Major Surles arrived in Japan during April 1946, and assumed command of the 20th Combat Mapping Squadron at Yokota. This is the the 31st Reconnaissance Squadron. During October 1947 he was transferred to Headquarters, Fifth Air Force where he took over duties as the photo reconnaissance officer of the Firth Air Force, aiding and directing the Post Hostilities Mapping Project of the Japanese occupation area. Major Surles returned to Yokota Air Force Base during July 1948 and was assigned to the 71st Reconnaissance Group, the outstanding photographic reconnaissance unit in the Fifth Air Force.

Major Surles graduated from Cisco High School in 1935 and Randolph Junior College, Cisco, Texas, in 1937 He also attended the University of Texas, at Austin, Texas, and was employed by the Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company of Cisco, Texas. He graduated from Aviation Cadet training at San Antonio, Texas, during June 1940 and was awarded his pilot's wings and commission

Major Surles departed on his first overseas tour during December 1941 and was at Pearl Harbor on that fateful morning of December 7th. He flew with the Fifth Air Force in the Southwest Pacific from this date until November 1942. A year and a half later he returned to the China-Burma-India Theater where he was assigned as the photo reconnaissance officer of this Theater, He returned to the United States during February 1945.

Who are the Pixies? Several weeks ago, capitol correspondents at Austin spent a hot




