IN OUR neighboring city Eastland an election has been called for February 28 for the citizens to decide if parking meters are to be retained or removed. Citizens of the neighboring city will doubtless watch the news with interest.

Cisco, we know of possibly persons who are pretty definitely opposed to parking meters. I know a few others who won't express a personal opinion, but I doubt if the meters are the answer to the parking problem.

EASTLAND CALLED the election because the city had promised the county that the proposition would be balloted upon during some trouble over the matter facing meters around the house. Eastland's meters had been taken of \$4,366.50 through 31.

Some of our good friends called to see if Cisco was going to have an election. He said he believed in the Daily Press reported last night that an election would be held after six months.

Looking back over the files, all I can find about "six months" is that the city had agreed to keep meters for at least that period.

Working with Mayor Rosenthal, we know that there is no plan to hold an election unless the city desire one. If the council should in the proper manner, an election would be called.

CISCO'S METER receipts amount to \$5,278.00 through Dec. 31. This was five months. The average amount \$250 per month, half of which goes to the company until the meters are paid for.

BE SURE you'll be glad to see that receipts from the metering to retire city bonded debt — that the city is ahead of schedule in retiring these bonds. We've been asking a lot of people — particularly residents of rural areas — what they think of the meters. And a big part of them are for the metering. They tell us that they'd give any just about any time to see the park for a few minutes in the particular store in which they want to do business.

NOT EVERYBODY we've asked for the meters. One lady she was opposed to them because she never had any change. Generally, the women were more in favor of meters than the men. Looking at them from all angles, we've decided Cisco would probably be sorry they were taken out.

Production Credit Week Proclaimed By Governor To Honor Texas Group

In a proclamation signed Dec. 31 Governor Allan Shivers set aside the week of Jan. 22-28 to be observed as Production Credit Week in the State of Texas and called upon the citizens of Texas to join him in paying tribute to the farmers and ranchers of Texas who have done so much in fostering the movement in the state.

The proclamation follows: Under the terms of the Farm Credit Act passed by Congress in 1933, there are 502 production credit associations in operation over the nation, of which 36 are located in Texas.

The management of these associations was placed in the hands of the members themselves on the theory that only local farmers and ranchmen have the intimate knowledge of the people and their operations that is necessary in making loans that are both safe to the lender and sound to the borrower.

The Farm Credit Act contained provisions for member ownership as well as member operation on the thesis that people tend to take care of what belongs to them.

Congress supplied the original capital stock to these associations to assist them in getting started in their capacity as retailers of wholesale credit already available through the intermediate credit banks.

LABOR RELATIONS BOARD UPHOLDS MOTION OF WEST TEXAS UTILITIES. ABILENE, January 20. — An order of the National Labor Relations Board, Washington, D. C. handed down Jan. 18th, sustained a motion of the West Texas Utilities Company to dismiss a petition filed by an international Brotherhood of Electrical Workers field organizer requesting that the Company's Rio Pecos steam generating plant at Girvin, Texas, be designated as a separate unit to try out an election.

HEARING on the Union Organizer's petition which requested the Rio Pecos plant be designated as a separate unit in order that employees there would vote separately from the remainder of the employees in the Company's power plants and transmission systems on questions of union representation was heard before Everett P. Rhea, NLRB hearing officer, at a hearing conducted in Fort Stockton in October, 1949.

Following the hearing the West Texas Utilities Company filed a motion to discuss the Union's petition contending that the unit was inappropriate, and that the regular employees in all its other plants and installations in the U. S. Bureau of the Census.

Whitaker further pointed out, "in the past" 65 per cent of the employees in the line and service department have on several occasions formally filed petitions with the National Labor Relations Board stating in effect that they wanted no Union representation.

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REPEAL THE LUXURY TAX

This session of Congress will consider some of the most controversial legislative proposals in history. One piece of legislation that would win popular support, however, would be the repeal of the luxury tax—wartime excise taxes.

The wartime excise taxes were passed during World War II to reduce employment, penalize consumption, and discourage business in lines that were competing with the war effort. The rates were set very high to accomplish these purposes.

The war is over and the time has come to repeal this highly discriminatory measure. There is no longer a need to reduce employment in specific industries, to penalize consumption of specific products, or to discourage business just because it used scarce materials and labor in wartime.

Looking at the picture from a retailer's standpoint, the jewelry stores must tack on approximately 20% of virtually every sale price for taxes. The drug stores must add taxes to many of the items they sell.

In addition to these taxes, luxury taxes still are levied on telegrams, telephone service,

transportation by train or bus or airline. These are certainly unjust in view of declining corporation earnings in these fields.

As Collier's Magazine said recently: "Let's let people go back to making things people want. Let's stop these penalty prices. Let's use the common sense that Congress is prepared to use."
