City, county, state and federal offices will be closed as well as the bank and post office, but a majority of the various retail stores will remain open during the holiday.

Cisco Youth Is Army Recruit

Recruit Jimmie R. Poplin, son of Mrs. J. R. Poplin of 205 W. 13 St., Cisco, has been assigned to the Fifth Armored "Victory" Division for fourteen weeks of basic training.

Reactivated July 6, 1948, the fifth division hung up a brilliant war record in six European campaigns during World War II. Before the end of 1949 Camp Chaffee is expected to have 20,000 troops, making it the largest Army Training Center in the Nation.

Before entering the Army, Recruit Poplin was employed as a truck driver. He is now assigned to Btry "A" 95th Armored Field Artillery.

Sgt. Pierce was killed in action in the French campaign on November 12, 1944, while serving with the American and British invasion armies. Born on September 2, 1923, he was reared in the Nimrod community and attended Cisco High School until his enlistment in the army.

Sgt. Pierce is survived by his father, M. H. Pierce of Cisco; a brother, Hubert Pierce of Lorrain, and a sister, Barbara Lou Pierce of Colorado City. An aunt, Mrs. B. C. Ingram of Nimrod, also survives.

Figures Released On Motor Truck Expense in 1948

AUSTIN, August 31, (Special) — The motor transportation industry was responsible for the expenditure of \$242,062 in Eastland County in 1948 for highways, schools and other governmental functions.

"This was made possible by payment of license fees, motor fuel taxes and intangible tax," said Roy Sanderford, President of Texas Motor Transportation Association in releasing a statistical study of the motor transportation Association industry's share of the cost of state and local government.

Sanderford stated that these figures do not include city and district ad valorem taxes, franchise taxes or unemployment insurance taxes.

Total taxes and license fees paid by motor carriers for the entire state amounted to more than \$50,000,000.

Eastland County's share of the industry's contribution to government was made up of the following: county portion of registration or license fees (commercial vehicles only), \$40,046; State highway construction, \$87,868; State highway maintenance, \$10,253; county and district road debt paid, \$15,458; surplus in road bond and distributed to county, \$3,679; per capita apportion to schools \$27,215; and intangible tax paid to county, \$2,213.

The above facts and figures prove beyond doubt that the motor transportation industry is paying its full share of the cost of government.

Two Wildcat Oil Wells Planned

Wildcat oil tests for two Eastland County areas were announced by drilling contractors Saturday. Both wells will go to 3,500 feet.

L. W. Roche of Gorman will drill his No. 3 D. M. Reeves on a location 2,300 feet from north and 330 feet from east lines of section 20, William DeMoss survey. The location is three miles northeast of Gorman.

The other wildcat is the Neeb, Austin and Evans No. 2 W. P. Moore, located north of Rising Star, 330 feet from west and 1,596 feet from south lines of the 85-acre Moore tract in the south central portion of the Mary Ann Clark survey.

Location is half a mile northwest of the same operator's No. 1 Moore, which had a show in the Marble Falls from 3,160 to 3,204 feet, but developed salt water on a drill stem test. The new effort will seek Marble Falls production.











OPEN SEASON -- NORTH ZONE: Sept. 1 to Oct. 15, both days inclusive. Shooting hours, one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.


SOUTH ZONE: Oct. 1 to Nov. 14, both days inclusive, except in Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Maverick, Dimmit, LaSalle, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Kenedy and Willacy counties where mourning doves may be hunted only on Sept. 16, 18, and 20, from 4 p.m. until sunset, and from Oct. 1 to Nov. 11, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

BAG LIMIT: Not more than 10 per day and not more than 10 in possession.

McMULLEN COUNTY: State law Nov. 1 to Dec. 15. Federal law, Oct. 1 to Nov. 14.






