More Than \$17,000,000 Spent For Fight Against Infantile Paralysis During 1948

More than \$17,000,000, it is estimated, was spent by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis assisting families and communities in the 1948 epidemic. Of this, more than \$6,000,000 was advanced by National Headquarters to chapters facing exhaustion of their funds.

Another \$300,000 was placed in state pools by chapters in areas of unusually high incidence.

Some of these expenditures, of course, were for care and treatment of patients from previous epidemics, just as part of the expenditures in 1949, and later, will be for continuing care of patients stricken last year.

In fact, carry over from 1948, when more than 27,000 persons were stricken, will probably be the heaviest in our history.

Without attempting to estimate the cost of continuing care in 1949, the rate of current expenditures makes it clear that more than ever before must be raised in the coming campaign.

Former Cisco Man Gets New Contract

Word was received in Cisco last week by Mr. and Mrs. Elbert Ezzell that their son, Bert, had been given a new three year contract as superintendent of the Matador Independent School District. Mr. Ezzell was made head of the Matador schools in 1945.

He is a native of Cisco, having spent all of his early life here. He is a graduate of Cisco High School and Abilene Christian College, later obtaining a master's degree from the University of Texas.

While in ACC he was a member of the Wildcat football team and was known as a kicking expert. He gained fame in 1933 for kicking a difficult field goal that enabled ACC to defeat McFurry 3 to 0.

Since Ezzell was installed as head of the Matador schools the system has undergone much improvement. Vocation agriculture classes have been added; achievement and intelligence tests have been made compulsory for all students; the area of the district has been increased from 165 to 435 square miles, and new buildings have been added.

Electrical service in Cisco was back to normal late Saturday and crews were busy over the area cleaning up after the most devastating ice storm in over 20 years, it was reported by officials of the West Texas Utilities Co.

All Cisco residents were again able to snap on the switches and obtain light — all because the company went all out to restore order out of the wreckage of the storm.

Scranton was the only community served out of the Cisco district that was without service late Saturday and officials stated that repairs were being rushed there so that residents would not have to spend another night in the dark. Rising Star's service was restored Friday after being off since Wednesday.

Work in the area was aided by the installation of a short wave radio system in the Cisco office. It was a part of a network covering the entire operating area of the company. Abilene was the control center and messages were relayed over the entire system. Trucks were equipped with receivers and transmitters and were in touch with headquarters at all times.

The service was placed at the disposal of the Texas Electric Service Company in locating a break in their 132,000 volt line running from their Leon plant to West Texas. The messages were relayed from Eastland by phone to the Cisco office and then to trucks spotted along the line. The break was found near Putnam.

Dave Oliver, the turning and twisting fireball back fieldman gave Wrangler gridmen pains in the side during the past football season, seemingly charmed the Ciscoans' outside defenders, racing into the inner-zone and then shuffling the ball into the sure shot fingers of towering McAlister who together the backboardsman tipped in 14 field goals.

For awhile it was a sure bet combination until seconds before the half. There Leon Parrish stepped into the two-man act for a time it appeared the pass play to the back boardsman would be spit and stopped, the Wranglers nearly succeeded

in knotting the score, but Clifton managed to inch out by a safe margin time after time.

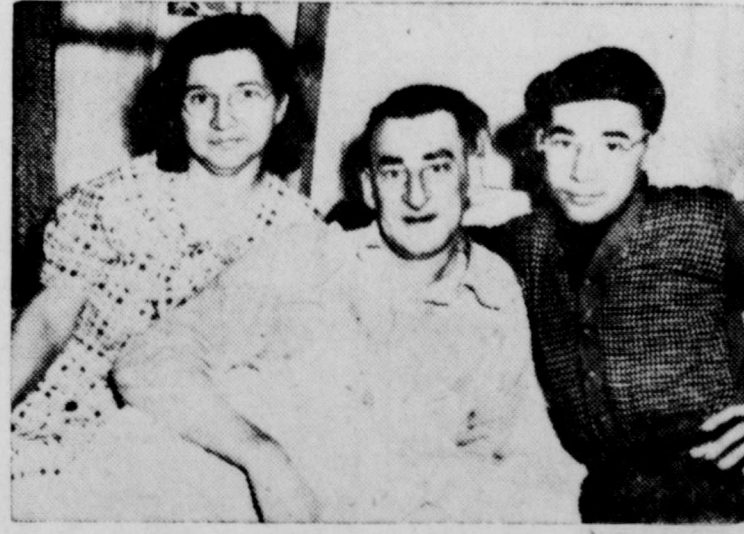

Mrs. Joe Wilson has returned from Fort Worth where she had visited her sister, Mrs. Ellen Turner, and other relatives there for several days.

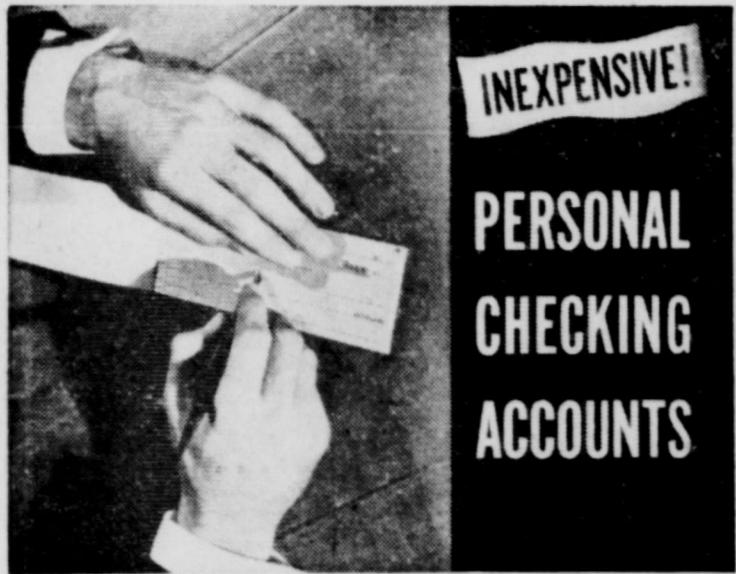
