Which was the first established Credit Bureau? The Retail Merchants Association, L. Self, Sec-

How was the Retail Merchants Association acquired by Miss Self? By purchase from a former Secretary and an agreement called "Bill of Sale" signed by H. S. Drumwright, A. D. Anderson, et al.

Had the Retail Merchants Association ever been sold before? Yes.

What does the word "Affiliated" stand for among Credit Bureaus? Each affiliated bureau pays to a centrally located organization a yearly sum for dues, which in a town of this size is about \$30.

Was the Retail Merchants Association ever affiliated? Yes, and in another location L. Self was President of the Secretaries Association 2 terms.

Is the Retail Merchants Association, L. Self, Secretary, the only unaffiliated Credit Bureau? No, we know of one in a town much larger than Cisco that has operatedd 20 years.

Would the merchants of that town start another without buying that couple's business? We do not think so.

What does "State" and "National" mean in this case? A body of organized men such as the State and National Grocery, or State and National Dry Goods Association, anly it is for retail credit pur-

Does the Retail Merchants Association, L. Self, Sec'y, have "International Coverage"? Certainly. Any credit reporting bureau can obtain reports from most all portions of the globe for a stipulated sum of money, however, there are not many people moving to Cisco from Africa, New Guinea, or Australia.

What protects the Retail Merchants Association so that no person or persons (except our own members and friends) can destroy the business? What is known as the "Consent Decree."

What is the "Consent Decree"? It is the result of a Petition entered by the United States of America in 1933 against the National Retail Credit Association, et al, under the Antitrust Laws.

Should the Retail Merchants Association, L. Self, Sec'y, be treated as if running a political race? No, this office is a business, and has been under the present management 18 years.

14. Does L. Self, Secretary of the Retail Merchants Association, contemplate selling this office on which much hard work has been expended? All of us expect to sell at sometime, or turn our businesses over to children in case there are any




