Good Well in Prospect as Lone Star Prepares to Complete Their No. 1 Fee

Lone Star Producing Company believed Saturday that they will be able to complete their No. 1 C. H. Fee, eastern extension in the Kleiner field, as a good well, although tests showed comparatively little gas pressure. The well was treated with 500 gallons of acid Thursday and oil appeared. The well was shut in and pressure on the casing had increased. Operators expect to renew completion work Monday. They were confident that the well could make it allowable as a pumper without further work. There was a probability that it might be treated with additional acid with the hope of making the well flow.

Two other wells in the field were nearing the Mississippi horizon. Potter and Alsbrook were below 3,600 in their No. 2 C. J. Kleiner and expected to top the pay zone by Monday. Lone Star's No. 3 Kleiner was drilling below 3,400 early Saturday.

Lone Star set surface pipe Friday night in their No. C-1 Kleiner an Ellenburger test some nine miles north of Cisco on the Eastland-Stephens County line.

According to reports the H. W. Skelly No. 1 Thomas was seeking pay in the Ranger formation, drilled several months ago, operators were unable to complete it in the Mississippi. Recently, a spudding was moved in for another try.

David B. Trammell and James McCurdy, Fort Worth, spudded in Thursday afternoon on their No. 1 City of Cisco, an Ellenburger test on the old city airport tract inside the city limits. The location is west of the Kleiner pool, near Mississippi lime production.

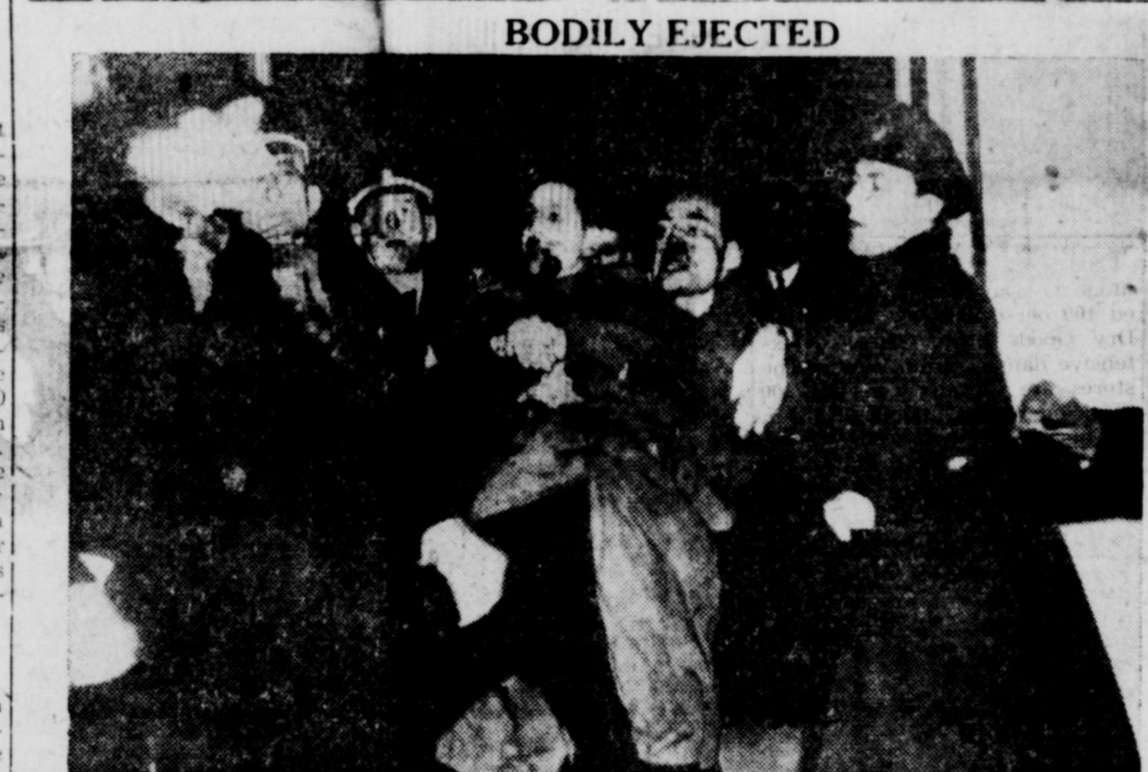

Students Asked To Help in Sale Of Tickets For Christmas Program

Students of Cisco schools will be admitted free to the presentation of "The Messiah" here at 3 p. m. Sunday, Dec. 19, providing they sell two tickets for 50 cents each. The Lions Club ticket committee announced Saturday. Announcements concerning the event will be made in the schools during the coming week. The Lions Club will use profits from the program to buy a piano for the stage of the new gymnasium-auditorium.

The new building which is complete with a regulation size basketball court, a stage, four dressing rooms and ample storage space is in the final stages of construction and will be ready for the Tuesday ceremonies. Construction under the direction of J. L. Black and Sons, general contractors, has gone forward few weeks were used in the without hitch and comparatively erection.

The opening ceremonies will feature short talks by civic leaders and school officials and will consume little time. Three basketball games have been scheduled for the opening. The Cisco Junior College has scheduled a game with the Howard Payne B squad and the Lobos will play either the Eastland Mavericks or a team from Olden. The tentative program pits the Lobo Queens against a girls team from Olden. 7 p.m. has been set as the time for the opening game but school officials stated that it was possible that the girls game would start a short time before the official opening.

Workmen were busy Saturday sanding the huge maple floor prior to finishing it for play. It will be one of the best basketball courts in the area when all work is complete.

The playing floor will be illuminated with 12 huge lamps of 1,000 watts each. The building will be heated by six overhead heaters capable of producing 840,000 btus per minute. Sport fans will be assured of ample heat during performances. In addition to the 12,000 watts of lighting the gym is equipped with a gigantic flood light that can be raised or lowered and used for boxing events. The large stage is at the north end of the building and the basketball goal at the end can be raised when the stage is in use.

The new building will seat 640 people at basketball games and can take care of 1,500 patrons at events requiring the use of the stage. There are two well lighted and ventilated dressing rooms off the stage and two large size dressing rooms to be used by basketball teams. Each dressing room is equipped with four showers with gleaming white walls.

The committee in charge of securing the building for the use of Cisco citizens was high in its praise of Mr. Black and his sons for the fine work they had done in taking down the building in Del Rio and bringing it to Cisco where they spent little time in rebuilding it for use. As an example of the care taken, the floor which is of maple was taken up and relaid with a loss of less than 100 square feet.

The complete building adds much to Cisco in beauty and as an answer to a long time need for a community center. It is finished with a beautiful and lasting asbestos siding and is attractively painted on the outside. The inside will remain unpainted until later, it was announced.

Everyone was invited to visit and assist in the opening ceremony the building Tuesday night monies.

Then, the price of that meal, for as long a period as the individual Texan can afford, may be sent by check or money order to the Silent Guest Committee in care of the Governor's Office in Austin.

The nation-wide campaign is designed to collect enough donations to help 230,000,000 undernourished and sick children throughout the world. The UNICEF will distribute 75 percent of the collections abroad, while 25 percent will be kept in America to help our own needy children.

Texas 4-H'ers Win Special Recognition

SUPERIOR records in 1948 National 4-H Soil Conservation, Recreation and Rural Arts, and Dairy Production programs won three Texas club members special recognition. The winners and brief outlines of their records follow:



Edwin Hanz, Jr., 21, of New Braunfels received the State winner's award for outstanding achievement in the 1948 National 4-H Soil Conservation awards program. Edwin put into practice such soil saving and building operations as constructing terraces, contouring, using phosphate and fertilizer, making drainage ditches, building dams and rotating crops. During three years of club work he has completed 18 projects and has served as assistant leader and president of his local club. In recognition of his achievements, Edwin has been given a \$25.00 U.S. Savings Bond, provided by Firestone. Promoting recreational and handicraft work has brought State recognition to Gene Mastey, Jr., 16, of Moore. His record will be judged to determine the eight national winners in the 1948 National 4-H Recreation and Rural Arts program. Objectives of the program are to assist 4-H members in developing cultural and recreational opportunities in their homes and communities, help 4-H members develop a higher appreciation of rural arts, make 4-H programs more attractive and self-satisfying and teach members to lead recreational activities. Each of the counties having an outstanding recreational program received a \$25.00 cash award, provided by United States Rubber Company. Doyle Davis, 18, of Hart, was the top State winner whose record was considered for sectional and national honors in the National 4-H Dairy Production awards program. 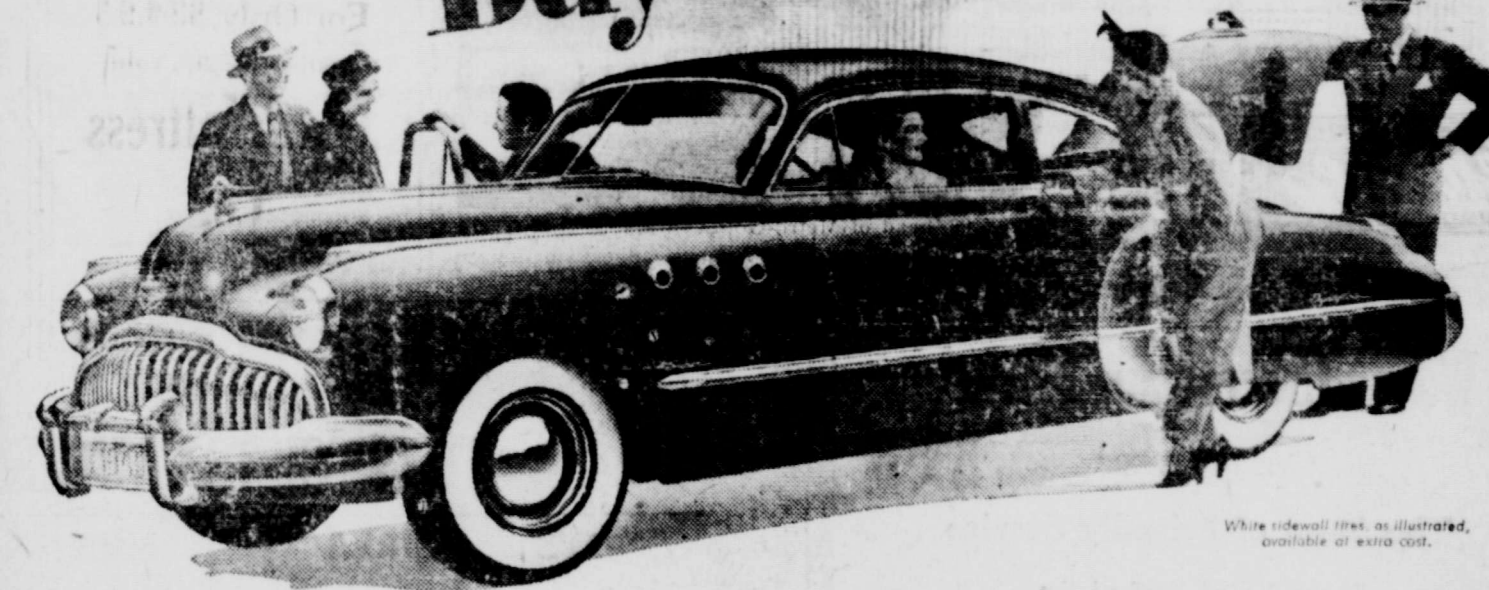

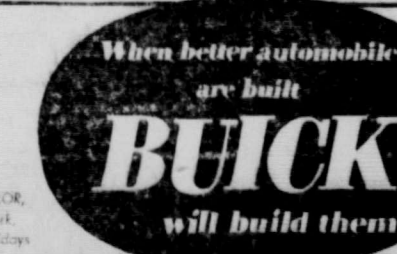

It in Peanut op For 1949 Ordered

Agriculture Secretary Charles Brannan Wednesday told peanut farmers to reduce their acreage by 22 percent next year if they want to receive government guarantee.

At the same time the Agricultural Department set bigger production goals for poultry, milk,

several vegetables, sheep and lambs.
Mr. Brannan proclaimed a marketing quota of 850,000 tons of peanuts for 1949. This year's crop is estimated at 1,144,000 tons. He said there would be a big peanut surplus next year if action is not taken to prevent it.
Next year's recommended peanut acreage, will total 2,611,367 acres compared with 3,340,000 acres this year. Peanut farmers earlier this year voted to continue such acreage control to continue eligibility for price support.
The department asks for a 10 percent increase in production of

chickens and turkeys, a 17 percent boost in the spring pig crop and a 3 per cent boost in milk production. This year's sheep and lamb flocks totals 28,500,000. The department wants at least 2,000,000 more next year. A 12 per cent increase in the sweet potato crop and boosts for 19 summer vegetables are requested.

Methods to Find Oil Are Studied

AUSTIN, Dec. 11—With new oil fields becoming increasingly hard to find, greater emphasis is being placed on methods of getting more oil from known fields, says a University of Texas petroleum professor.

Dr. George H. Fancher has collaborated with Dr. Morris Muskat, Pittsburgh, Pa., research physicist, on a chapter entitled "Theoretical Considerations In-

volved in Secondary Recovery Operations" in a forthcoming book being published by the Secondary Recovery committee of the American Petroleum Institute.

The committee is composed of 300 members from all over the United States, and is revising its initial secondary recovery publication in line with increasing interest in that problem.

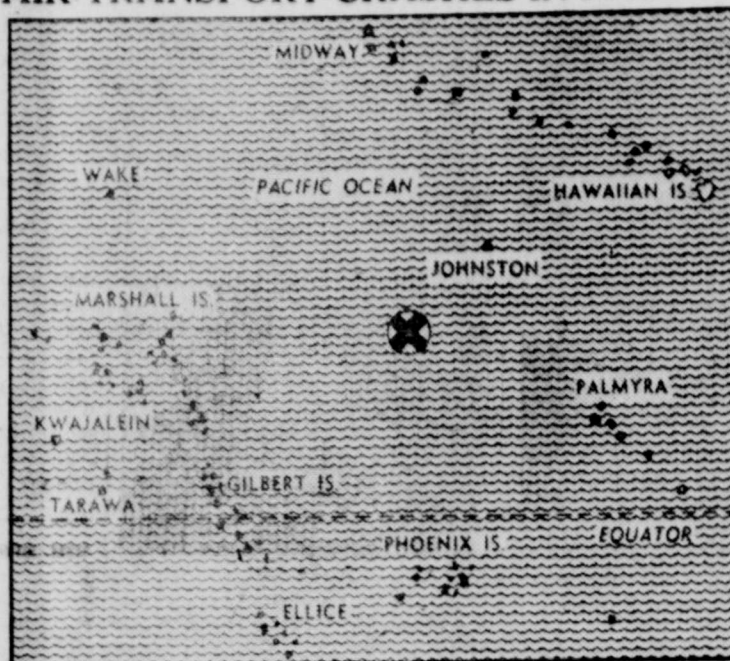
Initial publication of the book was in 1942.

More Support For County Farmers And Ranchers Promised

Eastland county farmers and ranchers will receive \$31,200 more support from the ACA, formerly the AAA, in 1949, than they have in 1948, Administrator Emmit Powell said this week. The funds are allotted by the Department of Agriculture to counties over the nation to aid in improving farming and ranching practices and are administered by county committees.

The sum allotted Eastland County for use this year was \$52,400, while \$83,600 will be spent for the next year.

The county committee, composed of Elmer E. Blackwell of Cheaney, B. O. Speegle of Scranton and Doss Alexander of Pioneer will meet Friday in Eastland to discuss features of the 1949 program, including whether to make eradication of brush and mesquite a part of the payment program.

The practice had been on the program for several years until this year when it was taken off.

Already definitely on the 1949 payment program, said Powell, are terracing, tank building, winter legume planting, rye cover crop planting (not on the program this year), deep plowing or chiseling (also new and phosphate fertilizing.)

The deep plowing, with a chis-

el plow, has been tried extensively and successfully in other sections of the country, in tight soil, Powell said.
The land is broken to a depth of about 12 inches, he said, while in ordinary plowing the depth reached is rarely more than 4 or 5 inches.
Powell said that already more than \$25,000 has been allotted for next year's payments, for planting winter legumes, a total larger than was used this year. However, because of the dry weather much of the legume seed is above ground, he said.
This year, about \$23,000 was allocated for legume planting.

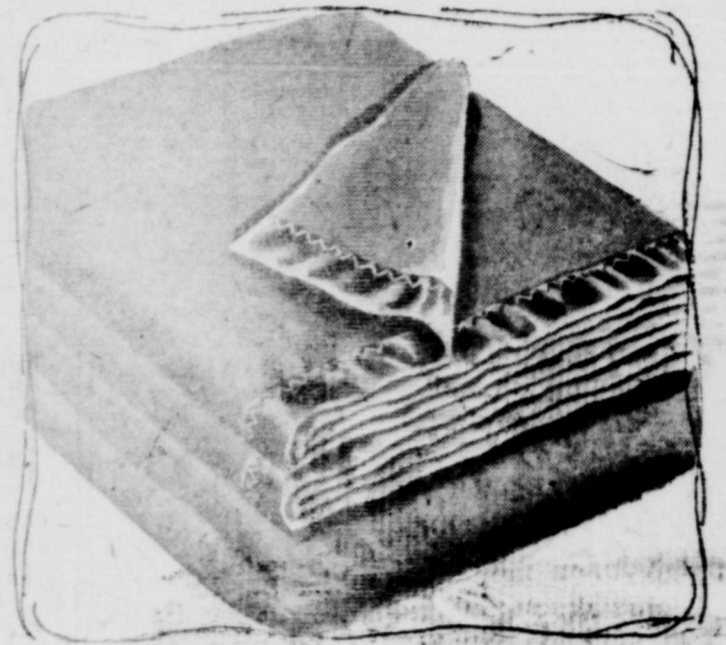

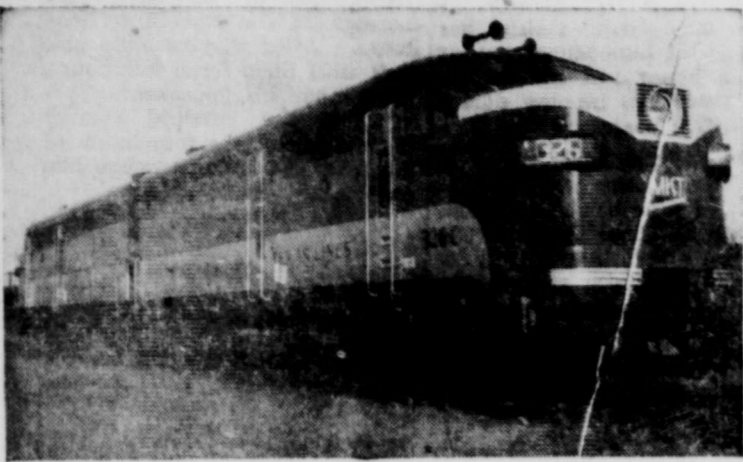
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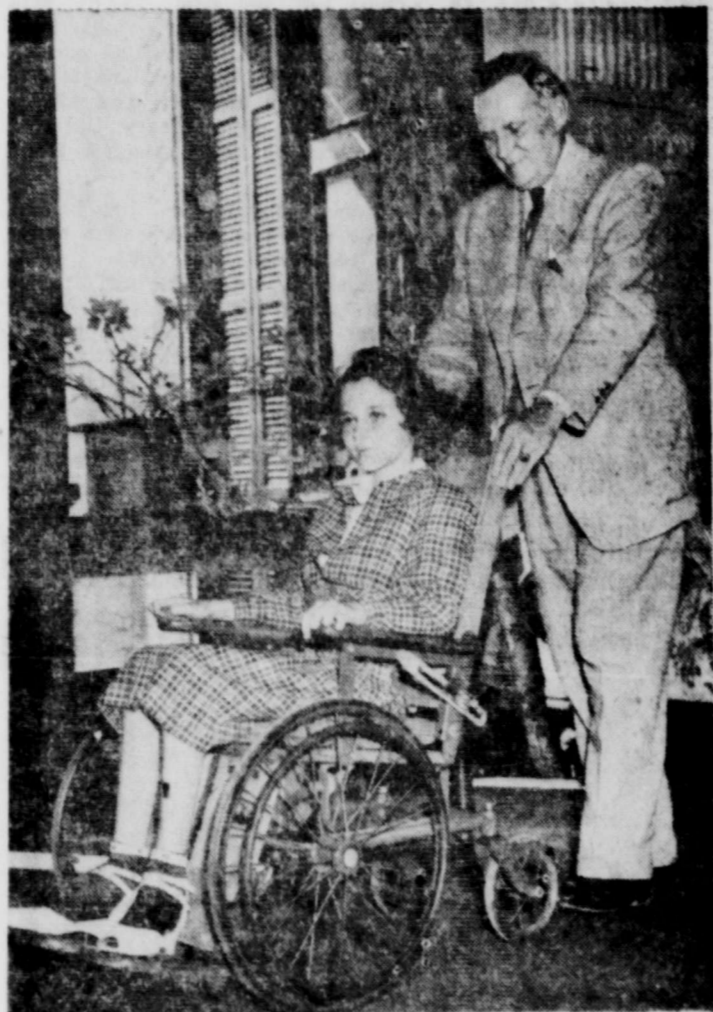
