Understand Mrs. Rhoads has not as yet been informed of her husband's death, due to her serious condition. Relatives feel, however, that she is beginning to realize that he has passed away.

MANY PERSONS who knew them considered both Mr. and Mrs. Rhoads outstanding young citizens. He was an honor graduate of SMU and was doing a fine job with the Humble here. A member of the First Baptist Church, he was interested in young people and taught a junior boys Sunday School Class. He also was assistant choir director.

HE WAS VOTED into the Lions Club only a day or so before the tragedy. Mrs. Rhoads is a talented musician and also active in the church.

AN ARTICLE IN Tuesday's Daily Press regarding motor scooter drivers was apparently written without sufficient facts. It said, among other things, that there are between 50 and 75 in the city. As a matter of fact, there are not that many in Eastland County. It also intimated that there were a good many unlicensed drivers of same. February 1 Set As Deadline For Peanut Allotments

February 1 has been set as the deadline for new peanut grower applications, according to an announcement by Emmett Powell, secretary of the Eastland County ACA.

Peanut allotments will again be in effect and all farms that have had peanuts grown on them in the past three years will be eligible for a regular allotment. However, farms that have not been planted in peanuts for the past three years will not receive an allotment until the owner applies for his quota.

The program is a part of the Production and Marketing Administration program.

Loboes To Meet Mineral Wells In Cage Game

With milder weather in sight, Coach Buck Overall's Cisco High Loboes will go to Mineral Wells Thursday night to play the cage team there.

A B-Squad game will be on the program to start at 6:30 o'clock, with the main event scheduled to follow. Coach Overall listed ten players to make the trip in addition to the regular starters.

The Loboes were cheered by the return of Durwood Smith, who had been absent from the court for the past three weeks due to a knee injury. He'll replace Dean McDaniels at center and the blonde-headed McDaniels will drop in to guard position. Don Kent will shift into guard position and Ray Rylee and George Watts will be juggled to the forward slots.

Mineral Wells has been given a slight 5 point advantage over the Loboes, but with Overall's crew in tip-top form now, tomorrow's district fight could shape into a toss-up. The Mountaineers hold a 43-38 victory over the Loboes, gained in the Weatherford tourney.

Despite icy days this week, Overall has taken every opportunity to groove his hoopers in to shape to handle the Mountaineers. The Loboes will inaugurate a new line defense which places Watt guarding the man at the backboard while the remainder of the team maneuvers over the court at will. It has proven effective in afternoon practice sessions and could inch the Ciscoans out in front.

Little Donald Kent, who is the team's shortest player at 5 feet and nine inches, is a show by himself. So far he is the leading scorer for Cisco High and handles his small frame to the best advantage with experience and aggressiveness.

NOTED SPEAKER TO TALK AT ROTARY CLUB TEACHER APPRECIATION BANQUET

More than 100 persons were expected to attend the Cisco Rotary Club's "Teachers Appreciation" banquet tonight when Grover Hart, influential speaker and president of the International Publishing Company, will be the guest speaker. Mr. Hart's subject for discussion will be "The United Nations Charter."

The informal dinner will begin promptly at 7:30 o'clock at the Cisco Junior College cafeteria, Charles Graham, in charge of the affair, said today. Approximately 70 invitations to members of the Cisco Public School and Junior College faculties have been returned, he stated.

Mr. Hart, who has been connected with the University of Texas Extension Department, is the author of "The United Nations Charter and the Statue of the International Court of Justice," and is a member of the Texas Bar Association.

Since the spread of Communism, Mr. Hart has published articles in his campaign against the threats of war. He is a noted speaker and has addressed many government committees on grounds of the United Nations. He will be introduced by Rotarian J. J. Calloway who arranged for the guest speaker's appearance.

Aside from Mr. Hart's address, Rotarian Ernest Hittson will entertain the guests and members of the club with a quartet composed of local musicians.

In spite of weather conditions, Rotary President Jess Proctor said the banquet would be held as scheduled. Mr. Hart was expected to arrive here early Thursday afternoon.

Officials Expect 135 Traffic Fatalities In January, 1949

AUSTIN, Jan. 9 — (Spl) — Fewer people are likely to be killed in January traffic accidents than in any other month of 1949, President Charles A. Miller of the Texas Safety Association said today. He expects about 135 deaths for the month. January, however, cannot be called the safest month of the year. Miller pointed out that while traffic movement drops very low in January because of bad weather actually more people are killed per mile traveled than in many other months.

The safest month is July which has the most travel, a relatively small number of fatalities, and the smallest number of persons killed per mile traveled.

With hazardous weather in prospect this month, Miller urged motorists to exercise unusual caution. ((Skidding on snow, ice, or wet streets and roads will figure in many January collisions,)) he said. Obscured vision will figure in many others.

Pointed out that wet or icy pavement may increase stopping distances from three to twelve times. Miller suggested that motorists driving on slippery pavement should keep asking themselves this question: "If something goes wrong, can I stop in time?"

Miller said the Texas Safety Association this month is beginning the second year of its participation in a nationwide, month by month safety education program in cooperation with the National Safety Council, statewide organization like the federation of women's clubs Parent Teacher Association, the American Legion, and official agencies like the Texas Highway Department of Public Safety. The program, called Operation Safety, is carried on by the Safety Association as a part of its contribution to the Governor's Action Program for Highway Safety, of which the Association is official coordinator.

SEMINOLE WOMAN DIES FROM INJURIES RECEIVED IN AUTO CRASH NEAR CISCO

Also injured in the accident was Mrs. Will L. Everett, who received a serious head injury. She was reported as improving by hospital attendants.

The Everetts and Mrs. Rivers were returning to their home in Seminole after attending the funeral of a relative in Lufkin when the mishap occurred.

Mrs. Everett's body was shipped to Seminole Wednesday night and funeral rites were to be held here. Thomas Funeral Home handled arrangements here.

Mrs. Everett is survived by five sons and six daughters.

Leaving damages conservatively estimated as above a million dollars, the ice storm which has held Cisco and the surrounding territory in its grip since early Monday, was thawing Thursday.

The storm left in its wake ruptured communication service and utility service, heavily damaged trees and shrubs, wrecked automobiles, burst radiators and water pipes and damaged streets and highways.

Hit the hardest were the West Texas Utilities Company and the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., who maintain thousands of miles of service wires in the area. The telephone company was accepting emergency long distance calls only and some local services were disrupted.

Emergency crews were at work Wednesday and Thursday clearing away the damaged equipment and making surveys of the loss. Officials estimated that the storm had already cost them above \$300,000 with more to come. Fifty men from Fort Worth were attempting to restore partial service as soon as possible.

The Western Union Telegraph Company also suffered greatly from the storm and was accepting no telegrams Thursday.

Cisco was without electric power most of Thursday morning and part of the afternoon, new line breaks occurring just about as fast as damages could be located and repaired. Wednesday night a transmission line between here and Putnam went down and plunged the town into darkness. In some instances the power was shut off to hasten repairs.

Service was resumed when the feeder lines into Cisco were attached to Texas Electric Service Company lines at Eastland. Shortly after the hookup was made the lines between Cisco and Eastland went out and all was dark again.

Service to Cross Plains and Rising Star was resumed at 1 a. m. Thursday after being off since midnight Tuesday.

Scranton and Nimrod were still without lights and power Thursday and will be out for another day or two. The failure was due to lines down south of Putnam. A mile of line and poles were down from weight of the ice.

Company officials were forced to use couriers to relay messages to repair crews because of damaged telephone circuits. The radio telephone was also out due to line breaks.

Repairmen from several South Texas points and from out of the state answered the call for help and were busy Thursday trying to bring some order out of the chaos. A crew of eight men from Nashville, Tenn., and like crews from Longview, Abilene and Mineral Wells were aiding local crews in the attempt to place service back to normal.

Three crews from Corpus Christi were in Abilene to work from that end but officials of the company and the telephone company estimated that it would take weeks take weeks to get their service to the same level it was before the storm.

**Eastland County Buys \$772,295 in U. S. Bonds**

The people of Eastland County bought \$772,295 worth of U. S. Savings Bonds during 1948, according to a year-end report by Harry Owens of Dallas, state director for Savings Bonds, to Cyrus B. Frost, County Savings Bond chairman. During the same period, the Texas people bought \$196,448,587.50 worth of these securities.

Mr. Owens said that Texans now own more than 1.5 billion worth of Savings Bonds which earned \$42,372,000 in interest during the year.

**Coffee Bread Brings Rolled Oats To Breakfast in a New Way**

HERE'S a new breakfast idea in two parts. Delicious Oatmeal Coffee Bread is partly made the night before and finished up in a jiffy in the morning. Besides sturdy rolled oats, this breakfast treat boasts raisins and nuts. Most of the preparation can be done the night before. Follow the recipes below and, in making advance preparations, sift together the dry ingredients and mix in the raisins and nuts. All you'll have to do in the morning is combine with the remaining ingredients and pop the bread in the oven. Here is the recipe for:

**Oatmeal Coffee Bread**

**Crumb Topping:**  
3 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg  
2 tablespoons flour  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

Cut butter into dry ingredients

**Bread:**  
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour  
2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
4 tablespoons sugar  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup raisins  
1/2 cup chopped nuts  
1 egg  
3/4 cup quick-cooking rolled oats  
1 cup milk  
4 tablespoons melted fat

Sift together flour, baking powder, sugar and salt, stir in raisins and nuts. Beat egg slightly; add rolled oats, milk, and fat. Add to first mixture, mix quickly but thoroughly. Fill greased muffin pans, 2 inches in diameter, 2/3 full or turn into greased 9-inch square pan; sprinkle with crumb topping. Bake in hot oven (425°-450° F.) about 25 minutes. YIELD: 12 muffins.

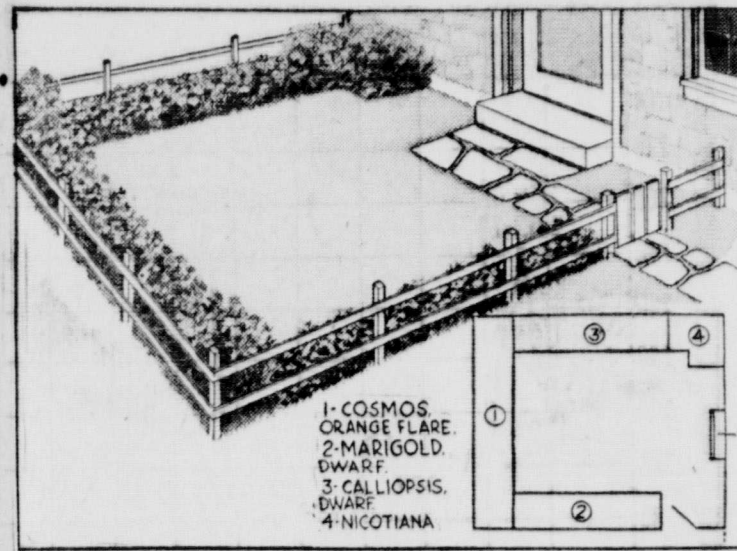

## Dooryard Flower Gardens in Fashion for New Homes

Dooryard flower gardens are growing in popularity in communities of new homes, and the fashion promises to spread throughout the country, transforming the appearance of older sections where flower beds in front yards have rarely been seen.

The fashion is well suited to the new one-story homes, of which thousands have been built in all parts of the country. Gay flower beds and borders give the simple lines of these houses a decorative frame which enhances their appearance. The flowers never grow so high as to obstruct the windows. A flower-flanked door extends a friendly welcome to callers, and a neighborly greeting to passers-by.

Eight months or more of floral beauty may be enjoyed in dooryard gardens anywhere in this country. For a full season's display, spring flowering bulbs should be planted in the fall. Snowdrops, scillas, crocuses, daffodils, early and late tulips, following each other in that order, will provide flowers from the time frost comes out of the ground until the June perennials are in flower. For summer, a planting of annual flowers may be depended upon to bloom until winter sets in.

The garden shown in the illustration is cleverly designed to increase the apparent size of the house and lot, while providing a charming decoration for the entrance. The fence is 18 inches high and serves to enclose the flower beds, for which flowers are chosen whose height will be in good scale with the fence.

Cosmos orange flare, dwarf marigold, and calliopsis are all yellow and orange; the fragrant nicotiana (sweet tobacco) is white. This gives a color scheme which is especially suited to a blue house, or one painted in tones of yellow and brown. All these plants will grow easily from seed sown direct in the garden. Flowers a few weeks earlier may be obtained by starting seeds in an indoor box.

White flowers of any color combination, or mixture, will be beautiful in a dooryard garden, regardless of the color of the house, delightful effects may be produced with color schemes worked out by amateurs having a gift for decoration.

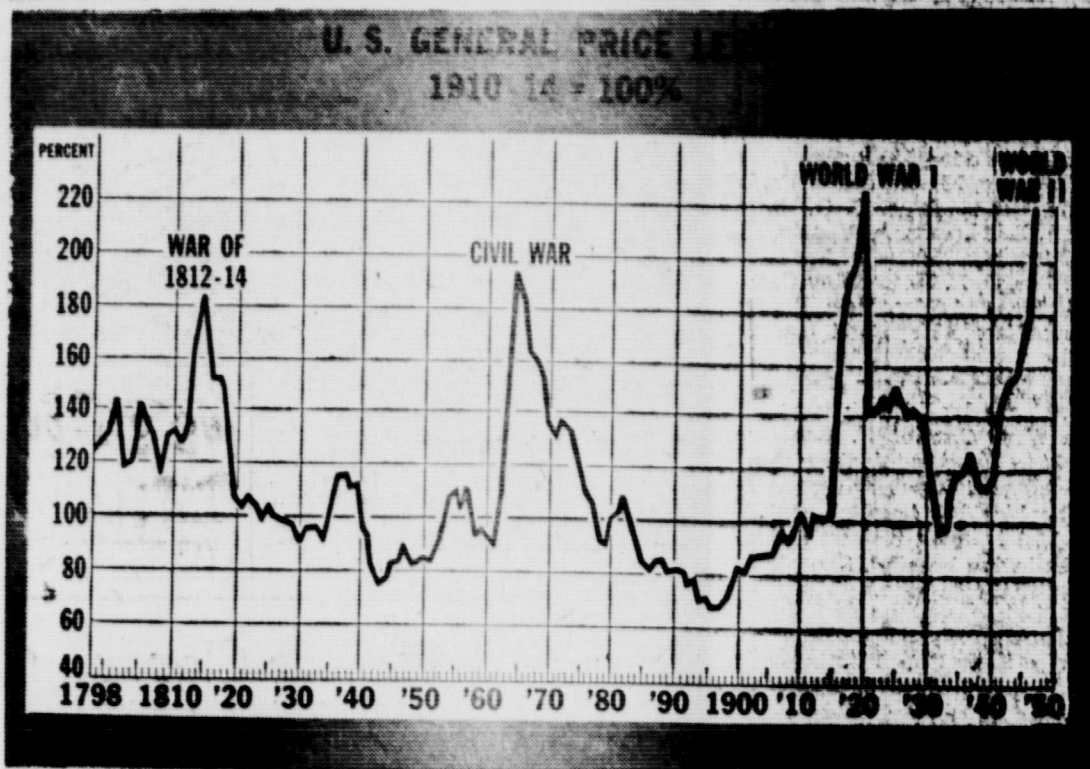

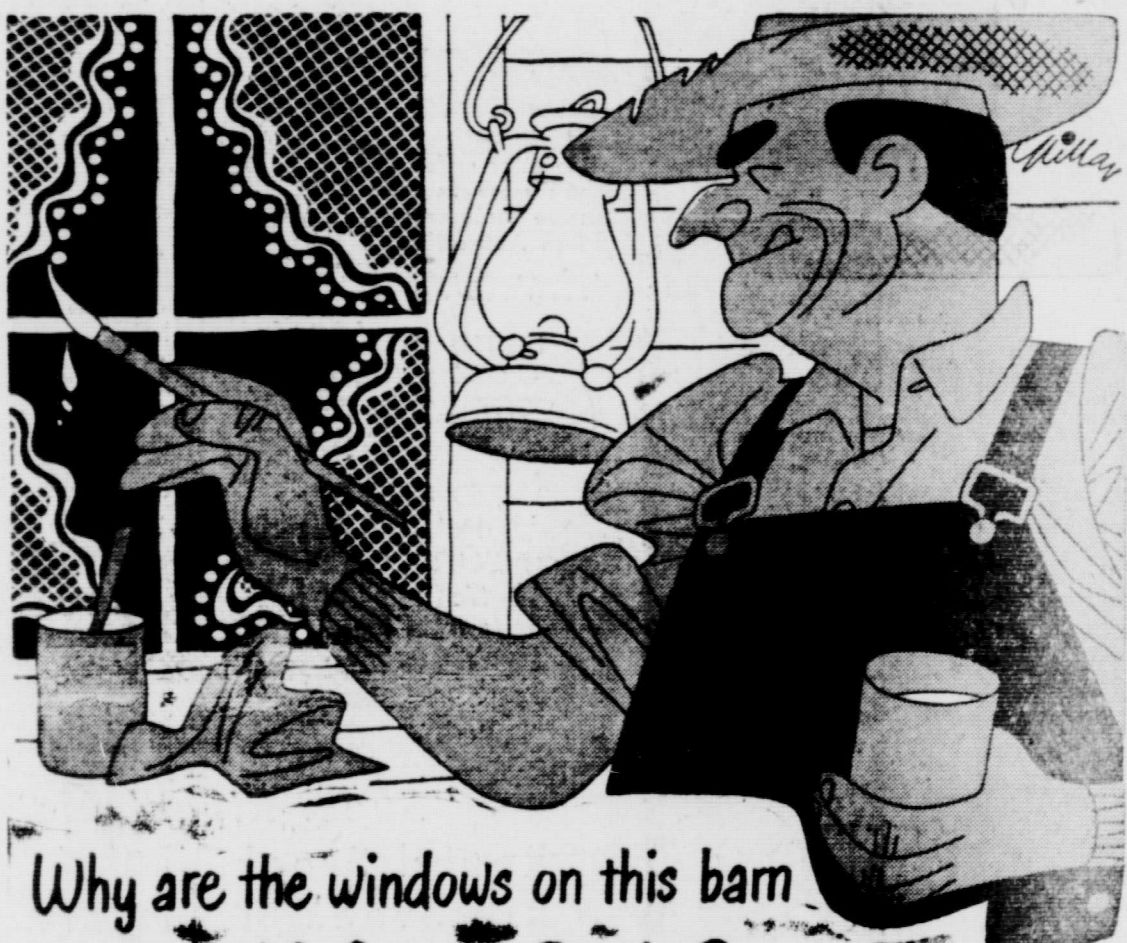
