Ramsey Well Is **Fested**; **Drilling Will Continue**

Drill stem tests were run late Friday on the McElroy Ranch Company's W. A. Ramsey No. 1, and indications were that the well could be completed as a good gasser in the bottom of the Caddo Lime. The hole was bottomed at 3,470 for the tests.

Previous tests in the upper Caddo showed a good quantity of gas and some distillate. Operators were confident that a well could be completed at that depth. The Caddo was reached at 3,195 feet and the first tests were made in the first 100 feet.

The permit calls for an Ellenburger test and the operators plan extensive tests of all prospective pay zones to the Ellenwere the Lake Sand, the Marble Falls, the upper and lower Ranger, and the Mississippian.

The well is located some six Eastland-Callahan County lines.
