For one thing, players Lites stayed on the same team from year to year. No hop-scotching by around, to the team who would bid the highest for your services.

Fans became accustomed to Ellis

the players with that 1950s method. Oh, you'd have the annual rookie. Each team might indulge themselves with one "rookie" per year--maybe not every year, even if you were the New York Yankees.

The Yankees had Joe DiMaggio, Yogi Berra, Whitey Ford, "Scooter" Rizzuto, etc. The Red Sox's mainstay was Ted Williams, who died only recently. The Cardinals had Stan Musial. DiMaggio, Williams and Musial played their entire major league careers with the teams we've listed.

I remember when Mickey Mantle, the Commerce (Oklahoma) Comet, was being groomed to replace Joe DiMaggio. A part of you wanted to see The Mick succeed.

But then--DiMaggio was a legend. Didn't he hit safely in 56 consecutive games back in 1941? Who could ever beat that? No one, apparently. It hasn't been equalled or topped in the intervening 61 years.

And besides that, if DiMaggio wasn't already the Super Hero--just for good measure, he goes and marries Marilyn Monroe!?!?! What else could this guy do??

It didn't seem to matter to fans like myself that most of the major league teams were based in the East, with none west of the Mississippi. This was also before weekly NFL games on TV. We had to keep up by daily radio broadcasts, the daily papers, and later on, the "Game of the Week" on (snowy) TV. In the 1950s, every major league team played 156 games per year. The season ended in September, and the World Series kicked off by October 1, maybe even late September. The champions of each league--usually the Yankees in the American League and the Brooklyn Dodgers in the National-played in the best of seven series. Today, there are divisional playoffs in each league (best of five), then the league championship series (LCS), before you've even determined who's representing the two leagues. Never mind the fact that the teams have already played 162 games in the regular season. The World Series tries hard to be finished before the first major snowfall in New York, but doesn't always make it. In the 1950s, the players competed for the love of the game. Good players might be paid \$25,000. Babe Ruth had stunned the world by getting \$100,000 a few years. Someone told him, "Babe, the president doesn't even make that much," and his reply "Yeah, but I had a lot better year than he did!" Today's millionnaires have no team loyalty. They'd change teams in the middle of an at-bat, if the right offer was made. It's just not worth watching the games anymore. I'd rather work a crossword puzzle. Annuities Can Help Build Retirement Savings If you're already contributing to a 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan, that's great. But you may need to sock away even more-and one way of doing that is by investing in an annuity.

Annuities offer a variety of benefits, including the following:

Tax-deferred growth of earnings--When you invest in a deferred annunity, you pay no taxes on your earnings until withdrawal, so your money will grow faster than it would if placed in an investment on which you paid taxes every year. However, if you make withdrawals before you reach age 59-1/2, you may have to pay a 10 per cent early withdrawal penalty, plus an additional sales charge.

High contribution limits -- You can basically invest almost any amount into an annuity, although some restrictions do apply. So, if you've already "maxed out" on your 401(k) or IRA, and you still want to put substantially more money into a retirement-savings vehicle. then you might want to look closely at an annuity. Variety of payout options -- An annuity can provide you with an income stream you can't outlive. But you also can decide to accept payments for a certain period of time, such as 10, 15 or 20 years. If you were to die before that period was over, your beneficiary would receive the payouts for the remainder of those years. And some annuity contracts even offer payout options that cover two lifetimes, so that when you die, your spouse can still collect income for the duration of his or her life. Deferred annuities may be either fixed or variable. When you purchase a fixed annuity, you receive a guaranteed interest rate during the "accumulation" phase--the time in which you pay money into the annuity. You can only purchase a fixed annuity, with a one-time lump sum. Although you cannot continue to add money to a fixed annuity contract, you can purchase additional fixed contracts. You also will receive a fixed payment amount when it's time to start making withdrawals. When you buy a fixed annuity, make sure you're getting one from an insurance company that's received high safety and stability rankings from the independent rating agencies. This is essential, because annuity guarantees are backed by the claims-paying abilities of the insurer--not by the investment performance or safety of the underlying portfolio. If you want some growth potential, you may be interested in a variable annuity, which can offer a variety of investment options, including pools of stocks or bonds, or a mixture of both. When you start taking withdrawals from a variable annuity, you can either receive a fixed payout, a variable payout or a combination of the two. If you choose a variable payout, the amount of each payment is based on the performance of your investments. Keep in mind, though, that any withdrawals you make before age 50-1/2 may be subject to a 10 per cent penalty, along with a possible deferred sales charge. When you purchase a variable annuity, you will incur some risk, as the value of the stocks, bonds or other vehicles within the annuity fluctuates over time. You could end up receiving less than your original investment. Ultimately, the type of annuity you choose will depend on your individual needs, goals, diversification requirements and tolerance for risk. You may even want to own a combination of fixed and variable annuities. In any case, at least consider annuities--they can make your retirement years much more enjoyable.

New Lenses Help Color Blind Distinguish Hues

People with color blindness have to learn the order of a traffic light or develop a way of distinguishing the color of their clothes. The Food and Drug Administration approved an eyeglass lens that will make life much easier for these individuals. The new lenses alter light waves as they enter the eye and improve color distinction. The




manufacturer makes four different lenses coated with color filters to assist with varying color-vision deficiencies. It is also working on a soft contact lens with the same features. Though a person may distinguish colors more easily with these new lenses, he/she still will not be able to see shades of color.

Despite the name, color blindness has nothing to do with being blind. Rather it is a deficiency in the way a person sees color. With this vision problem, an individual will have difficulty distinguishing between certain colors, such as red and green or blue and yellow. Red-green color deficiency is the most common form of color blindness; less common is a blue-yellow color deficiency. Color blindness is a genetic trait that affects more men than women. A common

Color blindness is a genetic trait that affects more men than women. A common X-linked recessive gene causes the condition. Men inherit the syndrome from a color-deficint mother or a mother who has normal color but carries the gene. Fathers who are colorblind never pass the gene directly to their children, although daughters always carry the color-deficient gene.
