

County Sends Profiling Data After Reminders

Parmer County was one of six Panhandle law enforcement departments that did not send racial profiling data to the state in a timely fashion. The six departments, Parmer County, Collingsworth, and Donley counties, and Estelline, Sunray, and Shamrock, were among 68 departments statewide that had not submitted data according to a report in the Sunday July 23 Amarillo Globe-News.

State Senator Royce West, D-Dallas, wrote the 2001 law prohibiting racial profiling and requiring reports. A February report complied from submitted data said that blacks and Hispanics are significantly more likely to be pulled over and are more likely than whites to be searched following routine traffic stops by six of every seven departments in Texas.

West sent letters dated March 10 and June 3 to the 68 departments then sent a news release July 16 explaining his requests and listing the nonresponsive agencies. Parmer County Sheriff Randy Geries told the Globe-News he remembers getting the request but has been busy with other priorities like a new-jail and robberies. "I don't think anything has been sent to him. There is no big deal there. It's just a matter of putting a priority on things," Geries said. "I'm hoping to have it done really soon."

Sheriff Geries was out of town this week attending a Sheriff's conference in Wichita Falls. Chief Deputy Wayne Gruben said that the profiling data was sent Monday July 26 after review by the county commissioners during their regular meeting.

Many law enforcement agencies argue that racial profiling statistics do not give a full picture unless they are compared to the ethnic breakdown of the area. As for Sen. West, he told the Globe-News, "I'm going to use every law at my disposal and every avenue at my disposal to get information. It's not over with."

Parmer County Receives Sales Tax For July '04

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn sent July sales tax allocations of \$214 million to Texas cities, up 2.7 percent compared to July 2003. Calendar year-to-date, city sales tax allocations are up 8 percent compared to the same period last year. Texas counties received sales tax payments of \$18.8 million, up 0.9 percent compared to last July. Calendar year-to-date, county sales tax allocations are 6.8 percent higher than last year.



Bases in Germany and Korea, while relevant to a Cold War The city council and city to print a retraction of this en- strategy, must be considered for closure first before bases in Louisiana, California and Texas face possible reductions or shut down as part of the 2005 Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC). In past BRAC rounds some stateside closures have been conducted hastily, and the military has only later realized their mistake costing millions of tax payer dollars, displacing soldiers and their families, and wreaking havoc on the local economies. Another growing concern is the increased restrictions being placed on our training capabilities abroad. In some areas our ability to fly helicopters at night, conduct live-fire exercises, or move vehicles over the countryside during war preparation has been severely limited. Not only do some bases fail to meet our national security needs; in some cases, the host countries are openly antagonistic toward our troops. Last year I enacted an Overseas Basing Commission, respon-

sible for a comprehensive study of U.S. military facilities abroad that will help defense policy makers arrive at more informed decisions. The panel's charge is to review the existing base structure and location, as well as assess whether our infrastructure is in place to meet current and future missions.

Important Asthma Facts

Asthma can be managed so that you can live a normal life. You should be able to play, exercise, sleep and go to work or school without being held back by asthma symptoms.

Asthma is a disease that inflames and swells the airways in your lungs. This swelling and inflammation, and the symptoms of asthma that they cause, such as cough, wheeze, shortness of breath or chest discomfort, can be controlled by medicine and by staying away from things that bother your airways.

Pollen or allergies, pollution or tobacco smoke, and respiratory infections like colds and sinus can trigger an asthma attack or episode that makes the airways narrow and makes breathing difficult. It is important to try to avoid things that trigger an asthma episode. Be sure to receive a yearly flu shot, and if you smoke, get help from your health professional to quit smoking for

Asthma needs to be watched and cared for over a very long time. Asthma cannot be cured, but it can be treated so that you can be free of symptoms all or most of the time. Asthma is not gone when symptoms are absent.

You play a big role in taking care of your asthma and working with your doctor.

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





Cotton Issues Top Washington News

LUBBOCK, July 23, 2004 By Shawn Wade Center stage has been a busy place in Washington, DC during the month of July with the usual jumble of individuals and issues vying for the spotlight.

For cotton the top candidates for attention have been consideration of the House of Representatives FY05 Agriculture, spending bill, development of the U.S. appeal of the WTO's Brazil/ cotton decision, and efforts to gain improvements in the federal crop insurance programs.

House Approves Agriculture Spending Bill

As Congress completes its last legislative week before their month-long August recess, a large number of important issues remain unresolved. For those in agriculture the most critical issue on the table is the 2005 Agriculture Appropriations bill.

The process did move forward slightly last week when the value cuts and resource mate- House of Representatives approved its version of the FY05 spending bill. The Agriculture Appropriations bill is the seventh At the recent seminar, TBC, of 13 spending bills acted on by the House to date.

With no action on a Senate version of the Agriculture Appropriations measure, it appears the Congress will add agriculture to strated recipes using beef value the growing list of unfinished spending bills.

High Plains Congressmen Randy Neugebauer, Charlie Stenholm and Mac Thornberry all voted for the legislation that provides \$16.77 billion in discretionary funding for FY05 on top of \$66.746 billion in mandatory spending. The final vote passing the Bill was

In the House bill Conservation programs were funded at the Key takeaways were ways to following FY05 levels: Conservation Reserve Program, authorized for full funding estimated at \$1.9 billion; Environmental Quality Program, capped at \$194 million; Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program, capped at \$60 million; and, Wetlands Reserve Program,

While the House approved budget did trim back some of the intended spending increases originally called for in the 2002 Farm Bill, major Farm Bill provisions such as payment limitations were left untouched during the legislation's consideration by the Budget Committee or during consideration on the House floor.

Crop Insurance Hearing Highlights Important Issues

House Agriculture Committee members heard reports and quesinteractive sessions that earned beef innovations and provide tioned Federal Crop Insurance Corporation Board Chairman Keith Collins and Risk Management Agency Administrator Ross Davidson during a July 21 hearing to update the Committee on the latest developments in the federal crop insurance program.

> During the hearing, Ag Committee members Randy Neugebauer and Charlie Stenholm questioned Collins and Davidson about recent RMA actions and noted the importance of key issues affecting producers.

Among the issues brought up during the hearing were the recent Standard Reinsurance Agreement negotiation process, the need to develop a solution regarding the deferred appraisal requirement for non-emerged seed, and increasing the ability of producers to tailor a risk management program to their situation.

Among the ideas discussed during the hearing was a proposal by Congressman Neugebauer to allow producers buying an APHbased insurance product to also purchase a Group Risk Policy that would cover the amount of their production deductible. Neugebauer also asked if consideration had been given to allowing a producer to select different levels of coverage based on production practice.

Collins and Davidson acknowledged the need to fully explore new risk management options. Collins noted that the FCIC Board has previously passed a resolution discouraging the Risk Management Agency from looking into the idea of allowing a producer to select different plans of insurance and coverage levels. He explained that the Board's decision was based on their perception that it would increase the complexity of the program for both producers and agents, and introduce additional opportu-

nities for program abuse. Plains Cotton Growers officials have suggested adding a limited amount of flexibility to the grower. PCG's concept would maintain the requirement that the producer pick a single insurance product, but add the ability to select different levels of coverage for dryland or irrigated production.

South Texans Gather For Beef At Festival

San Antonio's Texas Folklife Festival allowed 11,000 consumers to taste new beef product offerings in June, thanks to the Texas Beef Council.

The popular festival featured great tasting, value-added beef products as well as \$1 coupons, grilling information, and nutrition advice. The festival is held annually at the Institute of Texas Cultures.
