Pioneer Attorney Dies Early Friday

Judge James R. Burnett, pioneer Eastland County attorney, died at his home at 1505 Avenue D at 9 a.m. Friday after a lengthy illness. Judge Burnett came to Cisco some 25 years ago from Eastland, and had been a practicing attorney until his retirement two years ago. He was born in Madisonville, Texas on November 5, 1873 and came to Eastland county in the early part of 1900.

Funeral services will be held at the First Baptist Church at 3 p.m. Sunday with Rev. H. J. Starnes of Weatherford in charge. He will be assisted by Rev. Otis Sprickland. Burial will be in Oakwood. Thomas Funeral Home is in charge of the arrangements.

He is survived by his wife and one daughter, Mrs. Marion Macdonald of Los Angeles, California. Also surviving is one grandson, George Macdonald.

Other survivors include three brothers, J. H. of McAllen; Will of Meridian; and Oscar of Madisonville; two sisters, Mrs. W. A. McNair of Madisonville and Mrs. J. L. Pumphard of Temple.

Wranglers Take Conference Opener From Clifton Junior College Team

Clifton, Sept. 23—The work of militant Paul Mosley and hard jabbing forward line enabled the Wranglers of Cisco Junior College to clamp a 13 to 6 triumph over Clifton Junior College here Thursday night in the Northern district race for the local club. Several hundred Wrangler followers made up the partisan crowd from Cisco.

Mosley's kicking was outstanding and loaded with emphasis. Time after time, he propelled long, spiraling punts that kept the Cowboys in the red and under control at most times. And Mosley played two quarters with a broken finger—an injury he suffered early in the season.

Holding to a 7 to 6 lead most of the way, the Wranglers sewed up the fray in the final seconds of the fourth quarter when Bill McGuire stiffhanded center for the second touchdown. Ailing with a badly bruised leg, he was in the game for only one play.

Mosley's accurate booting can be given much credit for the payoff drive that bounced the Wranglers' lead to a safety point. Unable to gain momentum necessary to pull their punch-digging plays, the Wrangler eleven was forced to punt from their own 47 yard line. It was here that Mosley laid his toe to the ball to flip it out on the Cowboy's seven yard line.

Taking the ball on their eight yard line, after an unsuccessful attempted run back, Dave Oliver of the Cowboys whipped into tackle only to be tripped by Raymond Penn and Gene Milsap. In his desperation, Oliver shoved a lateral into the arms of Wrangler Garryn Lee who sped to the Cowboys six yard marker.

Two plays later Cisco received a 15 yard penalty. On the following play, the unexpected happened, the Cowboys were dropped for a 15 yard penalty, in which the ball was returned to their 3-yard strip. The next play saw the Wranglers clinch the win.

Clifton's Dave Oliver proved time after time to the locals that his snappy broken field sprints and rifle armed passes were meant to inflict serious threats upon the

Wranglers. Three separate occasions, Oliver and Holt juggled the ball into deep Wrangler territory before a stubborn line broke up the might-be touchdown thrust.

Taking over the offensive on their own 35 in the waning minutes of the second stanza, Oliver scampered around right end for what seemed to be an assured driving thrust. His jaunt netted 16 yards before he was halted. Running mate Don Holt chalked an additional five yard gain on the following play. And four seconds later, Oliver, on a hand off from John Massingale, plowed to the Wranglers' seven yard mark.

It was Oliver again who broke through tackle for the pay-off jaunt. A place kick for extra point was blocked.

The Wranglers initial touchdown came early in the first quarter. After exchanging the ball in 14 plays, Coach Everett's boys powered for 65 yards to the Cowboy's goal. Here, spec romping was handed the work horse chores.

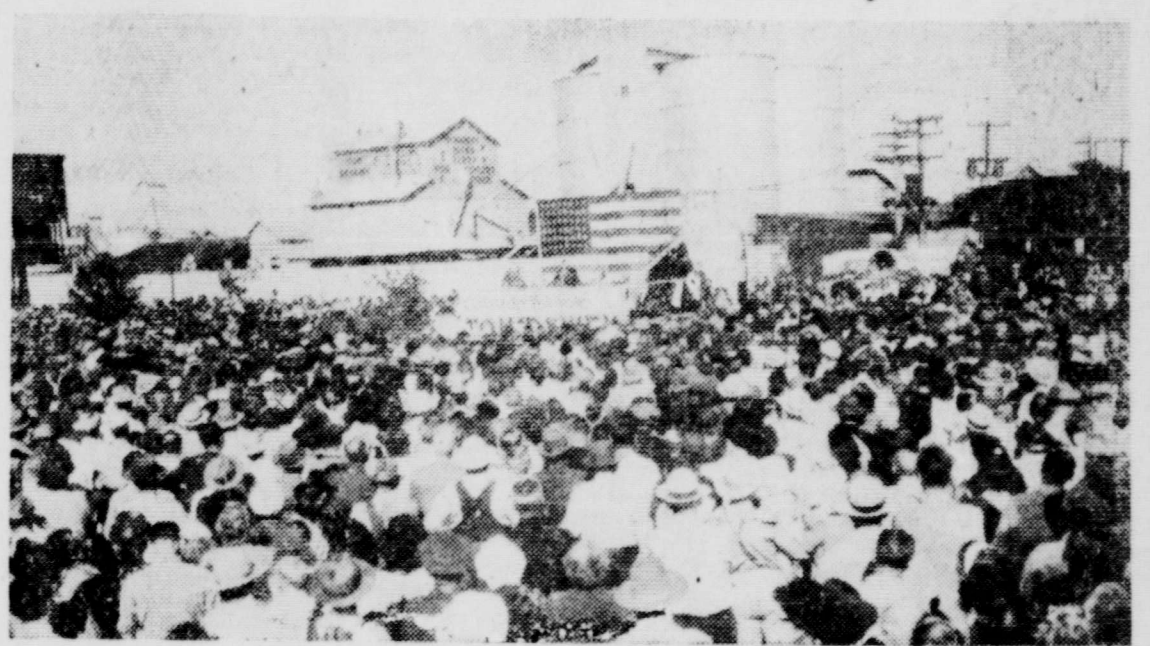
Quickly setting the tempo, Jack Leveridge cupped end to boost the ball to the Cowboys 20 yard line. Three plays later, Tompkins bucked the line to bolster the Wranglers' six points in the lead. He crossed the double strips from the host's seven yard line. Mosley converted.

Raymond Penn, Gene Milsap and Wesley Rutherford on duty in the line turned in impressive performances, while the backs seemed to click on their part with Leveridge Tompkins and Gann.

In the statistics, Cisco pulled out front in the fourth after taking a beating in the first and second periods. For yards gained by rushing, Cisco gained 118 yards to the Cowboys 58. In ground yardage, Clifton lost out when Oliver was nailed for a 24 yard set back and another for nine.

Cisco was formed to punt six times to the Cowboys' seven boots. The Wranglers tallied four first downs while Clifton made nine. In the air, Cisco completed 2 out of 4 for 36 yards while Clifton placed 2 out of 6 for 10 yards. Cisco drew seven penalties for 55 yards and Clifton took 3 for 45. Clifton fumbled three to the visitors' none.

The Lobos, primed and ready are almost to their full strength as Coaches Hansard and Overall have not benched a potential first stringer as the result of an injury.

Hansard is fielding his entire A starters in his forward line, the middle of which should be tough to crack. Attack Victim Is Released From Ranger Hospital

Travis Gregory of Fort Worth was released from the West Texas Hospital in Ranger this morning after being treated for wounds sustained when he was attacked by a 22-year-old negro worker at the Gulf Camp north of Ranger about 3:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

Gregory sustained wounds in the side, on the hand and head when Connel Griffin, in a fit of rage, attacked and beat him with a rock. Gregory, 27, and a foreman for the Fort Worth Sand and Gravel Company, was unconscious for five hours after being taken to the hospital.

According to Gregory, he had fired the negro because he refused to take orders. The negro became enraged and started cursing the foreman and then attacked him with the rock.

Police were notified of the assault and immediately launched a search for him. About 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, T. K. Hardy and several other men were scouring the woods around the camp and spotted the man. They notified police and Alfred Ames went to the scene and took the negro into custody. He offered no resistance to arrest. Later in the evening he was turned over to the sheriff's department and is being held in the county jail pending the filing of charges.

Gregory is part of a crew of men working on construction at the Gulf camp.

The Eastland County Chapter of the National Foundation to fight infantile paralysis has just received a check for \$1,000 to restore funds which have been depleted in the county through expenses incurred by six cases of the disease in the county.

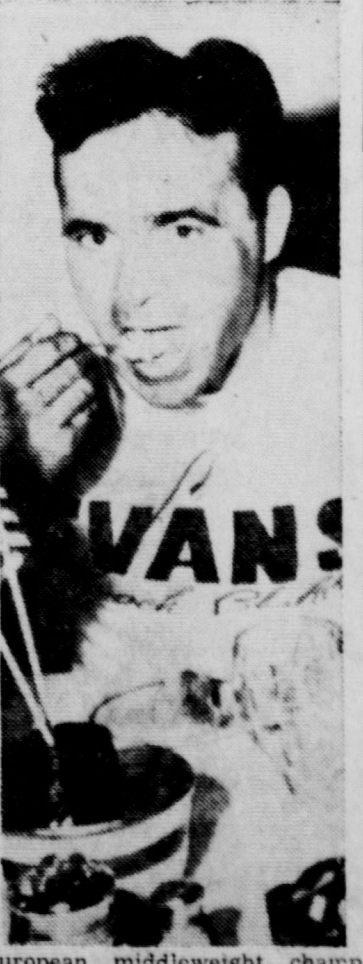

Examinations Set By Civil Service

Examinations were announced today by the U. S. Civil Service Commission for metallurgist, \$3,727 to \$4,235 a year, Radar Instructor, \$3,727 to \$7,432 a year, and Radar Instructor (Trainee), \$2,974 a year.

The radar instructor and trainee positions are located at Keesler Air Force Base, Department of the Air Force, Biloxi, Mississippi. No written test is required of applicants for these positions. To qualify competitors for the trainee jobs must have had four years of professional or responsible sub-professional experience in radar repair and maintenance; in instructing in radar or radio repair and

maintenance; or in electronics research or closely related work. College study in electrical engineering, physics or mathematics, may be substituted for this experience. Provision is also made for substituting experience in teaching engineering, mathematics or physics; or training or experience in the repair of radios for part of the required experience. For radar instructor positions paying \$3,727 to \$7,432 applicants must have had, in addition to the above experience or education, experience as a resident instructor in electrical engineering or physics in an institution above high school level. For positions paying \$5,232 to \$7,432, supervisory experience is required. Details of these requirements are given in the examination announcement.

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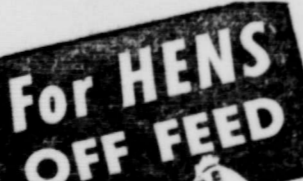

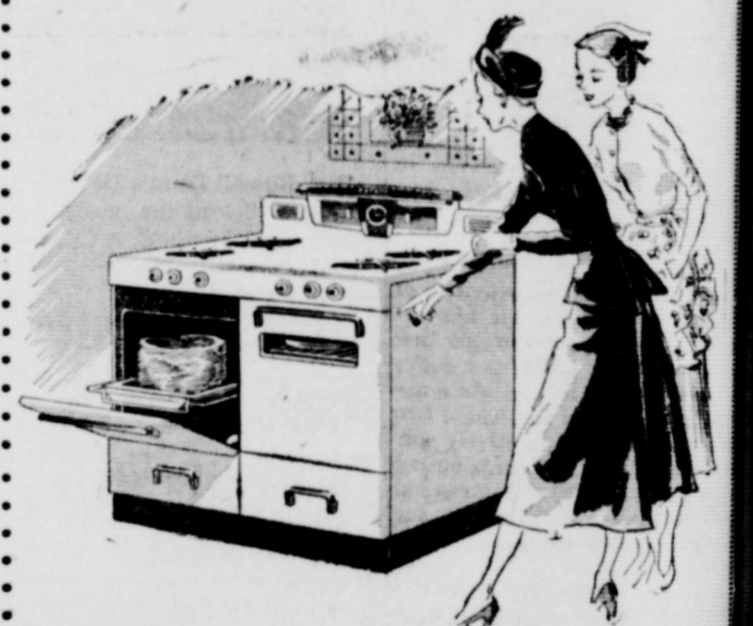
