## Rain Halts Early Harvest Locally

Wednesday night's rain, which measured 1.1 inches in the official Friona gauge (not Ron's), brought a halt to the cotton harvest in the local area, which had gotten underway during the past week.

The latest rain added to the measurement of .69 from earlier in the week, and a light shower last Friday morning.

On the positive side for cotton farmers--if the temperature had been about two and a half degrees colder Wednesday night, there could have been a snowfall of just over 12 inches on the level, or some freezing rain, which could have damaged the cotton crop a lot more.

Jerry Butman, manager of Friona Farmers Co-op Gin, said that his gin had processed about 700 bales before the rain called a halt to the harvest proceedings.

Butman said that all of the cotton ginned to date had been defoliated, and was on dryland or semi-irrigated land.

The farmers owning the cotton which had been ginned indicated that the early yield amounts were surprisingly better than they had thought it might be.

None of the better irrigated cotton had been ginned, Butman said.

The 1.69 inches of rain received during the past week, added to the light showers earlier in October, brought the month's total moisture to 2.51 inches, and supports one longtime area farmer who said about a month ago that "we're probably going to get about as much rain (during the harvest season) as we wished we had received back when we really needed it."

Yep. Mother Nature can be very fickle, as every farmer can attest.

**HALLOWEEN** is all about CONSUMERISM! It never was about Satan... even back when the first Celtic person of ancient Ireland hollowed out a turnip and stuck a candle in it to light his way from house to house and beg for "soul cakes" from the villagers on All Hallows Eve, the night before All Saint's Day which marked the end of the harvest season.

The celebration was similar to our Memorial Day when we visit cemeteries and place flags and flowers on the graves of our deceased relatives and friends... also similar in scope to our Mexican neighbors who celebrate Dia de Muerte on November first.

When All Hallows Eve made the great leap across the Atlantic and became Halloween, it left its pagan associations behind. Lighted turnips became carved pumpkins and the whole thing took on a nature of gaiety and roguishness. As the Irish and Scottish folk spread farther into rural America in the late 1800s, the celebration became a time for merry mischief. On November first, farmers would find wagons on the barn roof, front gates hanging from trees, and outhouses in the middle of Main Street. I've heard it said that "the fun went out of Halloween when we all went modern and got indoor plumbing."

Halloween entered the last century completely stripped of any religious significance. It was about this time that a popular trade paper of the day admonished its readers to "never let a seasonal holiday escape the attention of your customers, provided it is capable of increasing the value of your merchandise." Boy did they ever take that lesson to heart! Look at the American consumerism that now surrounds Christmas, Thanksgiving, July Fourth, Mother's Day.

Today Halloween is a SIX BILLION DOLLAR industry. We out-spend it only on Christmas, and we out-party it only on New Year's Eve and Super Bowl Sunday.

Of that six billion, almost two billion goes for sweets with which to treat the young goblins who roam through the night. About a billion and a half goes for costumes. The remaining two and a half billion is spent on food, drink and decorations... from orange and black Rice Krispies, Oreos with orange filling, to talking plastic skeletons and expensive fog machines with which to decorate the front lawn.

It's not just for the kiddies any more. Grown-ups have also embraced the holiday. Young adults in the larger cities enjoy dressing up in outlandish costumes to make the rounds of local parties. Beer companies report a 10% increase in sales around this time of year.

While adult festivities grow wildly profuse, parents have taken over the reins of establishing a more safe and controlled Halloween for their little merry makers. Some schools still have Halloween Carnivals. Churches hold harvest celebrations or "trunk or treat" in the church parking lots, while mall merchants dress up their stores and salespeople and invite children into the mall to "trick or treat" in a safe, temperature controlled atmosphere, complete with security patrols.

When my kids were young, I used to meet their friends at the door when they came for "trick or treat" and tell them I would only give them a treat if they would do a nice trick for me. We got some really cute results from that. One kid stood on his head, some did animal imitations, one group of kids linked arms and danced "do-si-do" around the front yard, and several told knock-knock jokes.

Of course they didn't realize this was a twist on the original meaning of trick or treat-- "If you don't give me a treat, I'll play a prank on you" and I certainly didn't tell them any different. Last year I tried to get some of the little doorbell ringers to do a trick. They just shook their sacks under my nose and demanded CANDY!

Anyway, I hope you all get dressed up as something you aren't and go have a safe and silly Halloween on Thursday.

## School Bd. Approves Tax Rate

The Friona School Board met in regular session Monday, September 9.

All board members were present, also Superintendent Jim Parker and Administrative Assistant Karon Zachary.

The board passed a motion to amend a previous motion, granting an increase of 3% to food service workers, instead of a previous 1 1/2% increase. The board agreed that in the future the food service manager will distribute approved raises to employees based on performance evaluations.

The board approved an ordinance to collect school taxes for Friona ISD. Another motion set a maintenance and ordinance tax rate for the 2002-03 school year at \$1.1450 per hundred dollars of valuation of such property.

The board discussed plans for the annual TASB school board convention and considered dates for Level II school board training.

### 75 Yrs Ago-Oct. 21, 1927

The Friona Star's \$3,000 Opportunity Club was written last Saturday night with the presentation of the prizes to the fortunate winners. The Chevrolet Coach was won by Mrs. Erma Taylor. The proud automobile winner stepped into her car and drove it away, hers to keep forever by right of conquest. Miss. Ilene McFarland won the diamond ring and Miss. Geneva Jones was the third place winner of the white gold watch. Paid in advance circulation has been increased by a big per cent and fully 95 per cent of the subscriptions were obtained for delivery in Parmer County.

On Friday last a representative of the firm of Hill & Nunn, of Amarillo, visited Friona with the result that before leaving he had consummated a deal by which his firm became owner of the Friona Telephone System. It is rumored that the new owners will greatly repair and extend the system, uniting it with other small town systems which it now owns.

### 70 Yrs Ago-Oct. 21, 1932

Each grade will have a booth with something to sell or some form of entertainment. # Chieftains Zap Olton 24-7 For District Win

While it wasn't as impressive as last year's 56-14 win over Olton, the Chieftains managed a 24-7 win over the Mustangs, for their first district win last Friday at Olton.

The win evened Friona's district record at 1-1. The team now stands 5-2 for the season. Friona is unbeaten on the road (4-0), and 1-2 at home.

Although the Chiefs outgained the Mustangs 308-176, they could manage to get into the end zone just four times.

The Chieftains got their touchdowns from four different backfield members.

Friona couldn't move the ball on its first possession, but likewise held Olton to just one first down on their first try with the ball.

The Chieftains caught a break when the Mustangs lined up to punt on fourth down from the Friona 40. The punter got a bad snap, and was tackled for a 25-yard loss, giving Friona the ball at the Olton 35.

It only took the Chieftains two plays to convert the mistake into points, when Jason Gutierrez made a nice 29-yard run, following his blockers into the end zone.

A bad snap on the point-after cost Friona a point, but the Chiefs had taken the lead, 6-0, with 6:48 left in the opening period.

It didn't take Olton long to respond, either.

Aided by a kickoff return to the 50-yard-line, the

Mustangs got with the program. Running back Tray Johnson turned right end on a sweep play, and was hardly touched on a 46-yard scoring jaunt. The Mustangs kicked the only PAT of the evening, to take the lead at 7-6, with 5:45 still left in the opening quarter.

Olton had taken only 1:03 off the clock in matching Friona's score.

On Friona's second possession of the second quarter, the Chieftains began a drive at their own 29, after Gutierrez returned a punt.

Nathan Haile looked like his "old self" on a hard, 29-yard run, which moved the ball from the Olton 49 to their 20-yard line.

Adam Bandy's number was called three times (of four chances), and the senior, battling back from a pre-season knee injury, responded with runs of six, six and two, the latter being for a touchdown.

Bandy took the handoff as the team tried a two-point conversion, and although it appeared he was over the line, the officials didn't agree. Whatever, the Chieftains had recaptured the lead at 12-7. There was 5:35 left before halftime.

Olton drove from their own nine to their 39, picking up four first downs along the way. All of the yardage came on the ground.

Facing third and nine, the Olton QB faded to pass, and tossed a pass toward a teammate (he thought). However,

the player he hit right in the chest was defensive back Corbin Neill.

Neill grabbed the ball and headed the other way, and ran untouched, 35 yards, for a Chieftain touchdown.

Friona's PAT kick was blocked, but Neill's timely theft and run with just 23 seconds left in the period staked Friona to an 18-7 halftime lead.

Early in the third quarter, Friona took over on their 37 yard line, and set out on a promising-looking drive.

QB Brock Field hit Gutierrez for a 14-yard gain and a first down; Haile smashed six yards for another, then repeated on a nine-yard burst. Friona had gained 49 yards in ten plays.

But two plays later, Field's pass was intercepted by the Mustangs, to ruin the scoring bid with four minutes left in the quarter.

An Olton threat was halted by a good defensive play by defensive end Cody Grimsley, who brought the Olton QB down for a five-yard loss.

Friona drove from their own ten to the Olton 20, a 70-yard drive. But the Chieftains had a pair of untimely penalties, and a fourth down pass, Field to Heath Gammon lacked five yards for a first down and Olton took over.

But Friona's drive was halted only momentarily. On Olton's first play, Gutierrez made the second Friona interception of the game, and returned the ball 15 yards to the Mustang 20.

Field then handed the ball to Friona's all-time rushing leader, Haile, three straight times, and he didn't disappoint the large Friona crowd.

On a third and one from the 11, Haile took the ball on an option pitch, shook off a couple of tackles, and bulled into the end zone.

In all fairness to the FHS snapper, he was subbing for the regular, but the failure to convert still left Friona with a 24-7 lead, and only 1:38 remained in the game.

The Chieftains now have six interceptions for the season, and four in their two district starts.





I went to a funeral a few weeks ago for the father of a young man that pitched for me when I was coaching at West Texas A&M University. Charles lost his battle with cancer as did my mother at just about the same age, and I truly could feel his pain. But one thing for certain is that Charles produced an outstanding son.

I was pleased to see many of his ex-teammates, my ex-players, in attendance as well. I couldn't help but reflect on how I treated those kids when they played for me at WTAMU. I was hard on them. Some more than others and what seemed so important to me at the time did not amount to spit at that funeral.

I would say there was about a dozen or so players there and several of them drove a considerable distance to get there. I was sitting in the back of the packed church and they were sitting in the front two rows, as a team, in reserved seats next to the grieving family.

As I sat there taking it all in, I heard a whisper in my ear. It was the funeral director and he said, "Your players would like for you to sit with them." I've got to admit it caught me a bit off guard. But I was humbled that they asked me to sit with them and I obviously accepted.

As I sat down next to a young man that pitched for me six years ago, he grabbed my knee and said, "Coach, you need to be sitting here, you're one of us." For a long moment there I am certain I

beamed like a father whose son just got the game winning hit. I was sitting next to 12 of my ex-players and they didn't hate my guts for being tough on them.

I got in the faces of more than just one of them and I did all I could to get every ounce of effort and production out of them. Some of my methods worked, and some didn't. I am sure I had given them ample opportunity to hate me, at one time or another, with my madness. They all had received their degrees and had solid careers. Most of them had married and a few already had children.

As I sat there it dawned on me, not anything new, but just a confirmation of what I have always believed. Commitment is the most important thing and times like this is when friendship really has its salt. It is not the number of games you win or how many homeruns you hit or hitters you strike out. It's commitment to each other and the goals you set individually and as a team. Not every team is going to win the conference championship, just one, so what counts the most is that you are committed to each other, coach to player, player to coach, player to player, and coach to coach.

That is all that matters when the dust clears. That you gave it all you had for yourself and each other leaving nothing to chance.

As I watch my three boys compete in various activities, I know through experience that the outcomes is not a big deal in the long run. What is a big deal is what they learn along the way. Because the long run is those young men that drove several hours to support their teammate who just lost his father.

Those young men practiced, conditioned, won, lost and grew together as teammates and along the way developed lifetime friendships.

But one thing that rang loud and clear in that church in Friona is that those young men were committed to each other. They are true teammates and nothing could or would take that away.





My son Casey is 25. Since he was a little boy I have called him Dut, a nickname that came about because his sister Kirsten couldn't pronounce his middle name. He has a degree in history (finally) from North Texas University in Denton. It was the fifth or sixth college he attended.

He has worked (on occasion) as a camp counselor, waiter, bartender and landscaper (he mowed some yards).

He is a big, strong, handsome young man that doesn't especially care if the sun comes up tomorrow. He's also his grandmother's favorite grandson.

Right now, I am jealous of him. He is working on the cruise staff of the Carnival Pride that sails every Saturday out of Port Canaveral, Florida. Perfect job for someone with no place in particular to go in life.

Every now and then he wants to write a column for me. I don't know why, but I humor him. He emailed me this one. Yes, I did cut it to pieces and threw some of it away, but I left a lot of the good stuff.

Here's your column Dut. Tell your European friends your daddy made you famous.

### Howdy from the Atlantic!

My dad asked me to do this but I've been a little wary about doing another one of these. I've tried to be a good writer but after six years of term papers, most of it comes out pretentious and unnatural.

Also, I'm nowhere as good as ol' Ronnie Lynn so today I'm just writing whatever pops into my noggin.

I recently arrived in the real world (sort of). I'm talking about having a job. I work for Carnival Cruise Lines and am the Cruise Staff Assistant on the Pride.

That means I run some of the games-trivia, bingo, trivia, win lose or draw, also trivia. I do grunt work too. Set up, break down, pick up, deliver. There are good and bad things about working for a cruise line. First, the bad.

Tourists, drunks and wannabe comedians that go on vacation. I hate the part of my job that I have to laugh every time the white guy from Nebraska walks up with the Rasta cap and fake dreadlocks and says "Hey, Mon."

A lady comes up to me and says, "Scuse me sir, do these stairs go up or down?" I have to admit I was confused myself for a second. A guy on the dock in St. Thomas, in cowboy boots, Bermuda shorts and a big foam rubber frog on his head asks, "Whaddya suppose the elevation is around here." Sea level, dude.

My favorite duty is mopping the stage before the shows. (Really, it is.) That is what I got my degree in actually--Advanced Mopping--with Stage Applications. To properly mop a stage, mix two parts warm water with one part blue-ish chemical from milk jug. Use broad strokes until entire floor is moist, stopping occasionally to lip-sync into mop handle.

If coast is clear, empty brown water in mop bucket into dancer's toilet. My other favorite duty is setting up tables and putting brochures on them.

Every other morning I wake up on an exotic island. St. Thomas, Belize, Key West, St. Maarten, Progresso, Nassau, Cozumel. I try to golf in all these ports and the scenery is worth the trip.

Let me just say that I make squat, but I have nothing to complain about. There are a lot of crew on board who work two or three times harder than I do for a lot less money.

Also, I have no expenses except golf and the occasional CD or book, so I save most of what I make and plan to use

it to backpack Europe when my contract is up.

Or if I'm lucky I'll have a good reason to visit Australia (wink, wink). It is the perfect job for a young man like myself just starting out after college who wants to travel. And these jobs turn into full-blown careers for people like me all the time.

When I first got on board, I found ship life to be a little overwhelming. The sheer size of the ship and the way it is operated blew my mind. It took me a month to get the hang of my job and I work in the least complicated department.

The food and beverage department has the largest responsibility. In an average week on board my ship alone, here are some of the items passengers consume: 2200 lbs of prime rib; 4500 lbs of chicken; 15,000 lbs of shrimp; 1,000 lbs of lobster tail; 7,000 pizzas; 3,000 lbs of tomatoes; 6,700 lbs of potatoes; 22,000 eggs; 36,000 slices of bacon; 20,000 danish

pastries; 900 gallons of milk; 620 gallons of fruit juice; and 1,000 lbs of coffee.

That doesn't cover the bar, which serves 24,500 soft drink cans; 28,150 bottles/cans of beer; 1,420 bottles of champagne; 3,502 bottles of wine; and 4,000 liters of spirits. And every week, it all starts all over.

I really like my job. I miss my friends and family a lot and have to spend holidays on board, but I really like the atmosphere "Out Here". I've met many interesting people, passengers included. The steam room conversations alone could fill a book.
