SINCE PRINTING an inquiry in the Texas Historical Society for information regarding the Judge James Henry Cannon early day pioneer citizen of Cisco and Eastland County, we had a number of people as they remember Mr. Cannon as a fine outstanding citizen.

AND MRS. JIM ANDERSON, daughter of the distinguished lawyer, came in to bring us some newspaper clippings regarding her father's death. He died on October 1, 1919, at the family home here at the age of 70 years.

ONE OF THE newspaper clippings said in part, "James Henry Cannon was born at La Grange, Texas, January 17, 1849. In 1868 his family moved to Houston. He graduated in 1870 from Homer College, a school of law standing in that day. In 1871 he came to Waco, where he was in the office of General Harrison and was admitted to the bar.

He came to Eastland County in 1873 and when the county was organized in 1876 was elected the first county judge. Later, he served as district attorney when this district extended west to the Pecos, then two terms in the state senate, and was for a number of years judge of the 45th Judicial District.

In 1882, he married Miss Jennie Conner of Eastland with his wife and three daughters he moved to Cisco in 1903 where he has since made his home. He was a loyal member of the Methodist church and always a strong advocate of prohibition. He was an enthusiastic Mason, being a charter member of Eastland Blue Lodge and charter member of Cisco Royal Arch Chapter and Cisco Commandery."

The newspaper paid a glowing tribute to the Judge's life of usefulness. He was buried in the Cisco cemetery.

Take Runner-up Award Wranglers Lose to Lon Morris In Finals of Ranger Cage Tournament

Cisco's Junior College basketball cagers lost its opportunity to cash in on a second tournament trophy, but stayed in the fight to clinch the runner-up award of the annual Ranger Junior College tourney held there last week end.

Previously the Wranglers were the winners of the championship battle over Clifton Junior College's six team tournament staged there December 16-17-18. The trophy was of the first to be brought back to Cisco Junior College since early 1943.

At Ranger Coach Stormy Davis' quintet, with Homer Tompkins at the throttle, soared early into the lead after the elimination play-off, first downing Weatherford Junior College and then slamming a spirited Ranger five into the background as the tournament rolled into the final stages.

Unnoticed at the time, a well-rounded ball club from Jacksonville—Lon Morris Junior College—was keeping in step with the Wranglers, steadily and never faltering.

The Ciscoans, by pushing the Rangers from the picture, 40-38, went into the final phases of the tourney Saturday night and there met and lost out on the titlist award by going down under the hammer like blows of Lon Morris, 50-76.

The Jacksonville school, having already displayed a neat running attack in previous encounters, failed to perform and carry out its "all-over-the-court tactics" against the Wranglers in the first ten minutes of the game and at the half's end held tight to a slim lead, 31-37.

Minutes after the second half was whistled off, Lon Harris discovered the Ciscoans' weak points in the forward line defense, and soon benefitted by them, before any alteration by the Wranglers could be done.

Roy Burroughs, lanky six-footer and keen on cross court lay-ups, spurred the stimulated rally, nudging Lon Morris from the constant threat by the Wranglers and churned his team's attack into the final seconds of the play-off.

Burroughs personally made 24 of his teams 76 points being the highest scorer. Jack Henderson, guard for Lon Morris, followed the captain with 17 points.

For Cisco it was Leonard Gris-

by who lead in scoring honors, netting the basket for a total of 17 points with Homer Tompkins trailing with 13.

Tournament trophies were presented by Ranger Coach Boon Arterburn to the following teams: Lon Morris, championship; Cisco, runner-up; and Big Spring, consolation. Lynn Johnson of Cisco was awarded a bronze stature for the most outstanding sportsmanlike conduct while on the playing court.

Players chosen for the all-tournament team included Dave Turner of Big Spring, D. W. Harkins of Wayland, Leon Burks of Wayland, Leon Parrish of Cisco, Dave Oliver of Clifton, Eddie Alberts and Roy Burroughs of Lon Morris, and Bud Fletcher of Big Spring.

The junior college Wranglers will resume the season's cage warfare with Decatur, January 3 after Christmas holidays.

Prizes Offered In History Contest

A first prize of \$100 will be awarded the winner of the 1948-1949 Junior Historian Contest sponsored by the Texas State Historical Association. Twelve papers will receive awards totaling \$345.

Contest entries may deal with any topic in Texas history, but contestants are urged to work on some subject related to their community or local history. Suggested topics are: cattle, trails, saddles, Indian depredations, transportation, natural history, exploration, oil, economic, political, or biographical subjects.

"Any boy or girl in Texas under 21 years of age may become eligible for competition," stated H. Bailey Carroll, editor of "The Junior Historian" magazine of the Association which is written almost exclusively by young Texans.

The sale of Christmas Seals is being conducted now throughout the country and will continue until Christmas to raise funds for the tuberculosis control work of the N. T. A. and its affiliates.

Maritime Service Accepting Applicants For 1949 Classes

The United States Maritime Service has announced it will start accepting applications for the 1949 classes in its specialized six months training course which prepares men for a career in the United States Merchant Marines.

The number of men per class each month are limited. All interested applicants must meet the following pre-requisites: be an American citizen, be between the ages 17 1/2 and 35 years have obtained at least a ninth grade education, satisfactory complete physical and aptitude examination, and submit three letters of character reference.

Enrollees while in training will receive \$75 per month plus subsistence and quarters, uniforms and texts. Upon satisfactory completion of this training, enrollees will be certificated as experienced seaman in the United States Merchant Marine as ordinary seaman in the deck department, fireman, oiler and water-tenders in the engine department, and second cook and bakers in the stewards department.

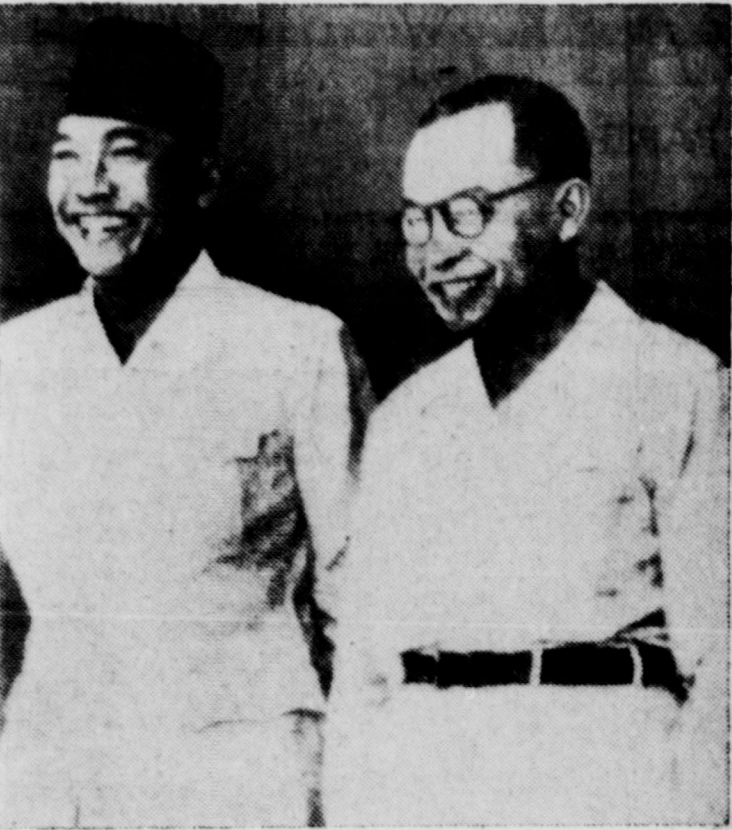
Texans Appointed To Marine Corps League Office

ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 21.—Appointment of two Texans to national offices of the Marine Corps League was announced here today by National Commandant Theus J. MacQueen, first World War II veteran to head this all-Leatherneck veterans organization. Judge Robert A. Hall of Dallas was selected to serve as a member of the League's national supreme judicial commission chairman is Ralph R. Thombs of Youngstown, Ohio. Hasten L. McCune Jr., of El Paso has been named a member of the League's national housing committee. The chairman of the committee is Bernard J. Curtin, Jr., of Lynn, Mass. Part of the League's program for the ensuing year includes doubling of its units, local teen age programs, a \$3,000,000 Marine memorial, and community programs that will include athletics, youth activities, Americanism and assistance to all veterans, particularly Marines.

Young Doctors And Dentists Needed By Army

AUSTIN, Dec. 21.—Reserve commissions are now available for young doctors and dentists, subject to the draft if they volunteer and are placed on active duty before being inducted under the Selective Service act. Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Senior Army Instructor for the Organized Reserve Corps, has announced.

Under congressional provisions these young doctors and dentists will receive \$100 per month compensation in addition to regular pay and allowances. The extra compensation will not be given to those who enter the services through the Selective Service, even though they are subsequently commissioned. These reserve commissions are available to qualified doctors of medicine and dentistry who have completed a four-year course physically able and now are serving an internship. Once they are accepted and commissioned in the reserve, they may be called for a period of active duty after they have finished their

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current year of internship. Such commission can be used to support a request for deferment in the draft. At the present time there is a dire shortage of doctors and dentists, it is stated, and young doctors and dentists, who are subject to the draft, the urged by the armed services to give serious consideration to accepting commissions. They may get detailed information from Waco Organized Reserve Corps Instructor's office, Fed. Bldg., at Waco, Texas.
