 businesses in July, compared to 283 in June, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Capitalization total for July was \$9,071,000. Merchandise businesses received 101 charters in July, real estate, 45; and manufacturing, 32.

Six Texas businesses failed in July. There were 12 failures in June 1948 and 4 in July 1947. Average liabilities were \$123,000 in July, compared with \$36,000 in June; and \$98,000 in July 1947.

Sixteen From Here Attend Nazarene District Assembly

Sixteen delegates and visitors from Cisco were among the one thousand that attended the combined Abilene District Assembly and Camp Meeting of the Nazarene Churches recently held in Plainview, headquarters of the district.

The meetings were held in the new tabernacle, which is in the process of development. The city of Plainview and civic organizations there donated a large sum of money toward the location of the permanent camp in that city. The building is located on a 15 acre tract in the city limits, and when completed will seat more than 1,200 persons. It is 90 by 100 feet, and is of modern architecture and structure.

For a number of years Cisco was the center for the district camp meetings, but the crowds became so large it was decided to seek a more suitable place. Since Cisco had no available space, the present location was decided on, officials of the church said.

Rev. W. B. Walker was re-elected district superintendent. Dr. G. B. Williamson, general superintendent, presided over the meetings, and dedicated the new tabernacle. Dr. T. M. Anderson of Wilmore, Ky., was the camp meeting preacher, and talked at all sessions.

U. S. Highway 80 Association Lists Main Objectives

A campaign to acquaint the motoring public of the United States with the advantages of traveling over U. S. Highway 80 and with the tourist attractions offered along the route has been outlined by Fred Brown, bank

vice president of Eastland, Texas, who is the new president of U. S. Highway 80 Association. The route runs from San Diego, Calif., to Savannah, Ga., and Cisco is on "80."

The objectives, to be discussed at a meeting of officials and directors of the association in Sept., are set forth by Brown:

"We want to work in each State for the best physical highway in the United States, working through each State Highway Department on any segment needing to be made more modern. We already have a fine highway, probably the only all-weather highway crossing the continent, and we want to make it finer."

"The association expects, over a period of years, to help make all the people along U. S. 80 fully aware of the importance of tourists business so that tourists will meet a universal attitude of courtesy and hospitality."

"We plan to raise funds through annual membership along the entire route, on a nominal basis, especially among persons directly benefitted by highway traffic and by increase in the volume of such traffic. We desire to obtain as many members of the association as possible because through numbers, greater enthusiasm can be engendered."

"When these goals are attained, the association will be able to make known all over the United States the advantages of traveling over U. S. 80 and the many attractions of a scenic and historical nature to be found along the route."

Organized Reserves Re-Entering Army Entitled to Employment Rights

AUSTIN, Aug. 20th — Officers and enlisted men of the Organized Reserves who re-enter the Army on extended active duty because of its expansion as a result of the new Selective Service Law are entitled to re-employment rights and benefits when released from active duty as provided by law, Col. Oscar B. Abbott, Senior Instructor of the Organized Reserves of Texas announced today. Personnel coming on active duty solely for limited periods of training are not entitled to re-employment rights; except by individual arrangement with his employer.

Col. Abbott, in an extended discussion of Organized Reserves, further stated that "applicants for extended active duty, except Medical Officers and Chaplains, will now obtain final type physical examinations at the nearest military station at no expense to the government for their travel. The report of physical examination must accompany the application for extended active duty."

Heretofore, physical examinations have been accomplished after the applicant was accepted.

All Army personnel and Army stations that will give physical examinations have been instructed to give Organized Reservists requesting a physical for the purpose of applying for extended active duty, a complete final type examination without requiring any written authorization.

Accepted applicants for extended active duty will hereafter be issued orders by the Department of the Army in Washington instead of returning applications to area commands for orders. "These changes are all designed to expedite the process of ordering applicants to active duty and are important to interested Organized Reserve personnel."

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Good Neighbor Week.

Following an official request of the Latin-American Relations Commission of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, Gov. Beauford Jester has proclaimed the week of November 15, as Good Neighbor Week in Texas.

At the same time he has issued an executive order to the heads of all state departments and institutions in Texas, calling for furtherance of the Good Neighbor Policy, now officially being promoted by the Texas Good Neighbor Commission.

Such action was urged by the WTCC in an effort to bring about the lifting of the embargo on Mexican seasonal labor in Texas, which will prevent cotton pickers from South of the border coming into Texas this year. Included with the WTCC request were letters and telegrams from most of the mayors and Chamber of Commerce managers in the West Texas cotton growing area.

The organization now is asking Gov. Jester and the Good Neighbor Commission to take these pledges of cooperation with copies of the governor's official proclamation and executive order, directly to the highest officials in the Mexican government. According to General Manager D. A. Bandeen of the WTCC, Texas has showed by its official action its desire to be good neighbors, and he believes the Mexican government will respond by lifting the so-called economic sanction which prevents Mexican seasonal workers being brought into the state. Bandeen has pointed out that available labor will be inadequate to harvest the heavy yield of cotton in West Texas, in an area sparsely populated and a heavy producer of cotton.

"Undoubtedly there are many positive acts of good neighborliness in your office, or known to your office, which would be valuable in giving a fair picture of the growth of good relations in this state," Gov. Jester wrote. "It is a part of our job as the government of the state of Texas to see that the progressive side of our state is known as well as the items requiring correction."

In designating the Good Neighbor Week, Gov. Jester urged solidarity and friendship.

"Because of the proximity of Texas to lands occupied by Latin-Americans and the enormous potential of modern industry for the development of the resources of the earth, we have this choice: either to work out our destiny in mutual happiness and prosperity, or to cast away opportunity for unfortunate and unnecessary divisions that keep us in stagnation and fear."

Bandeen has urged Thomas Sutherland, executive secretary of the Good Neighbor Commission to take this official action directly to Mexico City.

"We do not believe the republic of Mexico will want to further foster economic discrimination against the cotton growers of Texas or against its own Nationals who would receive compensation far greater than it would be possible for them to earn in their own country, because of a few isolated cases of so-called discrimination in a great state with 254 counties and 7,000,000 people," Bandeen wrote.

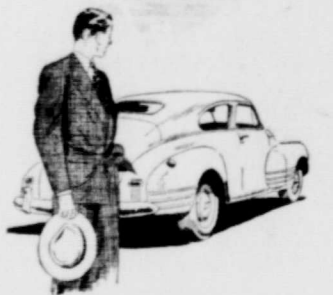

Naval Air Station At Corpus Christi Needs Skilled Men

The Naval Air Station at Corpus Christi announced Saturday that it needed qualified workers to carry out its expanding aircraft overhaul program.

The announcement listed opportunities for skilled and semi-skilled workers in the following lines: aircraft mechanics, metal-smiths, radio mechanics, toolmakers, sheetmetal workers, electricians, and helpers for the craftsmen.

Application may be made for these positions by submitting a completed standard form 60 (application for Federal Employment) to the Industrial Relations Department, U. S. Naval Air Station, Corpus Christi, Texas.

The application forms can be obtained from any first or second class post office, or from the Corpus Christi office.

WAA Will Close Two Big Offices

Tightening its organizational belt another notch in the five-state southwest region, the War Assets Administration will close its Houston and San Antonio offices August 31 leaving its Grand Prairie headquarters to handle future surplus property disposals for the state of Texas, Col. Karl E. Wallace, WAA regional director, announced today.

The contraction is part of the agency's program of liquidation

under which WAA will be dissolved nationally by February 28, 1949.

Both the Houston office, located in the Milam Bldg., and the San Antonio office, at 610 South Flores, are now operating with staffs of five people, Wallace said. A sales crew of four persons to conduct on the spot disposals will continue to clear out small remaining inventories in the south Texas area, he said.

Less than eighteen months ago, more than 750 employees were on the WAA payroll at each of the two offices, which were then in

charge of disposals for southwest Texas regions. As late as December, 1947, sales averaging upwards of a million dollars weekly in terms of original cost of government surplus were being chalked up at the two locations.

A series of personnel reductions begun in the last half of 1947 gradually decreased the workers to a skeleton force. A branch office formerly maintained by WAA at Beaumont has been closed for several months. Houston and San Antonio War Assets offices have been in continuous operation since 1944.

Information centers to serve prospective purchasers of war surplus in the southwest region will continue to be maintained by WAA at New Orleans, La.; Jackson, Miss.; Little Rock, Ark.; and Oklahoma City, Okla., in addition to the regional office at Grand Prairie, Texas.

Students Not To Be in Draft

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 21.—College students in the ROTC, whether they be senior, junior, sophomore or freshman, are not subject to the draft for the 1948-49 school term, provided they meet certain qualifications, F. C. Bolton, executive vice-president and dean of the college of Texas A&M College, said today.

"After the 1948-49 session, however, the secretary of defense is very properly providing a continued supply of qualified reserve officers by setting up a plan of deferment for ROTC students which will permit them to complete their college courses and have their reserve commissions before being called to perform their tours of military service," Bolton says.

Building Permits Increase in Texas

Texas building permits rose 22 per cent in July, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Building permits for 53 Texas cities, totaling \$40,500,351, were also 23 per cent above July 1947.

Houston ranked first with permits totaling \$8,654,000. Dallas, totaling \$6,240,586, was second; San Antonio, Ft. Worth, and El Paso followed in that order.

After adjustment for seasonal variation, the Bureau's index of building permits jumped 53 per cent to 795 per cent of the prewar (1935-39) base period.

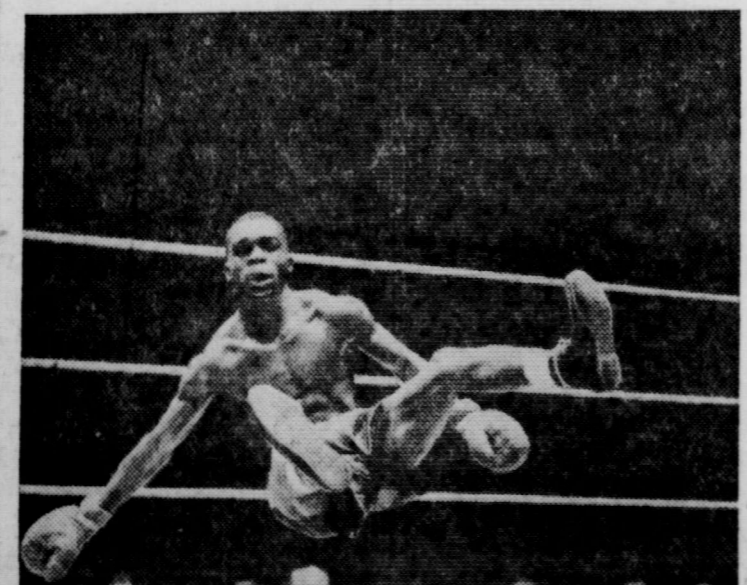
